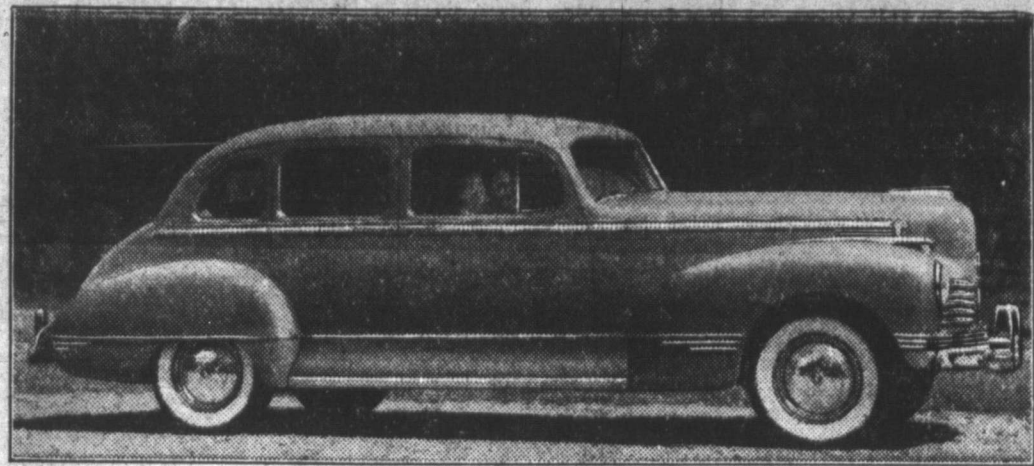

And when on the other side of the reef is the Brazilian bombshell, Carmen Miranda, plus songs by Mack Gordon and Harry Warren, the result, as mixed by 20th-Fox, is a gay and frisky musical in Technicolor, titled "Week-End in Havana," which opens a four-day run today at the LaNora. Tune-Smiths Gordon and Warren turn out one of their best jobs in this picture. The Brazilian bomber is spotted in "The Nango," "A Week-End In Havana," and "When I Love I Love." 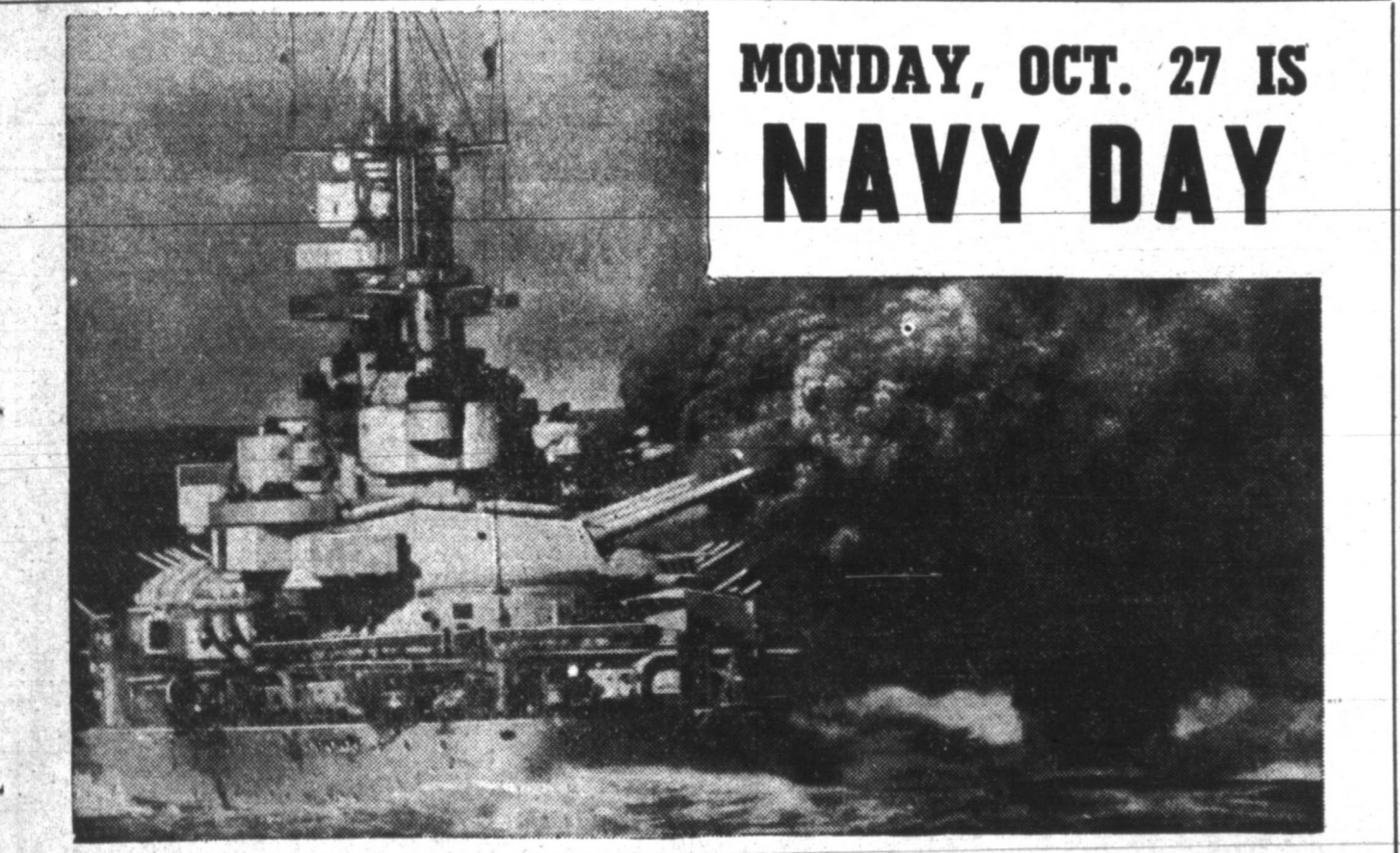

