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GARDENING FOR HAPPINESS

Be Sure To Plant Roses If You Like Adventure.

By HENRY PREE The Pampa News Landscape Consultant Fifth of a Series

Every garden should have some roses, be they bush, garden or climbing. Rose growing is an amazing adventure, full of surprises, most of them pleasant, and all of them in-structive. Each year finds better roses offered by the growers, after two-year trials have been studied in 14 test gardens throughout the

These gardens are under the watchful care of experts who note how the roses stand summer heat and winter cold, and resist insect pests and fungus diseases. Prize-winning roses are offered only in number 1 grade dormant plants. Thus you are guaranteed healthy, well-grown, vigorous bushes which will bloom the first season after

The following seven roses are recommended by the All-America Rose Council:

COUNCII:

CHARLOTTE ARMSTRONG—
Hybrid Tea. Buds blood-red, opening to cerise in warm weather and to spectrum red in cool weather. Foliage is described as mildew resistant, lark green, with bronze shading.

WORLD'S FAIR-A Floribunda type (large flowering polyantha). Vigorous bushy plants with large clusters of large rich red flowers. Foliage bronzy red. Has a pleasing, spicy fragrance. The Floribundas are remarkably hardy, easy to grow, and prolific bloomers.

THE CHIEF—Is said to have a

sweet fruity fragrance. Buds spec-trum red, opening to large rose-colored blooms, flushed orange at the base. Foliage dark green and

Well-rotted manure should be incorporated in the soil when the bed is prepared. First-year plants need less food than those well established. First-year feeding consists of 1 level teaspoonful per square foot of soil area about the plants while established. For Cleaner Elections

The experiment of the Hatch Act—and even its onsors would be first to admit that it was an experiment, not a final and complete solution of the election problem—has been distinctly worth while.

The first reaction is likely to be that the act was a failure. After all one of its chief provisions was ned at limiting to \$3,000,000 the amount that any party could spend on a national election. In this, the act failed. The Senate investigation committee found that the Republicans spent nearly \$15,000,000 the Democrats more than \$6,000,000. Even those are probably not the entire sums spent, for there is no way to tabulate every dollar that may have been spent by obscure organizations or individuals.

The comittee recommended tightening up the act and all federal election laws, and this will probably be done. The old difficulty crops up that attends the making of all law: how can the law be written so as to achieve exactly the results desired and no others? That is not so easy.

But the general lines are clear. The remedy for most abuses lies in publicizing them. The people are sound. When they know the truth about a situation they can be trusted to act honestly, and, in the long run, wisely. That was Lincoln's faith; that i sthe American faith.

What is the danger in campaign contributions and campaign propaganda? It lies not so much in the nts spent, as in lack of knowledge of just who is putting it up. The scurrilousness of many campaign tracts and dodgers is redoubled by lack of exact information on who is responsible. If that factor is known, the electorate is generally able to gauge the value of the material.

Every campaign ocntribution of any size, not only to the regular national parties, but to any organizations working in a political election, should be known. Every piece of campaign literature should carry names and addresses of the responsible persons issuing it; the vague names of some ephemeral or ganization is not enough.

The key to honest elections lies there, and it-is there that Congress should bend its attention in tightening the Hatch Act.

It is in the dark that the foulest deeds are done! a well-lighted goldfish globe is the best guarantee of honest elections.

Behind The News

WASHINGTON, March 19-A row over whether th United States should suport a second trans-oceanic airline to Europe has been fought for a couple of fast rounds lately, and it should be of interest to show how some things get done in your nation's capital. This particular row may never reach the floor of either house of Congress for open debate, but it is typical of the way some of the more important issues

This airline battle began when the House of Representatives Appropriations Committee turned down a request for a mere million and a quarter dollars to set up a rump, one plane, twice-a-month American Export Airlines service to Europe in competition with the existing Pan American Airlines which pioncered the route, now runs a three-times-a-week scheduled service, and is ready to go to daily service when it gets three planes this summer.

PAN AMERICAN SPENT MILLIONS BEFORE START

To get the background, you must know first that American Export Airlines is a subsidiary of American Export Lines, a shipping company which, operating under the U.S. Maritime Commission, runs steamship service between American and Mediterranean ports, and around Africa to India. The Mediterranean now being closed, the line operates to Lisbon, Portugal. Export Lines' S. E. C. registration certificate shows the company was formed back in 1936 on a capital structure of \$600, all that was necessary to buy voting control of the old Export Lines. With that as a starter, and with government subsidies and private loans American Export Lines ran its profits up to where they reached \$5 million in the first nine

Some time ago the company became ambitious to start airline operations to Europe. The Maritime Commission, however, ruled steamship line profits could ot be used for airline expansion and furthermore asked the company to deposit its surplus with the government, to be drawn on only for future emergencies, such as ship losses.

