

Crucial decisions by legislators postponed

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) - Texas legislators. facing a Monday midnight deadline, put off crucial decisions Saturday on state spending and congressional redistricting until Monday

Failure to reach agreement on either subject could bring on a special session. A Saturday night meeting of a

conference committee to negotiate a compromise on congressional redistricting discussed Senate-House differences for an hour then agreed to meet again Sunday.

There were no votes takes or a compromise congressional redistricting plan offered.

The House adjourned until 2 p.m. Sunday but the Senate session dragged on past 10 p.m. as Sen. Lloyd Doggett. D-Austin, staged a delaying talk against a bill to continue the state regulation of doctors.

The House voted late Saturday to reopen compromise talks on the general appropriations bill, by a 74-50 vote and demanded that the House-Senate conference committee add another \$28 million to increase teachers ssalaries

A fingerprint expert testified in the Corpus Christi trial Thursday that the palm print pressed into the drying blood on Sarah Donn Lawrence's left leg tied Jay Kelly Pinkerton to the stabbing death

Two state witnesses also testified that a second palm print lifted from a coffee table in Mrs. Pinkerton's home also tied Pinkerton to the murder scene

Pinkerton was living not far from the Lawrence home at the time of the murder. He was arrested four hours after the stabbing death was discovered.

FBI agent Belcastro testified that he could not get a match on the palm prints left at the scene for some time after the murder. After working with the print. Belcastro discovered it had been left in blood, therefore altering the print. He worked with the print and testified that it has in excess of 12 points of comparison to known prints of Pinkerton.

Pampa High School Fieldhouse was filled to capacity Friday night to watch 266 seniors receive their high school diplomas from School Superintendent Bob Phillips, Principal Paul Pavne, Vice Principal Andy Andrews and Assistant Principal Jane Steele.

The 1981 Class Valedictorian Debbie Drudl told family, friends and seniors

that this was their last time together and the fact may not have hit them yet. But what do we do now?" Drudl asked

"Many of us don't know what we want to do next week - let alone what to do with the rest of our lives," she said.

This is the last time we will be together as the Pampa High School Class of 1981. Some of us may work. Some may go to college, but all of us want to be successful.

"Everyone needs a different thing to make us successful. We must control our own destiny. Only we can make the

decision, the intelligent decisions in our lives. To make no decision at all is to let someone else run our lives. We cannot sit back and wait for our dreams to come true. "It is up to you." Drudl said.

Class Salutatorian Don Braswell said, "We have spent 12 years in schools, learning names, dates and places, but it is all worthless unless we can communicate. Our minds are like books, now and then new pages are added. We must be able to share our books with others.

"Anvone can talk, but only some can listen - it takes a special person to be able to listen.

Class President Rodney Brewer thanked the school board members, school teachers and staff for the past 12 years

"On the last day of school, we walked down the halls and through a small door that leads to a big world

"The school has protected us, but no more.

"Now we must choose college, careers and goals in our lives. A person decides on his goals by what he wants

the most. "We will depend on God, and our families. which are a gift from God. We will need true friends and our country.

"I challenge each and every one of you graduating to work for what you want." Brewer said.





HANOL Vietnam (AP) - Vietnam projects - including the search for U.S. has promised to continue searching for the remains of Americans missing in action after it announced the bodies of three more GIs will be returned to the United States. "We are pretty damn happy." said the leader of the U.S. delegation that got the news.

"The Vietnamese office for seeking missing persons has informed the U.S. side that three sets of remains have been found, and the two parties will discuss a date for their return." Vu Hoang, head of the Vietnamese search team, said Friday. "The Vietnamese government, prompted by good will and humanitarian spirit, will continue the search process.

Hoang described the latest negotiations as having been held in a 'very favorable' climate.