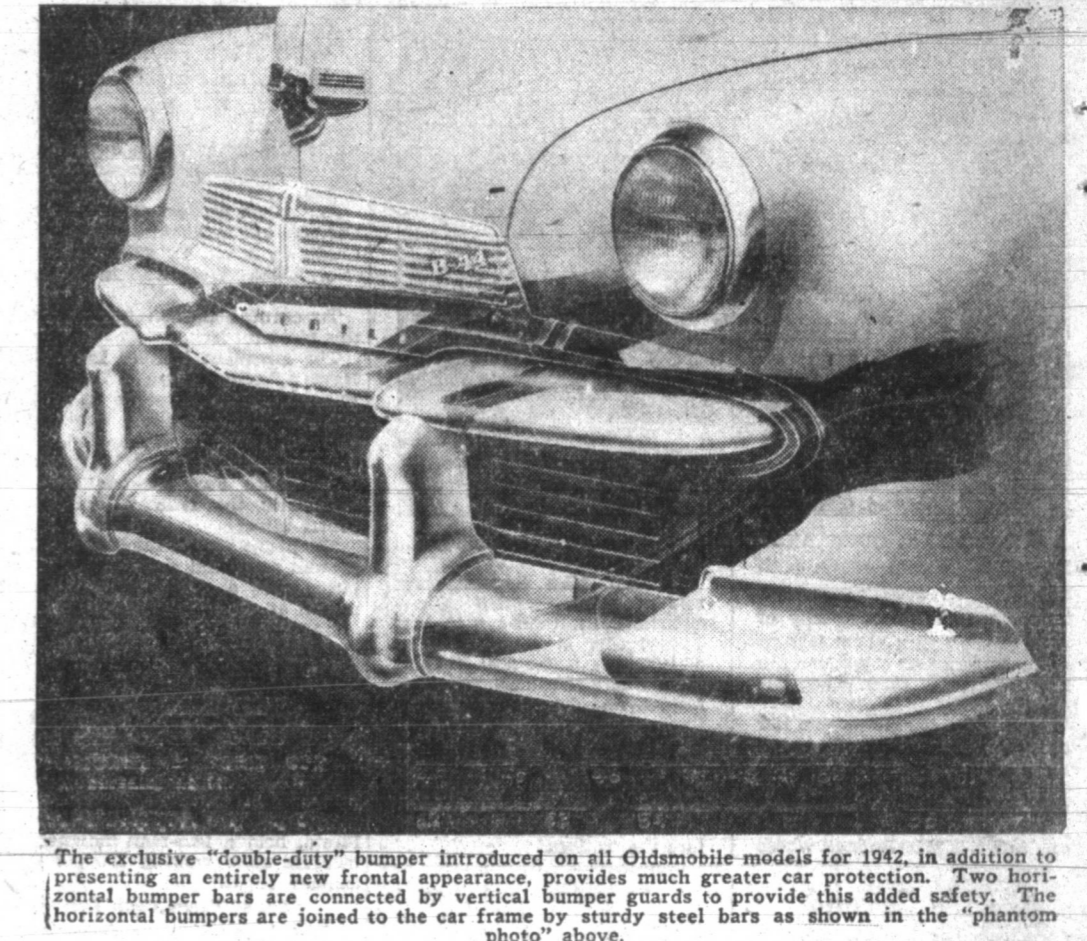

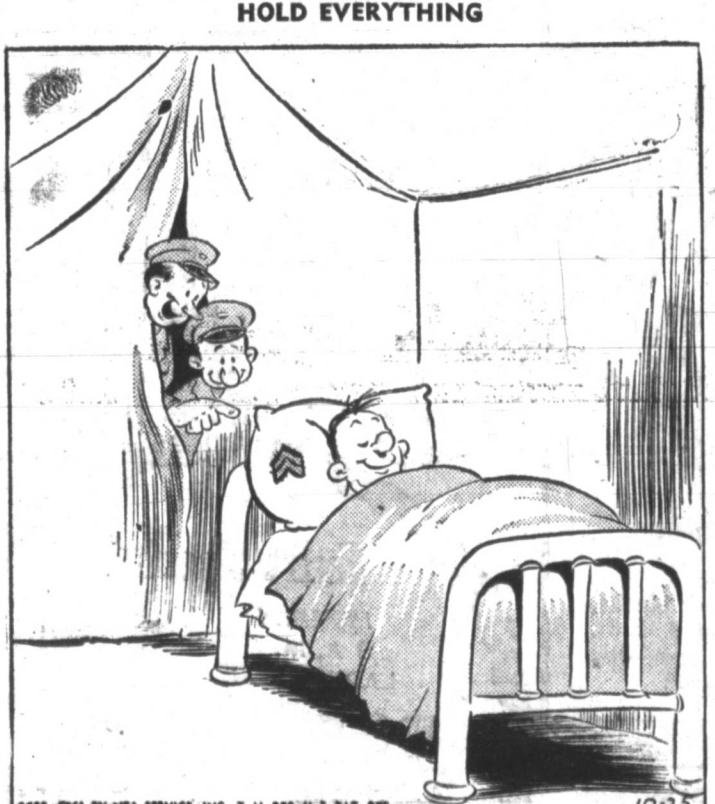
Callaway is a radio man third class and has received several pro-

motions during his service in the U. S. navy.

