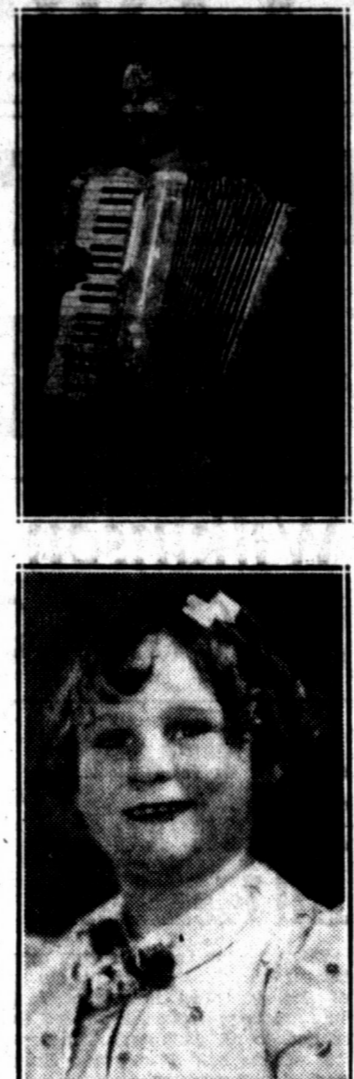

"I just can't find time to read," an attractive, intelligent matron apologizes every time a book is mentioned.

She has said it so often she believes it, and so excuses herself for stopping the process of education when she finished college and settled down to being a wife and mother.

Yet, look at the things she does find time for:

She finds time to knit garment after garment for the members of her family. Whenever she has half an hour of free time she picks up her knitting needles and her ball of yarn.

She finds time to play bridge three or four times a week—almost always with the same seven women.

She finds time to entertain ably. No simple little buffet meals for her. She works for two days getting ready for company dinner.

She also finds time to drive her children everywhere they go. They wouldn't dream of walking a quarter of a mile on the nicest day.

If she really wanted to read, to know what is going on in the world—in the way of thought as well as action—she could cut down on some of those activities and have some time for reading.

Children don't have to wear hand-knit sweaters. One bridge game a week ought to satisfy any woman. Entertaining doesn't always have to be on the grand scale. A hostess who can talk intelligently is a rarer creature by far than one who serves elaborate dinners. Children don't have to have a chauffeur at their beck and call.

TIME FOR WHAT WE WANT TO DO

It's usually downright dishonest to say, "I can't find time for . . ." We somehow manage to find time for the things we consider important. The woman who claims she hasn't time to read is really saying, "I don't think that reading is very important." But if she actually said that, she would have to face the fact that she has let her mind grow rusty.

For Beauty, Young Girls Need Cleanliness, Good Grooming

Beauty in the very young depends on absolute cleanliness, a fresh, carefully groomed look.

It's a mistake for any high school girl to assume that, simply because she is young and glowing with health and vitality, she can get by with clothing that aren't quite fresh, hair which isn't washed at least once a week, a dingy neck or untidy finger-nails.

CHIPPED POLISH IS SIN AGAINST GROOMING

It's a bad idea for the 16-year-old, or any girl for that matter, to wear her long bob so long that it looks bushy and neglected. A long bob can be charming, regardless of how widely upsweped coiffures are touted. But it isn't charming if it gives all over the shoulders. And, even when it's just short enough, it isn't charming unless it gleams and shines as a result of frequent brushing and weekly washing.

The high school girl who really cares about her appearance takes a bath every day, of course. She uses a deodorant each morning, and washes at least three times a week. She cleans underneath her fingernails with an orange stick. If she cannot manage to keep nail polish unchipped and uncracked, she gives it up altogether and buffs her nails instead. Chipped polish is one of the worst sins against good grooming.

Her sweaters and skirts are spotless. She can and will wash out a sweater in record time. She polishes her saddle oxfords often enough to keep them neat and shining. She doesn't let soiled handkerchiefs, bills or newspapers, stray notes, and such accumulate in the pockets of her coat.

In addition, she remembers not to apply layers of fresh makeup over stale. She washes her face thoroughly at night and puts on a new coat of cosmetics. She does the same immediately after school closes for the day. You don't catch her looking faintly grayish across the forehead and chin instead of pink and white and blooming.

An overflow crowd is expected to see the bouts. Chairs will be placed on the gymnasium floor on the east and west sides of the ring.

