Rally Falls Short After **Tough Start Dooms** Coyotes in Quarter-final Contest against Rankin

The Borden Coyotes almost continued their story book season with yet another unbelievable feet, as the they spotted the Rankin Red Devils a 19 point lead at 38 to 19 with 1:30 left in the first half before a furious rally left the Coyotes on the disappointing end of a 53 to 50 final score.

The Borden Coyotes started this contest very sluggish as they committed several first quarter turnovers that resulted in easy baskets for the Red Devils in the early going of this contest and a very cold shooting first quarter allowed the Red Devils to take a comfortable 17 to 6 first quarter lead. The Coyotes managed to make only 3 of 12 shots in that opening stanza before finding a little rhythm in the second quarter to bounce back with an 18 point quarter. Unfortunately the Red Devils did not share in the shooting struggles that the Coyotes had in the first half as they followed their 17 point outburst in the first quarter with a 21 point total in the 2nd period. In fact, the Red Devils managed to build a 19 point lead at 38 to 19 with only 1:30 remaining in the opening half of play. The Coyotes went on a 5 to 0 run to end the half to make the halftime score 38 to 24.

In the second half, the Coyotes combined a much better effort with a defensive adjustment to begin a much needed rally to close the double digit lead to 5 points as the they used a 15 to 6



Wind, Low Humidity Raise Wildfire Concer

Brisk winds, low relative That fire started from unsafe humidity and generally warmer than normal temperatures forecasted for the next few days have heightened firefighter concerns about the possibility of wildfires. Coming after an extended cold spell, fire officials fear that the drier conditions and warmer temperatures are likely to prompt an increase in outdoor activities, which will increase the likelihood of accidental fire starts.

With weather conditions moderating considerably from those experienced the past week or two, we expect more people will take the opportunity to do some early spring clean-up, outdoor construction projects or simply get out and enjoy the outdoors, says Les Rogers, assistant chief fire coordinator with the Texas Forest Service.

Rogers warns that since vegetation is dormant, finetextured fuels like grasses and weeds can quickly become flammable during dry windy conditions, as are now occurring across the area. He notes that it doesn't take much of a spark to ignite a grass fire, which can spread very quickly during windy conditions.

"Wildfires are uncommon in the winter in Texas," says Rogers. "One of the most devastating dark. The Texas Forest Service offers these tips for fire safety during dry, windy conditions:

- Report fires immediately through 911 or sheriff office. Wildfires spread rapidly during windy conditions and are very dangerous to extinguish.
- When using welding or grinding equipment outdoors, keep a spotter on duty to watch for possible spot fires. Where possible, remove vegetation from the

work area; otherwise, wet down the work area before and periodically during work operations.

- Remember that hot catalytic converters on vehicles can ignite wildfires, so only park and drive in areas free of dry vegetation.
- Extinguish and dispose of all smoking materials in your vehicle ashtray, rather than flicking ashes out window.
- Keep spark arresters and mufflers on agri-

The Sweet Truth About Sugar

(NAPSA)-It seems sugar has

gotten a bad wrap.

The majority of consumers wrongly think that a teaspoon of sugar has a whopping 70 calories, according to a study by The Sugar Association. The truth is that sugar has just 15 calories per teaspoon.

That means people may not be saving as many calories as they think when they reach for a yellow, pink or blue packet of artificial sweetener.

The obvious question is: How did we become so misinformed? Have all the sugar-free products, artificial sweeteners, anti-sugar diets and sugar-buster books biased our perception?

Browse a supermarket and you'll likely find sugar-free or reduced-sugar products in almost every category from jams and jellies to ice cream, cookies, breads, salad dressings and cereals. But are they better for you?

Recently, the Associated Press asked five nutrition scientists to evaluate newly introduced "re-duced-sugar" kids' cereals. The scientists found that the reducedsugar version of popular kids' cereals provided no reduction in calories or improved nutritional content over the regular sugar versions. The replacement ingredients provided the necessary bulk and texture to the reduced-sugar cereals but offered no nutritional or caloric advantage.

According to the American Dietetic Association (ADA) 2004 position paper on the use of nutritive and nonnutritive sweet-eners, "Nonnutritive sweeteners added to the diet have been shown to promote a modest loss of weight... The prevalence of obesity has increased substantially at the same time as the consumption of nonnutritive

Nutritionists say the best advice overall is to read nutrition labels and know what's in your food. Low sugar doesn't necessar-ily mean low calorie or better for you. Eat a healthy, balanced diet of fruits, vegetables, whole grains and other fiber-rich foods, plus calcium-rich dairy products. And you can add sugar, with only 15 calories per teaspoon, to make many of those healthy foods tastier. A bowl of fresh berries, homemade oatmeal or unsweet-ened yogurt tastes great with a
