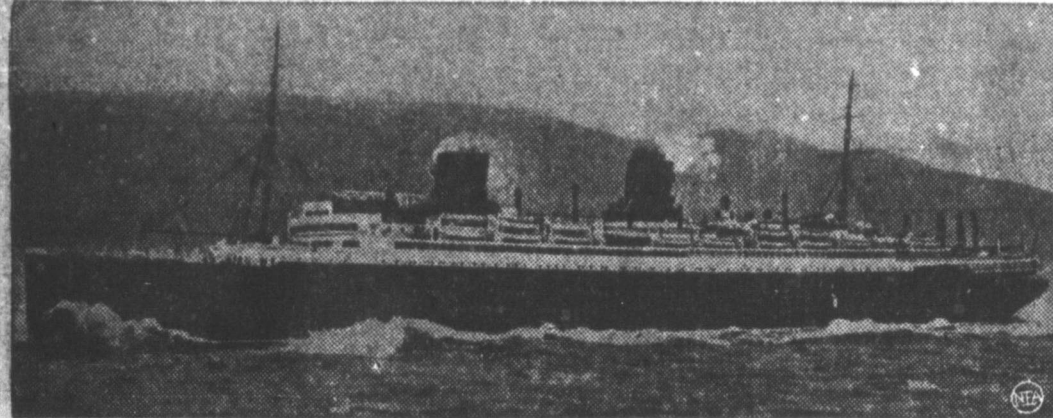

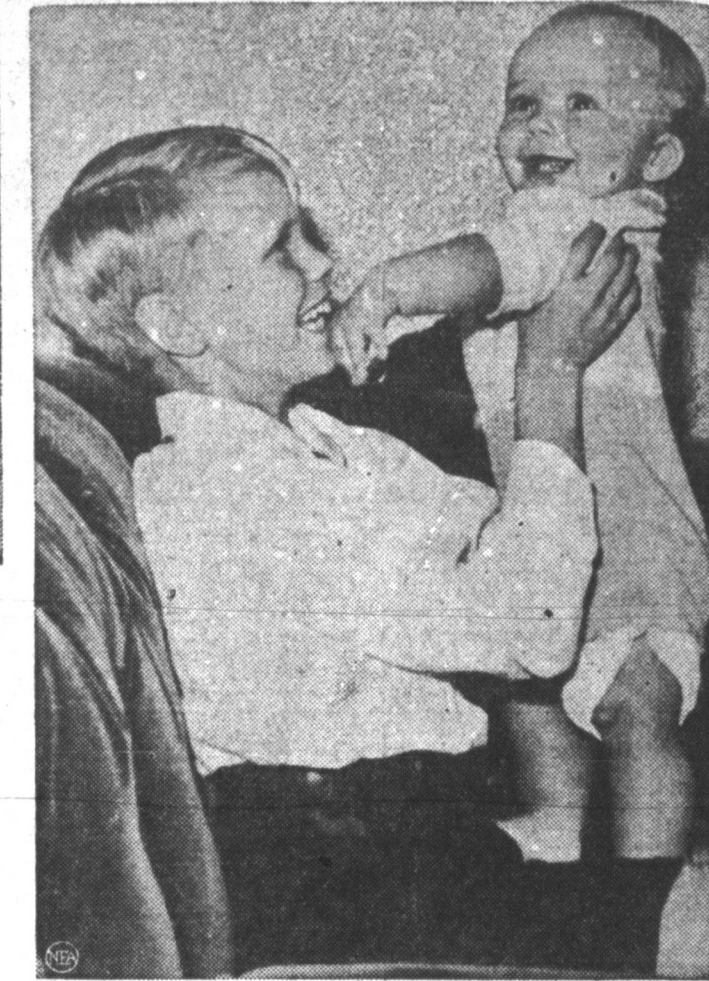

Finn School For Blind Hit By Russians

Hospital Area Blasted; Civilian Toll To Be Heavy

HELSINKI, Dec. 21 (AP)—Soviet Russian fliers in terrifying raids through the day bombed Helsinki and more than a score of cities and villages in southern and western Finland today and machine-gunned two trains.

HELSINKI, Dec. 21 (AP)—The destruction of a Russian battalion and destruction or capture of large quantities of Russian tanks, machine-guns and other weapons in successes along the eastern front were reported today by the Finnish army command.

HELSINKI, Dec. 21 (AP)—Soviet Russian planes today bombed a hospital dormitory, heavily damaged a school for the blind, and struck seven out of 16 other hospital buildings. Two hospital patients were among the injured, and some deaths were reported likely.

