ing things to England and meeting with great urgency everything for our own defense that we can produce by working 24 hours per day, every day, and having factories idle or slowed down, does not make sense," he said.

The requests also asked other concessions, relating to hours, working conditions and paid vacations.

There was a four-day strike at the plant recently by the CIO in protest against the ERP annual elections. The CIO contends the ERP is company-dominated.

Negotiations were under way at Milwaukee for wage increases for Allis-Chalmers Manufacturing company in the final phase of carrying out an agreement which settled a 76-day strike by a CIO union. Company and union officials met yesterday with Maj. James P. Holmes, labor department conciliator.

Sheppard Wrote Prodigious Index To Shakespeare

By HAROLD OLIVER

WASHINGTON, April 11 (AP)—As the late Senator Morris Sheppard disclosed today that the quiet little Texan—never generally known to have had a hobby—died without publishing a prodigious index of Shakespeare's works which took him 13 years to compile.

"The senator was so busy he never got around to publishing it," said D. Roland Potter, his secretary.

In leisure moments, Senator Sheppard jotted down Shakespearean quotations in long hand and captioned them by subjects. He titled his work "Selected Comments of Shakespeare on over 4,000 subjects." Shakespearean students have termed it one of the most comprehensive and individualistic efforts yet completed.

As the senator finished a volume in long hand he had it typed. In his office library there are now 35 typewritten volumes, including nine folders of indexes. He directed that if they were ever published they should be dedicated "to my wife Lucile."

The dean of Congress—he had served continuously in house and senate since 1902—was known widely for his sponsorship of the prohibition amendment to the constitution. One of the subjects on the first page of his Shakespearean compilation was "abstinence."

"No, Pompey, I have kept me from the cup," was the entry beside it, quoting from Anthony and Cleopatra, 2nd act, scene VII.

The first entry was a quotation on "Abhorrence." The last dealt with "Zeal, Excess of."

Senator Sheppard died Wednesday of a cerebral hemorrhage. His body was enroute today to Texarkana, Tex., where services will be held tomorrow.

east wing had surrendered and that 80,000 Greeks had been taken prisoner.

A special communique by the German high command declared several Yugoslav divisions had been "shattered" and 10,000 new prisoners taken. Twenty thousand already had been reported captured.

The new threat to Greece sized up as an attempt to flank strong British-Greek defense forces strung out along the Greek peninsula from fabled Mt. Olympus, near Salonika, to Chimara, on the Adriatic sea coast—and possibly to cut off Greek troops still fighting against the Italians in Albania.

British RAF reports disclosed that the Germans had reached the angle of the Greek-Yugoslav-Albanian frontiers in a drive toward the northern Greek town of Florina.

An RAF communique said British warplanes had bombed and machine-gunned a major transport column near Bitolj, in southwest Yugoslavia, seven miles above the Greek frontier.

"Armored columns on the road between Florina and Prilep were bombed successfully from a low altitude," the RAF said.

Florina is 20 miles south of Bitolj, Prilep is 25 miles northeast of Bitolj.

Germany Strike At British-Greek Army

(By The Associated Press)

ATTEN: APRIL 11—British expeditionary troops have clashed with Adolf Hitler's blitzkrieg invaders for the first time in northern Greece, it was officially announced today, and the battle of Greece apparently is developing.

Striking toward the right wing anchor of the British-Greek main defense line, in the vicinity of fabled Mount Olympus, the Germans were reported to have captured Yanitsa, 15 miles due north of the Olympus range.

Other Nazi columns were reported trying to push through the Bitolj (Monastir) Pass, in southwest Yugoslavia, threatening the British left wing in a drive toward Florina, Greece.

Headquarters of the British expeditionary force reported stiffening resistance against the Germans in southern Yugoslavia.

Armored troops were said to be rolling southward from Prilep, Yugoslavia, toward Florina, northern Greece.

Refugees arriving from Yugoslavia said that the Slav forces fought valiantly, inflicting terrific losses on the invaders and suffering heavy casualties themselves, but that they had been unprepared for the violent Nazi attack in the Struma and Vardar river valleys.

They quoted Yugoslav generals as attributing the defeat mainly to a breakdown in communications, which left many units struggling in the dark, without knowledge of the movements of other units.

LOS ANGELES, April 11 (AP)—Deanna Durbin, 19-year-old movie actress, and Vaughn Paul, 25, her first and only sweetheart, obtained a marriage license today.

Deanna and the young movie executive braved a rainstorm to reach the license bureau as it opened this morning. The couple will be married next Friday night at the home of her parents, Mr. and Mrs. James Durbin, in Hollywood.

Their romance began four years ago. He was an assistant director on her first motion picture. He proposed six months ago.

Hungary Marches Into Yugoslavia To

BUDAPEST, Hungary, April 11 (AP)—The Hungarian army has marched into Yugoslavia to reclaim territory lost in the World War.

The Hungarian nation was informed on this step, taken yesterday, with publication in morning papers today of a proclamation of Regent Admiral Nicholas Horthy.

