With District 4 champion Jay- ton finishing up its season last Saturday by playing in the Divi- sion II state title game, which Vernon Northside won 60-41; that league's all-district team was released this week. In conjunction with that league's honor roll, its all-star representatives were also named.

Chapman is one of that league's all-star representatives, "He's real fired up about it," Coyote Coach Bobby Avery said of
"He should do great in this game, too. He really enjoys playing defense and is a pretty good cornerback, but he's one of those kids who would do good wherever they decide to put him out there
Borden County's Zane Williamson was one of that league's alternates for the state's six-man all-star game next summer in Lubbock
Clint Chapman is one of several Coyote players to receive all-district honors. Chapman was recognized for his play at quarterback as well as at cornerback
Clint's younger brother, Borden County freshman Flynn Chapman, was that league's newcomer of the year
Flynn, who started out the season by playing on the Coyotes' JV, also earned first-team all-district at linebacker. He also received second-team all-district at kicker.
Other Coyote first-team honorees are senior Zane William son at tight end and on the defensive line, junior Michael Bullinger at running back, special teams and at comerback, junior Quentin Shafer at block-
ing back and at safety.
Chapman rolled up impressive numbers on both sides of the ball for the Coyotes. He completed 118 out of 187 passes for 1,508 yards and 26
touchdowns. He also finished touchdowns. He also finished the year with 180 tackles, in-
cluding 53 solo stops. He had

one fumble recovery and one interception.