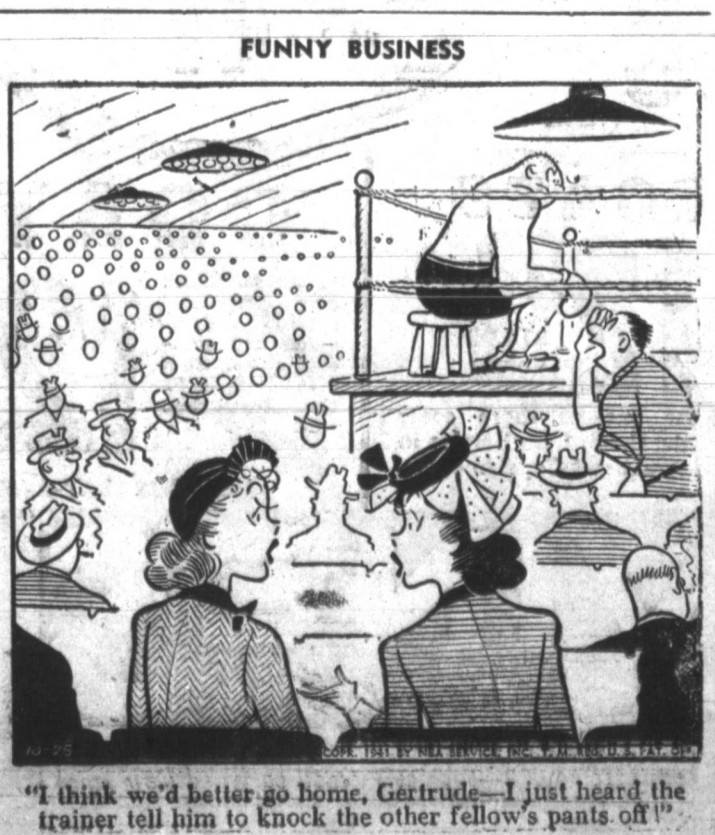

His short leave was divided between his parents in Canadian and his sister and brothers in Amarillo.

