## Israel Demands Foreign Governments Uproot Arab Guerrillas Bases

JERUSALEM (AP) - Israel warned today it would hold the countries that assist Arab guerrillas responsible for the Munich Olympic murders, and demanded that world governments expel Arab terrorists from their territories

A government statement said it vowed to fight the guerrillas "and will not excuse those who aid them from responsibility.

Premier Golda Meir thanked the West German government for its efforts to free the Israeli hostages from their Arab captors. She voiced support for the German decision to use force against the terrorists.

In the statement, issued after an emergency Cabinet meeting. Mrs. Meir expressed regret that the rescue operation had failed.

The statement said Israel will demand foreign governments and political organizations take effective measures against Arab guerrilla cells operating abroad.

Such measures should be taken with the aim of paralyzing their activities and uprooting their bases it added

Israeli newspapers criticized West German security at the Olympic Games and demanded revenge from the Arab world.

The nation reeled with shock over the killing of 11 of the 29 members of its Olympic team. Only hours earlier. Mrs. Meir had drunk a cognac toast and the Jewish state had rejoiced over premature reports from Germany that nine Israeli hostages had been rescued.

Later came the terse official statement: "The

government of Israel announces in profound sorrow that 11 members of the Israeli Olympic delegation have been murdered by Arab terror-

Newscasters' voices cracked as they told the country of the massacre. Radio Israel's usual gay break ast music was replaced by the funeral march from Beethoven's Eroica Symphony. Even while Israel thought the hostages were

safe, newspapers called for reprisals. "War to the end against these murderous

organizations, their members, supporters and dispatchers, wherever they may be," urged the newspaper Davar.

"As far as Israel is concerned this is an act of war, not only by members of the terrorist organizations. but also by those Arab countries

whose open support for the munderous terrorists made possible this deed.

If they do not now eliminate the terrorist bases within their borders, Israel will undertake the task." Davar said.

## **U.S. To Take Step To Halt Terrorism** WASHINGTON (AP) - Pres- Nixon responded, "Naturally,

ident Nixon, after-bolstering security against terrorist attacks on Israeli citizens, ordered Secretary of State William P. Rogers today to consult other governments "on an urgent basis" to find ways to halt terrorism.

White House press secretary Ronald L. Ziegler said Nixon summoned Rogers and presidential adviser Henry Kissinger to a 75-minute early morning meeting in his office to discuss measures following the international drama of politics and violence at the Olympic Village in Munich, West Germany.

Nixon, who telephoned Israeli Prime Minister Golda Meir Tuesday, sent her a telegram today, saying the death of the athletes "is a tragedy for all the peoples and nations of the world

Ziegler said Nixon asked Rogers "to consult with other governments on an urgent basis as to what collective measures by the international community can be brought to bear on the problem of terrorism.

Congressmen, candidates and administration officials joined Nixon in condemning the assault which ended Tuesday with hostage in a burning helicopter. Two other Israeli athletes were shot dead when the Arab commandos invaded the Israeli Olympic compound in Munich early Tuesday Democratic presidential candidate George McGovern appealed for new determination to stop the killing ... before we come to believe that violence is the only way of life. Speaking in Los Angeles, he said. "Once again the shame of violence has stained our times. It is a recurring nightmare which shadows our brief years together as human beings

we cannot do anything with regard to what happens in other countries. That is their responsibility. primarily. except we can indicate our interest. He said he assured Mrs. Meir


that we would try to do everything we could with regard to groups of Israeli citizens traveling in the United States to see that where there is any information at all with regard to possible attempts of this sort. that adequate security measures are taken.

Asked for comment on the protection afforded Jewish members of the U.S. Olympic team. Nixon replied. "I am never satisfied with security when you see incidents like this. but I believe that we have adequate security measures."

But he continued. "As I have indicated, or at least implied in my remarks here, since we are dealing with international outlaws who are unpredictable, we have to take extra security measures ... to protect those who might be targets of this kind of activity in the future.

McGovern's running-mate. Sargent Shriver, found 150 Jewish students waiting to meet him on his hotel doorstep in Al bany. N.Y. They asked that McGovern and Shriver endorse economic or military sanctions against Arab states which may harbor terrorists.

