### City Solons Okay Pampa Plant Plans

The city commission gave approval today to implementation of preliminary plans for modifications to the

waste treatment plant

northeast of the city. Gene Barber, of Merriman and Barber Consulting Engineers, Inc., presented the spreliminary plans to the commission this morning for consideration

The main design for the plant is based on the use of stabilization ponds for detention of the water for 23 to 25 days to allow settling of much of thewaste material in the water from the sewage system and industrial discharges.

Currently the new plant has 1212 acres of stabilization ponds. The total acreage would be more than doubled with the new ponds, Barber said.

"The ponds are an efficient and reliable type of operation" for use at the plant, he said.

According to the plans approved this morning, the new ponds would be located in the hilly area immediately northwest of the plant, with structures connecting it to the current ponds to allow for recirculation.

Pumping would be required for the water up on the hill, but it would be more efficient in the long run, Barber said.

Barber noted it would be easier to build the ponds in the creek area below the plant, but complications would arise

Among the problems that would be encountered would be less space, drainage into the ponds from the hills, a pipeline already in existence and conflict with the fringe areas of the proposed Red Deer Creek watershed project.

### Four Bombers Lost, Six Fliers Missing

American fighter-bombers were lost over North Vietnam last weekend, a fourth was downed today and six of the eight fliers are missing, the U.S. Command announced.

This raised losses over North Vietnam to 82 planes and 91 missing airmen since the resumption of full-scale bombing on April 6, the Command said North Vietnam has announced the capture of more than 20 of the fliers.

The weather over the North cleared somewhat Thursday. and American planes flew more than 310 strikes, the largest number in a week. The Command said its fliers knocked out 25 warehouses, 10 ammunition storage buildings, 15 bridges and 31 water supply craft.

The Command launched an investigation today into a charge by Peking that American bombers attacked a lifeboat from a Chinese merchant ship off the coast of North Vietnam on Tuesday and killed five

### McGovern Attacks **Economic Structure**

SAN CLEMENTE, Calif. (AP) - Predicting he will win the November election "twice as big" as in 1968, President Nixon says he wants four more White House years to pursue what he terms a "breakthrough for peace" in dealings with Peking and Moscow.

Nixon spanned the continent Thursday - just hours after accepting renomination by the Republican party at Miami Beach. It quickly became apparent that the convention chant of "Four More Years" will be the official litany if not the announced slogan of his drive to defeat his Democratic opponent, Sen. George McGovern.

Arriving at the Western White House here after dark, Nixon told several thousand devoted well-wishers from Southern California communities where he has lived or studied:

Why do we want four more years? So we can continue to make this breakthrough for peace. I think I have learned now to negotiate. I think I know what we want and what they want. I think I know what steps can be taken. I know that we have to be strong, and yet I know that we have to nego-

Before helicoptering to his seaside villa, he recalled to a jubilant throng in San Diego that after his nomination four years ago he had immediately gone to San Diego from Miami Beach

This crowd is twice as large as we had in 1968 and we're going to win twice as big in 1972. he declared.

Four more years!

Nixon, who had spoken earlier in Chicago and in a Detroit suburb. lost no time in directly challenging McGovern on two key campaign issues: defense and busing policies.

Before the American Legion in Chicago, he didn't mention McGovern by name but said if his opponent's defense economies were carried out the United States would be a second-rate power and peace would be imperiled.

In a statement issued upon arrival in Michigan, he called anew for antibusing legislation and accused the Democraticcontrolled Congress of failing to act on the matter. McGovern favors busing as one tool to achieve desegregation, as do

## **Smith Concerned About Ideas** To Reduce His Budget Power

Preston Smith says a legal opinion by Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin could strip away so much of the governor's budget power that he would only be a

"ceremonial figurehead." Smith said he may have to call a special session before the legislature meets in 1973 to "correct the problems" caused

The governor already is considering a special session on

insurance reform. "I am gravely concerned about the recent opinions of the attorney general and the drastic limitations which they would place on the executive authority of the governor of Texas, Smith said in a statement Thursday. "These opinions are far reaching and threaten virtually every authority of the chief executive."

Martin issued an opinion Wednesday-in response to a request by Comptroller Robert Calvert-that the legislature's custom of authorizing the governor to transfer funds from one agency to another for state business was unconstitutional.

