WASHINGTON, Oct. 12. -The gravest concern was expressed at the state department today at the threat by the President of China that war would be declared if the League of Nations, meeting to-morrow, does not settle the Manchurian dispute with Japan satis factorily.

Fund as Precluding Use of Money Set Aside for Other Purposes.

# COX DISAGREES

Administration Not Willing to Delegate Authority to Anyone to Incur Bills It Is to Pay,

Reasons why the county commissioners are limited in their ability to assist in charity programs were outlined by Judge D. Stennis today in a lengthy statement.

Commissioner L. O. Cox of this Commissioner L. O. Cox of this precinct dissented from the policy expressed, and declared that was mandatory upon the county to help those absolutely destitute. Other commissioners were believed by Judge Stennis to be in accord with the policy as stated.

The statement follows:

A great deal has been said about the responsibility of the county for relief of different kinds for the poor in Gray county. Aid is sought prin ipally in the incorporated cit-ies of the county, the rural districts usually taking care of their own. There are several classifications under which the discussions arise: First, food and clothing for the needy; second, medicine for the sick, who are poor; third, doctor's bills; and fourth, hospitalization.

All of these are worthy subjects for charity and there can be no just criticism of any one for urging that all of them be attended to in fact, it is to the credit of any person who is more fortunate to think of those less fortunate.

It is also proper to consider these matters in advance and be prepared for the situation when it become acute.

As to what may be expected of the county is a proper question for citizens to ask, and we desire to give some information about the county affairs in order that we may all take it into consideration in ing the problem

Any assistance that may be given nust come from the general fund the county.

The commissioner's court has not authority to obtain money for any of these purposes from any other fund, and if they attempted to do so, it would be a violation of the trust imposed upon them. In addition the county auditor should not and, in my opinion, would not approve the warrant

The limit for the amount that can be levied for the general fund is 25c on the \$100 assessed valuation. If all these taxes are paid (there is a prospect of considerable delinquency) this fund will amount to
