Sixty Tickets For Speeding

Speeders, beware! Records Peace and City Corporation cuffed. Judge Morris Nowlin, show the whopping number of 60 speeding tickets issued in Bailey County by members of the Texas Highway Patrol during the first 10

days of June. Muleshoe City Police officers ing the same period of time.

In other violations in the JP books are three for running stop signs; two each for no driver's license and failure to drive in a single lane; and one ticket for each of the following violations: failure to yield right of way; improper left turn; drunk in public; minor consumption (of liquor); driving on wrong side of road; drunk pedestrian and driving while

intoxicated. Cases heard in city court or filed on the city docket include: three on drunk charges; two for no driver's license, speeding and minor possession and consumption of liquor and one each for the following violations: improper start from parked position; failure to yield right of way; expired driver's license; passing on the wrong side and failure to control vehicle.

Judge Nowlin said that as far as he knows, the sixty tickets issued during the first 10 days of this month may be an alltime high in speeding tickets issued in this area. He also commented that the officers and he are not just attempting to add to the city and state coffers by fining violators, but are in an attempt to stop some of the flagrant violations and perhaps save lives, property and in-



The 1968 Pontiac driven by Mrs. Molloy spun out of control in the 1000 Block on West American Blvd, and hit a metal light pole in front of the Art

The right front of the automobile was caved in with part of the right side of the dash resting against the front seat. The car was estimated to have at least \$1300 in damage with Southwestern Public Service Company estimating \$200 damage to the light pole which snapped some large bolts and leaned precariously in a severe sandstorm which was blasting Muleshoe at the time of the accident.

A small dog riding in the car received a cut over its eye and was taken to a local veterinarian for treatment.

Mrs. Molloy is undergoing treatment in the local hospital for a broken nose, abrasions and possible internal injuries. Her husband said she had been staying with her mother, who is seriously ill in a Clovis hospital, and had fallen asleep while returning to Lubbock.



With grain selling at \$1.75, this cost will be \$4.90 per acre. So, if weed control costs are less than this, a control program will be profitable.

"Although several chemical products are being offered this year," add Smith and Wiese, we are still working with the same chemicals that we have always depended on." Herbicides available are Milogard. Herban, a mixture of Herban and Milogard and mixtures of Lorox and Milogard. In the past we have not had some of the blends that are available this

Milogard, formerly sold as propazine, is the most widely used preemergence in grain sorghum. It is a reliable, relatively inexpensive chemical that has done the job for growers in the past. Some growers may have experienced carryover problems. However, if Milogard is sprayed at recommended rates in a 10 to 20-inch band, there is no reason why cotton can't be planted the following year, contend the scientists.

"One of the main reasons for using a combination mixture is to minimize residue problems the following year," explain Smith and Wiese, "Milogard has long soil residual while Herban and Lorox have shorter residual periods."

The Herban-Propazine mixture, generally sold as Herban 21P, has been effective and may control some additional weed species that neither chemical will control alone, However, as far as crop injury is concerned, this mixture is not any safer than propazine alone and should not be used on loamy sand or sandy soil. Herban 21A, a Herban-Atrazine preemerge mixture, is not re-commended for Texas but is used in northern areas of the

Two Lorox-Propazine mixtures are also available -- LOP-65, sold as a wettable prowder, and Pro-Lin, a flowable suspension. Growers would want to use these two mixtures primarily on Loam or Heavier soils, advise the scientists. However, LOP-65 or Pro-Lin can be used on sandy loam