Fund transfers have been a custom for years, and the legislature has even included the authority in the general appropriations bill since 1957, when Price Daniel was governor.

If Martin's opinions are correct, Smith said, "and if action is not taken to grant the governor constitutional budgetary executive powers, the next governor of Texas will be at a severe disadvantage and be faced with almost continual crises and serve only as a ceremonial figurehead. It could literally be disastrous if the

### Amarillo Zinc Smelter Wins 5th Delay To Stop Operation

AUSTIN, Tex. (AP) - A zinc a poisonous metal that acsmelter in Amarillo, which everybody agrees pollutes the air. has been given permission to violate the law for another 16 months

The Texas Air Control Board voted Thursday to grant a fifth delay to American Smelting and Refining Co. (ASARCO). mainly on the ground that an immediate shutdown of the plant would cost 450 workers their jobs.

The board earlier rejected on a 4-4 vote a motion to require immediate compliance with the law. Board member James Abrams of El Paso, who was expected to vote for that motion, was absent.

"We need his vote." Charles Barden, executive director, told a reporter. "but his son was killed in an accident a week ago and he feels he must stay with his wife.

The 16-month delay was granted after the board first voted to give the firm until June 30. 1975, the date on which the firm has said it wants to close the plant anyway. After Dec. 31, 1973, the feder-

al Environmental Protection Agency will take over the duty of granting or denying delays. ASARCO may ask for a sixth extension after that date. E.W. Robinson of Amarillo

voted against the 16-month motion because it did not guarantee the company's right to continue operations until 1975. The ASARCO case is the most

celebrated one the board has handled in its six-year history. The company has asked for and received delays for three years.

NEW YORK (AP) - In a fullscale onslaught on the Nixon-Agnew administration. Democratic vice presidential candidate Sargent Shriver has called President Nixon the world's biggest "war maker" and Vice President Spiro T. Agnew the nation's "great divi-

Campaigning across Ohio. Pennsylvania and into New York. Shriver met hard hat steel workers in Pittsburgh Thursday, got the endorsement of a 75,000-member union in Cincinnati and said in New York that Nixon's acceptance speech at the GOP national convention convinced him the President is living "in fantasyland -Disneyland — not in the United States.

Shriver was to spend most of today campaigning in upstate New York after breakfasting with the mayor of Bayonne,

Dissecting the Nixon accept ance speech and the Nixon record. Shriver in numerous appearances, blamed the President for permitting inflation to grow and for allowing unemployment and crime to rise.

The President has also refused to acknowledge Republican links to the bugging of the Democratic National Committee. Shriver said, and has declined to reveal the sources of what Shriver called a secret \$10 million political "slush fund."

- Bobby Fischer appeared to be in the stronger position with a chance for a victory in the resumption of the 18th game of the world chess championship today.

Grandmasters said defending champion Boris Spassky had some chance of a draw, but no prospects of winning. A victory for the 29-year-old American challenger would would give him a four-point edge over Spassky, an unprecedented margin in the history of the championship. The score going into the 18th

game was 10-7 in Fischer's favor with the challenger needing 1212 points to take the title and Spassky needing 12 points to retain it. A victory counts one point and a draw gives each player half a point. The game adjourned Thurs-

day after Fischer's 42nd move. The Russian blundered on the 31st move. losing a bishop for a knight and weakening his position in the center of the board. But the experts said Spassky

played well after that.

If the high court upholds lower federal court decisions in the Rodriguez vs. San Antonio Independent School District case. it likely will affect every taxpayer in the state where or not he has school children.

And it apparently will set the pattern for public school financing throughout the nation.

Arguments on the appeal will be heard after the Supreme Court reconvenes in October with the decision weeks or maybe months later.

The court contest began in 1971 when a three-judge federal court in San Antonio held the Texas system of financing public school education was unconstitutional. They said the present system of state-local financing based on local property taxes deprives children who live in school districts with low property valuations and low school tax revenues of equal protection under the 14th Amendment

Texas would have to raise an additional \$2.4 billion a year to increase its per pupil spending average to the level of its wealthier school districts, Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin said in the state's appeal filed with the U.S. Supreme Court. The entire state budget for 1973, from both state and federal funds. is only \$4.1

"The one-kid, one-buck plan would destroy local autonomy. Martin also claimed.

