VIRGINIA BEACH, Va. (AP) - Beth Ann Pratt, 17, came to Virginia Beach last Thursday. looking for one more week of summer fun before returning to Oil City (Pa.) High School for her senior year.

Saturday she met 18-yearold Anthony Jerome "Tony" Herbert. Friends say they spent much of the next two days to-

Early Monday morning Beth died in the General Hospital of Virginia Beach. Police say drugs caused her death.

Late Monday night Tony was found hanging from a shower rod in his cell at the city jail. Police ruled his death a sui-

"We still don't know if there's any relationship between their deaths." Lt. Henry Capps, head of the police's juvenile division. said Wednesday

We do know Herbert was the only witness to the girl's death and we know he was rejuctant to talk about it." Capps continued. "But we're afraid that the only people who know what actually happened are dead.

Police said nothing new has developed in the case. They have questioned friends of both youths. but don't know what brought the two together, or what actually happened that last night on the beach.

Beth Ann Pratt looked like the prototype "beach" girl; tall. attractive and well-tanned with long blonde hair. Friends in Oil City, a town of 17,000 in Northwestern Pennsylvania, described her as "out-going" and "bright." She sang in the school choir and helped raise money to bring foreign ex-

change students to Oil City Her father, Richard D. Pratt is a stock broker.

Dick Pratt is well-respected and well-liked here." said an Oil City acquaintance. "I can't imagine his daughter

Last week Beth went to Cleveland, Ohio, joined two girl friends there, flew down to Virginia Beach, and met Tony Herbert sometime Saturday.

Dole said in a letter to GAO. A GAO official said. "We plan to give this the same type of treatment we gave the Republicans.

Frank Mankiewicz, McGovern's national political director, told reporters that GAO already had begun a "routine" audit of McGovern finances before Dole asked for it.

For Dole "to accuse the McGovern campaign of the kind of violations that are talked about in this letter. Mankiewicz said, "is somewhat like a man caught on the street after a bank robbery with the cash in a sack calling in the police to arrest a jaywalker he sees crossing the street. I don't think anybody is fooled by this."

Dole charged that the McGovern campaign received at least \$10,000 from a Londonbased committee called Americans for McGovern Abroad. which has not registered with the federal elections office. Mankiewicz said there is such a group, it did contribute \$10,000, "and so far as I know it has not registered.

But, Mankiewicz said, there is some doubt in the law as to whether foreign committees were required to file. We'll clear that up, and that committee will file very shortly."

On other matters, Dole said there are reports that some McGovern supporters bought tickets at prices of at least \$2. 000 for a Madison Square Garden rally, but the purchasers have not been individually iden-

Mankiewicz said the rally followed an initial filing period deadline, and "if there were such contributions" they could be included in a later report.

Dole said the press reported Stewart Mott of New York contributed \$377.500 to McGovern's campaign, but public. disclosures report \$38,000 in contributions and \$160,000 in ans. Mankiewicz said the latest report was June 28, "and I am confident the report was accurate. He has made other contributions since and they will be fully reported when we make our next filing.

Mankiewicz also said that since the GAO found possible violations by President Nixon's campaign fund handlers, "it is not surprising that Sen. Dole would come up with six or seven suppositions and nit-picking charges with respect to the McGovern campaign

GAO had said the GOP campaign organization failed to make required public disclosures involving about \$350,000. Dole said violations by the McGoverern people "could amount to several hundred thousand dollars in non-reported and improperly reported campaign funds.

The GAO report on the Republicans, which was sent to the Justice Department, resulted from inquiries into alleged ties between GOP campaign money and the break-in and attempted bugging of the Democratic party headquarters in

Depot Hit

pilots destroyed a giant ammunition depet in North Vietnam Wednesday, the U.S. Command reported today. Fliers from the carrier Kitty Hawk said their bombs caused 100 secondary explosions and seven large fires at the Dong Ngan depot 13 miles

northeast of Vinh. Pilots from the carrier Oriskany hit a major fuel depot a mile west of Vinh, while other Oriskany fliers attacked a storage area 39 miles to the south. The Command said they caused five explosions and a huge fire at the fuel depot, and at the storage area destroyed more than 100 supply crates and

damaged another 100. A third target was the Cam Pha fuel depot 37 miles northeast of Haiphong. The Command said pilots from the Midway destroyed four supply buildings there and touched off a large explosion and a fire.

In South Vietnam, Communist forces rained rockets into the big air base at Bien Hoa during the night and carried out a series of hit-and-run terror and sabotage attacks at scattered points.