If the elected servants are trustworthy, then they should have no concern that the various machinations of their functioning are a public matter. The present law allows closed sessions for reasons of security. property acquisition and discussion of personnel. The proposed amendment prompted by the growing spectre of organized labor within the teaching profession. would allow boards to plan bargaining strategy behind closed doors.

One proposal was aimed at the merger of school districts. It will ask that a petition signed by at least 10 per cent of the qualified electorate be required to bring about a consolidation election rather than the present 20 signatures.

Two of the provisions to be sought were influened by the new 18-year majority law. One would make it mandatory that a candidate for a place on a school board be 21 years old at the time he or she filed as a

candidate. The other, receiving its most enthusiastic support from college towns, would allow a school election to be called for any Saturday in the year rather than the present first-Saturdayin-April. Presumably, college towns would have such elections in the summer when the young vote would represent hometown youth rather than college students.



**Major Parties To Seek Mexican-American Votes** 

LOS ANGELES (AP) -Democrats and Republicans say the influence of Spanish-Americans is not going unnoticed as both parties bid to capture California in the upcoming presidential election. California contains the nation's largest Mexican-American population, with more than three million of the state's 20 million residents Spanishspeaking or Spanish-surnamed. Republicans say they may be able to lure a substantial number of votes from the traditionally Democratic Mexican-Americans.

Democrats say their strength may be cut but not because of Republican wooing.

Henry Ramirez, appointed director of the Cabinet Committee on Opportunity for the Spanish-speaking by President Nixon, says re-election of the President would insure progress for Mexican-Americans.

Louis Velasquez, director of the Spanish-speaking committee at Democratic presidential nominee George McGovern's local headquarters, concedes. We're obviously going to suffer a little bit this year. but for different reasons."

AMPI is one of the nation's largest milk cooperatives with more than 43,000 members from the Gulf Coast to the Canadian border

It was named as the defendant in a civil suit filed Feb. 1 by the Justice Department. which claims it has monopolized the sale of milk produced by dairy farmers in 14 states, ranging from Texas to Minnesota.

The San Antonio based cooperative has denied the government's charges.

Records on file Tuesday showed Judge Suttle ordered that certain Borden and Kraftco documents can be kept confidential, which as those dealing with cost and pricing information, profit and loss statements, customer lists and information on future plans.

Confidential documents would be available to consultants and lawyers for either side but would not be public record. The court will





Krueger said his department produced 12 bachelor degree students during the 1972-72 school year.

As for salaries. 43 per cent of the companies expect to pay \$7.000 to \$9.000 a year for the graduate. Forty-five per cent put the salary range at \$10.000 to \$12,000, and 12 per cent would prefer to negotiate

Krueger said the Texas poultry industry ranks high nationally and makes a significant contribution to the state's econom

Final figures of cash receipts from Texas poultry and eggs was \$22.6 million in 1970. the year for which the latest complete figures were available. Applying an input-output multiplier factor developed by agricultural economists. the receipts flowing into the economy amounted to \$961 million. Krueger said.

Dr. Osborn will identify the difficulties economists foresee and suggest possible solutions. Petroleum and groundwater in the 56-county area are exhaustible and non-renewable. Osborn savs.



**BATTIN' AROUND New Chapter Written On Forestry Of West** 

By C.R. BATTEN

A new chapter in the history of more than 100 years of controversy over the lands that make up the national forests of the West is now being written.

The latest episode in that chapter was set down Aug. 16. when District Judge Samuel Conti of the U.S. District Court of Northern California. San Francisco, approved a preliminary injunction against the Forest Service, to prevent the cutting of timber. building roads, or any other action that will change the wilderness character of any roadless area inside the national forests. He set a trial date of Nov. 9 in the case of Sierra Club et al vs. Butz et al.

This decision sets the stage for a long court battle that, in the words of a Sierra Club spokesman, involves, "the greatest mass of environment in litigation ever in American history." It is impossible to estimate the total affect of this decision

arts and crafts. For those who want to relax. they can sprawl on the grassy slopes of the Institute grounds for entertainment under the stars


More than 1.000 Texans from 84 cities will cover the institute's 1312 acres for the fourday celebration to show how Texans of all origins have

discovered what he calls "an inherited disposition" to pulmonary emphysema, the lung disease which is becoming increasingly common as smoking and other lung irritants increase.

