Ford Company Faces CIO Strike Threat

(By The Associated Press)

The Huge Ford Motor company, which holds millions of dollars in national defense orders, faced an implied strike threat today from the United Automobile Workers (CIO).

"Any necessity of a strike" at the Ford plants can be avoided by "sincere negotiations" on five union demands made yesterday, declared a statement by R. J. Thomas, UAW-CIO president, and Michael F. Widman, Jr., director of the union's drive to organize the Ford workers.

Ford spokesmen said they wouldn't "take the trouble" to reply to the union, which asked wage increases, acceptance of the principle of seniority, and an immediate bargaining conference for employees of the company at Highland Park and River Rouge, Mich. There are 85,000 Ford production workers in the Detroit area.

On other labor fronts affecting the defense program this was the situation: Seven thousand employees of the Allis-Chalmers company in Milwaukee, Wis., and 6,500 of the International Harvester company tractor plant at Chicago remained out on strike, with no apparent progress made toward settlement of the disputes. Allis-Chalmers has some \$40,000,000 in defense contracts.

At LaCrosse, Wis., rubber plant 800 CIO-unions walked out yesterday contending the company had violated seniority rules. A second strike in two weeks stopped production of freight cars by the Pullman-Standard Car Manufacturing company at Michigan City, Ind. An AFL union spokesman said the company refused to consider a grievance committee's demands.

Miller Sentenced To 7 Years In Pen
TEXARKANA, Ark., Feb. 6 (AP)—Convicted of kidnapping his stepdaughter, Mrs. Dorothy Crawford Garner, Jesse William Miller today was sentenced to serve seven years in the federal penitentiary.

Mrs. Garner charged that Miller and his wife lured her to a farm near McKinney, Texas, by telling her that her grandfather was ill, then allegedly forcing her to pick cotton. Miller said he would appeal. Mrs. Miller was freed by an instructed verdict.

Willkie Utterance Held In Contempt By German Sources
BERLIN, Feb. 6 (AP)—Authorized German sources asserted today that utterances such as that by Wendell L. Willkie released yesterday in London should be received only with contempt.

(Willkie, in a statement broadcast by the BBC after his departure from London yesterday, said: "Tell the German people that we German-Americans reject and that the aggression and lust for power of the present German government.")

"The German government, the authorized sources said, did not pay much attention to Willkie's words, since he is a private citizen. "Of one thing we are sure," they said, "Willkie would not have made this reference to his German extraction before election."

(Actually Willkie made a full statement concerning his German ancestry in his acceptance speech at Elwood, Ind., last July.)

It was asserted that Willkie had behaved more English than American—"the British lords so impressed him."

McCormick Would Seize Island Bases

WASHINGTON, Feb. 6 (AP)—Col. Robert R. McCormick, publisher of The Chicago Tribune, testified today he favored occupying British and French island possessions by force if that were necessary to prevent Germany from using them as bases for an attack on the United States.

McCormick appeared before the senate foreign relations committee on the administration's British aid bill, but said he did not wish to express an opinion on the legislation itself.

After the witness had declared it was "fantastic" to believe the United States could be invaded, Senator Pepper (D-Fla.) asked: "Suppose Germany should conquer Great Britain and take over British bases in this hemisphere?"

"I wouldn't let them do it," McCormick replied.

"To prevent such a step, McCormick declared, he would seek first to acquire the island possessions in advance but that if this were impossible he would occupy them by force.

In saying it was "fantastic" to suggest an invasion McCormick mentioned formidable distances, transportation difficulties, and other barriers for any would-be invader.

Senator Pepper asked McCormick whether he favored the policy of "sending our navy there first" if American security were threatened in any part of the world, and the witness agreed.

"Suppose Hitler declared war on us," Pepper observed.

"Then we'd be in for a fight," McCormick replied, adding: "These Germans aren't so tough, senator, I've been up against them and I'm not scared of them."

The witness testified that he had spent 16 months overseas as a staff and field artillery officer in the last war.

"The newspaper publisher said he did not believe the combined British, Italian and German fleets are 'bigger than ours.' "We don't know how many ships of those fleets are still floating," he said. "The Italian force is mostly on the bottom."

"You mean all those the British have been able to catch," Pepper supplied, adding humorously: "Have you heard that Mussolini promises Hitler all aid 'short of war'?"

Long-Time Resident, Mrs. M'Cullough, Dies

Mrs. Samuel McCullough, 79 years and eight months old, died at her home, 207 North West street, here this morning. She had been a resident of Pampa for 31 years, coming here from Ohio.

Mrs. McCullough had been in failing health for some time but her condition did not become serious until January 5 when she was taken to the hospital. She improved rapidly and was released a few days later. Her condition became serious a few days ago.

She was born in Tuscarora county in Ohio. In 1890 she was married to Mr. McCullough in Coshocton, Ohio. They moved to Pampa in 1909 and Mrs. McCullough became connected with C. B. Barnard who owned one of Pampa's first stores. Mr. McCullough died Feb. 21, 1934.

Mrs. McCullough was active in work of the First Methodist church during her residence in Pampa. She joined the church at an early age in Ohio. She was a member of the Mothers class of the First Methodist Sunday school.