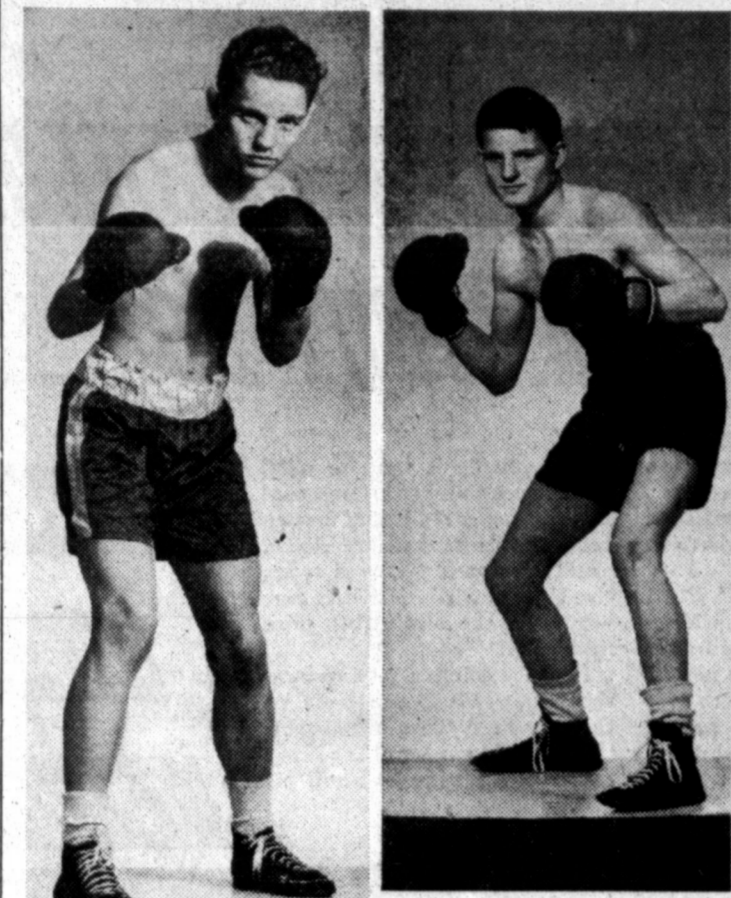

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Never Floored, Simon Likes His Chances Against Louis

DETROIT, Mich., March 19 (AP)—Ponderous Abe Simon, never knocked off his feet in 50 tough battles, presented a one-man ballyhoo in his own behalf today over his chances of accomplishing the seemingly impossible—defeating Joe Louis.

Simon says nobody believes him, but he is convinced, deep in his heart, that he has an excellent chance against the Brown Bomber, whom he meets in Detroit's Olympia arena Friday night in a bout scheduled for 20 rounds, or less. The New York challenger bases his conviction on the fact that he has never been hurt by a blow, that he is never floored, and that Louis, with all his devastating power, cannot hurt him.

Simon, stretching 6 feet, 4 inches, and weighing 255 pounds, has the physique to stand up under a terrific bombardment. He has powerful shoulders and arms, and a bulging chest, and not an ounce of fat on his huge frame. He has the biggest pair of hands in boxing, each measuring 14 1/2 inches.

"I realize I'm perhaps alone in my own convictions," Simon said today, "but I'm sure Louis can't hurt me."

Both boxers wind up their training today. Louis, supremely confident of victory planned to breeze through four rounds of boxing, with Simon also shortening his work with the gloves to four rounds.

Promoter Mike Jacobs arrived from New York to superintend the final details of the battle. With tickets selling from \$1 to \$5, Jacobs figures on a \$50,000 gate.

France Seeks Way To Get American Grain
WASHINGTON, March 18. (AP)—An arrangement for shipment of American grain to unoccupied France under terms acceptable to Great Britain was reported near at hand today.

Informal sources said the agreement probably would follow these lines: sufficient French funds, now "frozen" in this country, would be released to purchase the grain; it would be stowed on two French ships now in New York harbor, and the supplies would be distributed in unoccupied France under supervision of the American Red Cross.

Y., and not one of them produced for the entire eighteen holes the kind of golf expected from the masters of this ancient, troublesome game.

Cooper's case probably was the most surprising since Light-Horse Harry usually turns in his best scores when he is in a near-perfectionist, mechanical groove.

Recently "Coopie" has been having trouble, though, and the trouble led to his borrowing a driver from Horton Smith for a practice round two days ago. Cooper did quite well with that driver.

But yesterday morning, Harry saw another driver in Smith's locker. So he took that one, without saying a word to Smith, and proceeded to half-lead the field.

DENVER, March 19 (AP)—A scrappy Minneapolis Ascension club team uncorked the biggest surprise of the 34th annual A. U. basketball tournament by spilling the St. Louis Rangers, a red hot pre-meet favorite, 40 to 36 last night.

Hank Luisetti's San Francisco Olympic club team and the national champion Phillips 66 Oilers preceded the Minnesotans into tomorrow's third round schedule.

Hank sank 17 points to the delight of 5,000 fans and paced the San Francisco club team he captains to an easy 53-28 triumph over St. Louis Nebeca last night.

The Winged "O" team and 15 others moved into today's third round play for the surviving 16 teams, beginning at 1 p. m.

Phillips will open the night show at 7 p. m. against Kansas City College of Commerce.

Southern Methodist of the Southwest conference, competing as the Dallas Wilsons, will tangle with Denver Legion, runner-up at the 1940 A. U. tourney.

Creighton Swamps Iowa State 57-48

KANSAS CITY, March 19 (AP)—The Missouri Valley conference, made up of schools the Big Six members parted company with in 1928, carried the Midwest's banner in the eight-team hunt for a new NCAA basketball champion.

Creighton, king of the valley remnants, won that privilege by spilling Iowa State, one of the half dozen schools that seceded a decade and a half ago.

The Cyclones, best the Big Six could offer, lost a 57 to 48 verdict last night to the Omaha Bluejays who switched from their usual fast break to neat passing and the scoring of Ed Beiser, powerful center, for the triumph.

By its victory, Creighton became the opponent of Washington State in one of Friday night's two games here in the opening round of the Western finals. Coach Jack Priel of the Pacific Coast champions, left the Cougar train in Montana and flew here in time to see the game.

Arkansas, Southwest conference king, and Wyoming, topnotch five of the Rocky mountain area, are the other western finalists.

Australia Considering War, Claims Japanese

NEW YORK, March 19 (AP)—Do-me (Japanese news agency) in a radio broadcast today quoted Japanese arriving from Sydney, Australia, as saying that "Australia is considering seriously the possibility of war with Japan."

Thirty-four members of the staff of the Takashimaya company at Sydney arrived at Kobe. The same steamer also brought 14 Japanese women and children who have been residing in Australia.