He also said the recovery of American remains has been a slow process because of the hostility some Vietnamese still feel toward the United States

He said some of this hostility stemmed from U.S. "approval" of China's month-long invasion of Vietnam in 1979. Hoang said the attack had drawn resources away from other

MIAs. Hoang's promises to keep up the search were made shortly before the three-man delegation ended its visit to

Hanoi and flew to Bangkok Saturday. 'We are pretty damn happy." said Lt. Col. Joseph Harvey, head of the delegation and commander of the Defense Department's Joint Casualty Resolutions Center in Hawaii.

Harvey and two officials from the U.S. Embassy in Bangkok, Lt. Col. Paul Mather and James Tully, flew on to the Thai capital to begin arranging for the remains to be flown out of Vietnam The servicemen's names were being

withheld pending positive identification in Hawaii

The last time Vietnam returned American war dead was in August 1978. when authorities gave a visiting congressional delegation the remains of 11 U.S. servicemen.

Since the 1973 Paris cease-fire agreement, a total of 71 sets of remains have been returned, and intermittent talks have been held between U.S. and

opera "L'Elisir d'Amore." As Adina. the only female role in the opera. Ms. Johnson will sing opposite Luciano Pavarotti, the world's leading tenor. Ms. Johnson is the daughter of Mr.

and Mrs. Rex Rose of 505 N. Gray and a 1968 graduate of Pampa High School.

Some 20 years ago, Pavarotti won a similar international competition in Italy, which launched his brilliant career. Wishing to give today's young talent a comparable opportunity, he auditioned more than 500 singers from all over the world.

From these, he invited 78 to participate in the competition held last week in Philadelphia. Of these, 29 were selected to sing in the finals Saturday night. At that time, 19 were named to casts in two operas to be presented by the Philadelphia Opera Company next spring. The second opera is "La Boheme.'' which will also star Pavarotti.

Both operas will be nationaly telecast in May 1982.

Ms. Johnson studied in New York this past winter. One class was conducted by John Wustman.' Pavarotti's coach accompanist. He encouraged her to sing for Pavarotti, and she was auditioned by him in February.

In addition to voice, she has studied Italian, German, French and Spanish. Her diction coach during the spring was Nio Castel of the Metropolitan Opera Company.

Ms. Johnson explained that it is quite difficult for a beginner to obtain a manager. She said, "The artist manager for Columbia Artists has been interested in me and has followed my career for about a year. Early in May, they offered me a contract. Bessie Crittenden is now my manager, and I am very fortunate to have signed with her. She is not only capable and aggressive, but is also easy to work with.

Even as she was talking, the telephone rang. It was her manager calling from New York to tell Ms. Johnson that the Houston Opera Company was requesting her to audition for the role of Musetta in "La Boheme'' Friday

When asked about her voice range, she said. "When I was in high school, I sang first alto, but my voice has matured, and I am now clased as a

spinto - dramatic coloraturo soprano. My voice is just now beginning to achieve its full range

Her most recent performance was with the New York Opera Company in March. She sang the role of Agathe in "Der Freischutz." She won the role as a result of what is known as a "cattle call audition." No invitations are issued, and consequently, large numbers of aspiring singers appear.

Ms. Johnson has given numerous concerts and has performed scenes from more than a dozen well - known operas.

In October she appeared with the Amarillo Symphony Orchestra in the Beethoven 9th and in February with the El Paso Pro Musica in "Brahms Requiem.

Ms. Johnson has won numerous competitions prior to her latest triumph. Among these are: Post Advanced Division of the National Association of Teachers of Singing Contest (National Convention), Houston, 1978; Regional Metropolitan Opera Auditions, 1980; National Metropolitan Opera Semi - Finalist, 1980: and Aims Summer Vocal Institute Scholarship, 1980.

She has received encouragement and

praise from a variety of sources. Lee Shaenen of the Chicago Lyric Opera School said. "You are too advanced for our lyric school. You should be singing in an opera house in Europe.

Theodore Uppman of the Metropolitan Opera wrote. "She does not really have any idea how truly talented she is.