Another alternative, which Martin also opposed, would be to equalize local school taxes by giving to the poor districts and taking from the richer ones.

Glenn Ivy, research director of the Texas Research League. said in a statement to the League of Women Voters of Texas that "full state financing would mean an end to local school property taxes, at least for operating purposes, and the state would have to raise approximately \$1 billion a year from some other source by 1974 just to maintain the status quo. That would double the present Minimum Foundation Program

Ms. Rose Spector, an attor-

suit, told the League of Women Voters that the evidence in the case "clearly demonstrates, that state aid to local districts provided by the Minimum Foundation Program has little, if any, equalizing effect ... itresults in wealthy districts gaining most in state aid per pupil with minimal effort."

What is required is a financing plan where the variation in wealth between school districts does not affect the level of spending for any child," she

The Minimum Foundation Program was set up in 1949 to cure exactly the problem it has failed to cure-equalize school spending over the state. However, the program, which is financed an average of 80 per cent by the state and 20 per cent locally, only sets a minimum for school spending. If a school district has lots of available tax revenue it can spend much

Martin said that the state's averge 80 per cent of cost, ends up with the state paying up to 98 per cent of school costs in poorer districts and less than 80 per cent in the richer ones.

According to Ivy's figures. Odessa in Ector County, with 24.384 pupils, has 1.019 teachers and a starting salary rate of \$7,445. The Edgewood district in San Antonio, where the suit originated, has 22,134 pupils, 805 teachers and a starting salary rate of \$6,000

"To level-up would cost more than \$2 million for higher salaries and 120 more teachers at Edgewood," Ivy said. "To average-out would mean setting the starting salary for both districts at \$6,700 and transferring 63 teachers from Odessa to

Edgewood. Ms. Spector said that the evidence in the Rodriguez case shows that "the high revenues in districts with high value tax bases are not related to a greater desire for education by the residents of such districts. It is in the poor, not the rich. school districts where the greatest tax effort is being

The Texas Education Agency reports for the 1969-70 school year show the average expenditure per pupil that year was \$558. Actually the

expenditure per pupil ranged from less than \$300 in some districts to more than \$1,100 per pupil in others. Even school districts of similar size varied more than 180 per cent in

spending per pupil. In California-where school officials are asking the U.S. Supreme Court to decide against Texas-the variation in spending ranges from \$407 to \$2,586 per pupil in elementary schools.

So far all efforts by those school officials to get the California Legislature to overhaul its school financing system have failed.

The San Antonio federal court in 1971 gave the state two years to restructure its school financing system. That time will be up in December 1973.

If the U.S. Supreme Court decides against Texas' appeal and the Legislature does not take prompt action, then it will be up to the federal court to implement its own order-to design a constitutionally acceptable school finance system for Texas.

### **GAO** To Delay GOP Campaign Fund Report

WASHINGTON (AP) - The General Accounting Office has decided to delay its report on alleged Republican misuse of campaign funds after a talk with a top Nixon re-election official produced "new facts."

The announcement of the delay came after a GAO auditor met in Miami Beach, Fla., with Maurice H. Stans, Nixon's chief fund raiser.

### **MacGregor Warns GOPers** Not To Be Overconfident

WASHINGTON (AP) - When President Nixon asked Clark MacGregor to take command of his re-election campaign, he Hidn't give the then-presidential counselor detailed instructions

on how to do his job. They weren't necessary, MacGregor says, because his personal and political ilosophy and his reaction to events are virtually identical to Nixon's. "I am comfortable enough in

my 12 years of association with Richard Nixon," he adds, that "I don't have to check" with the President before making a

If Nixon doesn't agree with how he operates. MacGregor says, "I'll hear from him.

MacGregor's move to the reelection committee headquarters a block from the White House was not the first he has made at Nixon's request.

He gave up a safe House seat and 10 years' seniority on the important Judiciary Committee to run for the Senate in 1970 when Nixon saw a chance for the Republicans to win control of the Senate and tapped the best candidates he could find.

MacGregor lost to Hubert H. Humphrey, but Nixon shortly summoned him to the White House to serve as director of congressional relations. That was his job when John Mitchell bowed to his wife Martha's demands and quit as campaign director July 1.