British Capture New Positions In Eritrea

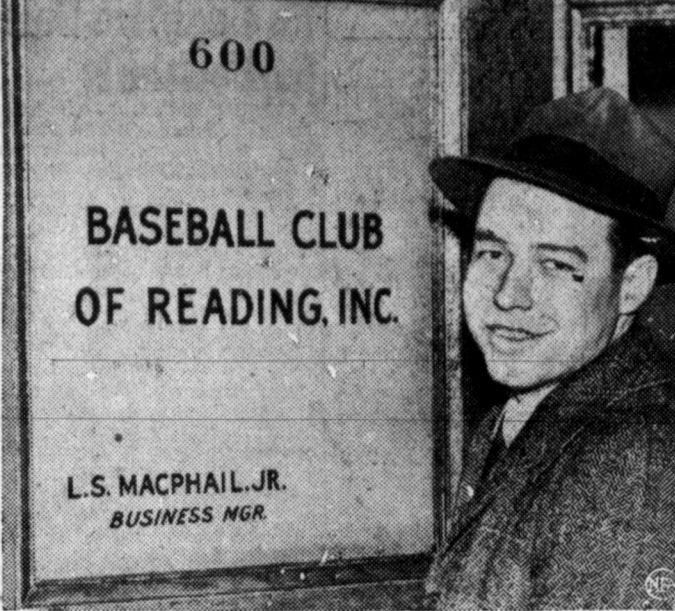
CAIRO, Egypt, March 19 (AP)—British forces have captured additional "important positions" south of besieged Cheren in Eritrea and repulsed Italian counter-attacks with "serious losses" to the Fascists, the middle east command announced today.

"The situation continues to develop favorably," the CHQ war bulletin added.

The action was part of a campaign aimed at smashing the Italians before the rainy season starts, military circles indicated.

An army described as the greatest ever assembled in this area has been gathered by Britain for the effort—touched off by the launching of a new offensive two days ago in the Cheren sector of Eritrea, where 35,000 Italian troops entrenched on strategic heights have been blocking the path to the colonial capital of Asmara and the Red Sea coast.

Commission Sees Charts Of Underpass

Blueprints were spread on the table at the city commission room Tuesday afternoon, as City Engineer Dick Peppin explained the Cuyler street underpass to the commission at its regular meeting.

Bids for the construction of the underpass are to be received by the Texas Highway department in Austin Tuesday, contract let, and work due to start around May 1. The job will last from eight months to a year.

There was no action necessary by the city commission yesterday on the project, the commission merely being shown the detailed plans of the job.

Also on the table, in addition to the blueprints, was the one-inch thick brown-bound book titled "Texas Project Specifications, Prepared by Bridge Division, Austin."

The underpass will have two spans L-beams, 31 1/2 feet between centers of bearing plates. Three tracks are to be carried by the structure. The roadway will be divided into two 24-foot lanes. Vertical clearance will be 14 feet. Grade raise will extend 3,300 feet with a maximum raise at the center of Cuyler street of 4.73 feet.

Width of the underpass will be 60 feet.

Changes will be necessary in the levels of adjacent streets. On Tying, the south curb line, center is to be lowered 4 inches, center 1 foot, 2 inches, north curb line 2 feet. Atchison, west curb line, center, 1 inch; south curb line, 1 foot; center of intersection, 9 inches.

Brick paving will have to be removed, a sprinkler system installed on the underpass slopes, and a 2,400-foot storm sewer line built for the subway.

fell on a hospital, and a theater and dance hall were hit.

Imminent invasion of the seige-battered island kingdom was forecast in far-off Tokyo by Major General Kiyofuku Okamoto, Japanese embassy attaché just returned from Berlin. He declared that a German cross-channel landing was "now only a matter of hours."

On the African war front, the British announced the capture of Ujiga, an important eastern Ethiopian town, which controls the road drive across 150 miles of the arid Ogaden plateau preceded the assault.

Two other British columns, plunging deeper into Emperor Haile Selassie's Italian-conquered African kingdom from the south, were reported advancing upon Negelli, whence a passable road leads to the Ethiopian capital of Addis Ababa.

Cairo dispatches said the British campaign in East Africa was now entering its final phase, after weeks of preparation, with drive on all fronts aimed at crushing the Italians before the rainy season starts in about two weeks.

U. S. Increasing Naval Experts In Pacific Countries

BATAVIA, Netherlands East Indies, March 19 (AP)—The United States today was reported increasing its staff of naval experts in the Far East and south Pacific.

Two officials were being stationed in Singapore, in Darwin, in Sydney, in Auckland and other points, in addition to those regularly attached to the U. S. legations in Canberra and Bangkok, it was said.

They were described as "observers" and not members of the American diplomatic or consular services.

At the same time, great interest here in the training cruise of American warships which currently puts a total of four cruisers and nine destroyers of the U. S. navy in Australian and New Zealand waters.

Observers here say that they believed the United States fleet will undertake "the heavy work" if Japan moves the main body of her capital ships against Singapore, or the East Indies, and the United States enters the conflict.

Bill Intended To 'Outlaw Communism' In Texas House

AUSTIN, March 19 (AP)—A bill intended to "outlaw Communism" and making it a felony to advocate overthrowing the government by violence lay in a house of representatives subcommittee today.

The subgroup of the criminal jurisprudence committee was instructed to study the proposal with a view to determining its constitutionality.

Also sent to a subcommittee was a bill by Rep. B. Simpson, Jr., of Fort Worth which would make a felony of theft of accessories or parts from an automobile.

