# Lone Star Shining 

This weeks, Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchinson's column highlights our state's heritage and the unique holidays form Texas independence Day to San Jacinto Day that help us celebrate that rich history.

Walk down the streets of any foreign city with an outline of North Dakota on your shirt and you'll undoubtedly draw blank stares from passersby. But with the state of Texas on your chest, you'll get a slap on the back, a "howdy pander," and the inevitable inquiries about horses, South Fork and J.R. Ewing. Although we're known for our can-do attitude and adventurous spirit, it is our state's heritage that truly sets us apart.
Very few states enjoy such a rich history. We are the only state to enter the United States as a sovereign nation. Each year, starting on March 2 , when Texas declared its independence from Mexico, through April 21, San Jacinto Day, when we defeated the Mexican army, captured Santa Anna and won our freedom, people around the state find ways - small and grand - to celebrate being a Texan.

I have always loved Texas history in large part because of my family heritage. My great-great-grandfather,
Charles S. Taylor, was an "Alcalde" or chief magistrate under the Mexican government. He was later elected as
a delegate from Nacogdoches to the Convention, where he signed the Texas Declaration of Independence in 1836. He, along with 58 other delegates, declared our independence form Mexico, setting Texas on course to be an independent republic for 10 years before joining the United States Senate - the same seat I hold today.
Each year, on or about March 2, I take to the floor of the United States Senate to read Colonel William Barret Travis' letter calling for reinforcements at the Alamo. That letter reads in part:
"I shall never surrender or retreat . . I I call on you in the name of liberty, of patriotism and of everything dear to the American character, to come to our aid, with all dispatch. The enemy is receiving reinforcements daily and will no doubt increase to three or four thousand in four or five days. If this call is neglected, I am determined to sustain myself as long as possible and die like a soldier who never forgets what is due to his own honor and that of his country - Victory or death.
The bravery and solidarity of Col. Travis and the men he led at the Alamo are unmatched. Their refusal to yield in San Antonio enabled General Sam Houston to
build up his troops. Preparing for ultimate victory at the Battle of San Jacinto.
It is important for Texans to revel in our history and celebrate the strength and valor of our forefathers. Our independence was born out of a great battle and must never be taken for granted.
In the nearly two centuries since the Battle of the Alamo, Texas has forged a distinct path, growing into a prosperous and vital state. We are the second most populous state, contributing nearly $\$ 700$ billion dollars to our nation's gross domestic product, and we have nurtured some of this country's greatest leaders. Our geographic diversity, from the flatlands of the panhandle, to the lushness of the Hill Country, sets the perfect backdrop for the varied industries, cultures and people that call Texas home. It is a unique blend that creates a rich state of contrast, color and flavor.
It is my hope that all Texans learn the wonderful and rich history of our state, and continue to pass on the tales of our past through the generations. I'm proud to represent Texas in Washington and will continue to make sure the lessons learned from the challenges of our past pave the way for continued growth and prosperity.

It did not take Coach Kevin James' troops long to find the pieces in another championship season.
Borden County's girls saw still another outstanding year on the high school hardwoods come to an end last Tuesday night at Levelland, where the Lady Coyotes fell 60-50 to top-ranked Happy in a Class 1A Division II regional semifinal playoff game
Borden County finished at 26-7. The Lady Coyotes have now finished each of their past two seasons by losing to Happy in the third round of the post-season.
"At the beginning of this season, not many people gave these kids a chance to accomplish what they ended up doing," James said.
Borden County's girls are

Borden County trailed 15-8 at the end of the first quarter and then $34-17$ at the half. The Lady Coyotes were down 49-25 at the end of the third quarter.
The Lady Coyotes finished their season with a really strong fourth quarter that saw them outscore Happy, 25-11.
"We finally went to hitting our shots there toward the end of this game," James said. "I guess we just waited too long to get started."

## Prepare Now for Unpredictable Weather

With the weather in West Texas being very unpredictable, we need to concern ourselves with safety and protection. One way to find out if you are in harm's way is by listening to a weather radio. The National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration weather radio system broadcasts National Weather Service warnings, watches, forecasts, and other hazardous information (includeing natural and man-made disasters).
Since so many of us do not receive local news and weather, a weather radio is a good investment. They usually run around $\$ 40$. They can provide up-to-date weather information, and can be set to sound off when a warning is issued. We all know how quickly a severe storm can develop and the damage it can do.

Whether you have a weather radio or not, you should be prepared and have a plan. Keep your plan up-todate and practice frequently so that everyone in your family/household knows and understands the plan. You should have a designated place to go when a tornado or other severe storm is approaching. Each person should be responsible for bringing certain things such as pets, blankets, flashlights, etc. You should even prepare a bucket or container with emergency equipment (flashlight, batteries, blanket, weather radio, bottled water, non-perishable food, etc.). If you are all headed to the same place, and know that you should be there in an emergency, time and lives can be saved. If for some reason you cannot make it to
the designated area, have a place designated to meet after the disaster is over.
Other types of preparation are to have emergency phone numbers posted by the telephone for easy access. It is difficult to remember the phone number when you are panicked. Borden County Emergency numbers are listed below. Another safety step is to install safety features in your home such as a smoke detector, a carbon monoxide detector, and fire extinguishers. It is important to check such safety equipment often. It is even important to have a safety plan when you are driving or traveling. Know your surroundings. Listen to the weather, know where to go or who to call in an emergency.
No matter what the weather situation is, be prepared, it could save your life!