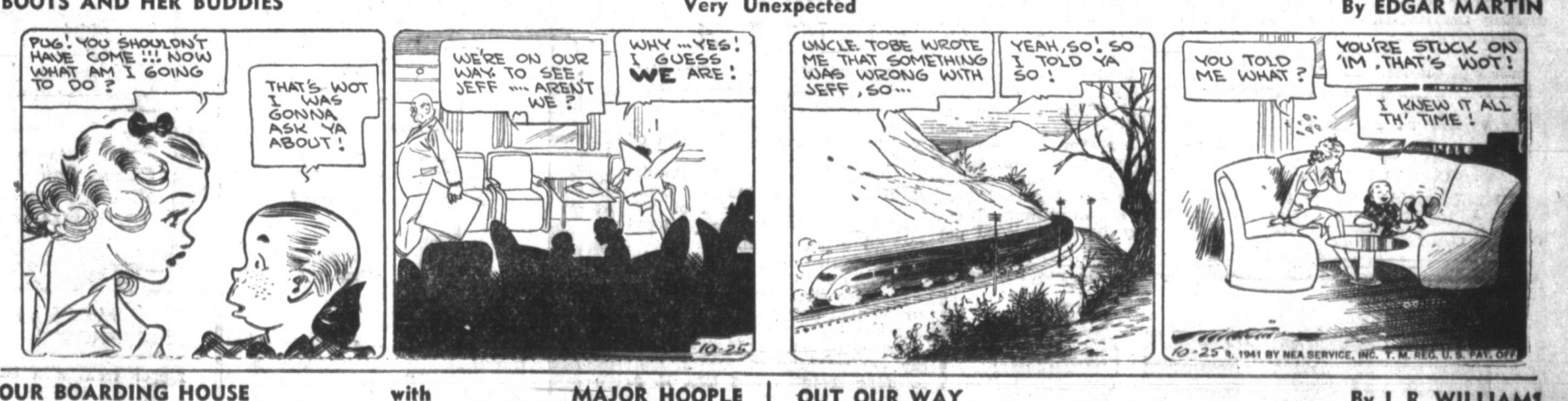
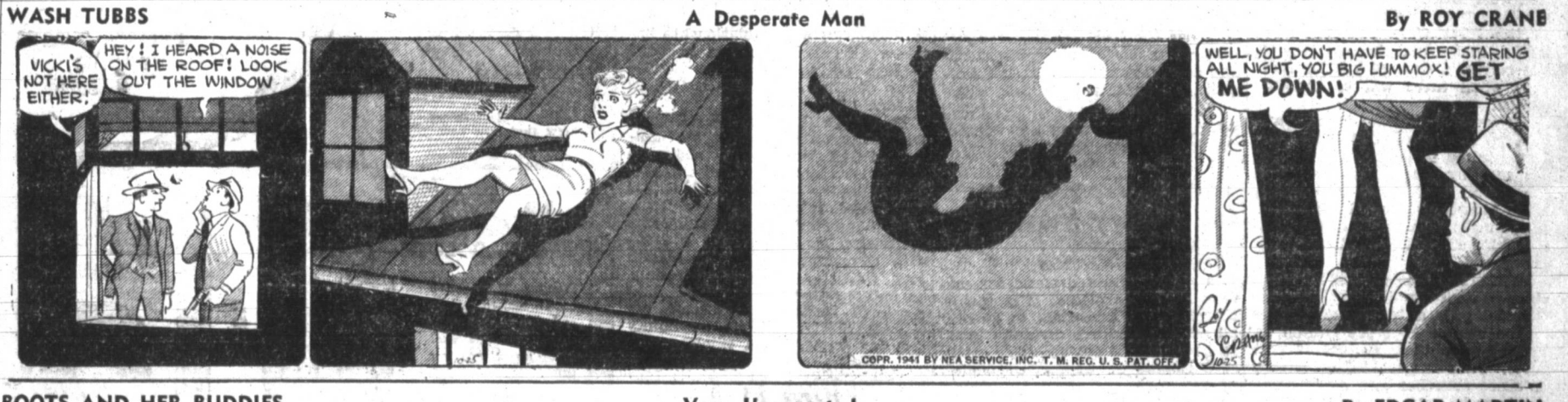
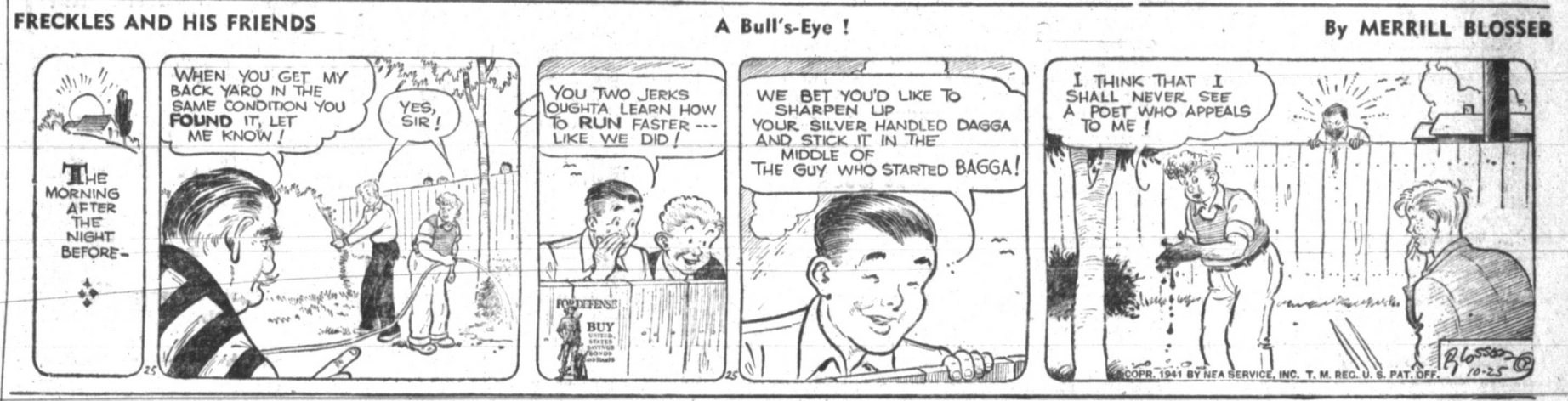

IPAA Advocates "Sufficient And Adequate" Price For Oil

TULSA, Okla., Oct. 25 (AP)—The Independent Petroleum Association of America adopted a resolution yesterday urging a "sufficient and adequate" price for crude oil after a spirited two-hour discussion in which efforts to insert a specific 25 or 30 cents a barrel recommended increase failed.

