

Down the Years With the Dollar



If you think your dollar doesn't go as far as it used to, you're right. A dollar today buys about the same amount of hamburger that 61 cents bought in 1939. This chart, based on figures from the National Industrial Conference Board, shows how the value of the buck has bounced up and down. Two wars brought the biggest changes. Note how the pre-World War I dollar bought about \$1.37 worth of goods, while the post-World War I dollar slipped to *8 cents in 1920. In exactly the same way, the pre-World War II dollar, good for about a buck's worth, collapsed to its all-time low, At the peak of the depression, April, 1933, the dollar was worth almost \$1.20. For a tiny ray of hope for your hard-pressed buck today, note that little upward turn down in 1948's corner.





SECTION FIFTEEN—All garbage or trash that is mixed with water or other liquids shall, be drained and wrapped before being put in the can of receptacle, except slop and waste placed in a special can therefor as provided in Section No. Four.

All animal matter that is subject to decomposition shall be well wrapped before being deposited in con-


