# War Department Accepts Lindbergh's Air Corps Resignation FDR'S REOPENING PROPOSAL ENDS COAL STR

### Secretary To FDR Assails Flier's Acts

Released Letter To Press Before President Got It

WASHINGTON, April 29, (P)-The War Department announced today that Colonel Charles A. Lindbergh's resignation as a reserve air corps officer had been

The famous flier had written President Roosevelt he was tendering his resignation because the president's comments on him at a press conference last Friday left "no honorable alternative."

While it has been the war department's policy not to accept resignations from reserve officers during the emergency period, Secretary Stimson possessed discretionary power to act favorably or unfavor-

WASHINGTON, April 29 (AP)— Stephen Early, presidential secre-tary, said today that Charles A. Lindbergh's resignation as a reserve colonel in the army air corps "leads me to wonder if he is returning his decoration to Mr. Hit-

Early referred to an honorary award for service to aviation given Lindbergh on a visit to Germany several years ago.

was sharp-spoken in saying that Lindbergh had released a letter to President Roosevelt for publication before it was received at the White House. Twice, he said, Lindbergh has followed that pro-

WASHINGTON, April 29 (AP)

—The United Mine Workers union

production would be resumed
Thursday morning in the nation's

April 1 in a dispute over a new
wage contract.

The announcement was made by a spokesman for Union President John L. Lewis after he had discussed with his district presidents in the Appalachian coal area the decision of southern producers last night to accept President Roosevelt's proposal to reopen the mines The union said it had received the notice from L. Ebersole Gaines, chairman of the southern producers' group, that the latter was willing to negotiate a new two-year agreement with the miners' union be made retroactive to the date of resumption of coal production.

The southern operators unexpectedly agreed to a \$1-a-day wage boost pending the final contract

Union officials said the reope of the mines was scheduled for Thursday instead of Wednesday because Thursday is the beginning If production started Wednesday, they said, it would mean that the operators would have to make up a payroll for one day instead of full day period.





### When Hitler And Churchill Agree

You don't expect, these days, agreement beweten Adolf Hitler and Winston Churchill on anything.

But they do appear to agree on one thing-and it is a thing that has significance for the United States. It is this: the war is a long way from being over. Churchill said in a recent speech that Britain is in

for an "undoubtedly long and formidable war."

Hitler said in his birthday message: "A hard battle year stands before us."

That last is a significant utterance in a country which from many official sources was promised final victory last fall. It means that Hitler knows what some Americans seem not to realize—that victory in the Balkans is not victory in the war. Victory in the whole Mediterranean or the whole Near East is not victory in the war.

may well speak of a hard battle year. The war could conceivably last very much longer. It could last two labor.

more years-10 more. That does not mean that the United States can hold back for a moment in the delivery of munitions so urgently needed. Yugoslavia and Greece fell in about three weeks. A shipload of supplies starting from New York the very day the Germans invaded would not have reached them before the whole tragedy was over. The United tSates did not let anybody down. American aid is not ineffective. Any help to Yugoslavia and Greece was based on the supposition that a front could be established and held. This proved impossible; time, that one indispensable munition of war, was lacking.

Hitler's own suggestion of "a hard battle year' makes it pretty clear that this will not be true of other battle zones. Whatever war material is on the way to Greece, for instance, will probably wind up in Egypt, not wasted. And American production is beginning to get under way. By and large, it is coming just as fast as any informed people thought it could when the program was launched less than a year ago Now is no time for faltering in the course we have

### ORIGINALS HEAD LIST

At the head of the list are such irreplaceable literary and historical gems as the original Declaration of Independence, the Constitution, Lincoln's first drafts of the Gettysburg address, the private papers of George Washington and other presidents. Thomas Jefferson's library (or rather what was left of it after the British got through burning Washington in 1814) and thousands of irreplaceable first editions which comprise almost all the masterpieces of American literature. There also is that famous Gutenburg Bible. There are scores of prints, including the worldknown Pennell collection of etchings. There are musical gems like original scores by the great German composers, Beethoven, Brahms and Wagner. There also are Payne's original "Home, Sweet Home," Key's "Star Spangled Banner," and Nevin's "Rosary."

Perhaps that will give you some idea of what will go into the bombproof hole in the ground. As for the hole or holes, David Lynn, capitol architect, and Mac-Leish still are working on that. You can't bury books and art treasurers like you do gold. The library caches will have to be ventilated, bug-proof and fireproof. That's no small order, but the successes and failures of European libraries and museums are pointing the

. So far, MacLeish and Lynn have little more than plans. To execute them will cost money. The only way you can get money out of the government is through congress. Therefore, if you are interested in following up this safeguard of the library's gems of ble value, watch for an appropriation bill that will provide the funds.

INFLATION OR REGIMENTATION

AND TOTALITARIANISM Those people who have not made a careful

study of credit and money and government are certain we will have inflation. What they do not seem to understand is that

there is an alternative to inflation. The alternative, under our present policies, is complete regimentation of all prices. If the government, by force and coercion, establishes the different prices of different things, it can prevent them from going up in credit terms, or what is commonly called money.

The actions we are taking, however, will lead to either inflation or absolute totalitarianism-a government of force where the government controls what people consume and what they work at. The present policy is a case of either/or. There is no alternative to either complete regimentation or inflation unless we about face. In fact, we have already had a great deal of regimentation, government controlling credit and interfering with free contracts

But this control will, of necessity, have to be increased as the lack of parity between different workers increases. We are now subsidizing the farmers to balance the wages established by labor monopolies.

This government interference has gone so far that, although the price of consumable goods is increasing, the price of the tools that are used to produce the consumable goods, is going down. What a strange thing to think that tools and equipment that would cost more to reproduce, because of higher consumable goods, are coming to be worth less to private citizens.

> So, although it would cost more to reproduce tools, fewer people are wanting to own tools. This is evidenced by the decline in the price of stocks; and owning stocks is nothing other than owning tools. People do not want to be in business because it is so dangerous and one is so likely to lose his savings when he owns equipment, because there is so much regimentation, so much totalitarian government control over his ac-

So, it is hard to say whether prices will go up or there will be more regimentation. Real Prices Will Go Up

It is not hard to say, however, that the real prices will go up. This is as certain as the law Can the United States lick Hitler? Have w. the equipment? What would we gain if we did? What would we lose if we did? What would become of us if we failed?

The course is not charted by the first World War. This is a different kind of a war. A different kind of a man heads the German empire. Facts have shown a great military might, whether or not we like the facts. Hitler controls virtually all of the continent. The Suez is in jeopardy today. So is north Africa. Where would we land our

Win or lose, what would become of our repub lic? Our present government has put our treasury in such a state that we could not survive another war without collapse and dictatorship of the kind we profess to despise.

The United States is wholly unequipped from a financial point of view to enter a war at this time. We are wholly unequipped to face the inevitable aftermath of war.

We are not equipped financially to safely build our own adequate defense, but this we must do. We have a double duty. We must defend ourselves in preparation for attack should it ever come, however fantastic the thought is, and we must defend ourselves against the results of our national leaders' meddling policies.

Urgent as defense is, the necessity of it is adding dangerously to our domestic financial plight. Yes, we will create new taxes, but new taxes impose new burdens on industry and new burdens on industry means curtailment of costs and curtailment of costs means unemployment. We are heading into another domestic financial catastrophe even without going to war. Only the war boom is holding it down today.

Ours is a big job at home. If we pass the red light by going to war, we will be voting away the republic we tell the world we love.