While practically all of the oil men attending the meeting agreed that a price increase in crude oil was necessary to stimulate new drilling and to prevent abandonment of wells of settled production, amendments which sought to specify the amount of any recommended increase were defeated by narrow margins.

One amendment adopted said that while a price increase of 10 or 15 cents a barrel had been mentioned as possible, it would be inadequate. The need for a better return from crude was based, the association said, on these points:

1. If greater reserves are not discovered, it will be necessary to produce many more flowing wells in excessive amounts, destroying their benefits of orderly production.
2. The price at the well must be high enough to prevent premature abandonment of stripper wells. Abandonment has been accelerated because the sale value of equipment in some cases is higher than the value of the oil the wells can produce.
3. New oil discoveries have shown a trend to increase when prices are good, and to drop off when prices are low.
4. The price for crude must be sufficiently high to create an incentive for further exploration, necessarily hazardous, and a price that will make available financial resources for wildcatting.

70-Foot Sign Put Up For WTSC Homecoming

CANYON, Oct. 25—One of the largest neon signs in the Southwest will welcome ex-students of West Texas State college on Homecoming day, Nov. 8.

The sign, now nearing completion, will be placed on the highway opposite the campus. The project has been sponsored by the graduating class of last summer. Dr. S. H. Condon, sponsor of the class, has directed operations. College students of manual arts and men of the NYA project have built the framework for the sign.

The sign will bear the words "West Texas State." It will be 40 feet in elevation and 70 feet long. Capital letters will be five feet high and smaller letters four feet in height. Wording will be read from each direction.

Timely Tips Given On Turkey Market

COLLEGE STATION, Oct. 25—The year's biggest demand for turkeys is in the offing. It is timely, therefore, for producers to go over all remarkable birds carefully, much as livestockmen cut out their cattle, says George P. McCarthy, poultry husbandman of the A. and M. college extension service. Only those turkeys often referred to as "ripe" are in best condition to go to market.

Growers can determine whether birds have developed well in flesh by feeling the keel and along the shoulders and thighs. If they are well fleshed they examine further to see whether they have put on fat. This is best indicated by layers of fat found along the thin feather tract of the breast and on the thighs. Examination should continue to see whether they have developed pin feathers.

GROOM, Oct. 25—When the dust blew in the "Dust Bowl" it wasn't news; when it rains in the Panhandle in 1941 it isn't news; but some of the events at Groom happening in the mud are news. The weather-man keeps announcing rain, and for once, everyone believes him; it's news, too, for he is usually right.

Some of the Groom citizens keep using the old expressions, "I wish it would stop raining," "If it stops raining," or "When it stops raining." Some have resigned themselves to the fate of being "muddied in." Others have stopped all activities because of the weather. Some have done things, but not Postman Bert Bural. Mr. Bural carries the mail on two different rural routes, three days per week on each.

The roads have been so bad in 1941 that Mr. Bural has ruined his two cars. The rain kept falling and the roads getting worse; Mr. Bural, in desperation, bought a new Ford tractor to use in delivering the mail.

Many were doubtful of Mr. Bural's intentions with his tractor. They were partly convinced when he parked it in front of the post office. They were fully convinced when they got mail delivered by tractor. The tractor got through the mud, but Mr. Bural got wet. Now the tractor is equipped with a rain-proof cab.

Postmaster Gray, of Groom, doesn't know whether to ask for a stamp to put on mail sent "Via Tractor" as he has for that sent by air. He does know that his rural carrier is a resourceful man.

The school bus drivers are about as bad off as Mr. Bural was, but can't use his idea of the tractor. One of the buses has been unable to run for over a week. This seems bad, but a check on attendance at school shows that a larger per cent of pupils on that route were in attendance than those of other buses.

One bus crossed a creek and picked up a load of children, on returning to the creek it found the water over the bridge and had to back track, unload his children and come home by a detour route.

Come what may, the people of Groom know that they aren't in need of moisture. There's no danger of a dust storm at present. The seed to have adopted the words from the familiar song: "Don't begin complaining when it starts raining. What the earth is gaining should not make you sad."