Ms. Johnson earned a B.M.E. degree from Texas Tech University in 1972 and an M.M. degree from West Texas State University in 1978. She has since studied with outstanding musicians throughout the Southwest, in addition to intensive studies in New York.

Currently, she is on a leave of absence from her position as head of the vocal music department and opera workshop at Amarillo College. She formerly taught at McMurry College in Abilene.

Radiating poise and self - confidence. she said of her career. "When I graduated from high school, I never dreamed of going into opera. Since I had made all - state choir for two consecutive years, I decided my voice was good enough to enable me to major in music education at Tech. But as my voice began to develop, my instructors

She continued, "Rosemary Lawler was my very first voice teacher. Gene Kenney at Texas Tech and Hugh Sanders and Jerry Doan of West Texas were especially helpful to me."

When asked to relate any special incidents which she considered significant, the attractive young women laughed and said, "Early in May I was scheduled to sing for Beverly Sills. On that same morning, my small daughter and a friend were leaving New York to return to Amarillo, I was worried about them getting to the air

welfare ceiling State increases

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) - A constitutional amendment that would raise the state welfare ceiling gained final legislative approval on Saturday.

A 115-16 vote in the House put the measure on the November 1982 general election ballot.

The ceiling on welfare payments from state tax money has been \$80 million a year since 1970. If the constitutional amendment is approved by the voters, the ceiling would be 1 percent of the state budget.

That means that under the state budget bill pending before both houses of the Legislature, the ceiling would be about \$130 million a year.

The welfare budget also includes federal funds.

Rep. Craig Washington, D-Houston, had pushed the measure through the House with no limit, but senators amended it attach the floating ceiling that would allow total welfare

Nimitz pilot to be buried near A&M

COLLEGE STATION, Texas (AP) - Funeral services for the Marine pilot of the plane that crashed on the flight desk of the USS Nimitz will held Thursday on the grounds of Texas A&M University, officials said.

Capt. Steven E. White, 27, graduated from A&M in 1976. He will be buried with military graveside rites in College Station City Cemetery following 2 p.m. memorial services at All Faith Chapel on the A&M campus.

White's Marine EA6B prowler crashed into a row of parked planes during a night landing on the Nimitz. The plane's three-man crew and 11 Navy men on the deck of the carrier perished in the crash.

White had married Air Force Capt. Ann M. White, an operating room nurse, only three weeks before the accident. He was stationed at Cherry Point, N. C. His wife is assigned to Patrick Air Force Base in Satellite Beach, Fla

In addition to his wife. White is survived by his father. Charles H. White of Houston; his mother, Mrs. Mary Spivey of Houston, two brothers and four sisters.





Local opinion Rezoning raises questions

A resident questioned the legality of the city's action last week in approving zoning for mobile homes in the 700 blocks of Nelson, Sumner and Faulkner Streets, presented as a renumbered ordinance

His questions, we feel, are warranted.

According to the city attorney, all the legally required steps were taken by the city commission

It seems the whole thing happened this way: The owner of one lot approached the zoning board and requested a zone change to place a mobile home on her lot. Because this would constitute "spot zoning," a bad thing to zoning experts, it was suggested that the area be expanded to include the 700 blocks of Nelson. Sumner and Faulkner, the only blocks in that area not already zoned for mobile homes.

The zoning board's survey of landowners indicated more favored the rezoning than were against it, so they voted in favor of the rezoning. and sent the request to the city commission

On April 28, a large group of angered residents against the rezoning — one who said the rezoning would create a "hell hole" for senior citizens - confronted the city commission. According to the residents' house - to - house survey of landowners, the vote was 15 to 11 against rezoning. The commission dropped the issue like a hot potato. The motion to approve the rezoning

have come closer to making the one resident involved and all the neighbors much happier in this situation

Second, why did the city fathers drop the issue like a hot potato only to pick it up later and do what they wanted to do in the first place?