The Saigon command said 15 Vietnamese were killed and 51 were wounded in the attacks. One American also was wounded, and eight U.S. and South Vietnamese planes were destroyed or damaged at Bien Hoa. Two-thirds of the Vietnamese casualties were civil-

Two Marine squadrons of A4 bombers and an Air Force squadron of A37 bombers are stationed at Bien Hoa, or 50 to 60 planes. They support ground operations in the southern half of South Vietnam and Cam-

Bien Hoa is also used as a forward operating base for scores of American jets based in Thailand. They refuel, rearm and receive maintenance at

The Saigon Command claimed 119 North Vietnamese troops were killed at Quang Tri Wednesday and 53 weapons were captured. It said more than 800 rounds of artillery and mortar fire hit South Vietnamese positions, and total government casualties were 12 killed

and 32 wounded In Cambodia, a relief column suffered more than 100 casualties fighting its way into a town 50 miles south of Phnom Penh that had been under siege

Five Americans Killed In Viet

SAIGON (AP) - Five Americans were killed in action tast week, three were missing and three were wounded, the U.S. Command announced today. It said it was the lowest total for any week since Jan. 1, 1965. when "statistical accounting"

One other American died from nonhostile causes.

The number of Americans killed in action was two higher than the previous week, but the number of wounded was the lowest in more than seven years Washington last June. of weekly reporting.

20.000-Head Feed Yard **Now Under Construction**

Buddy Cockrell, local rancher and business man, announced the construction of a new 20,000-head feed yard operation 14 miles east of Pampa on U.S. Highway 60 at a meeting this morning with officials of the Chamber of Commerce and the Pampa Industrial Foundation.

Located in the general vicinity of Moody Farms and Heaton Cattle Company, the feedlot is already under construction. The yard is expected to be completed and ready for business by Nov. 1.

The feedlot is expected to yield approximately 50,000 head of fat cattle per year. According to information released by Southwestern Public Service Company's agricultural department, this would mean a total cash business from such a yard of approximately \$32.610.000 annually.

Assuming that this increase in cattle would be processed by local packers in the Pampa area, it would add another total

agri-business on such a large scale, he said

said The initial operation would employ 25 people, with an annual payroll amounting to approximately \$200,000. according to Cockrell. The feed yard will be a

market for 1.830,000 bushels of feed grains and 16,470 ton sof hay per year. The feed yard industry in the Texas Panhandle area has been estimated in excess of \$6 billion Most of the Texas

Panhandle's industrial development in recent years had been in the agri-business field and it is encouraging to Pampa to see this new development come at this particular time, C.R. Hoover, chairman of the Industrial Committee of the Chamber of Commerce said

With the deterioration of the oil business in this area we have no other alternative than to turn to the agriculture business." Cockrell said

Areas that have not gotten into such agri-businesses have begun to lose population. Cockrell said.

Soviet Union May Give Up Bases In Egypt

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Soviet Union may soon be forced to give up its naval bases in Egypt, some intelligence sources here say.

Relations between the two countries have been rapidly deteriorating in recent months and President Anwar Sadat of the United Arab Republic already has told the Russians to withdraw their air force and army units.

Sources report a growing belief in Washington's intelligence community that the Russian navy may soon follow suit.

There have been reports of a secret meeting in which Sadat told his subordinates the Soviet navy would leave Egypt. Officials here say they know about the meeting but cannot confirm the reports. They say they are inclined to accept an earlier statement by Sadat that the Russians could continue to use the naval facilities.

But one official said it was significant, or at least interesting" that Moscow has not commented on Sadat's state

Sources say there has not yet been any change in Russian use of their naval installations at Alexandria, Mersa Matruh and the Gulf of Sollum on the Libvan border

Loss of the naval facilities would not have the same impact on the Soviet Union as its earlier loss of air bases, although it would be another psy-

WASHINGTON (AP) - All 18 attempts this year to hijack an aircraft for ransom have failed. Federal Aviation Administration Administrator John H. ransom money

Shaffer said today In every instance, he said, the persons involved either have been arrested, killed, or are under the control of a foreign government

The recent action by the Algerian government in returning the \$1.5 million in ransom money paid by U.S. airlines in two hijacking incidents must be a severe blow to anyone who still imagines that air piracy can be a profitable enterprise," Shaf-

"There now is virtually no place on earth a hijacker can go with the realistic expectation that he will be allowed to keep. the money he has extorted

"When a person buys a ticket on an airliner with the idea of hijacking it for profit," Shaffer said, "he has really bought himself a ticket to prison or to the morgue."