MacGregor, as an administration stalwart on the Judiciary Committee, had formed close ties with the former attorney general and was Mitchell's first choice as a replacement in the campaign director's job. Nixon needed no urging, and the 50-year-old Minneapolis lawyer moved again.



ALL SMILES after taking over direction of the Presi dent's re-election drive. Clark MacGregor is taking a serious view of the campaign ahead. He has warned Republicans not to be overconfident. Mac-Gregor, a White House aide and former congressman from Minnesota, succeeded former Attorney-General John Mitchell as campaign chief.

For MacGregor, it's a job with a future something like that of a flagpole sitter's: There is nowhere to go but down.

The pundits, pollsters and most of the public see Nixon winning handily in November over Sen. George McGovern. and if he does, the credit will hardly go to MacGregor. But if Nixon should lose

MacGregor's first message to the campaign workers was a warning against overconfidence. Although he is certain Nixon will win, he thinks

it will be a lot closer than many others do, and he is calling for a strong, steady, dedicated ef-

fort by all hands. They were attributes that contributed to the close relationship that developed between MacGregor and Mitchell. But MacGregor is far more open and congenial by nature than Mitchell, and has taken on a role as party spokesman that Mitchell shunned.

He has held more news conferences in the few weeks he has been in the \$60,000-a-year post than Mitchell ever did as campaign director

Where MacGregor is unable to match his predecessor is in his working relations with the White House staff. Mitchell enjoyed an intimacy with Nixon that transcended official duties and permitted him direct access to the oval office of the President.

MacGregor says he sometimes talks to Nixon two or three times a day by telephone. but he works mainly through White House chief of staff H. R. Haldeman.

MacGregor says he sees Haldeman and other top Nixon aides almost daily, usually at an early morning White House staff conference. 'I'm mostly a listener." says MacGregor, unconsciously underscoring complaints that are beginning to be heard in the field that campaign control is slipping more and more into the hands of the White House staff

MacGregor spends a lot of his time traveling around the country to meet party leaders and talk to campaign workers.

It helped account for his success as chief lobbyist for Nixon's legislative program in Congress, where he earned a reputation as a friendly persuader.





### Truth Is Too Simple

Great truths are often rejected for the very reason that ought to make them accepted—their simplicity

A simple idea does not commend itself to our intelligence because it seems beneath our dignity. We tend to look for greater mental challenge than a simple thought seems to offer. It is a humbling experience, after years of trial-and-error searching, to discover that the transcendent verity was right in front of us all the time

For instance, take the problem of poverty that so many wish to abolish. The obvious solution to poverty is property. That is to say, if we had more belongings, there would be fewer persons in dire need. Relatively speaking. some people would be poorer and some would be richer, but the basic necessities and some of the luxuries would be supplied even to the least. The question, therefore, is how do we get more property in this

Obviously to get more, we must produce more. In order to accomplish higher production.

we have to set up conditions that are advantageous to production. In the main, we have to insure as best we can that the producer reaps the reward of his production, that what a man earns he may rightfully keep. When we do that, we find that the wheels of production begin to turn.

That brings us to the ultimate consideration-distribution. For, of course, if the product is not distributed, the reward never reaches to the workingman. Basically, there are two systems of distribution-the governmental system and the profit system. By the governmental system. politicians decide who shall divide the rewards of production. By the profit system, the manufacturer must distribute his production in order to make a profit; if he does not distribute his

We didn't lose employment in Minneapolis because of that. but we failed to gain additional employment because our positon in the European market was very weak.

Honeywell, said Binger, immediately worked to correct its mistake. It bounced back with a system designed in Europe which more than held its own with Swiss. German. Danish and British competitors. Sales expanded and jobs were created—not only in Europe but. lo and behold, in far-away Minneapolis.




Tuition for Public School?

Squeezed for funds, a board of education decided to impose a tuition fee on all high school students. In short order, indignant parents went to court to complain. They pointed out that the state constitution called for a system of "free" public education.

In reply, the board argued that it was simply using its discretion to ease a tight financial situation. But the court decided that tuition was indeed unconstitutional

"The right of children to attend public school," said the court, "is not dependent on the discretion of



With education costs climbing, there has been renewed interest in the idea of charging fees of one kind or another to public school students. But tuition, at least, has usually been ruled out because of the requirement that education should be free.

