Bani-Sadr supporters storm Iranian offices

WASHINGTON (AP) — Supporters of deposed Iranian President Abolhassan Bani-Sadr today occupied Iran's only diplomatic outpost here and held several persons hostage for less than an

The Secret Service said one person had been shot and 15 to 20 arrested. The FBI. however, said four persons had been shot - two hostages and two captors - apparently before authorities arrived

Secret Service spokesman Jim Boyle said one person sustained a broken knee. City police spokesman Bill Jepsen said one had been shot and two

The District of Columbia Fire Department said the injured were taken to Georgetown University Medical Center, where officials later said two persons were being treated.

As those arrested were led off, shouts rang out of "Long live the people!" and "Death to the Khomeini regime

But from others gathered along police lines came cries of "Long live Khomeini'

A city police lieutenant said police had taken several persons into custody. but were having difficulty sorting out the hostages from the captors.

City police said 25 to 30 persons had been taken hostage, but the FBI said only eight were held

FBI spokesman Ron Dervish said a pro-Bani-Sadr group known as the Mujahadeen Khalq" had claimed responsibility for the take-over.

Leaflets found lying on the ground read "Death to Khomeini's regime. Long live freedom

Brewton said the demonstrators apparently cornered several employees in the offices of the Iranian interests section, located in an office building in northwest Washington, about 8:30 a.m.


Brewton said the protestors locked themselves and the hostages in a room and "several shots rang out. We don't know who fired the shots - the hostages or the people who were holding them.... Someone fired at least two or three shots

He said the protestors later unlocked the room for police, who, he added, did not fire any shots.

Police said they had secured the building by 9:30 a.m.

Earlier, a man who identified himself as a member of the "People's Majority." had called The Associated Press and said he and others of the group were occupying the Iranian

The interests section, operated under the diplomatic umbrella of the Algerian embassy, is maintained in lieu of a full-fledged embassy. The United States broke diplomatic relations with Tehran, following the storming of the U.S. embassy there in November 1979. and ordered all but token diplomatic personnel out of the country in April



WASHINGTON (AP) — The Reagan administration, saying it considers the air traffic controllers strike over, is looking for replacements for the thousands of controllers who continued picketing for a fifth day today.

Federal Aviation Administration, which reported 75 percent of all regularly scheduled air traffic flying, continued the massive task of sending out dismissal notices to the strikers. Letters eventually will be sent to about 12,000 controllers, none of whom will work again for the government as long as President Reagan is in office, officials said.

We see this as the first day in our effort to rebuild the traffic controller system in the country." Transportation Secretary Drew Lewis said Thursday night. The job, he acknowledged, might take two to three years and plans are being made to handle reduced air

traffic for a year or more He said he considers the strike, which began at 7 a.m. Monday, over, although he acknowledged that striking controller picketed at many airports and control centers around the country



Jobless rate drops again to nation's lowest level in a year

in jobs among adult men sent the nation's unemployment rate falling to 7 percent in July, the lowest level in 15 months, the government reported

Despite mounting signs that the economy is weakening, the jobless rate fell for a second month in a row, defying predictions of rising unemployment that had been made by most economic forecasters

The jobless rate, which stood at 7.6 percent in May, ebbed to 7.3 percent in June. Until July, unemployment had not been as low as 7 percent since April 1980, when the economy plunged into a deep downturn

The Labor Department said total employment in July rose 570,000, the largest monthly increase in more than ree years. Most of the gain place among adult men, particularly those between the from the ages of 20 through 24, the department said

declined by 282,000, to 7.5 million, in July. The jobless rate declined for all major groups of workers except adult women. Unemployment among this group rose from 6.5 percent in June to 6.7 percent last month

Overall, 99 million Americans held jobs in July out of a total civilian labor force of 106 5 million, the government

While inflation has been dropping from he double-digit range in recent mont s. unemployment had remained stuck around 7.5 percent for more than a year and most economists in and out of government expect the jobless rate to rise because of the downturn that appears to have begun early this year. Malathion spraying begins in Tampa

workers today began spraying pesticide in a six-block, residential area in hopes of killing off Mediterranean fruit flies that could threaten Florida's \$4 billion produce industry.