A proposed new penal statute which would make it lawful to kill a public enemy in the act of instigating any un-American activity was set for a public hearing next Tuesday.

Care Advised In Filling Out Questionnaire

Gray county registrants are sending in questionnaires in better form now than in the past to the Gray County Selective Service board, but registrants of this and other Texas counties are reminded by General J. Watt Page, state director, that they should keep in touch with their local board.

"The importance of the registrant keeping in touch with his local board and immediately notifying it when he changes his address and moves from one place to another cannot be exaggerated," General Page declared.

"The reason for this is obvious. The registrant who fails in this violates the law, places himself in needless jeopardy, does himself an injustice and causes the local board all kinds of needless trouble."

The state director also emphasized the fact that registrants can save themselves—and their board—much grief by exercising great care in filling out the questionnaire for his classification.

"Every local board has an advisory board," he said, "and the registrant who is in doubt as to how to answer any given question should consult this board and follow its instructions. That's what the advisory board is for, and to advise him on any other puzzling matter, also."

"The registrant who believes he has been placed in the wrong classification and wants to make an appeal has at his service the government appeal agent attached to his local board. This government appeal agent is charged with the duty of protecting the interests of the registrant, as well as those of the government, and to assist and advise him as to the procedure in making an appeal."

Legless Soldiers Tell How British Leveled Valona

BELGRADE, Yugoslavia, March 19 (AP)—Eleven Greek soldiers, headed home from the war in an exchange of prisoners, declared today British bombings they witnessed at the Albanian port of Valona had reduced the town to wreckage, the port to a shambles.

The Greeks, most of them mere boys and all legless, passed through Belgrade in an Italian Red Cross train of 18 cars carrying prisoners home for exchange. They were in a hospital at Valona awaiting transportation when British planes concentrated on the port in a recent raid.

"It was the most terrific bombing conceivable," one young Greek said. "The whole city seemed to tremble. How they avoided hitting our hospital I cannot imagine. Every other big building seemed to be wrecked."

Valona is the southernmost Albanian port still in Italian hands. It lies 28 miles from Tepelen, pivotal point in last week's fighting. Ten of the 11 lost legs as a result of frost bite. The other lost his legs when machine-gunned.

King George II of Greece thanked his army last night for what he termed a smashing blow dealt a week-long Italian offensive the Greeks said Premier Mussolini directed personally.

The whole civilized world follows with astonishment the Greek feats of arms," the King said in a message to his troops.

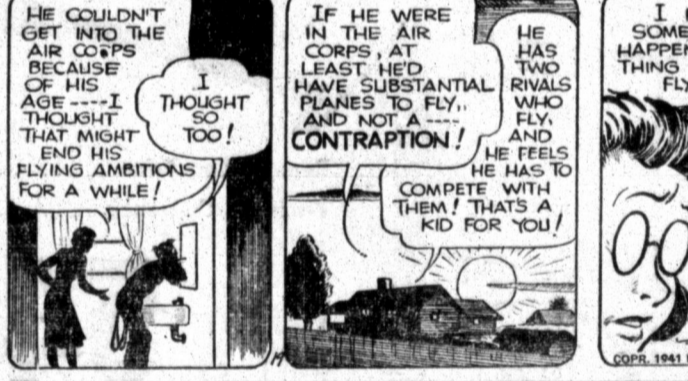

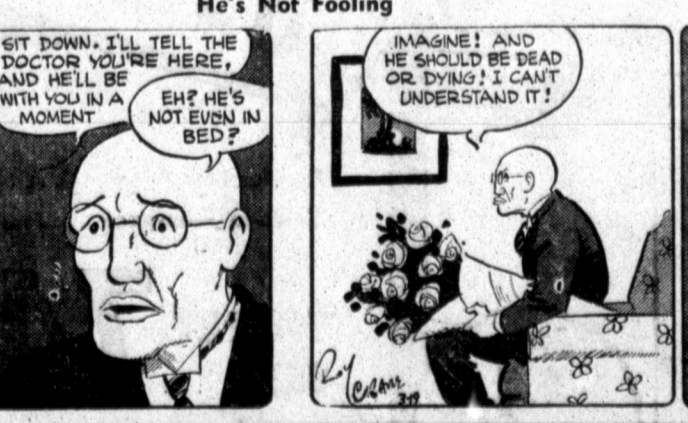

Navy Leads Color Parade; Patriotic Trims And White Accents Are Smart

Navy blue leads the parade of colors and lends itself so naturally to the fascinating patriotic trims, such as embroidered emblems on sleeves or pockets, brass buttons marching down the front. White is also a favorite trim on navy . . . is very popular in school girl collars of crisp pique or ruffled thinner cottons such as eyelet embroidered batiste. And then when these collars are removed, you have a dramatically plain neckline without a collar, beneath which you may wear a bright ascot scarf. Silhouette Is Slim

New Details

First shake out the dust thoroughly, soak curtains in cold water for about one hour, then wash in thick, mild soap suds and luke warm water. Do not agitate the machine too long; depend on the suds to loosen the soil. Rinse in clear tepid water until the rinse runs clear. Without twisting, press out the excess water by hand or wrap curtains in heavy absorbent towels. If desired, a little starch may be added to the last rinse water. Dry on a stretcher.

Let's talk about men's clothes—seriously.

Most comments on the recent tailors' show in New York and the larger one in St. Louis, have been anything but serious. Writers and radio commentators have had a great time kidding.

"One of the prettiest little numbers in the show, boys—a sapphire blue velvet evening tail coat, with a long tapering skirt, and twilight blue dress trousers. And how do you like this, boys—a royal blue evening cape, lined with ten yards of brilliant red satin?"