Hijackings for extortion began last Nov. 24 when a man known only as D. Cooper disappeared after parachuting from an airliner with \$200,000 in

Many government officials are confident Cooper was killed in the jump. However, nobody has been found, and the money has not been recovered.

All 20 hijack attempts sincetwo last year-have ended in failure, Shaffer said.

In five cases the hijackers escaped by parachute. All but one were tracked down on the ground and arrested, and the ransom paid them was recovered. The exception was a hijacker who surrendered to authorities in Honduras and claimed to have sent the \$303,-000 in ransom to recipients in

Red China. Of the 27 persons involved in the 20 hijackings. Shaffer said. three were killed and 17 were taken into custody by U.S. officials.

the previous high in July. A Benzpyrene Suspected As Lung Cancer Cause

NEW YORK (AP) - Two leading researchers reported today that benzpyrene, a chemical in cigarettes and urban air suspected as a cause of lung cancer, may not be guilty.

The doctors said a study of 5.939 U.S. roofing workers who breathe great amounts of benzpyrene from coal tar pitch and asphalt - the rough equivalent of the benzpyrene in 35 packs or 705 cigarettes a day - showed about the same incidence of lung cancer as the general population.

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

Fischer Only One Point From Championship Title

REYKJAVIK, Iceland (AP) diminished. Others believed Bobby Fischer was only one point from the world chess championship today, and the big question was whether he would try to wrap it up in today's game or cautiously coast to victory on two half-point

Fischer and champion Boris Spassky drew their 20th game Wednesday, giving the American challenger 11'2 points to Spassky's 812.

A victory counts one point, a draw half a point for each player. Fischer needs 1212 points to win the title and Spassky needs 12 to keep it. Victory for Fischer would

take the championship away from the Soviet Union for the first time since 1946. "I think Bobby will play to

win - but he is being very careful now." said Miguel Quinteros, an Argentinian master who recently joined the American entourage.

Some observers say the last seven games were draws because Spassky was playing sound chess and not because Fischer's appetite for a win had that having racked up six wins to Spassky's three in the first 13 games, and one of those Russian three a forfeit, Fischer felt he would prove nothing by taking risks.

If this match was being played according to the rules already adopted for the 1976 championship. Spassky would have lost his crown to Fischer on the 13th game. Under the new rules not yet in effect. draws will not count, and the match goes to the first player to win six games.

The young American appeared delighted as he walked off the stage after Wednesday's draw on the 54th move. Spassky sat glumly staring at the board for several minutes after the referee cleared away the

The game had begun Tuesday and was adjourned with Spassky in a position some experts thought might give him a victory. But after the game resumed, the champion could not find a line of play to capitalize on his placement

234,000 New Teaching Graduates Competing For 116,000 Vacancies This Year

schools in Texas find themselves swamped with persons seeking teachers jobs. The surplus is giving the districts an opportunity to upgrade their staffs, and causing college educators to look at ways of turning would-be teachers into fields where they are needed.

Associated Press Writer Nationwide, more teachers are coming out of colleges and universities than can find jobs. The National Education Association estimates 234,000 new teaching graduates are competing for 116,000 vacacies this

In Texas, an Associated Press survey shows, while there is still a shortage of some teachers-mostly in math, science and special educationand rural schools are having trouble finding teachers, big city schools are getting thousdands of applications while hiring only hundreds

'I think one of the reasons we have a surplus," says a spokesman for the Dallas Independent School District," is that it's a good paying job with good hours and vacations. A teacher on a master's schedule can make \$12,500. They're doing much better than they use to. A teacher with a Ph.D. who wants to teach could make \$15,000 for 10 months work."

The glut of teachers in big city schools, the AP survey shows, has enabled districts to upgrade the quality of teachers. But the very process is also making it very hard for beginning teachers to find jobs.

Claude Kellam, an assistant superintendent with the San Antonio Independent School District who hires teachers for the district says. "We're taking solid, successful experience in preference to no experience when available. We're taking what appears to be top quality personnal instead of 'retreads.' A person might have had 10 years experience, or one year 10 times, and it makes a differ-

ing in his district they try to upgrade the overall status of their teachers.

Austin does hire some teachers with no experience, he said. "we have a great many students that do practice teaching in our schools, from the University (of Texas), from Sam Houston State, from St. Edwards and a few others. We watch them and if we find some that are real good and have real potential we try to find a place for them when they apply."

Supt. Ivan W. Fitzwater of the North East Independent School District in San Antonio says his district is also hiring mostly experienced teachers.