Charles Poucher, of the Florida Department of Agriculture, manned a hose and began spraying a Japanese plum tree shortly after 9 a.m. The spray, pump through hoses from tanks on three trucks, is laced with the pesticide malathion and a protein bait to attract the flies.

Poucher said it would take six hours to spray the area, where three dead medflies were found Tuesday

State attorneys in Tallahassee. meanwhile, were going before U.S. District Judge William Stafford today with a request to let Florida resume banning shipments of produce from California. Officials believe the medflies found in Tampa were brought in from California.

What we are asking for is a 16-day embargo, which we think gives an eminently reasonable time to take eradication measures and determine the extent of the infestation," said Florida Attorney General Jim Smith.

A federal judge in Panama City, Fla., last month lifted Florida's stringent quarantine against California fruit and

No new medflies were found Thursday, but state officials said it was too early to tell the extent of the infestation. Spraying was to start

Meanwhile, in California's Santa Clara Valley, where aerial spraying against the fruit flies has been under way since July 14, a fertile fruit fly was discovered outside the 267-square-mile spray zone - a development officials there termed "serious."

It was the second discovery of a fertile fly in two days, medfly project officials said in Los Gatos, Calif. The fly was found in a citrus tree in San Martin about 11 miles south of the spray area.

"This is a serious development," said Don Henry, the medfly project's deputy director. "I am not going to play that

On Wednesday, officials reported discovery of a fertile fly near Coyote, north of San Martin and southeast of downtown San Jose.

Another fly was found Tuesday in Corte Madera north of San Francisco. but officials said it had not been determined if it was fertile or one of millions of sterile flies released.

Military wants \$4 a day from every American for defense

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Pentagon, in a new record five-year budget plan, wants to spend \$4 a day for every man, women and child in the country to maintain the nation's military security.

The \$1.6 trillion total sought for fiscal years 1983 through 1987 works out to \$876 million per day, or \$608,500 per

Stretching the Reagan administration's push to "re-arm America" to include another year, the plan represents a \$200 billion increase over the Reagan administration's 1982-86 program as outlined to Congress last March

The huge boosts are being driven by costly adm8nistration aims to develop and produce a fleet of advanced

strategic bombers, increase the size of the Navy by 150 ships, install a new intercontinental missile system and add about 200,000 more men and women to the uniformed forces

The services have submitted the proposals in line with top-level Pentagon instructions to stay within the administration's goal of sustaining 7 percent a year in "real growth" after allowing for inflation Sepior Pentagon officials are about to

start detailed reviews of these proposals, with particular emphasis on the detailed fiscal 1983 budget which will go to Congress in January, along with a new five-year projection.

Pentagon spokesman Ben Welles predicted "there will have to be chopping and paring" of some programs

If the Reagan administration accepted all the proposals submitted by the armed services in recent weeks, the defense budget would climb from \$222.2 billion requested for next year to \$412.1 billion in 1987. Pentagon sources said that the armed

services also were allowed to submit separate packages of military programs involving additional billions of dollars they believe are necessary but could not fit into the 7 percent guideline.

At the same time, the services were told to draw up contingency plans for budgets 5 percent below the guideline in case the administration's projections por economic growth fall short and tax revenues are below expectations.

Report Soviet rebuffed U.S. in Afghan talks

NEW YORK (AP) - The Soviet Union recently rebuffed efforts by the Reagan administration to begin secret discussions aimed at reaching a political settlement of the fighting in Afghanistan. The New York Times reported today

The Times quoted unidentified State Department officials as saying the U.S. has shifted its strategy in an attempt to get the Soviets to begin talking.

The officials reportedly tried to convince Soviet officials that since they could not defeat the rebels in Afghanistan, they should go along with the American offer to provide a "face-saving diplomatic exit that would take Soviet interests into account.

The Soviets, however reportedly said

they would not talk until the West recognized the regime of Babrak Karmal, which they installed, and until there was a guarantee that guerrilla operations will not cross the border into Afghanistan.

The Times said the Reagan administration is trying to persuade the Soviets they will end up with a military standoff in Afghanistan.