If the "boys" would stop snapping their suspenders long enough to listen to the tailors, they would be a handsomer lot. And don't let them try to tell you they don't care how they look. Most of them do.

Brighter Colors

This year, as usual, the tailors sponsor brighter colors for men. And men, much as they may laugh at a "honey yellow raglan-sleeved sports jacket with terra cotta slacks," should be thankful.

How about that loud plaid sports jacket Mr. X bought last fall? Would he have bought it five years ago? Would he have dared to wear it if the tailors hadn't been plugging plaids for years?

Let him listen respectfully then, to the style forecast for spring, as compiled by the Merchant Tailors and Designers association of America.

"For spring," say the tailors, "there should be the rejuvenating influence of color to contrast with darker winter shades."

For "informal day wear," which is what most men are looking for, they urge brighter wools. Not wild, but quite reasonable looking are the new Algerian stripes in blues, greens, grays, tans, browns. More on the giddy side are "multiple polychromatic stripes." The new Glen Uguarts and Grecian key patterned worsteds are toned down sufficiently for the milk-toasty soul.

In cut, the tailors emphasize straighter lines, possibly to agree with the slenderer feminine silhouette. New business suits have slightly longer coats, with vests cut slightly higher. Trousers are somewhat tighter than those of last fall.

Day-in and day-out hats include snap brims and off-the-facers (a man can be just as "pure-browed" as his wife, can't he?).

Comfort For Summer

The summer forecasts should be a comfort. It stresses ventilated fabrics. "Porosity" appears in loosely woven straw hats, belts, braces, ties, shoes, shirts, and suits.

The "average man" is encouraged to let himself go on sports clothes. Tony Williams, a leading tailor, says: "Sports clothes should provide relaxation from sober business dress. A man needn't feel that bright colors are sissy. Some of our hardest men are the most colorful—our cowboys, our lumberjacks."

Suggested sports outfits are white coats with Capri blue or terra cotta slacks; knee-length shorts; felt sports hats in two tones of the new diamond brown; straw hats with bright-striped bands.

The tailors sponsor jeweled accessories for well-dressed men: a modern ring with square-cut deep brown diamond, set in gold, wagon wheel cuff links in yellow gold with champagne diamond hubs.

Wider Brims Seen In All Types Of Men's Spring Hats

There is plenty of news to be found in the shapes of men's new spring hats. The wider brim has very definitely found a place for itself in all types of hats. Sports and leisure types will of course run a bit wider than the more conservative town hats, but the trend is generally toward the wider brim. 2 1/4 and 2 5/8 inches are still the best widths for regular town hats, while the country types will look well with brims of 2 3/4, 2 7/8 and 3 inches. The spring hats have been built with great attention to details demanded by these new wider brims, and the new blocks and shapes are in correct proportions.

Equally interesting is the new pre-shaped block which is now assured of nation-wide acceptance. Great strides have been made in this type of hat since its inception several years ago, and the current product is a masterpiece of the felt hat industry. Men can now purchase a beautifully blocked felt hat which will retain its shape without the constant attention so necessary in the hand-blocked types. These pre-shaped hats come in a range of shapes, from the round telescope for the younger fellow to the conservative spread crease, and even the regular center crease. These already blocked hats are to be found in a variety of colors, shapes and trims, and the correct hat, factory-blocked, can be found for almost any daytime occasion.

Many of the new hats are being shown, too, with the crown tapering in slightly from the top of the hatband. Also good is the crease rounded at back and pinched in at the front of the crown. Snapbrims are ever popular for casual wear and the Homburg retains its high rating for more formal town and business wear.

Brim edges have also taken on a touch of something different for spring. While the plain welt edge continues in vogue and the raw and plain bound edges still have their place, the new edges add considerable spice to hats in general.

GUARD AGAINST RAIN

Quite new is the rubberized lawn coat, coated with rubber inside, but extremely lightweight, and available with matching hat. Black rubber coats, also with hoods, and classic oiled cotton coats with big book-size patch pockets are both practical and inexpensive.

BLANKET PROTECTORS

To keep fine blankets and comforters from soiling along the edge, baste a straight piece of fine white linen along entire side. This should lap over five or six inches on each side. To make more attractive, edge the linen on the outer side with lace or embroidery. When soiled, these covers are easily removable for laundering.

FRUIT CREAM PIES

Adding fresh or canned fruit to cream pies will give your desserts nice variety. Slice the fruit into the baked pie shell. Cool the cream filling before pouring over the fruit. Sliced bananas, oranges, peaches, apricots, pineapple all are good for this purpose. Top with whipped cream or a fluffy meringue.

PAJAMAS AID SLEEP

The time has not come when a man can try on pajamas before taking them home to try to sleep in. And the man who believes himself an insomnia sufferer because of twisting waistbands, strangling crutches and collapsing collars, will be glad to know that this spring he'll sleep sweetly because pajamas have been made with every possible comfort and sleep-inducing feature.

POMPADOUR HAT

To accommodate your smooth, becoming pompadour, you will want a hat that sets well back on the head. A smart Fifth Avenue shop shows a neat crown of shining black milan straw with satring pompons directly in the front that gives the important "high" effect. A generous veil adds sophistication and helps to keep the coiffure neat. This model is shown also in red, navy, or green.

When a milliner so famous for trend-setting as Lilly Dache admits that she found inspiration for several of the hats in her spring collection in new hair styles, every woman ought to be convinced once and for all that her coiffure is as important as her hat, and vice versa.

