The Most Dangerous Part About Irredeemable Paper Money There is a group of patriotic citizens in the United States that

is attempting to perform a great service to the American people, It is known as the Economist National Committee on Monetary Policy. A man by the name of Philip M. McKenna is making a great attempt to get people to realize what is happening to them. Mr. McKenna is a manufacturer. Ten years ago he started a business with 10 men. No he has 600. The amount of energy he is putting in trying to put over this idea to the country, it seems, would leave him mighty little time for his own usiness. He is issuing a series of oulletins and sending throughout the nation explaining the end result of irredeemable pa-per money. In his last bulletin he iscusses statements made by Randolph E. Paul in the November, 1948, issue of "The Tax Law Review". He shows how badly Mr. Paul is confused. Mr. Paul says:

"In fact a revolution has taken place in economic thinking in the last 15 years. We have found that nations desert what we once regarded as eternal verities like the gold standard; indeed our country is now embarrassed by the posses-sion of too much of the world's gold supply. etc. etc." Now I quote from Mr. McKen

"I think I may be of real service to Mr. Paul and others who may be suffering from 'that delightful feeling of wisdom so much greater than that of our fathers in economic matters.' Events, sooner or later would inexorably relieve them of that gratification which their 'monkeying' with 'eternal verities' has brought about, that gratification which they inwardly feel but modestly refrain from ex-

pressing. "Mr. Paul says first, that economists have made a 'discovery' in the past 15 years, namely 'that the inancial skies do not fall when nations desert what were once regarded as eternal verities like the gold standard.' 





**Low-Cost Expansion Cottage** 





This attractive frame cottage which can be built by easy stages at a cost well below \$5,000 for a complete two-bedroom home, was developed by Michigan State College, East Lansing, Michigan. For economical construction, the floor is a 4-inch concrete slab. Standard insulated frame construction is recommended by the College. Fireproof mineral wool in full-thick batts is the most widely used form of insulation, according to the U.S. Department of Commerce. This cottage can start with a basic 14' x 22' structure costing under \$2,500 and containing bathroom, kitchen and living-bed-dining-room. Plans call for placing gables on each side of the basic structure for later addition of two 9' x 12' wings. One wing will provide a bedroom, the other a porch, which if enclosed, will make another bedroom. Sheets of building-board make the low-cost interior finish. If the budget does not permit, the basic 14' x 22' room can be erected as a shell and used as a summer home until wings, insulation and wall finish can be added.