Officials are said to be trying to bring about some movement on the issue before September when Secretary of State Alexander Haig Jr. and Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko meet at the United Nations.

State Department officials also told The Times that government officials are trying to build support for the administration's position in the United States as well

The government plans to try to gain support at home by having Haig release a memorandum that says U.S. citizens and groups "filled the streets and squares of the world to defend the North Vietnamese and Vietcong," during the Vietnam War, but have exhibited "no such ... moral outrage" for the people of Afghanistan. The Times reported.

To encourage the Soviets to seek non-military solutions to the problem. the State Department is distributing an intelligence estimate to reporters and its embassies which says the Soviets 'appear to be losing ground" in Afghanistan, the newspaper said.

Continental officials relieved by purchase delay the regulatory hurdles Texas LOS ANGELES (AP) — Continental

Airlines officials said Thursday they were disappointed by a Civil Aeronautics Board decision allowing a takeover by Texas International Airlines but said a 60-day delay ordered by the CAB might yet save the company frem a merger it does not want

After Houston-based Texas International and its chairman Frank Lorenzo purchased 48.5 percent of Continental's shares last March, about 11.000 Continental employees developed an employee ownership plan, which involves their buying 15.4 million new shares of Continental stock

"Our struggle continues, and we will ultimately win. We will take our case to president Reagan, who has the authority to overturn the CAB ruling." said employees association chairman Paul Eckel. "We will fight to overcome

International has thrown in the path of our employee ownership plan.

"We are in a deadly serious race to save our jobs and airline. Texas International's position has been helped by the CAB. We take comfort, however. in the support we are receiving from the courts, the public and the nation's political leadership," Eckel said. Thursday's CAB order must be

approved by President Reagan, who has 60 days to consider it.

"The 60 days is very important to us," said Continental Employees Association adviser Chuck Cheeld, who is a pilot for Continental.

The California commissioner of corporations, Geraldine Green, has ruled a stockholder vote is necessary to implement the employee takeover. Cheeld said the 60 days might allow the group to get around the corporations

"We'll never quit. We'll fight this thing to the very end," Cheeld said. 'What happens if we lose? I'll tell you. What he (Lorenzo) has got to do is sell

off assets, airplanes, in order to pay off the incredible debt that he's incurred in this whole thing - in effect, start liquidating the airline.

Does that mean Cheeld and others will be out of work? "You bet," he said. "Each airplane means a certain amount of jobs - pilots, flight attendants on down.

"Another thing is he would move the headquarters out of Los Angeles, just to reduce cost. Of course, that's a massive relocation of people," Cheeld said.

French embassy takeover will result if Bani Sadr not returned

BEIRUT. Lebanon (AP) prominent Iranian religious leader warned France today its embassy in Tehran would be taken over if France refuses to extradite ex-President Abolhassan Bani-Sadr and a leftist leader. Tehran Radio reported.

The warning came from Ayatollah Meshkini, the Friday prayer leader in the holy city of Qom, who took over the post from Ayatollah Hussein Ali Montazari, the heir-apparent to supreme leader Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini, according to the broadcast. Meshkini's first name was not given.

Addressing French President Francois Mitterrand in a sermon delivered at a Qom mosque. Meshkini was quoted as saying: "If you do not agree to extradite these terrorists to Iran, in the same way that the Iranian nation stood up to America with clenched fists and the call of 'God is Great' and rubbed America's snout in the dust, it (the Iranian nation) will do

Blacks praise redistricting plan AUSTIN, Texas (AP) - A congressional redistricting plan

that would deny Republicans any gains in the Texas delegation while drawing a minority district in Dallas has won the endorsement of a group of Dallas black leaders.

The plan was expected to get a final vote in the House redistricting committee today, which would set up floor action in the House on Saturday.

Meanwhile, the leader of the House Democratic Caucus sought a way to eliminate Congressman Martin Frost's objections to his proposed district and, thereby, gain the support of another senator for the loyalist Democrat redistricting plan.

Rep. Bob Bush, D-Sherman, spent most of the afternoon with Frost in the office of Sen. Oscar Mauzy, D-Dallas, whose district lies mostly within Frost's congressional district.