The expert, Charles of the Ritz, in whose hair designs Madame Dache found inspiration, believes that we definitely have seen the end of the era when a woman left her hat off to keep from musing her hair.

DON'T MAKE COIFFURE A "SET PIECE"

He points out that hair is woman's most pleasurable feature and that, therefore, it's a mistake to think of it in

terms of a "set piece" to which her hats must conform.

The forward swoop of many of the Dache hats starts behind the high pompadour, rising from the back of the head. Heart-shaped hats are smart with heart pompadours. Oriental loops of hair are interesting with adaptations of Chinese hats.

One coiffure, appropriately called "Waikiki wave," has wings of hair over the ears, breaking into a foam of ringlets from the forehead in a downward curve behind the ear. The pompadour is a two-way business which may be combed upward from the forehead, or over into a reverse pompadour.

With the oriental motif creeping more prominently into the fashion and beauty picture, pompadours of violets, hyacinths, carnations, and other fresh blossoms often are shown at either side of the head for evening. A short rope of apple blossoms is chic just behind a medium-high pompadour.

HAIR MUST GLEAM WITH HEALTH

Nothing is chic, however, in hair that isn't gleaming with health and cleanliness. Only beautifully groomed hair lends itself satisfactorily to any smart coiffure, simple or elaborate. This means brushing at least three times a week. It means a shampoo at least once a week. And, particularly if your hair is just brown with no great amount of natural highlights, it may also mean that every shampoo ought to be followed by a rinse.

Once she is completely dressed, the smart woman stands before a full-length mirror and decides what should be eliminated rather than what other pins, earrings or gadgets to put on. She knows that the right amount of jewelry can be most effective, that too much creates an illusion of fussiness.

With a flower hat she would rather pin a single fresh flower on her lapel than a large corsage. Flowers, like jewelry, are best when worn with restraint. THE PAMPA NEWS

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For Cleaner Elections: The experiment of the Hatch Act—and even its sponsors would first to admit that it was an experiment, not a final and complete solution of the election problem—has been distinctly worth while.

The first reaction is likely to be that the act was a failure. After all one of its chief provisions was aimed at limiting to \$3,000,000 the amount that any party could spend on a national election.

The committee recommended tightening up the act and all federal election laws, and this will probably be done. The old difficulty crops up that attends the making of all law: how can the law be written so as to achieve exactly the results desired and no others? That is not so easy.

But the general lines are clear. The remedy for most abuses lies in publicizing them. The people are sound. When they know the truth about a situation, they can be trusted to act honestly, and in the long run, wisely.

What is the danger in campaign contributions and campaign propaganda? It lies not so much in the amounts spent, as in lack of knowledge of just who is putting it up. The scurrilousness of many campaign tracts and dodgers is redoubled by lack of exact information on who is responsible.

Behind The News

The Pampa News' Washington Correspondent: WASHINGTON, March 12—A row over whether the United States should support a second trans-oceanic airline to Europe has been fought for a couple of fast rounds lately, and it should be of interest to show how some things get done in your nation's capital.

This airline battle began when the House of Representatives Appropriations Committee turned down a request for a mere million and a quarter dollars to set up a rump, one plane, twice-a-month American Export Airlines service to Europe in competition with the existing Pan American Airlines which pioneered the route, now runs a three-times-a-week scheduled service, and is ready to go to daily service when it gets three planes this summer.

EXPORT LINES GET 90% OF SHIPPING: Confronted by these facts, the House Appropriations Committee turned down the American Export Airlines request with the comment: "The committee cannot divide the present mail pay on this route . . . and make a successful operation for either company."

Some time ago the company became ambitious to start airline operations to Europe. The Maritime Commission, however, ruled steamship line profits could not be used for airline expansion and furthermore asked the company to deposit its surplus with the government, to be drawn on only for future emergencies, such as ship losses.

Pan American, for its part, sank some \$6,000,000 of private capital into its trans-oceanic operations before its first commercial flight to Europe. This represented equipment, training of personnel, securing rights and building bases.

Common Ground

By R. C. HOYLES: This column contends there can be no satisfactory program until we measure the status of each man by the common yardstick of the God-given social right to create and enjoy anything anyone else has a right to create and enjoy.

CAN DO NO WRONG: A ridiculous and embarrassing position seems not to bother the defender of paternalistic government, as instigated by the New Deal.

These men who like to be known to their fellow-men as interested in freedom and the oppressed, love to make the statement that someone is underpaid and someone gets too much.

But when these individuals are asked to set forth an eternal, impersonal, numerical rule or principle by which they determine what each person should receive, they will not answer but simply parrot-like repeat their original statements.

In reality this man is saying, while he probably does not know it, that he is setting himself up as the standard of goodness. He is the norm by which all things are compared.

Of course this is a ridiculous, absurd and embarrassing position for any human being to take. It is a position taken by men in a mad-house, or by Caesars, or by Hitlers, or by Mussolinis or men drunk with power.

But that is exactly the position that supporters of the New Deal are actually in. If they shift their contention of right and wrong to the majority, then they are saying that the majority is like Caesar's wife—it can do no wrong.

Yes, the man is in an absurd, ridiculous and irrational position, when he says the government or the majority should determine what any man should get, because he is, in reality saying that the majority is like Caesar's wife—it can do no wrong.

INCOME TAX AND DIVIDENDS: I notice in the report of the Thompson Products Company, a Cleveland corporation, manufacturers of valves for airplane engines, that their tax per common shareholder amounted to 92c a share in 1929, \$1.41 in '38, \$2.65 per share in 1939, and \$6.36 per share in 1940.