Lesser fees, too, have been rejected by the courts more often than not. In another case, a school board tried to charge pupils for their textbooks. The board's theory was that "free" education referred merely to the school building and the teachers - not to

However, the court held this fee unconstitutional also, saying that books are an integral part of the educational process. The judge commented:

"No education of any value is possible without school books." Nevertheless, another school board did succeed in collecting a textbook deposit from its students. This time, the plan had two features that made it more palatable: 1) the deposit was waived for any student who could not pay it;

2) the deposit was refunded at the end of the semester, if the books were returned in reasonably

good condition. A court decided that this kind of a fee was too minor a burden on the educational process to be objectionable. All it amounted to, said the court, was a practical method of encouraging students to take good care of their books.

### Law Aimed At Drivers

By DON OAKLEY A tough, new law designed to remove dangerous and irresponsible drivers from America's highways has been proposed by the National Association of Insurance Agents, the oldest and largest such organization in the

The model law will be recommended to NAIA state affiliates for enactment in each state legislature.

Under the proposed legislation, called the "Habitual Offender Act," a person convicted of an accumulation of major or minor traffic offenses loses his driver's license for life and is subject to a mandatory prison term if he continues to drive. An offender who stays "clean" for five years may, however, apply to the court for

reinstatement of his license. The penalties may seem harsh, but compared with laws in some other countries, they actually appear to be permissive. In South Arrica, for instance, the penalty for drunk driving is 10 years in jail and a \$2,800 fine. In San Salvador, it can be execution by firing

squad. Six states already have similar habitual offender laws. Virginia was the first, followed by North Carolina, Rhode Island, New Hampshire, Maine and Massachusetts. In Virginia, the law is credited with helping bring down that state's fatality rate per 100 million miles from

5.2 in 1968 to 4.3 in 1970. In the past 10 years, half a million Americans have been killed in traffic accidents, most of them victims of a habitual offender. NAIA's argument is that many of these accidents would not have occurred had courts been required to impose the ultimate penalty -imprisonment-on those who have shown a consistent disregard for the law, rather than waiting until after tragedy

### **Inside Washington**

Nixon Campaign Organization **Garners Even Lower Opinions**

Robert Novak MIAMI BEACH - The low opinion within the White House of President Nixon's reelection campaign organization sank even lower last week when Presidential aides made a

startling discovery. They found that the campaign staff had failed to make even a routine analysis of delegates attending the 1972 Republican national convention. Expecting no floor fights, they had not bothered.

And with some 70 per cent of the Republican delegates attending their first convention. the campaign staff confessed to the White House it could not accurately forecast the outcome of a possible convention floor fight over the nature of the 1976 convention. "I couldn't believe my ears.

a White House aide told us. What have those guys (the reelection campaign committee) been doing over there for the past year?

Southern and Western states fighting the proposed increase in 1976 delegate strength for the big Eastern industrial states learned weeks ago they could not count on practical help from Mr. Nixon's political operation even though his campaign aides quietly support them.

Consequently, staffers of conservative Republican Congressmen were brought here to run a delegate-counting operation out of the Eden Roc Hotel suite of Mississippi state chairman Clarke Reed. They have wooed conservative delegates from such large states as New York, Illinois. Ohio and Indiana for the possible floor fight. Similarly, the

Southern-Western coalition had to make its own decisions without Nixon campaign help. Its high command--State Chairman Reed, D. Jack Gibson of South Dakota, David Kennedy of Wyoming and Earl Davenport of Washington--decided their plan to retain the power balance in the smaller states would fail in the rules committee unless it were revised to enlarge the number of convention delegates.

For hours Wednesday before the convention, they awaited approval from Nixon campaign headquarters at the Doral made the decision themselves. just before the rules committee convened to decide the question. A tart letter of resignation

from Olga (Bobbie) Gechas. hired during the regime of former Democratic national chairman Fred Harris to build up the National Committee's list of small contributors, is the latest sign that Jean Westwood. the new national chairman is cleaning house from top to But. Sen. George McGovern

West wood. Held in highest regard by former national chairman Lawrence F. O' Brien and treasurer Robert S. Strauss (who succeeded the Harris regime). Miss Gechas sent her boss, National Committee treasurer Donald Petrie. a scorching "memo" explaining her reasons for quitting.

