British Defenses Take Steady Toll (By The Associated Press)

LONDON, July 11-Twelve enemy planes were shot down and many more damaged by British warplanes during heavy attacks today around the coasts of England, the air ministry announced.

(By The Associated Press)

LONDON, July 11--Germany's bombers, in unrelentng raids, blasted England from coast to coast with bombs today and turned machineguns on civilians in the streets of towns, but England's defenses took a steady toll. The government reported "a few" deaths.

At least eight German raiders were reported shot down -three in the southwest, five from one south coast portby British fighters and coordinated anti-aircraft fire which kept the attackers high in the sky.

British warplanes, striking again at Italy, were reported by the admiralty to have sunk an Italian destroyer and a denot or store ship in a Sicilian harbor.

In a southeastern town a German raider killed two persons, but British fighter planes chased the plane out to sea and were believed to have shot it down.

The British ministry of home security issued a communique saying: "During the night bombs were dropped in a number of scattered points in the eastern and southeastern counties and in the midlands. No casualties were reported except a small number in two east coast towns of which a few were fatal.

"Slight damage of no military importance was caused."

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
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



Germany Claims -**Shipping Toll** Higher Than '18

BERLIN, July 11 (AP)—The high command announced today that 609,000 tons of "enemy commercial shipping" was destroyed by German submarines during the six weeks

This may be compared to the average of 250,000 tons lost monthly by the United Kingdom by all ac-tion in the 21-month unrestricted World War campaign which Germany launched in February, 1917.

The reported rate of destruction against Britain in the present war already equals the fiercest period of the unrestricted campaign months of 1917—when the British Isles at one time were said to have had only a three-week supply of food.

Thus, Germans declare that their submarine warfare is turning into a starvation blockade of the British Isles. The 609,000 tons cited in today's communique excludes the tonnage sent to the bottom by air at-

The high command declared that German submarines are averaging mere than 100,000 tons of shipping weekly in their forays and the au-Deutschland asserted that 3,000,000 tons of neutral and enemy shipping have been sunk by the German navy alone, exclusive of aircraft sinkings.







Shared Advantage, Shared Burden orthcoming Pan American meeting at Havana is going to provide some very practical tests of mu-

If the American nations are to co-operate for their common advantage, It is obvious that they ought to share responsibilities.

For instance: Dr. Oswaldo Aranha, Brazil's foreign inister, has indicated that he does not believe Eurobean possessions in the Americas ought to change hands "by unilaterial action." Translating that from liplomatic into English, it means that the United ates alone ought not to grab such an island as Martinique to keep it from falling into German or Italian hands. Any such grab ought to be made in an ordinary way by all the American nations acting to-

gether, and becoming joint trustees for the territories. That is right enough, and we believe the United States would go along with it. But Dr. Aranha has cided not to go himself to the Havana conference out to send a representative. This suggests that Brazil is handling gently the hot potato of just how far she will go in taking part in any such mutual action.

The United States has clearly indicated that it would prefer to handle any such problems jointly. For 10 years it has labored to make the Monroe Doctrine ot merely a policy of the United States government, but a joint policy of all the American republics.

Let no one make any mistake about it. If there is a threat of seizure of Caribbean islands or other South American territories whose occupation by a European ower would endanger the Panama Canal, the United States will act alone if necessary.

It would be helpful if, even before the Havana meeting, both presidential candidates could make clear that in inter-American matters there is no party. U. S. diplomacy is often handicapped by the feeling among other American countries that a change of administration may mean a change of policy.

But in the present emergency both parties are bound by the logic of events to closely-similar inter-American policies. To have both candidates say so, perhaps even in a joint statement, forthrightly and definitely would probably help smooth the path of the American aries to Havana.

It will act together with the other republics if they have by that time decided to carry their fair share of the burden. But if they have not, if they shillyshally along and seem reluctant to join in mutual action, then the United States will act alone.

But it will act. It has no other choice.