Following the death of Mr. McCullough, she was active in having a church erected in Pampa. Burial will be held in Fairview cemetery, and a memorial to her husband and it was named McCullough church.

Mrs. McCullough is survived by two children, Mrs. Earl Meade, Seymour, and Neil McCullough, Pampa, and two grandchildren, Martha Lu McCullough and L. N. McCullough, Jr.

Funeral services will be conducted in the First Methodist church by the Rev. H. H. Bratcher, pastor of the Grove Methodist church, and formerly of the McCullough church, the Rev. W. M. France's political crisis moved nearer a showdown in the thinly-veiled struggle between the 84-year-old Chief of State, Marshal Philippe Pétain, and the conqueror, Adolf Hitler.

Outwardly, the Nazis profess to be keeping hands off behind the scenes, however, sharp German pressure was reported on the aged marshal to reinstate his ousted former vice-premier, Pierre Laval, an ardent proponent of cooperation with Germany.

Today, Pétain's No. 1 aide, Naval Minister Admiral Jean Darlan, returned to Paris for new conversations with Laval amid indications that the French government was strictly opposed to restoring Laval to the cabinet on his own terms.

Dispatches from Vichy said Laval's first demands were rejected as exorbitant at a meeting yesterday of Pétain and his ministers.

The British reported steady advances by their armies on Africa's far-flung fronts—in Eritrea, in Ethiopia, and in Italian Somaliland. South African troops were said to have driven 60 miles inside Somaliland from British Kenya.

Italian settlers in eastern Libya, British said, have joined the military withdrawal toward Benghazi. German bombers struck at London and southern England last night in a short but intensive raid. The British officially classed the attacks as light.

Dispatches to neutral Sweden from German-held Oslo asserted that all Norwegians more than 15 years old had been ordered to register by the Nazi-dominated government in an effort to strengthen its control.

Youths May Take Exams For Army Plane Mechanics

An unusual opportunity for youths desiring to become mechanics in the air corps is now being offered by the United States Civil Service commission. The commission will offer competitive examination for the post of mechanic-learner and will pay a salary of \$50 a month to those accepted while they are learning the trade.

The examination will be for young men between the ages of 16 and 25 years to assist in learner's capacity, mechanics of higher grade in the miscellaneous repair and manufacturing work on aircraft and aircraft engines. An examination will be held in Pampa. Applications must be on file in New Orleans not later than February 18.

Competitors will be rated on the basis of written mechanical aptitude test, on a scale of 100. This test will consist of problems in spatial relations, (pertaining to space), arithmetic and simple mechanics.

Applicants must be physically able to do heavy labor. Further information may be secured from V. Darnell at the Pampa postoffice.

Fight Over Truck Load Limit Opens

(By The Associated Press)

Panic-stricken Italian colonists were reported fleeing before the British in Premier Mussolini's dwindling north African empire today as aerial scouts told of seeing Fascist motorized columns withdrawing from Bengasi and black-shirt troops falling back post-haste on the east Libyan stronghold.

Fresh Greek successes in Albania, announced in Athens, plunged Italy's war effort into further gloom.

Dispatches from the Libyan desert battlefield said that Gen. Sir Archibald P. Wavell's troops were pressing westward along the Mediterranean coast at a pace which would bring them to the gates of Bengasi within 48 hours.

Bengasi, 325 miles from the Egyptian border, had been heralded as the site for a probable major defense by Marshal Rodolfo Graziani's retreating armies. It was not immediately clear whether the withdrawal of motorized columns signaled abandonment of the town.

Latest reports put the British within 60 miles of Bengasi, sweeping forward at a 30-mile-a-day clip.

In the Greek-Italian war, an Athens spokesman declared that the Greeks had smashed two Fascist counter-attacks in the Adriatic coastal sector, and that the Italians were falling back "in confusion, abandoning dead and wounded on the field of battle."

The Greeks said that Italian tank attacks had been frustrated and that the Fascists had been driven from "positions of great strategic importance."

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Colonists Flee Before British Army

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Flier Claims U. S. Air Force 'Deplorable'

(By The Associated Press)

AUSTIN, Feb. 6.—Smouldering since the last general session two years ago, the bitter truck load limit fight popped back into legislative prominence today.

The Senate Highways and Motor Transportation committee, before a crowd that spread over the big senate chamber heard testimony last night on a bill repealing the present 7,000-pound net load limit and substituting a gross weight regulation which would allow loads up to 36,000 pounds, or a gross weight of 56,000 pounds.

A continuation of the hearing was set for Feb. 12.

The battle spread to the house where the Highways committee in that chamber scheduled a hearing tonight on a bill identical to the one heard in the senate.

Alternately praised and condemned, the new proposal by Senator Rogers Kelly of Edinburg limits weight by application of a scientific formula.

Kelly asked the committee to approve his bill and solve "once and for all a vexing problem that has troubled Texans for ten years."

"By what reason can you place a truck on a bill identical to the one heard in the senate?" he asked.

Proponents agreed the 7,000-pound restriction was absurd and asserted a small increase would result in the same economic stranglehold imposed by the present law.

But foes of Kelly's bill countered that bigger loads spelled damage to highways and lateral roads.

"If you pass this bill you will be called back here in two years to rebuild the highway system," warned Doak Rainey, a consulting engineer and former employe of the state highway department.