"It has been dismaying and in some instances demeaning to have been confronted with questions of confidence in my sense of responsibility, my judgment as well as my sense of concern for the financial needs of the DNA and the tasks at hand " she wrote Petrie, with copies to Mrs. Westwood. O'Brien (now McGovern's campaign chairman) and

Strauss. During her 212 years at the committee. Miss Gechas built the list of direct-mail contributors from 16,000 to more than 80,000, assuring the committee money enough to keep its current bills paid despite the huge overhang of a \$9 million debt.

A somewhat similar letter of resignation was sent by Mary Lou Burg. Wisconsin national committeewoman, to Chairman Westwood late last week but Miss Burg refused to discuss it.

Mrs. Westwood had conferred the title of "deputy chairman" on her, but the title proved to be meaningless. Miss Burg, after two years as National Committee vice chairman, was given absolutely nothing to do.

Although the forced resignations of these two political experts has gone unnoticed, they are one reason why pro-McGovern politicians worry so deeply about the McGovern campaign. With all its other problems, they feel, it is squandering talent in a way that will haunt the fall campaign



During the past four or five years, church conventions took a sharp turn from an experience of inspiration and fellowship to an ordeal of pain and physical suffering. Much of the social conflict and disruption of the decade have been absorbed by the churches. When national church assemblies meet, these issues come into week-long focus, with hot debate and deliberation.

Confrontation tactics, employed by dissident groups have added more tension and uncertainty. The fun and fellowship of other years has been overcome by the heartache and perplexity of modern difficulties and alarms.

It is not being argued that the religious community should be spared the grief and anxiety of the world Indeed, of all organizations it should be the company that is involved in the affairs of men and nations, offering help. comfort and understanding. The crunch that is hurting the church now-and surfaces at the large church conventions-is the exhausting schedule and elaborate program that all but engulfs those delegates who attend.

For some time, this was an occupational hazard ex pected of politicians and diplomats who struggled with time-zone change and grinding dockets. But now the churches have vast national and international gatherings and their participants are subject to the same pressures and liabilities.

• In Dallas last month, the African Methodist Episcopal Church convention, representing some two million members, went through a grinding week-long convention. On the final night, Bishop John Douglas Bright, 56, of Philadelphia, fell from the stage and was pronounced dead moments later, victim of a heart attack earlier session lasted more than seven hours as delegates argued into the dawn over whether or not to suspend one of their leaders charged with malfeasance and misadministration.

• In Denver during May, at the United Presbyterian General Assembly, this writer observed several evening sessions that lasted beyond midnight-and beyond the capacity of many delegates that had begun their day with 7 a.m. breakfast meetings in the hotels. At the close of one late adjournment, a clergyman from California collapsed while waiting for the elevator. By the time the emergency squad arrived, he was dead

• In New Mexico last year, a noted elder attending a church convention in Rochester, N.Y., died upon his return. Few people, young or old, are prepared for the exhaustion and emotional upheaval that accompanies these national meetings.

There are many sources of tension and uneasiness resting upon the churches today-and one fresh injection is a massive amount of business that must be conducted on the national level. Twenty and 30 years ago the churches did not have the money or membership or strategy to weigh what is now set before them. Furthermore, the grass roots movement has demanded complete and, at times, absurd accounting of all boards, agencies and committees that function for the denominations

An enormous amount of time is spend reviewing the actions and policies of top officials. As a result, conventions are choked with reports, speeches and surveys. Budgets descend like autumn leaves. Parliamentary floor fights and docket hassles flourish. The people on the platform scold the delegates and each other

It is not a pleasant time to serve one's church as a delegate to a national church convention. But, then, there is always the political convention and that makes the ecclesiastical enclave look rather tame and moderate.



## **Munich Prepares For** Olympic Torch Arrival

festive capital welcomes the Olympic torch tonight as a relay runner from Greece jogs into historic Koenigsplatz where Hitler plotted his course to infamy

The 20th Olympic Games, a \$1 billion undertaking of contemporary West Germany, becomes a reality Saturday with athletic teams of 122 nations marching into the 80,000 capacity Olympia Stadium.