Behind The News

WASHINGTON-If you are not thinking what the nation of Wendell L. Willkie has done to "the third term" and the New Deal, you should be-because Washington is talking about nothing else. Trying to sift all this talk down and pass it on to

Because Roosevelt is the only man, these observers leclare, who can "save us from Willkie," he will have to answer the draft of his party, no matter what his personal inclinations are.

2. Here is where a good many wild guesses, as well as some darn good political reasoning, come into the

Nobody intimate with the President . . . I mean those who really know him . . . ever has said that he WANTS to run a ain. On the other hand, these persons insist that the President is tired and convinced that his health would suffer from a third term. We have call money and time money. Now, we have more and more of "call labor" and less and less of steady labor.

What I mean by call money is money borrow ed that the lender has the right to demand its payment any time and will not contract for the borrower to keep it for a given period. This kind of money is very hard to use to any advantage. It is usually a very low priced money; the lender of which has not personal use for it. Only operators who are very venturesome and risky will borrow much of this kind of money, even if it does save money, because it is so dangerous and the borrower is likely to have to liquidate his holdings, which often cannot be liquidated for the amount of the debt. He prefers usually to pay a higher rate of interest in order to know how long he may use the borrowed capital. Honest Men Prevented from Contracting

Under labor union contracts, all labor is "call labor". No worker dare contract for any length of time. No matter how honest and dependable and desirous a workman may be of entering into an agreement with an employer that if the employer will proceed with an operation that will furnish the worker a steady job for some time, the individual laborer is prevented from making agreement with the employer that he will stay with him for this time, even if the employer agrees to pay him a given amount for a given amount of work.

It is easy to see how an employer would hesi tate to start even a small project if he could not depend upon his help. For example, a man would hesitate to contract to buy a supply of cows and contract to supply a given amount of milk daily, if he could not be assured that he would have help during that period. If he did

contract for it, he would be obliged to add greatly to the price in order to compensate him for the risk of not being able to fill the contract and being penalyzed for damage. And if this is the case in a small undertaking, it is exactly the same in big undertakings. When the big operator cannot enter into an agreement with skilled working men in whom he has the utmost confidence and whose word is as good as their bond to him, then he certainly hesitates to go into an undertaking that furnishes steady and long time employment just the same as he would hesitate to go into an enterprise if he had to borrow the money and pay on call. Collective Bargain Only Option

Few people understand that collective bargainng is not a bargain at all; that it simply is an option and prevents the honest, dependable workers, who, could have steady work, from making any contract at all with the employer. The union guarantees absolutely nothing and prevents the individual from guaranteeing anything. All the union does is to say that if we have the labor and it wants to work, we will give our consent for it to work.

This "call labor" is taking away from the workers the most important thing in their lives-their souls. It prevents them from using their conscience, their judgment, and compels some to act in ways that they are horrified that they have to act. And when individual nien are prevented from using their conscience and prevented from entering into a contract, they tend to become little more than automatons, robots, and can do nothing but goose-step.

It is a law of nature that what you do not use you lose so that men who are prevented from using their own conscience and have to abide by the decisions of the union, soon lose their conscience.

How can anybody think there will be any development of individual character, any permanent employment, any increase in employment so long as the capable, honest individual workers are not permitted to make any promises whatsoever to their employer.

Employers can use a certain amount of "call labor," like unskilled and common labor, because their place can be substituted easily. But when skilled labor is required and the skilled laborer dare not make any promises whatsoever, that they will work a minute, a day, or a year and will not even promise that they will not try to prevent other people from working, it is hard to conceive how anybody who has had any experience at all in business, can believe there will be very much employment as long as this condition

Surinam Is Netherlands' Largest American Colony

N 1667 the Dutch traded New York the English for Surinam, or Dutch Guiana, a section of South American jungle, sandwiched between British and French Guianas. In 1940, with Germany occupying the Nether-lands, Surinam and other Netherlands colonies in the New assume greater importance under the U. S. Monroe Doctrine.


