

"It is fortunate for Texas that other states have taken their fund-raising responsibility mor seriously. Otherwise, it would not have been possible for your county to have received \$4,095, Texas chapters \$737,068.77 through NFIP Epidemic Aid Services in addition to \$67,684.61 contributed by Texas chapters to the Texas Polio Fund Committee. Advances to Texas chapters in 1948 totaled \$520,615.42

.The financial situation is so serious that we must do our share and more this year if we want to be sure of taking care of polio in Gray County and Texas. We aren't through with the epidemic of 1948. It is estimated that \$900,000 will have to be spent this coming year on 1948 Texas patients, some 275 of whom are still hospitalized. Comparable sums will be spent elsewhere. We do not know what 1949 will add to our responsibilities. At best it will take a lot of money, more than we have ever raised in any previous cam-

paign.
Texas must be a leader in this year's campaign, and I know you will want your county to be one of the leading counties of the state.

The road resumed operations un-der a 90-day truce between the railway brotherhoods and the management, to permit the hauling of water to Archer City, faced with a water crisis.