Resonant Huffman, Harrison county judge, declared the large load limit would be costly to counties and would greatly increase road and bridge maintenance fund expenditures.

The Rio Grande valley was represented on both sides of the argument.

R. B. McLeish, Waco, approved the Kelly bill and asserted that the state legislature "transportation takes the greatest part of our fruit dollar."

But Frank Davis, Harlingen, said increased truck loads decreased the price paid the grower.

A house committee booked a night hearing on a proposal to abolish prison whippings.

A senate committee quickly approved a bill permitting the use of state land for a huge pleasure pier at Galveston and a house committee docketed early consideration of the measure.

Further study was ordered by a house committee on a proposed constitutional amendment permitting soldiers, sailors, and marines with Texas residence to vote.

Lonnie E. Alsup, blind representative from Carthage, introduced a semi-serious resolution attacking the West, East and South Texas Chambers of Commerce. The house wouldn't let him send it to the state affairs committee, and he avoided a direct vote by raising the topic of order in the resolution period had expired.

The resolution evoked considerable laughter and shouting. Alsup told his colleagues that "to a certain extent, I am serious."

The proposal hailed upon the three regional chambers "to consolidate in order to save taxpaying citizens large sums which they now are paying out for triple duplicated services and further to promote more efficiency in the industry of this state, and not politics."

"We are not yet willing to sur-

When the V. F. W. Auxiliary was organized 25 years ago, its purpose was the support of its parent organization and all of the phases of its program.

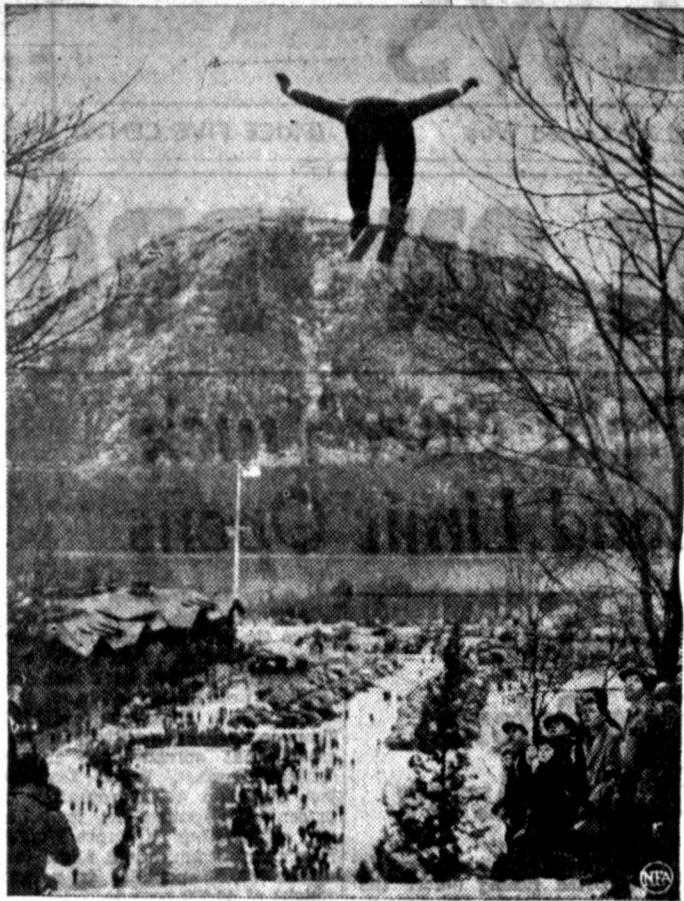

Senate Argues Employment Of Relief Officer

AUSTIN, Feb. 6 (AP)—Continuing an investigation of old age assistance administration, the senate today sought to determine the conditions surrounding the employment of J. S. Murchison, former mayor of Corsicana, as executive director of the public welfare department.

Dr. Thomas H. Taylor of Brownwood, a member of the welfare board, told the senate sitting as a committee of the whole that Murchison was appointed by the board a few hours after Adam E. Johnson resigned and that no one other than Murchison was considered for the position.

Questioned by Senator Joe Hill of Henderson, Dr. Taylor said that he did not know Murchison before his appointment although he had heard of him.

"Was he experienced in welfare work?" Hill queried.

"As mayor of Corsicana," Dr. Taylor replied.

"Why did you consider only one man out of six million persons in Texas?" Hill wanted to know.

Dr. Taylor declared it was the consensus of the board that Murchison thought of welfare problems in a practical way and with a view to eliminating unnecessary red tape procedure.

Dr. Taylor, who also is president of Howard Payne college, was the second witness in the investigation to determine the basis, if any, of complaints old age assistance investigators had refused arbitrarily to accept pension applicants and that field workers had treated applicants discourteously.

Italian Brigades Lost In Uplands

WITH THE BRITISH FORCES NEAR CHEREN, Eritrea, Feb. 5 (delayed) (AP)—The Italian garrison of Barentu, estimated at three and a half brigades, which on Sunday attempted to slip away from encircling British forces after the British capture of that town, appeared lost and dispersed today in the wild scrublands of Eritrea.

This Fascist force which retreated southward in an effort to reach Adi Urgi and Asmara, Eritrean capital, by way of Tokul and Pozzi Di Tole, used an unfinished road which disappears in the uplands.