With this ruling in effect, the steamship company had to ask the government for subsidy or governent loan to finance its airline program. To start this, American Export Airlines got a certificate of convenience and necessity from Civil Aeronautics toard, authorizing it to begin service of one round trip every two weeks. This certificate was signed by the President last July, and American Export Airlines thereupon applied to the government for a bsidy of a \$1,229,000 to set it up in business for a year running its one plane—a two-motored survey passengers. Supported by the subsidy, however, the ompany proposed to sell stock and therewith order planes, enabling it to enter into full competition

Pan American, for its part, sank some \$6,000,000 of private capital into its trans-oceanic operations chairman of the Maritime Commission. efore its first commercial flight to Europe. This for mail, carrying all the Postoffice department them to break even.

CAN DO NO WRONG A ridiculous and embarrassing position seems not to bother the defender of paternalistic govern-

ment, as instigated by the New Deal. These men who like to be known to their fellowmen as interested in freedom and the oppressed, love to make the statement that someone is underpaid and someone gets too much.

But when these individuals are asked to set forth an eternal, impersonal, numerical rule or principle by which they determine what each person should receive, they will not answer but simply parrot-like repeat their original state-

In reality this man is saying, while he probably does not know it, that he is setting himself up as the standard of goodness. He is the norm by which all things are compared. And when he says workers are getting too much, he compares it with his own personal opinion. He sets himself up as the sole authority, the standard of goodness. Certainly a standard does not change. It is eternal. So, he, in reality is saying that he is like Caesar's wife-he' can do no wrong because he is the measure by which he determines good-

Of course this is a ridiculous, absurd and embarrassing position for any human being to take. It is a position taken by men in a mad-house, or by Caesars, or by Hitlers, or by Mussolinis or men drunk with power. It is also the position of all beasts. They recognize no standard of goodness but their own desires. They will not agree to abide by any rule of right.

But that is exactly the position that supporters of the New Deal are actually in. If they shift their contention of right and wrong to the majority, then they are saying that the majority is like Caesar's wife-it can do no wrong.

But all history proves that this is not the case. It was the crowd that demanded the life of Socrates and the life of Jesus. It is the unthinking crowd that makes progress so slow.

Yes, the man is in as absurd, ridiculous and irrational position, when he says the government or the majority should determine what any man should get, because he is, in reality saying that the majority is like Caesar's wife—it can do no wrong If the government has the right to determine what any one man should earn it then has the right to determine what every man should earn. So those who advocate collective bargaining or government regulation of earnings are claiming to be a standard of goodness and right. They say there are no eternal principles, everlasting truths by which right and wrong must be judged.

If these people could only see their absurdity, possibly they would desist from their condemning other people without an eternal standard, when they are obliged to use themselves as the norm, the standard of goodness.

INCOME TAX AND DIVIDENDS

I notice in the report of the Thompson Products Company, a Cleveland corporation, manufacturers of valves for airplane engines, that their tax per common shareholder amounted to 92c a share in 1929, \$1.41 in '38, \$2.65 per share in 1939, and \$6.36 per share in 1940.

The War **Today**

The surprise isn't in British Premier Churchill's announcement that German U-boats and battle cruisers have been operating on what he refers to as "the American side of the Atlantic," but in the fact that they haven't been found in these waters before.

Germany, Italy and Japan—the triple alliance—have made it emphatically clear that they consider the United States already in the

war because of our all-out aid to Britain. A natural corollary is their presence on our side of the fence. Of course, their saying so won't put us into the war unless they back their charge with action. Of Wool For Men

Wool for men's clothing in 1941 is expected to reach the most dominant position it has held for several years, according to leading clothes designers and fashion commentators, chiefly because of the stress now being placed upon the durability and health advantages of wool in army uniforms.

During 1940 it was a military year for most nations of the world, with the single exception of the United States. This year, with the creation of the enormous defense program, it is definitely a military year for this country, and fashion designers in both the men's and women's fields point out that the military note is having its chief effect in colors and types of cloth rather than in the close-fitting military design which had its effect upon civilian dress during the last war.