(Which brings to mind that old cliche - if you can't stand the heat, get out of the kitchen.)

Third, why was the ordinance simply renumbered and resubmitted without going back to the zoning board for reconsideration - without again going through the public notification process?

The fact that the city's actions were "legal" according to the city charter does not make their actions just" or in the best interests of the people they're supposed to be serving

Whether the city's charter DearSir requires it or not, our city commissioners are there to serve our interest - to do what seems best for us whether it's a legal requirement or not

Fourth, why didn't the mayor let the people speak at the first reading of the newly renumbered ordinance? Aren't city commission meetings open to the public? Isn't the public allowed to speak to its rulers - on any subject - in an open, public session? Or is that merely another inconvenience that can be subverted when city dads are tired of listening? We admit the city commission was

Jury acquits anti-Castro exiles in diplomat's death

Saturday acquitted two anti-Castro Cuban exiles in their retrial on murder charges brought in connection with the 1976 five counts related to the slaying. bomb-slaying of leftist diplomat Orlando Letelier of Chile.

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However, the jury convicted one of the defendants. Guillermo Novo Sampol. 41. of two counts of perjury before a grand jury. Novo and co-defendant Alvin Ross Diaz, 48,

were convicted of murder and sentenced to life imprisonment in 1979, but an appeals court overturned the verdict, saying the defendants' cellmates should not have been called to testify against them.

In their retrial, the two men again faced possible maximum sentences of life imprisonment on charges of murder. murder with explosives and conspiring to murder in of a U.S. government that felt the need to the Letelier assassination.

NEW DELHI. India (AP) - Troops led by a major general killed Bangladesh President Ziaur Rahman in Chittagong Saturday and said they took over the government, broke relations with India and had havy support. But officials in Dacca said they were in charge, set up a state of emergency and curfew and told the rebels to surrender.

The United News of India reported that two aides and six bodyguards were killed with the Bangladesh president, that there were heavy clashes between loyalist and rebel troops in

the Chittagong area. and that Indian police were on alert on the Tripura state frontier on the east side of Rangladesh to prevent a possible influx of refugees. streets in

Loyalist troops were reported patron. Dacca, the Bangladesh capital 140 miles

Vice President Abdus Sattar took control in Dacca, declared an internal emergency and put near-martial law restrictions on the impoverished South Asian nation of 90 million. Dacca Radio reported.

Sattar announced that Bangladesh would continue to honor all international treaties and commitments. Relations with India. Bangladesh's giant neighbor and ally in Bangladesh's.







DJ's slip of lip costs job, \$10,000

FORT WORTH. Texas (AP) - Bob Lashbrook says a slipped disc - of sorts - cost him his job and the radio station where he worked part-time a \$10,000 contest prize.

The 60-year-old full-time carpenter and weekend disc jockey at KSCS-FM in Fort Worth says his problems began Monday while he was filling in for another announcer.

The station, nearing the end of a three-month ratings war and fighting to retain its top spot in the Fort Worth market. had promised to pay \$10.000 to any listener who heard a disc jockey failing to play three songs without interruption.

Lashbrook, who has worked as a disc jockey since 1942. says he played two songs Monday afternoon, then keyed his microphone to do a commercial. But he realized his mistake and gave only the station's call letters, then played the third song in the "three in a row" package.

It was too late. A sharp-eared listener heard the goof and wrote the station, demanding prize money.

"Every stations has promotions and giveaways." Lashbrook said Friday after he had been fired. "but when they give something away here, they get mad about it."

They (station officials) threatened the announcers that we'd lose our jobs if we did anything to make them pay, but no one really expected them to carry out the threat.

He said station management verified the mistake by listening to tapes, then asked an attorney's advice to see if they had to pay

While station officials would not comment on the incident. a source at the station said the attorney told them they had to pay the money

That's when R.T. Simpson, the network program director. payed Lashbrook a visit at his carpentry shop.