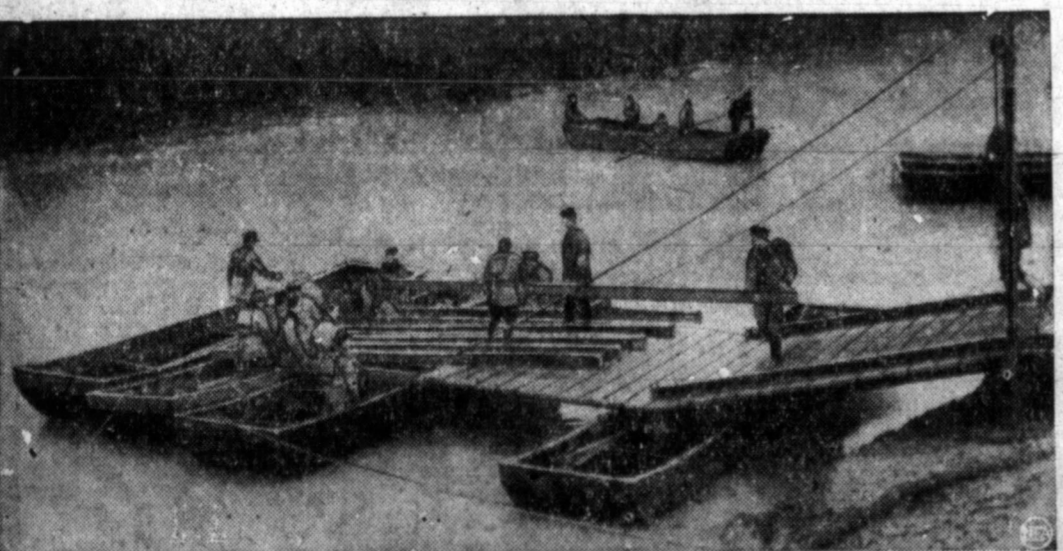

Italian Tank Drive Fails, Greeks Claim

(By The Associated Press)

ATHENS, Feb. 6.—An Italian attack yesterday in the Tepeleni sector of Albania, in which tanks were said to have led the way for shock troops in armored cars, was reported today by the Greeks to have been shattered, putting the Italians again on the defensive.

Dispatches from the front said that anti-tank fire destroyed four of the armored cars and "many" tanks and that the assault troops, routed by a Greek bayonet charge, threw down hand grenades and automatic weapons as they fled.

The counter-attack was launched the moment the column halted for the motorized troops to go into action. The crews of four armored cars were taken prisoners, it was said.

The attack was made in darkness, but the surprise element was lacking, the Greek dispatches said.

The Italians were reported hastily entrenching at some points of the front and here and there Greek advance units were so close, it was said, that they could hear their foes at work.

The Albanian port of Valona, once one of the busiest links in the Italian supply chain to Albania, has been so badly battered by repeated bombings that the Italians have given it up as a base port, Greeks reported today.

The Greeks quoted Italian prisoners as saying the Fascists have been forced to unload supplies at Kriponero, a small town south of Valona on the bay of Valona.

The Greek spokesman reported fresh advances by Greek soldiers in Albania, despite "very unfavorable weather conditions," and the Greek high command officially reported that Italian attempts to attack with tanks were frustrated.

The spokesman declared that Greek strikers, wielding bayonets in hand-to-hand fighting which he described as "the most brilliant since the outbreak of the war," drove Italian defenders from a village and found intact a storehouse

Second Trial Of Mrs. Henry Begins

LAKE CHARLES, La., Feb. 6 (AP)—Early completion of a jury for the second trial of Mrs. Annie Beatrice Henry, charged with murder in connection with the rice field slaying nearly a year ago of Joseph F. Calloway, Houston, Texas, salesman, was indicated today as a new panel of jurors reported at the opening of court.

Nine talsmen were chosen before the original panel of 44 was exhausted last night, leaving three to be obtained from the new panel of 60 ordered by Judge Mark C. Pickrel.

George McQuiston, former state police captain, sought since Monday as a material witness, voluntarily appeared yesterday and immediately was ordered held in contempt of court by Judge Pickrel for delaying the trial.

Mrs. Henry, together with Horace Finnon Burks, her alleged companion at the time Calloway was fatally shot, was convicted and sentenced to hang at her previous trial.

Five-Year Limit On Bill Agreed To By House Committee

WASHINGTON, Feb. 6 (AP)—Democratic members of the House Foreign Affairs committee, in a bid for increased support for the administration's mid-Britain bill, agreed today on an amendment to put a five-year limit on the president's powers to make contracts under the law.

The group also decided to sponsor another amendment designed to clarify further the effect of the legislation with regard to use of American ships for convoy purposes. The amendment would insert in the bill the statement that "nothing in this act shall be construed to authorize or permit authorization of the entry of any American vessel into a combat area in violation of the neutrality act of 1939."

Chairman Bloom (D-N.Y.) said the committee did not decide to make any concessions with regard to proposed limitation of the amount of funds which would be spent under the bill.

House Considers Two Oil Bills

AUSTIN, Feb. 6 (AP)—Marked for house of representatives floor consideration in the near future were two oil bills today—one making the Texas proration laws permanent and the other renewing the state's membership in the interstate oil compact two years.