Bush said earlier that "1512 senators" had expressed support for the Democrat plan, with Mauzy obviously the one who was halfhearted because of Frost's objections.

Botulism may be cause of illness

A patient admitted Thursday to Thomason General Hospital displayed symptoms Dr. Raul Portillo described as a "typical out-of-the-book case" of botulism, a deadly form of food poisoning caused by bacterial toxins in contaminated food.

Portillo, senior chief resident at the hospital, said the patient's cousin had died of suspected botulism poisoning several days earlier in nearby Juarez.

Europe's economic agony

By ROBERT WALTERS

OTTAWA (NEA) - At almost every economic summit held during the past seven years, the United States has found itself blamed by its allies for problems far beyond its control - and the recent meeting here was no exception.

Most of the heads of state of the other six leading Western industrialized nations sought to cast the United States in the role of scapegoat for a generally sluggish global economy, despite evidence to the contrary.

The considerable clamor over the supposedly deleterious worldwide impact of high interest rates in the United States was, in great measure, unjustified.

None of the nations participating in the summit, including the United States, would dispute the existence of the economic problems outlined recently by Allan E. Gotlieb, Canada's undersecretary of state for external

In a Winnipeg speech, Gotlieb cited

"the tensions between fighting inflation and coping with the implications of low - or no - growth scenarios foreseen for most summit and other developed countries over the coming months, with their significant social and political overtones, particularly at a time of growing unemployment in many industrialized states.

At the summit, Italian Prime Minister Giovanni Spadolini proclaimed that "we must defeat this monster of inflation and unemployment since they absorb ever - increasing resources.

Treasury Secretary Donald T. Regan quoted French President Francois Mitterrand as warning that unemployment in France as well as in (West) Germany and other countries in Europe was getting to a flash point where it might cause social upheaval."

There is little doubt that Western Europe faces at least several years of economic agony. The Royal Bank of Canada, for example, predicts that the average annual growth in gross national product for the seven summit nations will range between 2.5 percent and 4.5 percent during the 1980s.

With the exception of Great Britain, which is at the bottom of the list, those projections all fall below the actual GNP growth rates experienced by each of the respective countries during the

But high U.S. interest rates probably are less of a contributing factor than two other elements - a belated "baby boom" in Western Europe and the continuing economic impact of massive increases in crude petroleum prices.

The "baby boom" began in the United States almost immediately follwing World War II, in the middle and late 1940s, but many European couples delayed having children because of adverse economic

Large portions of their nations had been raveged by the war, the industrial base had been crippled, housing stock was in short supply and food was difficult to obtain.

It was not until a decade later, when a degree of normalcy returned to those countries, that the "baby boom" began in Western Europe. Now in their early . to mid - 20s, those post - war children finally are entering the region's job market.

As a result, the Europeans now are beginning to experience the rising unemployment and plummeting productivity that plagued the United States economy throughout the 1970s.

In Belgium, approximately one third of all 25 - year - olds have never held a full - time job. In Great Britain more than 2 million people were out of work at the beginning of this year. In West Germany, unemployment exceeded the politically sensitive 1 million level late last year.

The role of oil prices in fueling inflation is demonstrated by the fact that consumer prices in the economic summit nations increased by 14 percent following the 1973 "oil shock" and another 9 percent after the 1979 - 80 "oil -

High interest rates in the United States are draining capital from Western Europe that could be used to deal with more fundamental economic problems, but they hardly are the immediate cause of the dislocation now being experienced.

Striking the Gulag

The news doesn't travel as quickly from the Mordavian prison in the Soviet Union as it does from Maze Prison in Northern Ireland. But a U.S. citizen imprisoned for "anti -Soviet agitation and propaganda" in Lithuania has been on a hunger strike since June 15.

He hasn't been converted to a media martyr yet. Western photographers are not allowed to document or film his progressive emaciation. Indeed, to the best of our knowledge, U.S. consular officials haven't yet been permitted to see him, though efforts are being made by the State Department. We think more people should know about the

Vytautis Skuodis, also known as Benedict Scott, was born in Chicago on March 21. 1929. Thus he is a U.S. citizen, even though his parents took him back to Lithuania in 1930, and the State Department, in the absence of any evidence that he's done anything to prejudice his status, considers his citizenship valid.