"He (Simpson) had all of my personal stuff and this little envelope in his hand." Lashbrook said. "I asked him if I was through. He said I was and that was that

Gail O'Brien, another part-time disc jockey at the station. said she quit six weeks ago after being told at a staff meeting that anyone who violated the "three in a row" policy would be fired

"I told them I wouldn't run the contest or work under that kind of duress where you can be fired for an honest human error." she said. "There's no way a part-timer can work under that pressure.

Station general manager Warren Potash said he would not comment until "Monday or Tuesday" on Lashbrook's firing. Meanwhile. Lashbrook says he's going to take a trip to California to see his newborn grandson. He delayed the vacation because he thought he would be needed to fill in for vacationing announcers at the station.

"I'm sure going to see my first grandchild." he said. And if I knew the name of the guy who won the money. I'd ask him for half

Oil probe targets file bankruptcy

OKLAHOMA CITY (AP) - Bankruptcy petitions have been filed by a Shawnee man and two companies that are targets of an investigation by the Oklahoma Securities Commission.

Cov Everett, his wife. Shelee Dene Everett, and the CSC Oil Group Co. and Freedom Energy Corp., all of Shawnee, filed the petitions in Oklahoma City federal court late Thursday

The assets of the two firms were frozen last week by District Judge Raymond Naifeh in the wake of a lawsuit by several investors. The Securities Commission filed court action May 21 to halt the investments while the loss of up to \$15 million by investors is investigated.

The bankruptcy papers' showed Everett, a 26-year-old former Shawnee high school football star, owes \$17.28 million, including \$250.000 in federal taxes. \$40,000 in state taxes and - \$16.76 million in investor claims.

Securities Commission officials say they are investigating complaints by several people who said they invested money in the oil firms after being guaranteed a quick return on their investment, plus a 50 percent profit.

The bankruptcy filings list 43 oil leases, worth an estimated * \$1.8 million, as held by Everett. The leases are listed as numbers, pictures of How many times have you located in Beaver. Payne. Pottawatomie. Texas. Seminole,

Hispanics plan challenge of redistricting plan

civil rights group said Saturday they expect the Congressional redistricting plan to be challenged in court.

"The state, to my knowledge, has never adopted a plan that stood up in court." said George Korbel, an attorney for Texas Rural Legal Aid.

Korbel has been involved in voting rights litigation since 1970. and represented plaintiffs in the 1971 suit that challenged legislative apportionments made after the last census.

'I'm sure there's going to be litigation no matter what." he said, explaining that Republicans, blacks and hispanics objected - for different reasons - to both the House and Senate plans for Congressional districts.

Because Texas is covered by the Voting Rights Act. the redistricting plan must be approved by the U.S. Attorney San Antonio and north of District 15, now represented by U.S.

Since moths do not feed on anything where they are resting and are protected by a heavy coating of scales. sprays will not provide any immediate or spectacular results

POTATO PLANTS? Gardeners sometimes find extraordinary things, such as growing on 'tomatoes' potato plants. Usually the imeediate reaction is that potato plants have become crossed with tomatoes. However, that's not the

case at all. Actually, the potato plants are blooming. The green fruit found on potato plants are commonly called potato seed balls that result from pollination and fertilization of potato blooms.

producing true seed. Plants which are grown from these true seed produce small potatoes about one inch in size. This process results in new improved varieties.

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

DEAR ELEANOR: Here it is:

PLEASE, GOD, I'M ONLY 17

The day I died was an ordinary school day. How I wish I had taken the bus! But I was too cool for the bus. I remember how I wheedled the car out of Mom. "Special favor," pleaded. "All the kids drive." When the 2:50 bell rang, I threw all my books in the locker. I was free until 8:40 tomorrow morning! I ran to the parking lot, excited at the thought of driving a car and being my own boss. Free!