This raid on Helsinki, coming on the sixtieth birthday of Joseph Stalin, the Russian leader, started at 11:58 a. m. (3:58 a. m. CST), and followed earlier attacks on towns for 25 miles around the capital.

Fifteen bombs fell in the five-block hospital area. (As this story was being sent via Copenhagen, the connection suddenly was severed, presumably by another air raid alarm.)

Official said not all the bombs dropped in the hospital area exploded, but the dormitory, a five-story structure of red brick sustained a direct hit.

Windows were broken over an area of a square mile. The clinic building, a five-story stucco structure, was damaged heavily, as was the school for blind, a building four stories high and a block long.

Power lines dangled over the streets which were littered with glass, bricks and fragments of wood. Firemen, police and workmen labored steadily, clearing away the wreckage and spraying water on small fires burning here and there though no incendiary bombs were dropped.

One bomb blasted a six-foot crater in solid rock; another burst gas mains.

Most of the hospital patients had been removed, but 10 were too ill to stand transfer and one of these was injured seriously while another was struck by stones shot through a window by one bomb explosion.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 23.—War plans against an invisible foe were mapped today in the nation's capital.

Dimes and dollars instead of bullets and bombs will be the ammunition.

It is war to the finish—no armistice until the invader has been conquered.

The battle strategy was charted when Keith Morgan, national chairman of the committee for the celebration of the president's birthday, presented to Commissioner George E. Allen of the District of Columbia, his commission as chairman of the "March of Dimes" committee for the Fight Infantile Paralysis campaign.

Commissioner Allen, in accepting the certificate of appointment, declared he would work with every state chairman and every county and city chairman to assist them in securing the greatest results in the drive for funds.

At the same time Chairman Morgan sent a letter to all state chairmen throughout the country telling them of the importance of the "March of Dimes" campaign in connection with the celebration of the president's birthday and urging them to mobilize millions of men, women and children behind the great silver parade.

Members of the national headquarters staff present with Chairman Morgan at the commissioner's office when final plans for the campaign were discussed included Colonel D. Walker Wear, assistant national chairman, and Tom Wright, director of publicity.

Chairman Morgan pointed out that last year the birthday greeting cards to the president, in which dimes were inserted, struck a very spontaneous spark in hundreds of thousands of persons. He declared: "Despite the late date that many of these cards were distributed, 183,000, containing \$212,000, were sent to the White House, or an average of over \$1.00 per card."

women stewardesses and two boys, will be kept at Ellis Island until they have been examined by immigration officials.

They appeared relieved and happy to be ashore and laughed as they described how they scuttled the third largest vessel in the German merchant marine.

Two Crewmen Lost More serious was Third Officer Henry Lampe, 27, who said the two crew members lost when the others put out in 22 lifeboats apparently thought the alarm was only the signal for another "scuttle drill."

Lampe explained that when the alarm sounded indicating an enemy vessel had been sighted, each crew man leaped to carry out orders given in advance.

He said the Columbus' seacocks were opened by engine crew while ten men, known as the "stosstrupp" or special action crew, seized drums of benzol and emptied them in strategic spots throughout the vessel.

Two trusted sailors, Lampe continued, followed them with incendiary torches that turned the 32,500-ton ship into a flaming hulk.

Crew members had their duffel bags packed ever since the Columbus left Vera Cruz, Mexico, last Thursday noon for a destination—announced to the press as Oslo, Norway, but known only to the captain.

Most of the crew, until they were actually on deck, thought the last "abandon ship" alarm was merely another "scuttle drill."

All German Ships Carry Trained 'Scuttle Squads'

By HAL BOYLE
 NEW YORK, Dec. 21. (AP)—Survivors of the German liner Columbus told today how Nazi ships carry trained "scuttle squads" to comply with general orders from Berlin requiring them to burn and sink their own vessels rather than let them fall into enemy hands.

The Columbus, destroyed by its own crew Tuesday off the American coast after it sighted a British destroyer, was the 12th Nazi ship sent to the bottom under Adolf Hitler's maritime policy of suicide before capture.

Its master, Captain Wilhelm Daehne, who with 576 other survivors was taken to Ellis Island last night from the rescue vessel, the U. S. cruiser Tuscaloosa, seemed depressed at the loss of his ship but shrugged fatalistically when asked why he had given the command to sink it.

"You get an order and you obey," he said quietly. "You don't ask questions."

The lean, middle-aged German sea captain said the Columbus, scuttled within the American neutrality zone 240 miles southeast of Nantucket Shoals lightship, carried no weapons other than "six pairs of boxing gloves."