Skuodis grew up to be a geologist, eventually teaching hydrogeology and geological engineering at the University of Vilnius. But somewhere he must have developed some pride in his Lithuanian heritage as well.

He began work on a stilluncompleted manuscript. "Spiritual Genocide in Lithuania," and is alleged to have been involved in two underground samizdat publications Alma Mater," and "Perspectives" (or Perskektyvos).

The KGB searched his house in November, 1979, confiscating various manuscripts and papers. Undeterred, he joined the Lithuanian Helsinki Final Agreement a few days

He claimed his American citizenship in an open letter to President Carter and wrote a letter to Comrade Brezhnev, making the foolish demand that the Soviet government comply with the Soviet constitution.

The results were predictable. He was dismissed from his teaching post, and in January 1980, he was arrested. His trial occurred in December, 1980. He shunned a state appointed lawyer and demanded an American lawyer, to no avail. On December 22, he was convicted

under Article 68 - 1 of the Lithuanian SSR Criminal Code for anti - Soviet agitation and propaganda and for distorting the reality of Soviet

Under international law, a U.S.

citizen arrested in a foreign country is supposed to be entitled to the protection of consular officials - at least consular officials are supposed to be able to meet with him. This privilege is, in most countries and in most circumstances, accorded to any foreign national, even a dope smuggler

In addition, of course, the kinds of things for which Skuodis was convicted are supposed to be protected under the Helsinki agreement, not just for U.S. citizens but for Lithuanian and Soviet citizens. Amnesty International considers Skuodis a "Prisoner of Conscience." and the State Department is proceeding on the assumption that he is a political

The State Department has raised the case with the Soviets through diplomatic channels and at the Helsinki accord conference in Madrid. Congresswoman Cardiss Collins of Chicago is pushing for official action to get Skuodis released and has sent a letter to Brezhnev. More members of Congress are expected to jump in.

There's no way to get reliable information, of course, about Skuodis' condition when he started his hunger strike over a month ago. Soviet prisons are not noted for their tender treatment of political prisoners.

Skuodis' case is of special concern because he is an American citizen. There were two Lithuanian nationals sentenced with him, Gintautas lesmantas. 51, and Povilas Peceliunas, 53. Insofar as the Helsinki accords are considered. they should be released too although the question of the U.S. government's involvement in their cases is problematical. But Skuodis is clearly entitled, under international law, to some scrt of representation by the U.S. government.

Lithuanian - Americans, along with Americans from other Baltic countries protested the treatment of Skuodis and other political prisoners at the Soviet consulate in San Francisco in July. Whether they will be getting the kind of support that could lead to Skuodis' release cannot be foretold. The Soviets have bowed before to

the pressure of effective public opinion. If enough pressure is forthcoming, Skuodis mght be released. He probably doesn't have much

time left.

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) --Former State Sen. H.J. 'Doc' Blanchard says raging floodwaters might have missed his home on May 24 if the state had done a better job of building a nearby

The Senate on Wednesday approved a resolution allowing Blanchard to sue the state. The House also must approve the required resolution before Blanchard can take the state to court.

Blanchard's house sustained \$49,000 in damage during the flood that killed a dozen people and battered hundreds of homes when Shoal Creek left its banks. His house is near the creek.

The former Lubbock legislator said Thursday his home is not far from Loop 1. known locally as MoPac Expressway. The state highway department, · Blanchard said, failed to provide for proper drainage when it built the road.

"They should have fixed it up so the water would have been retained." Blanchard said. "They made it into a flume that (carried) that water into Shoal Creek.

"It damned near washed away. The flow of Shoal Creek was changed by all the water that poured into it .. part of it from MoPac," said Blanchard.

'The state owns that water All surface water is owned by the state, including flood water. Anyone that owns property is supposed to maintain it so as not to damage their neighbor," he

Ben Alley, assistant district engineer for the highway department, said he had not heard about Blanchard's complaint. He said he could not comment on whether the highway causes flood

Blanchard, a Democrat who served in the Senate from 1962 through 1975, said he was not sure if he would sue the state, but decided to seek the required approval while the Legislature is in



Grand jury indicts prominent rancher

smuggling and banking law violations has been approved against former Texas Aeronautics Commission member Rex C. Cauble, a Dallas newspaper reported.