It doesn't matter how the accident happened. I was goofing off - going too fast. Taking crazy chances. But I was enjoying my freedom and having fun. The last thing I remember was passing an old lady who seemed to be going awfully slow. I heard the deafening crash and felt a terrific jolt. Glass and steel flew everywhere. My whole body seemed to be turning inside out. I heard myself scream.

Suddenly I awakened; it was very quiet. A police officer was standing over me. Then I saw a doctor. My body was mangled. I was saturated with blood. Pieces of jagged glass were sticking out all over. Strange that I couldn't feel anything.

Hey, don't pull that sheet over my head. I can't be dead. I'm only 17. I've got a date tonight. I am supposed to grow up and have a wonderful life. I haven't lived yet. I can't be dead.

Later I was placed in a drawer. My folks had to identify me. Why did they have to see me like this? Why did I have to look at Mom's eyes when she faced the most terrible ordeal of her life? Dad suddenly looked like an old man. He told the man in charge, "Yes, he is my son.

The funeral was a weird experience. I saw all my relatives and friends walk toward the casket. They passed by, one by one, and looked at me with the saddest eyes I've ever seen. Some of my buddies were crying. A few of the girls touched my hand and sobbed as they walked away.

Please . . . somebody . . . wake me up! Get me out of here! I can't bear to see my mom and dad so broken up. My grandparents are so racked with grief they can hardly walk. My brother and sisters are like zombies. They move like robots. In a daze, everybody! No one can believe this. And I can't believe it, either.

Please don't bury me! I'm not dead! I have a lot of living to do! I want to laugh and run again. I want to sing and dance. the whole world. All I want is one more chance



Fast food double price of home-cooked

COOKING, STOP HEATING Accept a challenge to stop heating and start cooking with microwaves. Explore all of the basic cooking possibilities, and use microwaves for roasting. simmering and baking.

First, experiment with recipes and techniques in the microwave oven user's manual. Learn to use the oven to perform all these techniques. Then progress to an easy - to - follow cookbook or simple recipes. Be sure to use appropriate microwave utensils

A variety of cooking utensils go directly from the microwave to the table, saving both serving and cleanup times. These include glass, plastic and glass ceramic accessories. Or use

pressed paper products for preparing foods which contain little liquid or fats. excessive. The percentage of



FAST FOODS: NUTRITION, COST

Learn about the cost of 'fast foods' versus home cooked meals, and about their nutrition. Home - cooked or "fast food" meals are about the same in nutrition, but not in calories or in cost. More and more women in the labor force or other busy lifestyle are sending Americans out to eat. especially "fast foods." Specifically, how do fast foods compare. in cost and nutrition. with home - cooked meals? One USDA comparison shows that fast food chain meals are as nutritious as their homemade counterparts but cost about twice as much.

For example, in the Washington, D.C. area in July 1976. a hamburger (or cheeseburger). french fries and soft drink cost about 1.8 times as much as it would have at home, and dessert (apple pie) cost 3.5 times as much

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Cable News Network gives its subscribers real-life drama

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ATLANTA (AP) - While millions evoured the cardboard-and-greasepaint emotion of TV's "General Hospital" late last March, subscribers to Cable News Network had front row seats for real-life courtroom drama, as actress Carol Burnett defended her reputation in a libel suit against the National Enquirer.

CNN, with nearly 6 million subscribers nationwide, reported live a developing story that would attract only passing notice on the major networks' evening newscasts, and just a bit more attention when the verdict was announced.

"We've been tested on every sort of classic television story - the election, the hostages' release, a shooting at the president, the space shuttle - we've passed them all," says Reese Schonfeld, CNN's president.