Both proposals were recommended for passage by a committee after a public hearing last night, the permanent statute bill getting but one dissenting vote and the compact bill receiving unanimous approval.

Members Jerry Saclier and Olin Culberson of the railroad commission, which administers the proration laws, expressed satisfaction on the committee's action.

Asserting the laws had been administered creditably, Rep. Gene McNamara of Waco, author of the bill taking the oil statutes out of the temporary category, declared they should be made permanent in view of possible federal control of the oil industry.

"There is danger of federal control and I believe Texans should regulate their own industries," McNamara said.

C. R. Starnes, Gladewater oil operator, said he favored permanency of the proration laws but was opposed to a provision in the statutes.

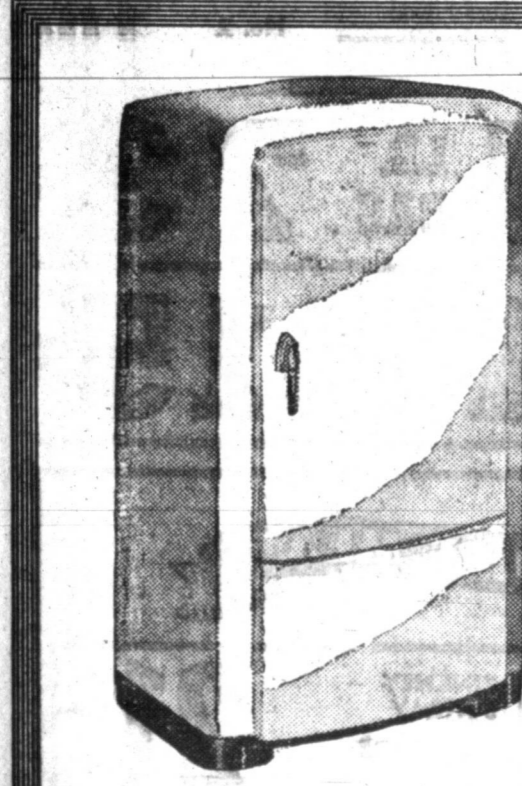

Emergency Housing Programs To Start

WASHINGTON, Feb. 6 (AP)—Housing needs for the army of civilian workers concentrating at national defense centers in Texas will be met by the government.

This was seen in the announcement of C. F. Palmer, defense housing coordinator, that emergency housing programs would start at once near Dallas and Dumas, and that a more comprehensive program would be worked out as soon as the "extreme urgency" of the present situation had been handled.

Defense contracts of the American Zinc company required the employment of 250 additional persons at Dumas, Palmer announced.

Severe Criminal Code Announced By Rumanian Premier

BUCHAREST, Rumania, Feb. 6 (AP)—The most severe criminal code in modern Rumanian history was announced today by Premier General Ion Antonescu, providing such penalties as death for drawing anti-government cartoons, and five to 10 years at hard labor for singing political songs in the streets.

The code also establishes the death penalty for misappropriation of more than \$4,000 in public funds, and one to five years imprisonment for parents whose children are convicted of crimes. Penalties equal to those for adults are provided for children over 15.

The prison terms are doubled for Jews, Communists, and those non-Rumanian ethnic origin.

More than 20 crimes are made punishable by death within 10 hours after sentence is passed. Among them are promising to redistribute fortunes or to end taxation and engaging in any class struggle.

The special punishment for Communists was the first in Rumanian legal history.

While saying he "was not a tyrant," and does not wish to "spill blood," Antonescu declared any future revolts must be forestalled so that order can be reestablished immediately "for us and our allies."

Gayda Attacks U. S. Policy

ROME, Feb. 6 (AP)—Virgilio Gayda, Fascist editor of Il Giornale D'Italian said today that "defense of plutocracy" was the "unconfessed but dominant aim" of United States "intervention against the Axis powers."

For that reason President Roosevelt has failed to ask Great Britain for a clear declaration of her "concrete reasons" for war, the editor said, in continuation of his criticism of American efforts to aid Britain.

Gayda wrote that the "facts belie" talk by Mr. Roosevelt and Secretary Hull of defending democracy and justice and "show a dominant plutocratic power."

Gayda then reported that he considered evidence of "plutocratic domination" in Britain, which included a statement attributed to John Wilmot, Laborite member of the British house of commons, that a privileged class of 400,000 persons holds fortunes totaling \$12,000,000,000 (\$48,000,000,000).

Gayda also cited British "workers' agitation for wage increases" and said British golfers opposed ploughing up their courses for the growing of food.

The editor based his argument against the United States' furnishing of arms and ships to Britain, "with grave risks against Italian and German peoples," on "the understanding that the official policy of the United States as formulated in the bill to aid England is an open and deliberate violation of neutrality."

He identified opponents of the bill, naming particularly General Robert E. Wood, as "more honest and wise American politicians."

bases for an attack on the United States.

While the senate committee was hearing Lindbergh, Democratic members of the House Foreign Affairs committee agreed on an amendment to the British-aid bill to put a five-year limit on the President's power to make contracts under the legislation.

The extension of the contractual power three years beyond the proposed expiration date of the law, it was said, would permit the completion of large projects, warships for example.