Government sources in Texas and Washington, D.C., told the Dallas Times Herald that the indictment would be returned Friday in the Tyler courtroom of U.S. District Judge

Neither Cauble, a prominent Denton banker-rancher and the millionaire owner of the fashionable Cutter Bill Western World stores, nor his attorney, G. Brockett Irwin of Longview, could be reached for comment

The newspaper said grand jurors approved the indictment Thursday after hearing testimony from two unidentified witnesses and after hearing evidence presented by David Baugh, a former assistant U.S. attorney in Beaumont who has been appointed special prosecutor in the case.

The newspaper reported government sources said four counts centered on alleged drug smuggling activities and the remainder deal with alleged banking violations involving "hundreds of thousands of dollars" at Houston and Denton

Sources told the Times Herald that federal prosecutors contend the money was used to finance drug smuggling

The unidentified sources told the newspaper the indictment follows an investigation into a scheme to smuggle at least 86 tons of Colombian marijuana - worth an estimated \$113 million - into Southeast Texas aboard shrimp trawlers between August of 1976 and Nov. 29, 1978.

Federal agents said the drug smuggling operation ended when Drug Enforcement Administration agents arrested 12

DALLAS (AP) — A 13-count indictment alleging drug men at a Port Arthur dock for smuggling 22 tons of the illegal weed aboard the ship Agnes Pauline.

Those eventually charged included Charles Elbert Muscles" Foster, a foreman at Cauble's Denton ranch, and Charles Talkington, a Cauble ranch hand. Les Wallick Fuller, a member of the Agnes Pauline crew, was a former president of Cauble's Cutter Bill operations.

Cauble was not indicted for any involvement in the ring, but prosecutors hammered away at the Cauble connections during the 1979 trial in Beaumont of the 18 men accused in connection with the scheme. Ten of the defendants were convicted and sentenced to prison terms ranging from two to 10 years and ordered to pay fines totaling \$340,000

Cauble was called to testify in the later trial of Foster, who was acquitted, and Tennessee millionaire John Ruppel, but he repeated invoked his fifth amendment protection against self-incrimination and refused to answer questions

But the Denton businessman dismissed allegations of his involvement in the scheme by defense attorneys by saying the lawyers tried "to frame me."

Shopping center evacuated after gasoline spill

TYLER, Texas (AP) - A 20-store shopping center was evacuted Thursday after a tanker truck carrying 9,000 gallons of gasoline and diesel flipped over and spilled part of its flammable cargo, officials said

'We didn't waste any time getting people out of the area." said Tyler Fire Chief Jerry Weaver, who called the mishap "an extra dangerous situation

There was no fire and no injuries were reported.

Weaver said firefighters used about 750,000 gallons of water to wash away the leaking fuel and keep the truck dampened in the 95-degree heat


He said the fuel was washed down a storm drain and into a nearby creek



There was the wedding here at St. Paul's of the Prince of Wales, the heir to the British throne, to the former Lady Diana Spencer.

And a decade or three ago in a disputed part of the kingdom just an island away, there was the wedding of himself, Lord of hardscribble house, also known as myself, to the former Brigid Mary Murphy of Meighfoner, Mullaghbawn, County Armagh, Northern Ireland.

On the eve of Charles' wedding, the royal firemaster set off 21/2 tons of fireworks in Hyde Park, culminating in a corruscating, turning catherine wheel hundreds of feet above the ancient dueling oaks.

On the eve of our wedding, the IRA blew up seven miles of the main line tracks between Belfast and Dublin near the Newry viaduct.

Charles had a bachelor party, a last night out with the lads, at White's Club in Pall Mall, with cold beef, raspberries and cream, etc., Washed down with bottles of his favorite champagne, Bollinger '75. The prince was back in Buckingham Palace by 12:30 am, and the club manager described the affair as "n quiet Hooley.