The Burnett story was something that interested me," says Schonfeld, momentarily relaxed in his office above CNN's state-of-the-art newsroom. "We can do those things because we have the

CNN, a year old June 1, has by most standards established itself journalistically, providing a mix of news and features for an audience that has grown steadily from less than 2 million at the start. And there is some indication now that the commercial networks have begun to feel the

competitive pinch. A week or so after the attempted assassination of President Reagan. ABC News complained that CNN had used videotape of the shooting to which it was not entitled.

"I think there's concern," Schonfeld reflects, "that we're a lot better than what they thought we'd be.

Early in May, CNN went to court against the three major networks and the White House to break up what it called "predatory and illegal practices" in the pooling of TV coverage in Washington.

There is an unmistakeable air of confidence at CNN, and not without reason: Losses, an anticipated \$2 million a

month at the beginning and probably

greater than that, are now reported to be less than \$1 million monthly, with "a little black ink" forecast for late fall.

 The audience, 1.8 million subscribers at the start, is increasing at a rate of 300,000 to 350,000 a month, approaching a projected 8.8 million to 10 million by the end of 1981.

- Advertisers, less than two dozen on June 1, now number about 100, with rates ranging from \$150 to \$800 for a 30-second spot, depending on time and projected audience.

We're two or three years ahead of schedule as far as overall quality.' says R.E. "Ted" Turner, the flamboyant owner of the Atlanta Braves baseball team who created CNN and whose money - and enthusiasm - fuel the one-of-a-kind operation. "I couldn't be prouder.

"We anticipate seeing a little black ink in October-November," says Turner, who expected to lose about \$25 million in the first year. "We'll go back in the red around the first of next year. and then in the black for good in March or April.







Mrs. Posey is a 40-hour-per week, fulltime employee of Liberty National Bank and Trust Co. of Oklahoma City. Her office is in the den of her home just east of this southern Oklahoma town about 150 miles away near the shores of Lake Texoma.

"I can just get out of bed and walk to the den and I'm at work." said Mrs. Posey, who has been employed by the bank for the past 18 years.

That's a lot easier than it was when she lived in Moore, an Oklahoma City suburb, and battled the traffic to and fron the office every day. And then there were the night calls.

get out of bed. get dressed. drive 15 miles to the was waiting for us. office. clear up the problem, drive home, get back in bed and try to get a little sleep," she said.

Now, if there is a problem at night, she just pulls Zoo for 10 years, bought a building and moved it on a robe, sits down at her computer console (it here for his shop

"I try to work a normal 9-to-5 job." Mrs. Posey said. "But the other night, for instance, I got called Mrs. Posey is a computer programmer and about 11:30 p.m. I worked for over a half-hour to analyst for a major Oklahoma bank. Her office. clear up the problem, so I'll just take 30 minutes off some day when I want to go shopping or

The Poseys decided to change their lifestyle after spending at least two weekends a month, summer after summer. camping at Lake Texoma "and meeting the friendly people around here." Mrs. Posey said. They had grown to love the area so much. they decided to move here.

"We knew that we would have to find a place on the highway for Gene to have his welding business." Mrs. Posey said. "Then we came down If there was some sort of problem. I'd have to here one day and here was this house, just like it

At that time. Mrs. Posey intended to look for computer work in Ardmore, about 35 miles to the west, or Durant, 18 miles to the east. Then came her going-away party at the bank.

There were some giggles at first, she said, but the idea soon caught on with the bank's officials.

Among the first visitors after the Poseys moved in were a computer serviceman from the bank, who installed her terminal, and Southwestern Bell Telephone Co. workers from the local office, who wired it to the telephone line

The telephone people said they had never done anything like that before, but they did it real quick and without any problems." she said.

With that, Mrs. Posey was ready to go to work. Her job is to maintain and change programs in the bank's computer

'If a change has to be made in the program. my bosses at the bank will call me or send a written request." Mrs. Posey said. "I can write a new program or make changes in current programs right here at this terminal.

Liberty National does the data processing for about 80 Oklahoma banks, including some in this area. "The computers work 24 hours a day, seven days a week. all year long." she said.

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