We have hired a number of beginning teachers such as in special education, areas where competition is not as keen. Their chances are not as good as two years ago, or a year ago for that matter. And five years ago, they could name their

come to Texas seeking jobs. The Texas State Teachers Association, which maintains a job registry in Austin for prospective teachers, will no longer accept applications from out of state teachers because of the surplus here.

Many of the applicants for the Houston Independent School district are from out of state. says Dr. George Garver, general superintendent of the district. With Houston's boomtown image they come here looking for jobs, he said, only to find that the district, because of a declining enrollment coupled with the recent failure of a bond election, hired just 186 of the 9,000 who applied this year.

The wives of businessmen transferred to Houston also help flood the market. Garver said. One is Mrs. Yolanda Rawlings, a former Kansas City high school English teacher. Her husband transferred to Houston two years ago and Mrs. Rawlings looked for a teaching

"One school official told me there were 50 applicants for every opening," she said. She fi-

Wardrobe Planning, Selection Important It should be comfortable and

Editors note: This is the second of a two-part fashion series of fall wardrobes -planning and selection prepared by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. In Part 11, which concerns wardrobe selection, Roxanne Schnorr, Extension clothing specialist, outlines tips for selecting fashions while staying within a budget.

COLLEGE STATION ... Getting the most satisfaction for your clothing dollar depends on your buymanship abilities. according to Roxanne Schnorr, Texas Agricultural Extension Service clothing specialist.

'Your season's wardrobe budget will have more buying power if basic rules, such as selecting the correct size. checking the fit, analyzing workmanship and reading hangtags, are followed," she advised

In discussing effective selection of wardrobe items, the Texas A&M University specialist added that other considerations team with basic rules for success in buying. They are the budget itself, fabric care after purchase, and flexibility of style.

Completing your wardrobe and being fashionably dressed can be done without overspending." Miss Schnorr insisted. "Your budget is the best guideline for getting the clothes you need at prices you can pay

"Avoid impulse spending sprees," she cautioned. "It's wiser to buy one outfit at a time to coordinate with your total wardrobe and to observe the new arrivals at stores periodically.

Be sure to set aside enough money for large purchases especially if they won't be the first selection you make in the

"Don't go overboard on price for any one article. Many changes may be more satisfying for an on-the- go female than one or two high-quality outfits. Fashion turnover seems to be frequent, and the 'in' look may be easier to achieve with a moderate price. the Texas A&M University specialist explained. adding that all fashions can be purchased on the ready-to- wear market at prices to fit a budget.

A second major consideration in selecting wardrobe fashions is upkeep required of the fabrics. Easy-care fabrics may be more suitable to the budget as well as the time schedule. Miss Schnorr-said.

Flexibility of style marks the third consideration.

To extend your wardrobe as far as possible, think in terms of different effects you can get by switching separates around. she suggested. "Dual purpose outfits add flexibility to the wardrobe

"Accessories are important. too, as they help make your wardrobe go further. They're fun to buy but often are fads, so you won't want to put a lot of money into any one thing. Remember, prices often are reduced to a modest level soon after they first hit the market."

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

American: World's Hope

There was a time 20 years ago when Americans often got on our nerves because they were so sure of thémselves. Now we get nervous because Americans seem to be losing faith in their own destiny.

The statement is by Peter Petersen, a member of the West German Parliament, who admits to being prejudiced about America

America saved his people from starvation not so very long ago, he recalls in the New York Times Thousands of American soldiers-250,000 to be exact-are stationed in his country, and because of this commitment hiscountry is still free.

Half of it, that is. The other half, with a population of 17 millions, is locked up behind barbed wire, walls and mine fields—behind what amounts to the ugliest and most inhumane border to the world." Some 400 East Germans have been killed because they wanted to go from one part of their country to another

The American committment to freedom and the price Americans are paying for it every day says Petersen, saves West Germans from the fate of their neighbors who are the victims of imperialism.

That is why it disturbs him to hear American students talk about American imperialism," or to see, on a visit here, only headlines about a prison riot somewhere or the dope problem in cities or to be warned not to walk back to his hotel after dark.

Americans are probably the world's best salesmen of material goods, he says, but they are inept at selling ideas. And the ideas are still there- the forces that made America a great country and inspired a dream to peoples all around the

It is a dream not of two cars in every garage but of freedom as conceived in this country in 1776. It is not "American freedom in a national sense, but is the basis of human dignity

We now have a crisis in the Free World, says Petersen because Americans appear to be shrinking back from the responsibility that goes with being the strongest power in the world. The Soviets don't have such qualms, and that is why they fill every vacuum America and its allies are leaving

America's heritage of freedom is the hope of the world. Petersen states bluntly. in words reminiscent of those of an American president more than a century ago.