Webster says a Hooley is "a wild drunken Irish party." and on John Bull's other island there is no such thing as a quiet one. The only thing I recall about the wake held for me in Hanlon's Public House is that a local farmer leading a herd of cattle back from the field in

Camlough stopped in. I can't say we carroused until the cows came home, because they were still in the parking lot next

There were boy sopranos, trumpet voluntaries and the Bach chorale at the royal wedding. And New Zealand soprano Kiri Te Kanawa, direct from the Royal Opera House at Covent Garden trilling out "Let the bright Seraphin's" from Handel's "Sampson."

We had a boozy old prima donna direct from a long standing engagement at Hanlon's Saturday night singalongs who rendered "Whispering Hope" in a shattering vibrato that, given a bit more carrying power, would have decimated the Waterford glass works.

The Prince and Princess of Wales went off in the horse-drawn state landeau to the honeymoon train waiting at Waterloo Station to take them to Broadlands, the late Earl Mountbatten of Burma's estate in Hampshire. Hundreds of thousands cheered them along the way.

We went off in a huff, a horse-drawn huff as it turned out, because Patsy Dologan's pre-war Humber broke down. The train to Cork was delayed, because of those missing sections of track, and when we got to the dock at Cobh, there was some mixup about the steamer tickets. For the crossing to New York on the S.S. America, U.S. Lines had me in cabin class and the wife down in steerage.





Charles Medlin served for a short time in 1979 and in 1980 Rev. Burl Hickerson was called to the church.

Religion in the news

NEW YORK (AP) - In a time of military buildup, the 'peace' people are marching, praying, fasting and signing petitions

Several denominations have made "peacemaking" a current priority. And some church leaders, including a bold bishop, have advised refusing to pay the portion of taxes that

"Freeze the Nuclear Arms Race" is the call of several national organizations taking part in fasts, vigils, church bell ringings and other demonstrations, starting Thursday and continuing through the weekend, in communities across the country and abroad.

The timing conicided with the 36th anniversary of the atomic bombings of Hiroshima and Nagasaki. Lighted candles are being set afloat in many rivers, symbolizing the fiery events.

The American Friends Service Committee, a pacifist Quaker organization, along with the interdenominational Clergy and Laity Concerned, the Fellowship of Reconciliation, Women's International League for Peace and Freedom and the New Jewish Agenda are among national groups supporting. the weekend activities.

The aim is to build public support for a joint U.S. - Soviet halt to production, testing and development of nuclear

Advocacy of withholding the share of federal income taxes that go for military equipment came not just from traditional 'peace' denominations, but from a Roman Catholic

Archbishop Raymond G. Hunthausen of Seattle, in a mid-June speech that has since evoked wide reactions. suggested Christians refuse to pay the half of their federal income taxes going for armament.

Similar suggestions came from leaders of three relatively small, but historic "peace" denominations - The Church of the Brethren, the Friends and Mennonites.

A joint meeting of them under the banner of "New Call to Peacemakng" said paying for war is wrong and asked members to "consider refusal to pay the military portion of their federal taxes, as a response to Christ's call to radical In separate actions, the Church of the Brethren has

supported "open, massive withholding of war taxes" and the Mennonites general conference is fighting in court against being required to withhold taxes partly used for military purposes from embloyes' income

The New York-based War Resisters League estimates 2,000 to 10.000 Americans annually hold back part of their taxes, some eventually being forced to pay but continuing to repeat

By less drastic means, numrous Protestant denominations, United Presbyterians, United Methodists, the United Church of Christ. American Baptists and the Christian Church (Disciples) have launched programs emphasizing the urgency of peacemaking.

Roman Catholic bishops are planning a re-examination of church teachings on war in view of the nuclear potentialities.

Religion roundup

HONOLULU (AP) - Representatives from Methodist churches around the world have denounced U.S. intervention in El Salvador, saying it negates "the right to self-determination" there.

The 14th World Methodist Conference also condemned South Africa's racial separation policy as victimizing most of the country's people, and assailed "the rush of both super-powers to pour arms and their own atagonisms into the Middle East."

CHICAGO (AP) - A seminary professor says there are remarkable similarities between the church at its origin and in the present century - both in bursts of growth and of

The Rev. James Scherer of the Lutheran School of Theology told mission experts from about 20 countries that as in the 1st century, the church in many places is "growing at an astonishing rate

Also, as in the earlier period, he said Christians are often harassed, imprisoned or executed for their beliefs. Increasingly, the church today has learned that faithfulness to Christ leads to confrontation with the authorities and demands witness to the gospel in all its implication and the defense of human rights and dignity.

