B.H.S. U.I.L. Academic Teams Crush Competition at District Meet

Throughout months of preparation this past fall, and especially so the past three Wilson. months, the steam had been building inside the U.I.L. Academic teams of Borden County High School.

At the District 9-A U.I.L. Academic Meet on March 27, all of that steam exploded into a possibly from BHS won seven team awards and twelve of twentytwo individual events on their won both the Extempway to accumulating a whopping total of 494 points.

In all, twenty BHS students advanced on to the regional meet to be held on April 23-24 at Hardin-Simmons University in Abilene.

The overall victory was BHS's fourth consecutive district academic title and surpassed last year's winning total by over 140 points.

Coyote junior honored by Texas Six-Man Coaches

Borden County has its second all-state basketball player in as many weeks.

A week after Coyote senior Ashley James was listed among the top small high school girls basketball players in the state, Borden County junior guard Ben Griffin has now been recognized among the top boys on the hardwoods out of the state's six-man high schools.

Griffin has been named as a second team honoree on the 2003-2004 Texas Six-Man Coaches Association's All-State Boys Basketball Team.

"Whenever you don't make the playoffs and still make teams like these, it really does say something about a kid and the ability that he has in this game," Borden County Coach Trey Richey said of Griffin. Last season, the Coyotes finished

at 16-14, including a 6-4 record in a district that also included Class 1A Division II state champion

Griffin becomes the Coyotes' third all-state athlete in the current school year.

In addition to Griffin and James on the hardwoods, Borden County senior standout Kyle Pinkerton tackled first-team all-state honors last fall on the high school football field on the defensive line.

In addition to earning secondteam all-state from this group, Grif-fin has also been named to that association's all-Region II first team.

Another Coyote player senior

Shane Tarleton earned second-team all-region honors by that group. "Those two guys have been war-

riors for us all season long," Richey

Dawson junior Kanyon Brown also earned second-team all-region

This past season, Griffin averaged 15.5 points, 6-2 rebounds and four assists per game.

"Probably, one of the biggest things going for Ben is that he's such a competitor," Richey said. "He was also our leading scorer, second on the team in assists.

"He was also one of our top rebounders and a good defender,

On the year, Griffin connected on 38 percent of his shots from outside the three-point arc. He hit 81 shots from outside the three-point arc.

"There were five or six ball games this year where he hit five or more three's," Richey said. "He even set the school record

out here after making seven once in one ball game against Loraine."

The best thing going for Griffin as far as Richey is concerned is that

he is only a junior.
"It's definitely nice to have this guy coming back again next year," Richey said. "I know I'm looking forward to it.

"Hopefully, we'll be able to start working on putting some of the disappointment of this season behind us and we can start working our way back toward that direction (playoffs) again next year.

There is more to Griffin than being a talented high school basketball player.

He is also pretty magical on the high school golf course, as well.







Spring Cleaning – Time to tidy up your mailbox

It's time for spring cleaning overall appearance of the - sweeping and vacuuming, moving your warm-weather clothes to the front of the closet and chest of drawers, checking the outside of the house to see if it needs housekeeping tips for your repairs, painting, or general sprucing up.

While you're spring cleaning the house, don't forget to check on your mailbox. Neat, attractive, well-maintained mailboxes contribute to the

community and to the security of your mail. After all, your letters deserve a clean, safe place to stay, too.

Here are some helpful mailbox.

Check the door and hinges - make sure the door closes properly to keep your mail in and keep the wind and water out.

- Look it over for protruding nails and sharp edges. Sand and repaint, or replace, your mailbox if it's rusty - you don't want to have to go get a tetanus shot, and neither does your letter carrier.
- If it is mounted on a post, check its stability and anchor it if necessary.
- Make sure your mailbox identifies your address. Display your address on both sides of the mailbox so police, fire and rescue personnel, and friends from out-of-town can find you. Adding house numbers and

other address elements to the box also will help ensure that you get your mail, not someone else's.

Approved traditional or contemporary curbside mailboxes are required whenever a mailbox is newly installed or replaced. You can find them at your hardware store and some department stores. A customer-built curbside

box may be used if the postmaster gives approval and if the mailbox generally conforms to the same specifications as approved manufactured mailboxes. Contact your local postmaster before erecting a custom-built mailbox.
