In the second half, Ira continued to get too many second-chance points as they hit the boards.

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
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The closest the Covotes would get came at the start of the fourth quarter when Griffin hit a free throw to pull BHS to within 12 at 42-30.

The Department of Transportation will hold a public hearing in Gail on Monday, February 9, 2004, to discuss the Trans-Texas Corridor. The purpose of the hearing is to give the public an opportunity to submit comments on potential routes.

The Trans-Texas Corridor is a new type of transportation network that includes roads, rail, and a utility zone designed to move people and goods faster and safer, keep hazardous material out of populated areas, and improve air quality.

The meeting will be held in the District Courtroom of the Borden County Courthouse. The courthouse is located at the intersection of US 180 and FM 669 in Gail. Registration begins at 5:30 p.m. with the hearing beginning at 6 p.m. The facility is handicap accessible. Say good-bye to dry skin this season

When winter temperatures leave you singing the dry skin blues, small changes in your daily routine can make a big difference.

"Dry skin is a problem for many people during the winter months," said Dr. Ida Orengo, an associate professor of dermatology at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston. "When humidity decreases, the air becomes drier, which can cause skin to become dry and flaky."

Lotions typically fall into one of three categories — liquid, cream and ointment. All help the skin to retain moisture. When choosing moisturizers, liquids are good for use over the entire body since they are easiest to apply and don't stain clothing as much as creams. Creams are better for localized areas such as the hands, feet and face because they last longer on the skin. Since ointments are thicker and greasier, they are

most appropriate for exceptionally dry areas and are best to apply at night to avoid soiling clothes.

"The best time to moisturize is right after your shower because the skin is more receptive to moisture since the pores are opened up, "Orengo said.