Lieberman's work is only one of several medical ge netics projects being carried out at the City of Hope Medical Center here. He is in charge of the Center's Pulmonary Biochemistry Laboratory.

Lieberman says the first indication that emphysema might have an inherited quality was uncovered in a research project in Sweden a decade ago. The initial breakthrough indicated a recessive gene was responsible, and the Swedes who did the work estimated that possibly one per cent of emphysema cases were genetic in origin.

"It was treated as a medical curiosity, that's all," he says.

Lieberman took it more seriously, however. First at the Veterans' Administration Hospital in Long Beach, Calif., and then here at the City of Hope Medical Center, he began studying emphysema patients.

His studies apparently indicate that the genetic form of the disease is responsible for approximately half of all emphysema cases. And what is perhaps most curious about the research thus far is that there seems to be an ethnic, or national, derivation to these defective genes.

First, the House of Representatives rejected an amendment to a foreign military aid bill demanding withdrawal of all U.S. forces from Indochina by Oct. 1. pending a limited cease-fire and release of all U.S. prisoners of war by North Vietnam.

The 288-178 vote was called a "major victory" for the Nixon administration

The strange thing about such futile gestures is the significance attached to them by both their proponents and their opponents

Congress could pass any kind of war deadline it wanted to. That kicker about the war prisoners would immediately nullify it

And what if by some slim chance the expressed sentiment of Congress were to move North Vietnam to accept the terms, to announce it agreed to a ceasefire and was prepared to release all the prisoners right now in exchange for a complete U.S. withdrawal some months hence?

Isn't that exactly what President Nixon says he wants? Or isn't it?

Next. along came another in the string of celebrities to visit North Vietnam, the former attorney general. Ramsey Clark. charging the United States with inhuman acts of war against North Vietnam and with the deliberate and systematic bombing of its dikes and other civilian targets.

Clark served neither the

were true, the place to say it was not in Hanoi but in Harrisburg or Honolulu or Hackensack By condemning his own country in the camp of the enemy. Clark made himself an instrument of that enemy, an act which during World War II would have brought formal charges of treason.

But then the United States has never been in a war quite like this one

The entire controversy over the dikes is strange. When is a target a "civilian" target and when is it not? For that matter. when is a war a war and when is it not?

In World War II. the British deliberately and systematically bombed major dams in Germany. The objective was not only to knock out hydroelectric facilities but to inundate farmland. disrupt transportation. damage civilian

morale-and kill people. Next. Democratic vice presidential candidate Sargent Shriver claimed that President Nixon had had an opportunity to achieve a favorable peace settlement in Vietnam in 1969 and "blew it." At week's end. additional details seemed only

to add to the confusion. Meanwhile, presidential candidate George McGovern hammered at the theme that the President really did not want peace in Vietnam but merely to keep the Thieu regime in power. Finally, within hours of all these other events, it was announced that the last U.S. combat force was leaving South Vietman-and the heaviest

### **Inside Washington** Watergate Figure Fired, Then Hired by White House By ROWLAND EVANS and ROBERT NOVAK

WASHINGTON - G. Gordon Liddy. a central figure in the squalid Watergate case, was fired by the Treasury Department in July 1971 for insubordinate, unauthorized conduct on gun controls-and immediately found a cozy haven in the White House.

The official Nixon administration version of this strange story, both then and now. is that this was nothing but a routine transfer.

In fact, however, high Treasury officials were flabbergasted and furious when they learned the man they had fired quickly landed a coveted staff job on the White House Domestic Council. From there. Liddy went to the Nixon reelection committee--and subsequent notoriety--without ever having his troubles at the Treasury aired

This background points up two important facts about Liddy, who was fired from the reelection committee June 28 when he refused to answer Federal agents' questions about the June 17 break-in at the plush Watergate's Democratic national headquarters: First. Liddy has a record of

free-wheeling without regard for the desires of his superiors: second, he has been protected and supported by senior officials at the White House and has their blessing to this day. Liddy came to the Treasury in 1969 with a background in law enforcement and right-wing politics in upstate New York. As assistant district attorney in Dutchess County, ex-FBI agent Liddy ran for Congress in 1968

NRA here April 4. 1971. when Liddy--without authorization or approval--delivered a speech praising NRA goals and indicating a helping hand against gun controls by the Nixon administration.