The proclamation said formation of an independent Croatian state in the north left Yugoslavia "dissolved into several parts."

This act left Hungary the duty to take again in our own hands the care for Hungarians living in the territories stolen from us," it said.

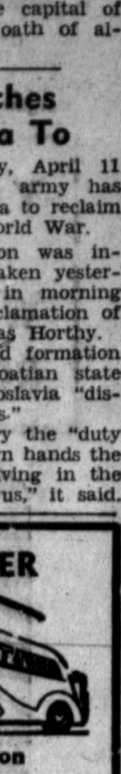

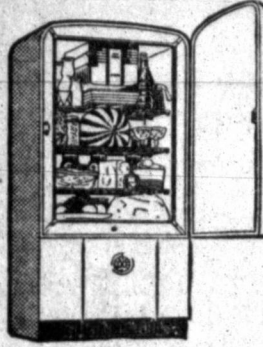

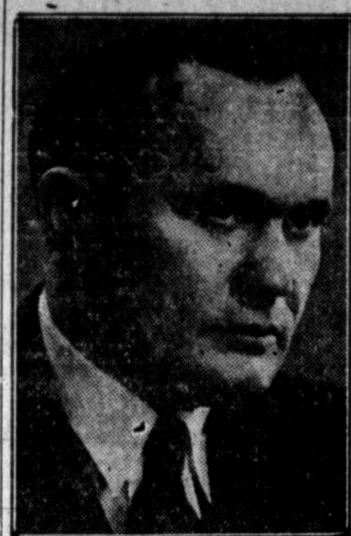

Government May Commander 14 French Vessels

WASHINGTON, April 11 (AP)—President Roosevelt's request for power to take over foreign ships aroused congressional speculation today that the government might commandeer 14 French vessels, including the giant luxury liner Normandie, which are tied up in American harbors.

In a message to congress yesterday, Mr. Roosevelt asked sweeping authority to make use of foreign ships idle in American ports to forestall a "growing shortage" of shipping facilities. The message, and accompanying legislation, said that "just compensation" would be made for any ships taken over.

There was no immediate expression of opposition to the plan, and administration leaders believed they could hurry the enabling legislation through congress.

First vessels involved under the new "seize-and-pay" program would be 39 Danish ships recently placed under protective custody of the Coast Guard along with two German and 28 Italian merchantmen.

One administration leader, asking not to be quoted by name, said that it would be "sound procedure" to seize the French vessels now in American waters, and predicted that possibly would be one of the first steps taken after the proposed authorization is approved. The Normandie is tied up at New York.

This legislator said that the French vessels are of no value to the Vichy government at present. "If we paid them a just price," he said, "it would be a fair transaction all around. The Germans might not like it, but I have a feeling that the French would."

There being nothing of more importance than keeping this country out of foreign and civil wars. I am continuing quotations from Robert Hutchins' radio talk on "The Proposition is Peace".

"We cannot seriously believe that what we have of the four freedoms we owe to our courage and our wisdom. We owe it rather to the courage and wisdom of our forefathers who were our constitution and to the Divine Providence that placed enormous resources at our disposal at a distance from the conflicts of the Old World.

"But if we go to war, and preserve the British Empire, and crush the Germans, our fundamental problems will remain. Why do not face our fundamental problems by going to war; we evade them."

"Hitler was right in holding before the German people an ideal higher than comfort. He knew he could not give them that. He offered them instead a vision of national grandeur and racial supremacy. These are false gods. Since they are false, they will fail in the end. But Hitler was half right. He was right in what he condemned, and wrong in what he offered in its place. It is our task in this country to realize the true ideals of human life, the true organization of human society, the true democracy. It is our task to work out a new order in America, not like Hitler's based on slavery and degradation, but based on the premise that society exists to promote the happiness of its members and that happiness consists in the development of the highest powers of men."

"Peace to Win War on Poverty. Edmund Burke said to the House of Commons: 'Judging of what you are by what you ought to be, I persuaded myself that you would not reject a reasonable proposition because it had nothing but its reason to recommend it.' The proposition is peace."

"America has been called the arsenal of democracy. It has been called the larder of democracy. Let us make it the home of democracy. This is America's destiny."

12-Grade System Favored By Woods

TEMPLE, April 11 (AP)—L. A. Woods, state superintendent of public instruction, favors the twelve-grade system in Texas schools and he thinks the step should be taken immediately.

Woods told a forum of superintendents here yesterday the federal government must come to the aid of cities whose school systems carry overwhelming burdens because of national defense projects.

He declared the state school board would try to help in the fall by readjusting school expenses to give maximum appropriations to towns such as Orange which is planning half-day operations because of the big gain in scholastics resulting from defense projects bringing a large increase in population.

Woods added that by fall the situation should clear up in many towns because of completion of construction work but that some would have full-time projects.

The forum was held in connection with the Texas Vocational Association convention.

E. H. Hereford, state director of curriculum, said small elementary schools with one teacher to a grade would be struck financially by transition from the eleven to twelve grade system and such schools would have to add teachers, but the small schools will not be hit.