Also, in a bid for increased support for the bill, the house committee decided to sponsor another amendment, reading: "Nothing in this act shall be construed to authorize or permit authorizations of the entry of any American vessel into a combat area in violation of the neutrality act of 1939."

At one point, Lindbergh testified in reply to questions by Senator Barkley (D-Ky) that he did not believe the United States should aid Greece in its fight against Italy.

Connally said he could not see why U. S. planes would be needed here if it was true, as Lindbergh believed, that there was no danger of an invasion of the United States.

Lindbergh declared in his "stop-encouraging-war" testimony that repeal of the arms embargo had "done more damage to France than if the act had been left on the statute books. 'In the end,' he said, "it might be shown to have done more damage to Britain."

"You don't believe Germany would have invaded France?" Connally asked.

"After all," the witness replied, "Britain and France declared war on Germany. I believe that if war had not been declared Germany would not have turned west. I believe that if we had kept the arms embargo peace would be under negotiation in Europe now."

Lindbergh asserted that "from the standpoint of Britain and France, I believe a better peace could be negotiated now than next month or next year."

On further questioning, the witness said he did not know whether Britain could be invaded. "It would be extremely costly."

Reterring his opposition to the British aid bill before the senate foreign relations committee, the noted flier asserted that it was an "established fact" that the country's air force was in "deplorable condition," its army "but poorly equipped," and its battle fleet "in urgent need of new equipment."

"I oppose placing our security in an English victory," he asserted, "because I believe that such a victory is extremely doubtful."

"I am opposed to this bill because I believe it endorses a policy that will lead to failure in war and to conditions in our own country as bad or worse than those we now desire to overthrow in Nazi Germany."

As he read his prepared statement, one of the committee he addressed was Senator Pepper (D-Fla.), who denounced him to the senate last year as "chief of the fifth columnists in this country."

That was after the aviator had condemned administration's foreign policies.

The 39-year-old flier said he had reached the conclusion that, given "several years," the United States was the one nation that could equal or excel Germany in aviation but he did not believe American assistance could give

Mexico, U. S., Expected To
Sign Economic Agreement

By LLOYD LEHRBAS

U. S. Leakproof
Tanks Superior,
Say Legislators

WASHINGTON, Feb. 6. (AP)—The leakproof gasoline tanks of American's newest warplanes, congressional sources declared today, not only are superior to German and British types, but also give the planes far greater range.

Legislators in close touch with military developments said the substance perfected by the U. S. army for protecting airplane fuel tanks from gun fire was so much more efficient than types used abroad that thinner layers could be used, taking up less room inside the metal tanks and displacing less fuel.

The substance, a refinement of that first used for the purpose by the Germans, consists chiefly of soft rubber which when perforated by bullets automatically seals itself and almost completely prevents leakage.

Although satisfactory protection against 30 or 50 caliber machine-gun fire, the sealing is not, of course, proof against the projectiles of aircraft cannon, the sources said.

It also was learned that the army air corps plans to put its aircraft purchasing on a long-range basis. That, officials explained, is the purpose behind the army's plan to ask congress soon for authority to build 11,000 additional airplanes.

Superimposed upon the current 25,000-plane program, the increase would give the air corps a total of 36,000 planes of all types but would be protected over a long period so manufacturers could plan their production well in advance. Such a program also was expected to stabilize employment in the industry.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 6. (AP)—The United States and Mexico, it was learned authoritatively today, expect to sign a comprehensive "good neighbor" agreement in the very near future, settling all major economic and financial questions now outstanding.

The pact, it was understood, will provide for a general, all-inclusive disposition of "every problem between the two nations." A number of the points involved have been pending for several years and involve millions of dollars.

The formulae for the agreement were worked out by Undersecretary of State Welles and Dr. Francisco Castillo Najera, the Mexican ambassador. They were said to have concentrated on a lump settlement, rather than a piece-meal disposal of numerous claims and counter claims arising from the oil expropriation, agrarian appropriation, and other controversial questions.

Final arrangements for the pact probably will follow the return of the Mexican ambassador here Friday, after conferences with his foreign office in Mexico City.

One of the major questions scheduled to be settled arose in 1938 from the Mexican government's expropriation of American, British and Dutch owned oil properties, valued by the oil companies at from \$400,000,000 to \$440,000,000, but appraised at only \$35,400,000 by Mexican courts.

Other extensive American claims resulted from the Mexican government's large scale expropriation of American owned land and property under its agrarian program, and a number of general claims resulting from alleged seizures of property dating back 70 years.

MEXICO CITY, Feb. 6. (AP)—Dr. Francisco Castillo Najera, Mexico's ambassador to the United States, received final instructions today from Foreign Minister Ezequiel Padilla on current Mexican-United States negotiations for a general settlement of all problems outstanding between the two countries.

The ambassador yesterday rejected these negotiations with President Avila Camacho, who summoned him from Washington.

Sources close to the foreign office said both governments would make simultaneous announcements of definite agreements shortly after his return to Washington Friday.

Vichy Government
Again Rejects Laval

(By The Associated Press)

VICHY, France, Feb. 6.—The French government, apparently opposed to restoring Pierre Laval to the cabinet on his own terms, sent Naval Minister Admiral Jean Darlan back to Paris today for further talks with the former vice premier and foreign minister, chief proponent of French collaboration.