"I believe it is the only hope we have, because if America fails, the world fails.

By Lawrence Lamb, M.D. **About Those Technical Words**

Dear Dr. Lamb-I read your article on angiograms and coronary catheterization, and I was particularly interested because I have had this procedure done. It wasn't a very comfortable feeling and it took a long time. Anyway, the doctors were satisfied with my X rays and told me I have idiopathic hypertrophic subaortic stenosis. Of course, the doctor went on to explain what each word meant but I've forgotten and would like for you to explain. How dangerous is this disease?

Dear Reader - Idiopathic

is a fancy medical word that we doctors use to say we don't know what causes the problem. It sounds a lot better than saying I don't know. Hyper means excessive and trophic means growth; thus excessive growth or overgrowth. Subaortic means underneath the aortic valve. which is the main valve controlling the outflow of blood from the main left pumping chamber of the heart into the giant aortic artery that carries blood to the entire body except the lungs. Stenosis means to occlude or obstruct, so the entire term really means an obstruction occlusion of the region just beneath the aortic valve caused by an overgrowth of tissue. The reason for the overgrowth of tissue isn't known, so it's called idio-

The main effect of this problem is to obstruct the outflow of blood from the left side of the heart to the body. The muscular left heart chamber has to pump harder to force the blood past this narrow opening or obstruction. For this reason the muscle of the left heart chamber enlarges causing cardiac enlargement from simple work. If the heart muscle has to work too hard and there is not enough circulation to the heart muscle itself, then a person can have heart pain or anginal pain similar to that caused by fatty deposits in the arteries to the heart muscle. Individuals with this complicating problem do get relief

from nitroglycerin tablets

under the tongue. Depending on the over-all heart status and the health of the individual, and deon the questi whether the overgrowth of tissue will grow back again or not, some individuals with this problem can have heart surgery and the overgrowth material removed. These kinds of decisions have to be made on an individual basis. Considering the type of evaluation you have had. I'm certain your doctor is aware of these various possibilities and will be able to give you the best possible advice on what you should do.

Here's more on cancer and food. Dr. Robert A. Good, one of the world's leading immunologists, reports that experimental studies in animals and human populations show that if you decrease the level of protein in the diet you can decrease the incidence of cancer. But, if you go too far and have a protein deficiency, you are more susceptible to cancer. It looks like there's an optimal amount of protein in the diet and defining this optimal amount may be difficult. (NEWSPAPER ENTERPRISE ASSN.)



CONSTRUCTIVE WORDS

Education, including academic, technical, public affairs, education and self-education, deserves encouragement and support of every constructive citizen. Never in the history of man has a people given of its time, its interest and its treasure for the education and the future of its descendants as have the people of our country.

Until very recently, the physical and material facilities of educational establishments. especially public education, were generally inadequate and poor, or at least they would be thought so by many.

No matter how primitive the buildings and the equipment, however, graduates of those early schools could read well. write good English sentences and spell. A look at the school buildings of that day of the rather basic and abbreviated education of the teachers of those days cannot explain why students today finish high school still unable to read, write or spell.

Reviewing some of the educational materials of the old days might be more helpful. One example is the 'Elementary Spelling Book' published in 1880 and 1908. based on Noah Webster's 'American Spelling Book." It is not a glamorous little book in appearance but it is solid good sense.

Spelling does not come easy or automatically for most. It requires mental effort and drill. This is provided. In addition, examples of usage of words abound and the examples teach the pupil to be a good person and good citizen.

Some examples of the maxims, not often found in later textbooks: "Men devoted to mere amusement misemploy their time." "Worldly men make it their primary object to please themselves: duty holds but a secondary place in their esteem. Strong drink leads to the debasement both of the mind and the body

Modernists who have been taught to sneer at such sentiments will not understand how they could produce good citizens who can read and write and spell. Others know that constructive words help make constructive citizens.

enough. As part of the Sears was largely responsible for Mr. Nixon's successful self-confidence exhibited here. preliminary delegate hunting in 1967, and his unsurpassed contacts in the Republican party would give Agnew a resource he seriously lacks. beleaguered Republican

Whether Sears takes enough time from his Washington law practice and whether Agnew (a notoriously bad listener) follows his advice are in doubt. But Adnew desperately needs a John Sears to build relationships with the party he has cavalierly neglected as Vice President.

Even if Human Events and the other right-wing ideologues eagerly accept Agnew solely because of what he says, the victory-oriented Republican leaders are demanding more than ideology




