

Mr. Huddleston has been with the Borden County Schools for the past six years. Prior to coming to Borden County, he and his wife Sharon were with the San Antonio School System.



Since Bob's association with the Borden County Schools, he has established an outstanding football record of 53 wins, 15 losses and 2 ties. Bob began his first year with a 8-2 High School Football record, resulting in a district runner-up pos-ition., Junior High District Champs, and Junior High Bas-ketball Champs. In 1970, The Coyotes were regional champs with a 11-0 win over the east in the State All Star Game. In 1971, The Coyotes reached the regional play-offs with a 9-1-1 record. Coach Dyess also coached Charles Billeck to second place in the 330 yard hurdles at the state track meet. In 1972, the Coyotes arrived at the state semi-finals losing to Goree on first downs. Their record 8-1-1. In 1973, the Coyotes were district runnerups with a 7-3 record and Junior High District Basketball Champs. The 1974-1975 football season revealed the Coyotes with a respectable 5-4 record. In 1975-1976, the Junior High won District football honors, and second in track and basketball closing a distinguished Borden County career for Coach Dyess.



Cotton Tests

Lubbock--Performance results from evaluations of nearly 100 cotton varieties in 1975 have been announced.

The top five varieties, which include two new lines, were amcoi SP21, Tamcot 788, Quapaw, GSA71 and Paymaster 303. The latter two are recently released varieties.

Under the direction of Dr. Levon L. Ray, cotton geneticist for the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, tests were conducted at Lubbock and near Lamesa in Dawson County and in cooperation with Dr. Douglas Owen at the Experiment Station at Halfway in Hale County.

At Lubbock, cottons were evaluated under dryland and irrigated conditions, on land with severe Veriticillium wilt infestations and in a narrowrow production system.

Over 50 commercially available varieties and about that number of unreleased, experimental varieties were tested last season, said Ray.

The Plains Cotton Growers and the Lamesa Cotton Growers organizations provided financial support for conducting the tests. Ronnie Culp, grower, and County Extension Agent Le-Roy Colgan, Jr., cooperated in the Dawson County test.

Evaluations, Ray said, are conducted annually under several conditions and at different locations on the Texas High Plains to assist growers in the variety selection decis-ions. Information furnished these tests will provide breeders a comparative per-formance, of varieties and and help them detect and correct anv weakness their variety

might have, he added. "Selection of the wrong cot-ton variety can be costly for