Nazi Captain's Secrets Will Be Buried With Him

 BUENOS AIRES, Dec. 21. (AP)—The secrets of Capt. Hans Langsdorff's thoughts in the hours of darkness before he died by his own hand will go with him to the grave today.

The commander, who obeyed orders of Adolf Hitler in destroying the German raider Admiral Graf Spee Sunday rather than renew a battle with British cruisers outside Montevideo, wrote a farewell letter to the German embassy just before committing suicide Tuesday night.

An Argentine naval commission investigating his death recommended that the letter be impounded and withheld from the public. It said its report would show that Langsdorff shot himself in his room at the naval arsenal here as reported by the embassy.

The slight body of the 45-year-old commander lay in state at the arsenal today in a cubicle no larger than his cabin aboard the Admiral Graf Spee, which the British chased into Montevideo after a 14-hour battle Dec. 13.

A burial plot was selected on the "German" cemetery, separated from British graves by a fence erected during the World War. Three hundred of the Admiral Graf Spee's crew were assigned to participate in funeral services there this evening.

Otto Langemann, the German minister to Uruguay, who had conducted fruitless negotiations for extending the warship's return in Montevideo, was coming here with other diplomats to pay tribute to the man whom honor meant more than life.

The German admiralty issued a statement in Berlin, saying Langsdorff "did not wish to live past the sinking of his ship," and that "after bringing his crew to safety, he viewed his work as finished and followed his ship."

It said the admiralty "understands and honors this step."

Reds Observe Birthday Of Joe Stalin

By WITT HANCOCK

MOSCOW, Dec. 21 (AP)—Soviet Russia celebrated on a vast scale today the sixtieth birthday of her leader, Joseph Stalin, who was eulogized by the press as "pilot of hope to the workers of capitalist states."

As his Red army legions fought in bitter cold in the invasion of Finland, a new biography of Stalin was published by President Michael Kallinin of the supreme Soviet, describing him as "a happy man who led one-sixth of the globe to socialism x x x he now is ready to lead them to communism."

The book was given an initial printing of 1,000,000 copies. A flood of newspaper articles credited Stalin with many achievements of the Soviet Union, including the "liberation" of Ukrainian and White Russian regions from Poland and pacts with the Baltic states, but made no mention of Finland.

Factories held parties in honor of the unostentatious Georgian, schools displayed exhibits of his life, and he was the subject of lectures at collective farms and other Soviet units.

The presidium of the supreme Soviet conferred on Comrade Stalin the order of Lenin—highest award in the land—and gave him the title of "hero of socialist labor" for his "exceptional services in organizing the Bolshevik party, creating the Soviet state, building a socialistic society in the U. S. S. R., and consolidating the friendship of peoples of the Soviet Union."

Comrades Ranked In his "official" biography, the order in which his "comrades in arms" are listed was seen by some as a semi-official ranking of Soviet leaders. The first four named are Premier-Vice Premier Vyacheslav Molotov, War Commissar Kliment E. Voroshiloff, Fuel and Railways Commissar Lazarus M. Kaganovich, and Supreme Soviet President Kallinin.

At least openly, no opposition remains to the rule of Russia by Stalin, son of a shoemaker. Of his secluded life, few details are known. He is a man of temperate habits and is described as in excellent health.

Stalin's personal nature and rumors that he dislikes flattery seemingly have had the result of increasing the almost-religious adulation of the Russian leader.

He is reported as doing all he can to interpret this near-worship as symbolic of Russian unity.

Smelting Plant In Mexico Is Picketed To Halt Removal

MEXICO CITY, Dec. 21 (AP)—The American Smelting and Refining company foundry at Matehuala, San Luis Potosi, was picketed by workers today to halt any dismantling and shipment of machinery to the United States.

The company applied two months ago for permission to close the foundry on the grounds that exhaustion of ore supplies had made it unprofitable to operate. Under Mexican law the company has to establish economic necessity.

The union of mining and metallurgical workers ordered the picket line yesterday, saying it had learned that the company had decided to remove equipment without waiting for action on its application.

The picket line, according to the union, would prevent removal of machinery which would stand as security for three months' severance pay and other benefits accorded the foundry's 800 employees under federal law.

CHICAGO, Dec. 21 (AP)—There's a reason why people give those "nightmare" neckties for Christmas.