Laval's first demands, it was said, were rejected as exorbitant at a meeting yesterday of Chief of State Marshal Petain and his ministers.

Official circles reported last night after a stormy two-hour meeting of the council of ministers that Laval might be offered both the presidency of the council and the interior ministry, which would give him control of all police services in unoccupied France.

The council was reported to have rejected a proposal by Admiral Darlan at the outset of the meeting that all the ministers resign and allow Petain to form an entirely new government.

Finally it was decided, informants said, that further action be withheld pending the outcome of Darlan's renewed deliberations with Laval in Paris. Darlan was due to arrive there at 10:22 a. m. (CST). A half hour after Darlan's departure, United States Ambassador Admiral William D. Leahy had an interview with Petain for what the embassy called "general information."

Censorship as to Darlan's movements was lifted and the press was permitted to announce his departure, contrary to previous practice.

1 1/2 cups tomato juice 2 1/4 cups cooked or 1 1/2 teaspoons salt 1/2 cup whole kernel corn, well drained (No. 2 can) 1/2 teaspoon pepper 1/2 cup finely diced celery 2 tablespoons vinegar 1/2 cup finely cut pickle, sweet or sour 3 tablespoons water 1/2 cup Fat Milk

Heat to boiling a mixture of tomato juice, grated onion, salt, pepper and vinegar. Add gelatin and stir until dissolved. Remove 1/2 cup from mixture. Chill larger portion until it begins to thicken. 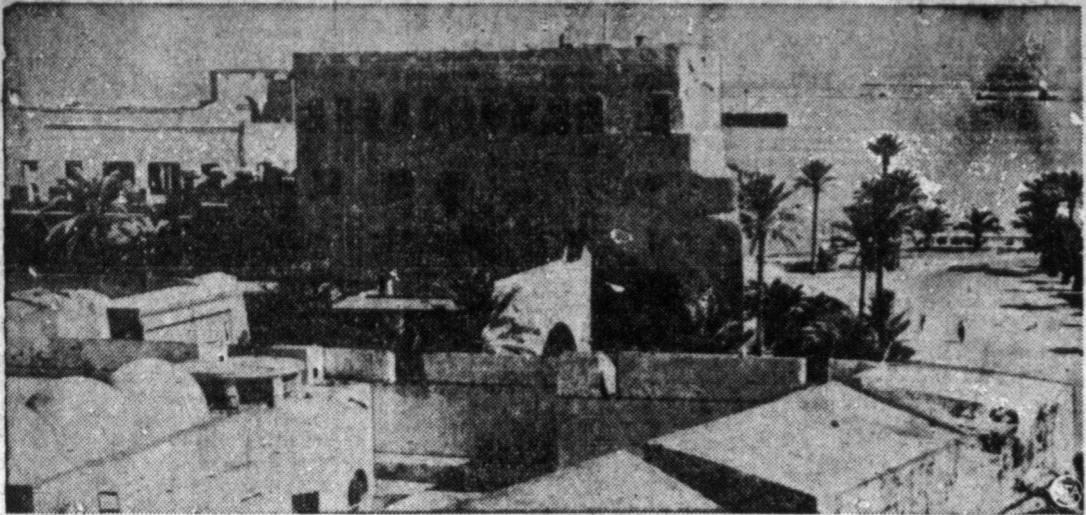

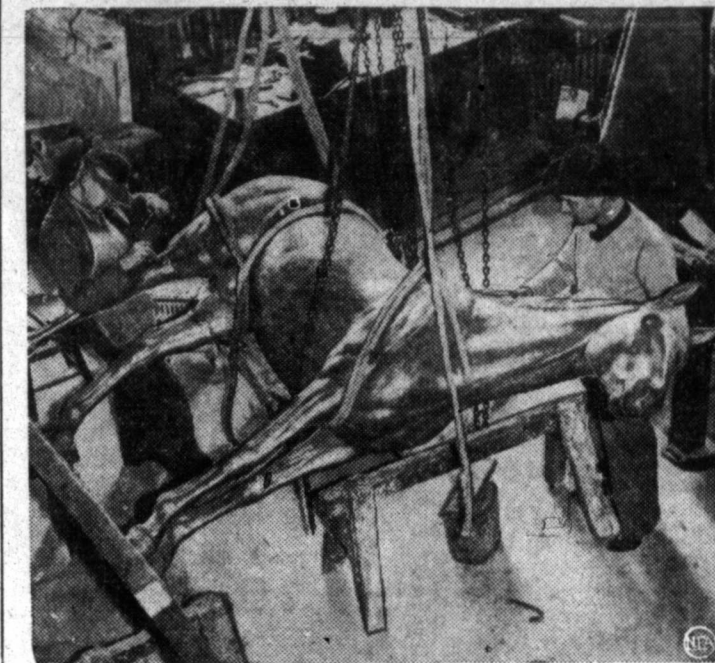

Amon Carter Calls C & S Lease Plan "Burlington Blitzkrieg"

WASHINGTON, Feb. 6. (AP)—Amon Carter, Fort Worth, Texas, publisher, denounced today as an "outrage" and a "Burlington blitzkrieg" a proposal by the Colorado & Southern Railway to lease its system by leasing the properties owned and operated by the Fort Worth & Denver City and the Wichita Valley railways.