They paid \$1.75 a share dividend in 1940. Their taxes were nearly four times as much as the man who put up the money received for his sacrifice.

The Celanese Corporation of America, reports in round numbers \$4,000,000 in taxes for 1940 and \$1,600,000 in 1939. This is a tax of about \$4 a share for the common stockholders.

What the ordinary worker and consumer do not understand is that this wealth that is taken by the government cannot be spent by the owners of the stock in research, expansion and furnishing better tools. The stockholders who are well-to-do, will live just as well but they will have this much less left to reinvest for improvements.

There is no possible way of taxes, in the long run, being paid by the wealthy. They are always paid by the great mass of consumers, in lower wages and higher costs, due to lack of better methods.

And it must be remembered that these taxes do not begin to pay the government expenses. The large part of our war expenses have been borrowed and will have to be paid in taxes later, eating up more of private enterprise, which seems to cause no concern on the part of the New Dealers.

has loaded on. Pan Am. does receive subsidy in the form of payment for carrying the mail, and it has offered to provide the three extra flights to Europe, giving daily service, at an additional cost of \$1,229,000 a year, or only \$300,000 more than American Export Airlines has requested for one trip every two weeks.

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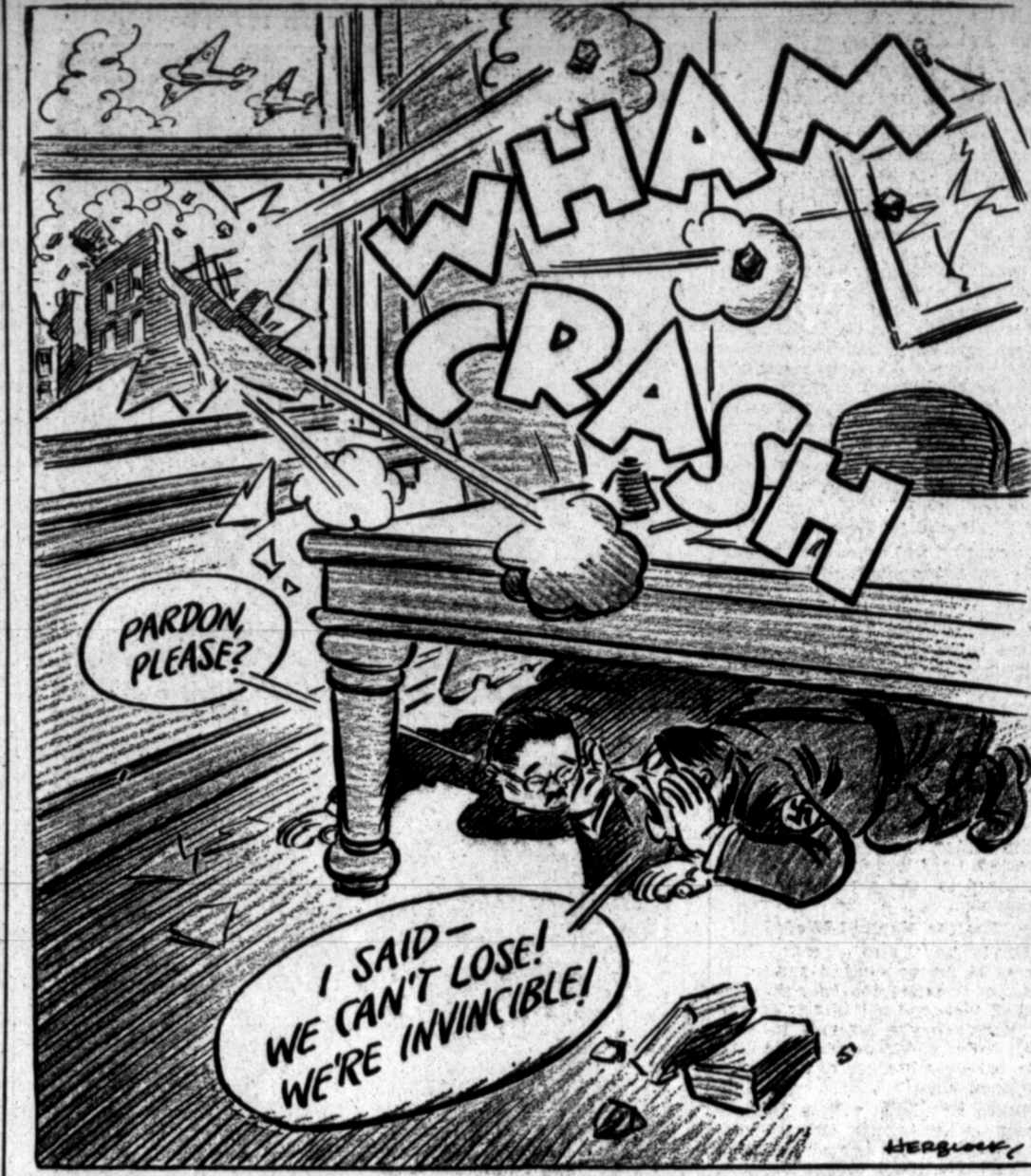
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John A. Slater, vice president of Export Airlines, asked the Senate subcommittee to restore the appropriation in the interests of free competition.

Juan Trippe, president of Pan American, admitting his company had a monopoly of air travel, contended American Export Lines had a monopoly on shipping, and this was confirmed by Admiral Land, chairman of the Maritime Commission.

American Export Lines now carries 90 per cent of all U. S. traffic to Europe and makes money. Pan American gets 10 per cent and is losing money. If that 10 per cent were split between two air lines, subsidies to both would have to be increased for them to break even.