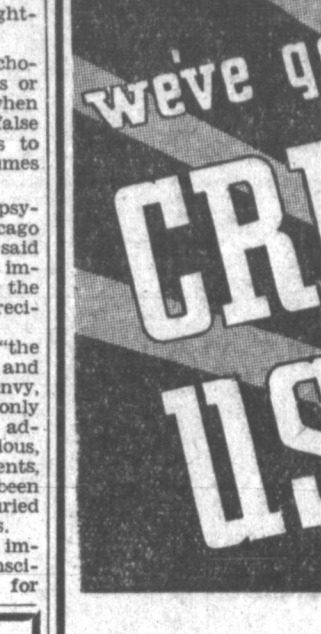

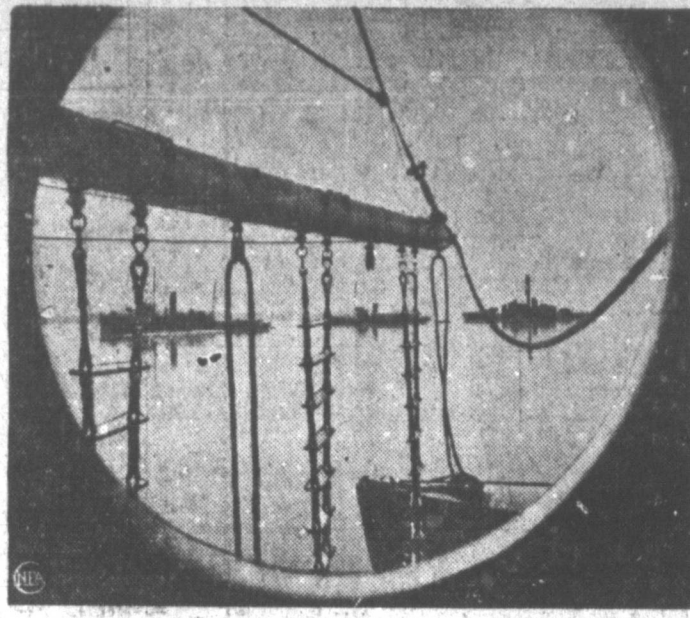

Louis Buchalter Found Guilty In Conspiracy Case

NEW YORK, Dec. 21 (AP)—Swarthy Louis (Lepe) Buchalter, 42, who will be sentenced January 2 for conspiracy to violate the narcotic laws, still faced today narcotic and bribery charges under which he could be sentenced to a maximum penalty of 124 years in prison and \$100,000 in fines.

Judge John C. Knox told William W. Kleinman, Buchalter's attorney, that "you should know how you are going to plead on these other charges by January 2." A federal court jury convicted Buchalter of conspiracy last night after hearing the government describe him as "top man" in a \$10,000,000 international syndicate which

Finns Seeking U. S. Loan Of \$50,000,000

WASHINGTON, Dec. 21 (AP)—Finland was reported today to be seeking a \$50,000,000 loan from the United States government to buy war materials for use against invading Russian armies.

Representatives of the Finnish government were said to have sounded out congressional leaders on the proposal after failing to obtain Wall Street financing for such a sum.

One member of congress approached said he gained the impression the Finns felt they could not long hold out against Russia's overpowering forces unless given more than moral support.

The Reconstruction Finance Corporation recently left Finland \$10,000,000 for purchase in this country of non-war materials such as agricultural surplus.

While the Finns welcomed this, they were represented as contending that their greatest need was for battle planes, guns and other war materials.

Ordinary discussions among congressmen apparently brought no definite reaction.

Such a loan, it was pointed out, would violate a principle laid down in this government's recent financial transactions with other countries: that no money would be lent for the purchase of war materials.

It was pointed out also a direct

war loan might involve this country's relations with Russia. Even more important, one member of congress said, would be the possibility a loan to Finland might be considered as the first step toward precipitating this country into Europe's affairs.

On the other side of the ledger, the same lawmaker said, was undeniable public sympathy for Finland, which has been the only European nation to meet regularly its payments on its debt to the United States.

Most government officials agreed that if Finland were to obtain a \$50,000,000 loan to get the war supplies it needs, congress would have to approve the transaction.

smuggled drugs into the United States illegally from France, Japan, China and other countries in 1936-37.

Buchalter was once described by District Attorney Thomas E. Dewey as "public enemy No. 1" and "the nation's No. 1 industrial racketeer."

Max Schmuckler, a co-defendant, was convicted of the same charge, but David Kardonick, the third co-defendant, was acquitted.

The government maintained that attractive women, in the syndicate's pay, had brought forbidden narcotics into this country in trunks. Coded cablegrams were used to direct the wide-spread activities.

Evidence was offered to show that Buchalter not only controlled the syndicate, but collected 50 per cent of its profits.

Originally, the case involved 30 defendants, including several women and discharged United States customs agents. Eighteen have pleaded guilty, and the others are awaiting trials.

Dewey estimated Buchalter's rackets netted him \$5,000,000 a year in extortion money alone.