The Colorado & Southern proposes to move the offices of the Texas companies from Fort Worth and the shops from Childress to Denver, Colo.

Appearing for arguments before the interstate commerce commission, Carter, who is chairman of a citizen's group protesting the proposal, said he was personally "pretzled" much worked up over the thing and that the proposal had aroused much hostility in Texas.

He predicted that because of a resentment in Texas, instead of a

substantial saving, as contended by the Colorado & Southern, the leasing of the Texas companies would result in a "very substantial loss" because of diversion of traffic to other carriers.

The Colorado & Southern is a subsidiary of the Chicago, Burlington & Quincy.

"As an evidence of my sincerity I am bringing up a boy (Amon Carter, Jr.) now 21 years old to carry on for me with the Fort Worth Star-Telegram," Carter told the commission.

"In my final papers to the young man I am leaving everything discretionary with one exception, namely the Burlington blitzkrieg against Texas.

"On this I have asked that he never relent in keeping the good people of Texas continually informed just how mean the Burlington has treated us country folks."

The commission, through its finance division, several months ago approved the Colorado & Southern's application. Upon petitions from various Texas interests, however, the full commission agreed to hear new arguments.

Ed P. Byars, representing the Fort Worth Chamber of Commerce, told the commission the Colorado & Southern had been a "millstone around the neck" of its Texas subsidiaries, the Fort Worth & Denver City and the Wichita Valley railways.

Byars, one of several attorneys who assailed the proposal, contended it would not be in the public interest and would result in losses to the railroad system.

Among others those argued against the lease proposal were C. C. Broughton, representing the Childress Chamber of Commerce, and C. C. Rotsch, assistant state attorney general who spoke for the Texas Railroad commission.

Broughton said that "when the Fort Worth & Denver leaves Childress there will be no Childress." Rotsch contended that the lines could be more economically operated from a centrally located point, such as its present offices at Fort Worth, than from one end of the system.

Byars said that the transaction would take from Fort Worth a payroll of \$275,000 and from Childress \$131,000 a year.

Buying Plan Worked Out By U. S. Army

WASHINGTON, Feb. 6. (AP)—Army buyers, with a staggering shopping list for millions of pants, shirts, shoes, socks and blankets, claimed today to have developed a long-range purchase schedule that will save important sums for the civilian public as well as the government.

Businessmen, who have directed buying for private mail-order and mercantile firms worked out the

system when the war department faced the problem outfitting the 1,400,000 men who are expected to be in the army before this year ends.

It was important to time the huge army purchases so they would not increase the cost of similar staples for civilians.

War department and national defense spokesmen presented their plan to congress and the house promptly approved a \$175,000,000 fund to carry it out. The senate may act on the legislation today.

Army buyers explained that when government purchases boost the cost of an item from \$4 to \$5, civilians may have to pay as much as \$1.87 more, because army buying eliminates profits of the jobber and retailer.

Russian Sentenced To Die In Poland

MOSCOW, Feb. 6. (AP)—More than 20 years after the Russian civil war, Col. Anany Volynets has been sentenced to death before a firing squad on charges of leading a White Russian band which killed 340 persons, it was disclosed today.

Volynets, who fled into Poland after the war, was captured at Rovno when the Soviets incorporated the western Ukraine in September, 1939, and was tried at Kiev.

Colorado to operate in interstate commerce in Texas in violation of Texas law.

Granting of the application, Byars contended, would result in loss of both good will and money by the Texas lines, increase their county tax assessments, and cut down their freight revenue.

"The Colorado and Southern has not made a dime in 20 years" Byars told the commission, "but it intends to spread its wings" and take over the Texas lines.

Broughton opposed discontinuance of the locomotive and heavy passenger car repair shops at Childress which he said would result in the loss of more than 100 jobs.

He declared proponents of the plan had failed to estimate correctly the cost at Denver joint shops of locomotive repair work proposed to be transferred there from Childress, and had made no mention of cost of heavy repair work on passenger cars.

He admitted Childress was interested in the employment situation rather than that of transportation, but said much of the business given the Texas lines now by Childress would be given to truck lines if the application were granted.

"We support the railroad because the railroad supports us," he said. Rotsch argued that 50 per cent of the revenue of the three lines was produced by the Texas lines, and only 20 per cent by the Colorado and Southern itself. He said that a close relationship between the Texas lines and Texas shippers had made it possible for the Texas lines to "carry" the Colorado & Southern.

Arguments opened with a restatement of the Colorado & Southern's aims by Walter McFarland, its attorney.

He said the purpose of the plan was operating economy and that a minimum saving of \$300,000 would be effected at the end of five years.

The question of labor conditions was the most difficult thing in the case, he declared, adding that he believed the Colorado & Southern had shown that employees affected by the transfer of shops to Denver would be "no worse off." It would be necessary, he asserted, to work out matters of seniority rights at Denver with labor organizations.

The hearings ended with a brief rebuttal statement by McFarland. There was no indication how soon the commission might reach a decision.

J. C. Willis' conviction of unlawful assembly in connection with another phase of the same disturbances which occurred March 1, 1940, was reversed and remanded because the judge refused a severance. Nineteen men were indicted on the unlawful assembly charge, all in the same indictment.