On the eve of that opening ceremony, the Olympic torch, ferried by hundreds of runners from Olympia, Greece, will reach Munich to be received by Olympic officials and a likely international ovation from tourists and sports fans gathered in Koenigsplatz.

That monumental central square of neoclassic architecture was the site of the "Brown House" which served as Nazi Party headquarters at the time of Hitler's rise to power in 1933.

signing in 1938 of the Munich Pact, the ill-fated agreement to guarantee what Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain of England called "peace in our time.

When the pomp and pageantry fades into the cool Bavarian night, the 10,000 athletes in Olympic Village will be poised to match their skills for 195 gold medals in 22 sports.

The International Olympic Committee announced Thursday night it had offered to welcome Communist China into the athletic festival, but Peking says no as long as Taiwan is

In other IOC action, the fourman bobsled competition was eliminated from the 1976 Winter Games as too expensive a sport - with an estimated possibly cost of \$100,000 an entry.

The move will allow Denver the Winter Olympics' next host city, to conduct all events in Colorado. Tentative plans had been made to switch the fourman bobs to Lake Placid N.Y.

The IOC added six women's rowing events to the 1976 Summer Games calendar at Montreal before reaching Friday's closing business session.

(One of a series on extraordinary happenings in each of the 16 modern Olympic Games.

TOKYO, 1964 - For the cycling events in 1964 the Japanese organizers built a magnificent Olympic Velodrome at Hachioji about 70 miles outside Toyko, at a cost of over'\$840,000. In all the Velodrome was used for four days during the Olympic Games.

Six months after the Games had ended, the Velodrome was knocked down to make way for building. The cost of demolition was around \$28,000.

The best punch thrown by featherweight Valentin Loren (Spain) at the Tokyo Olympics cost him suspension for life from amateur boxing. This vital punch, delivered with all the malice that Loren could muster, was, unfortunately, not directed at his opponent Cheng Hsu (Formosa)-but at the

Loren had been disqualified in the first minute of the first round for repeated fouling with his head. When Hungarian referee waved him to his corner. Loren tried to argue with him and eventually hit the referee with a perfectly timed left hook.

And, indeed, before he was led, still protesting loudly, to his dressing room, Loren also launched a vicious punch at a Netherlands judge who, in kindness, was endeavoring to calm the Spaniard.





Most of all, however, you must remember that a toy is only as safe as its owner. Any toy can be dangerous if it is misused. There is no good substitute for a parent's judgment and supervi-



### Aggressive Brazilian Bees Moving Toward U.S.

WASHINGTON (AP) -Swarms of ferocious honey bees that have been known to kill both humans and animals are moving toward the United States from Brazil at the rate of 200 miles a year.

There seems to be no natural barrier to block the bees and they could be in North America within four to six years, says a study financed by the Agriculture Department:

"The most alarming and best-known characteristic of Brazilian bees is their aggressivenness," according to the report. "Hundreds of bees become airborne and pursue and sting any animals or people within 100 meters of the apiary.

"There are many reports of animals and even people being killed by stings of Brazilian bees," it continued.

The report issued Wednesday

by the National Research Council and the National Academy of Sciences is the result of a trip by scientists last November and December to the bee area just north of the Amazon River in Brazil.

The study calls the bees "objectionable and dangerous" and says it is essential "to do whatever can be done" to keep the bees out of North America.

Commercial honey bees in the United States are of European descent. The Brazilian bee, though smaller, flies faster and farther, works harder at making honey, but become angrier much sooner than its northern relatives, the report

ropean strains there. Care was taken to use sieves called 'double queen excluders" for keeping the vicious African queens in place.

"Unfortunately, however, a visiting beekeeper, not understanding the situation, removed the double queen excluders and 26 swarms headed by the queens from Africa escaped in 1957," the report said.

Brazilian beekeepers tried to dilute the strain of African bees by introducing thousands of more agreeable Italian queens in 1963-64. Queens are fully mature females which mate with drones and lay thousands of

But keepers killed the Italian queens "because they produced less honey than Brazilian bees. the report says.

As a result, the African bees survived and now are moving

The committee warned against alarming the public about Brazilian bees

"The problem is likely to be magnified all out of proportion if the Brazilian bees get wide adverse press coverage," the