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The War Today

By DEWITT MACKENZIE: The surprise isn't in British Premier Churchill's announcement that German U-boats and battle cruisers have been operating on what he refers to as "the American side of the Atlantic" but in the fact that they haven't been found in these waters before.

Germany, Italy and Japan—the triple alliance—have made it emphatically clear that they consider the United States already in the war because of our all-out aid to Britain. A natural corollary is their presence on our side of the fence.

Of course, their saying so won't put us into the war unless they back their charge with action. When they start sinking ships 1,500 miles off our coast, however, it certainly creates what might be described euphemistically as a delicate situation.

Herr Hitler has declared that every ship—bar none—carrying supplies for Britain will be sunk. He has decreed that no American supplies must reach England.

Emphasis would seem to have been given this declaration by British admiralty figures issued yesterday for Anglo-Allied merchant shipping losses. For the week ending March 9 they were given as 98,232 tons, and for the previous week 141,314. These figures were contrasted with weekly losses averaging 75,000 tons in February and \$3,000 in January.

That's something for the Allies to worry about. If England doesn't get supplies she will be hungry in a few months and her vital industries will have to close. In other words she will be beaten.

Britain feels that the way to defeat the German submarine campaign is to supplement her navy quickly with more American warships. Assuming our non-belligerency, that could be done in either of two ways:

1. By lending more American naval ships to the British to man and operate under the union jack. 2. By sending our ships out under their own stars and stripes to act as patrols to convoy merchantmen.

There seems to be no alternative. Actually, too, while Britain could man a considerable number of more ships, she probably couldn't man a sufficient number soon enough to meet the emergency. That rather puts it up to our Uncle Sam to consider how far we want to go.

Now any warships which are convoying or patrolling the Atlantic lane are subject to be damaged or sunk. This means that if American warships should be used under their own flag, and one of them got torpedoed, we should have enough in the war, officially or otherwise.

Well, forewarned is forearmed. I might add that this is intended as my farewell appearance in this column in the role of a spirit-doctor whose medium tells him that the Yankees are right out in the no-man's land of this conflict.

Once as correspondent in France during the World War I was in a British general headquarters car which was driven right into the middle of no-man's land by mistake. We retreated in some haste, in the belief that machine-guns are no respecters of sitting birds or non-belligerents. I dare say the same would be true of the operators of a torpedo-tube aboard a Nazi submarine.

We may expect the U-boat drive to intensify rapidly and to work nearer our coast, just as the German bombers are striking with renewed fury at British ports like Liverpool, Bristol, Cardiff and Glasgow in order to destroy docking facilities for those merchantmen which escape the U-boats. Sinkings in our waters aren't new, however. The Kaiser's submarines worked our preserves a quarter century ago.

Leading Designers Stress Importance Of Wool For Men

Wool for men's clothing in 1941 is expected to reach the most dominant position it has held for several years, according to leading clothes designers and fashion commentators, chiefly because of the stress now being placed upon the durability and health advantages of wool in army uniforms.

During 1940 it was a military year for most nations of the world, with the single exception of the United States. Patriotic Motif Seen In Men's New Accessories

Viewed from the beginning, the 1941 fashion picture shows every indication of being one of the most eventful in many years.

With the U. S. defense program looming larger and larger on the national scene, some fashion commentators are uncertain as to the eventual effect the military atmosphere will have upon clothes, particularly on men's wearing apparel. The general consensus, however, is that for the time being men's clothes will continue to bear no marked resemblance to military styles.

The only noticeable military effect on clothes, at this time, is the beginning of a trend toward light tan and various shades of brown, together with the growing popularity of homespun and tweeds and topcoats with military collars.

Patriotic Motif

Perhaps the newest note in men's clothes this year is the emergence of blues and gray-blues in suits worn with accessories which strike the patriotic motif with neck-ties, handkerchiefs, socks and even garters appearing in red, white and blue. Shirts are striking the same note with red, white and blue stripes.

This seems to be about as far as the military trend has gone.

On the other hand, civilian dress has definitely influenced military styles, believe it or not! In contrast to the 1917-18 picture, when men's clothes effected tight-fitting coats, half or whole-belted, it is the soldier's tunic today which has changed in deference to the present custom of comfort first, with bi-swing pleats in the soldier's coat allowing greater freedom than ever before.

Brown and Blue "Musts"

The definite "news" this year is the shift to brown and blue in spring suits. Heralded as "musts" are the new shades called peat brown and rust brown. These colors will be seen in not only worsteds for business wear, but also in tweeds for sports and semi-sportswear.

The trend of last year to single-breasted suits in preference to double-breasted has apparently halted, with the double-breasted jacket not only holding its own but coming in to greater favor. Lapels on the double-breasted coats are rolled to the bottom buttons. Likewise chalk stripes are continuing in favor for business wear, while the colorful tweeds of 1940 are even more colorful this year featured by pronounced over-squares.

It is the tweeds and the worsteds this year offering a wider color range than in the past—which retain leadership in the drive toward more gaiety and imagination in accessories.

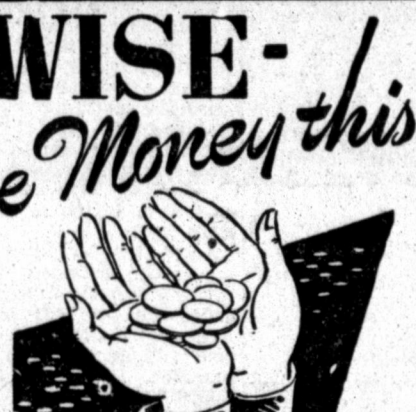