His Treasury superiors outraged, that was the end of Liddy there. But he suffered not a day of unemployment. While in the Treasury. Liddy had worked closely with Egil (Bud) Krogh. top aide to White House

domestic policy chief John Ehrlichman. Without even checking the Treasury. the White House elevated Liddy on July 19, 1971, to the lofty reaches of Ehrlichman's office. working under Krogh.

Ehrlichman told us this week he was not aware of Liddy's problems at the Treasury. Krogh would not talk to us but relayed word that he, too, was unaware of the gun-control difficulty.

When the Nixon reelection committee opened up in late 1971. Krogh recommended Liddy as committee counsel. The campaign officials soon encountered the difficulties experienced by the Treasury: Liddy did not follow orders. Routine political assignments went undone.

But nobody in the Nixon campaign structure ever gets fired for such reasons. Liddy was shunted off to Nixon fund-raising operations headed by Maurice Stans, and there he found a happy home. establishing an intimate relationship with Stans which flourished until the Watergate caper

BLOOMINGTON, Ind. (AP) Attorney Oscar R. (Jack) Ewing, 1910 alumnus of Indiana University, has been revealed as the donor of the giant red stabile in front of the new I. U Musical Arts Center.

The stabile is designed by sculptor Alexander Calder and entitled "Peau Rouge Indiana" (Indiana Redskin). It stands 40 feet high, is made of steel plates held together with bolts and is painted a bright orangered. A bold contrast to the center, it is considered part of the design of the building.





'Aliya' is the Hebrew word for the return of Jews to their homeland in Israel and some of that emigration from the United States has come in the form of a miniature brain drain.

Where Israelis used to worry about losing some of their best scientists to the high bidding of U.S. industry, there's pride in the fact that Israel is now attracting Jewish Americans to responsible positions.

One of the places where this limited scientific and educational emigration from the United States can be sampled is Israel's Technion, the technical university high on the Carmel Hills of Haifa. Mathematician Prof. Alfred Inselberg came to Israel last year from the University of Southern California and described his decision as positive not negative.

"I don't think of it in terms of having left the United States, but rather in terms of having come to Israel. In fact, one of the most difficult parts of being in Israel is the thought that I've left the United States which I was very fond of. And it was not a leaving because I was discontent, but perhaps un-



### Q And A

Q. My mother recently died and left a large doctor bill. How can a claim for medicare be filed?

A. In a death case, there are two ways the claim can be filed. If the doctor agreed for Medicare to pay him directly. he can complete the request for Medical payment form and only his signature is needed on this form. Medicare then pays the allowable charge directly to him, less the 20 per cent co-insurance and the yearly deductible of \$50. Under the other method of payment. Medicare will reimburse the person who paid the doctor bills. Again payment will be 80 per cent of the allowable charge. less the yearly deductible of \$50. If this method of payment is selected, the person who paid the doctor will need to file a request for medical payment with Medicare and include an itemized receipted doctor's statement. A word of caution-be sure the doctor's statement shows who paid the bill. Contact your social security office for assistance.

Q. Is there a premium payable for the Medicare insurance

A. There are two parts to Medicare. Part A. hospital insurance, and Part B. medical insurance, better known as the doctor bill insurance. There is no premium to be paid for the hospital insurance as part of your social security tax that you pay during your working years goes towards the payment of this insurance protection. There is a monthly premium payment for the doctor bill insurance. with the Federal Government contributing the same amount from general revenues to cover. the cost. If you receive a monthly check. the premium will be deducted from your check. If you are not receiving a check from social security. you will be billed every three months for your insurance. When you receive your notice of payment, a self-addressed envelope will be included for you to send your payment in. You will also be given instructions on how to prepare the check or money order.
