



What is all the fuss about soldier morale? A magazine took a lot of gripes too seriously. There is e difference between conversation and backbone.

Perhaps it is a matter of words. "Morale" is a strong word. It means the body of moral habits in a fellow's early training which add into character and stiffen the spine to do and to endure in time of stress. It means strength in teamwork. It has nothing to do with the casual kicks of youth thrown into a strange environment.

Every college lad gets tired of the college food. He writes home to mother about it-hoping for a chocolate cake. Every boarding school lass grows weary of the restrictions which her school authorities think necessary for her safety. She wishes she were home.

But neither the lads and lasses being educated nor the soldiers being trained, if brought right up against the question of whether they'd rather go home now or finish education and training, would vote for anything else than finishing the job.

American youth has come up through a period when it was not the style to appear patriotic or good The fad was to pretend sophistication and boredom. But under the conversational "lines" of this generation lie strength, high purpose and love of country

American soldiers are learning their stuff faster than the German youth ever did. They have individual intelligence and initiative to boot. It's fine to give them an outlet for their gripes, when the gripes have a basis, it can be set right. But no one need devote any serious thought to our army morale. We're

#### **Private Enterprise Sets Record**

The oil industry supplies the fuel that keeps our machines and many of our factories going. It has given the United States 63 per cent of all the oil produced in the world. On top of that, the oil industry is working wonders in other vital fields.

Rubber is absolutely essential to the nation in peace and in war. All our natural rubber comes from abroad, and our present supply of crude is sufficient for only two years. If this became exhausted and we could obtain no more, the oil industry could meet our needs with an efficient synthetic rubber made from petroleum.

Recently it was found that the fumes of pure gasoline are an effective anaesthetic. Petroleum is being made into powerful disinfectants.

When it comes to other materials of war, the in lustry is likewise playing a big part. A short while ago the government made arrangements with the industry to produce 60,000,000 gallons of coluene—the basic ingredient of TNT.

#### 100,000 Volunteer Nurses' Aides Within the next year the Red Cross plans to train

100,000 volunteer nurses' aides. The nursing facilities of civilian hospitals are already seriously strained. what with increasing demands from the military. public health and hygiene services. Should a great emergency come, a broad, speedy expansion in hospital beds might be required, and though many subsidiary hospital workers have had some training through NYA, WPA, and other agencies, they would not be enough to meet a great emergency quickly. So a volunteer program for nurses' aides is planned, designed to increase the effectiveness of existing trained nurses by supplying qualified assistants who can work under them. Physically fit women between 18 and 50 with a high school education or its equivalent are wanted. oLcal Red Cross chapters and hospitals will collaborate in giving the courses.

WHY THE WEATHER VANE ATTITUDE ON DRAFT PERIOD?

The continual fluctuation by the Administraion of the time draftees should be kept in training would be funny, if it were not so serious. If the Administration really had any definite ideas and principles they would not be changing their statements as to the length of time guardsmen or conscripts in the army should be trained in service

Now they are saying that draftees will be released in fourteen or eighteen months; that is, hose whom the representatives of the Adminisration say may be released. This statement leaves a lot of room for favoritism.

It will be remembered that the Administration and the War Department fought furiously to defeat Senator Taft's proposal to limit service to 11/2 years and Senator Burton's proposal for a 2-year limitation. Now the Administration and War Department, who wanted more than 21/2 years, are saying that these gentlemen were right and that the soldiers will be retained only for fourteen or eighteen months.

It is easy to see through the thin veil of deception. The Administration realizes that the 21/2 year law for draftees is not popular. They realize the low morale in the army. And if there is any one thing the Administration wants, it is to be popular; to have people vote for those in power to be retained in power. They are not particularly interested in fighting against the principles Hitler stands for because they too nearly stand for the same principles; namely, keeping in power. If they were really standing for the law of equal freedom, for the real Ameriican ideals, and this country were really in danger of foreign invasion, as they have been proclaiming, then they certainly should never retract their demands for a continuation of the

If there is anything that shows the fickleness and insincerity of the Administration, it is this change so quickly after the pulse of the people was felt by the one majority vote in the House for the draft bill

#### LOW ARMY MORALE NATURAL

The publishers of Life interviewed some 400 draftees in five different regiments. They found that 40 per cent of the boys in the draft rue the day they entered the army. This low morale in the army is a natural

result of broken promises and the inefficiency of the Administration and policies and beliefs indoctrinated into our people for the last three

The boys were put in the camps long before there was equipment for them to use that would be of service in case of war. Thus the boys can see the inefficiency at Washington.

In order to have morale, people must believe in immutable principles and the dependability of those in authority. They must believe in the law of equal freedom—that all people have equal rights with equal responsibilities."

No principles govern the acts of the present administration. The sons of the President are handed special jobs which the ordinary draftee has no opportunity of getting, no matter how efficient he may be.

We have made things crimes under the present Administration Tiat are not natural

It is now a crime to enter into a contract to employ a worker at a uniform rate for a longer period than the government decrees. It is now a crime to raise more wheat than

the totalitarian government prescribes. It is now a wime to make two blades of grass grow where one grew before. At least, we fine

In other words, we have established a double standard of rightness in the country. We are not fighting for the principle of equal rights to pursue happiness, as our forefathers did.

The lack of morale of the army is a natural result of our practices.

"If the American people can be sure of the minimum necessities, they will be more willing to go without the luxuries. Here is a technique in which the farmers of Amer-ica, who have to go without luxuries anyway, should be interested.'