GRAYMOOR, N. Y. (AP) - The Atomemen Friars, a Roman Catholic order dedicated to the cause of Christian Unity, have elected the Rev. Carmen Giuliano as superior general of the 198-member community

Giuliano, 55, a native of Waterbury, Conn., who has been director of the Chapel of Our Savior, Brockton, Mass., succeeds the Rev. Kevin F. McMorrow, the friars' superior

SISSETON, S.D. (AP) - A "feast of brotherhood," some called it, or "God's four-ring circus."

It involved a singing, worshipping band of Indians and whites - Episcopalians, Roman Catholics, United Presbyterians and United Church of Christ members - at their first joint "Ptaya Owohgdake" (Gathering Together).

Held at St. Mary's Episcopal Church and the nearby Siseton-Wahpeton Sioux powwow grounds and arena, the four-day summer meeting of four denominations having South Dakota Indian members replaced previously separate meetings held for a century.

WASHINGTON (AP) - The head of the Catholic bishops' Committee for Pro-Life Activities has taken issue with a presidential ccommission's recommendation for uniform laws to define death as cessation of heart, lung or brain function.

The Rev. Edward Bryce says there is no demonstrated need for such laws and that they could be a "stepping stone" toward legalized euthenasia (mercy killing). Much support for "brain death" legislation comes from advocates of euthenasia, he

He says wording of the proposed statute was "designed to insure that dead patients are not treated as living, not to insure that living patients are not treated as dead. This represents a subtle shift in society's attitude...and creates a precedent for treating death as a matter of legal definition rather than as a matter of medical fact.

Stagnant hog and cattle prices dent farm income

WASHINGTON (AP) - It may be good news to food shoppers, but stagnant hog and cattle prices have helped put a further dent in farmers' income prospects for 1981.

A few months ago: Agriculture Department economists said cattle and hog prices might increase, helping to improve the overall income outlook for the remainder of the year.

But this has not happened. A new department analysis issued Wednesday said prices this year are going up less than had been expected and probably will gain less than the general inflation rate.

Overall, food prices now are expected to gain 8 percent to 10 percent from 1980, the department's World Agricultural Outlook Board said. Previously, it has forecast only that food prices may go up "less than 1 percent.

Food prices increased an average of 8.6 percent in 1980. and it looked like a much larger boost was in store for this year.

When the department began forecasting 1981 food prices last fall, officials indicated an increase of 10 percent to 15 percent with a 'most likely" gain of around 12 percent.

But the mild winter, a backlog of beef cattle and reduced consumer demand resulted in only moderate price gains. Livestock markets, in particular, have not gone up as much this summer as many officials had thought.

Ralph Parlett of the department's Economic Research Service said "it's possible" that food prices might gain less than the 8.6 percent boost recorded in 1980. That would be below the overall rate of inflation currently expected by the Reagan administration.

Parlett, asked to comment on the latest report, said prices are rising more slowly than earlier, however, because "we're just not getting that response" to livestock markets that had been expected.

Lagging consumer demand, high interest rates and a stagnant economy in general have been the major reasons, he said

The report said net farm income prospects have failed to show any significant improvement and still is expected to range between \$22 billion and \$27 billion, the same as the forecast a month

In a revision of 1980 figures the report said net farm income actually turned out lower than had been reported previously - \$19.9 billion instead of \$21.7 billion.

The downward revision put 1980 net farm income 39 percent below the

near-record of \$32.7 billion in 1979, the report said.

'Disappointing livestock receipts have been a major factor depressing net farm income this year," it said. "Other factors include: More-favorable weather and the outlook for larger 1981 crops here and abroad; continuing high interest rates; and the strong dollar."

When the U.S. dollar is strong, many foreign buyers are discouraged from ordering as much grain and other agricultural products as they would have.

The analysis said producers' cash receipts from the sale of livestock may rise 5 percent to 7 percent this year and crop receipts 8 percent to 10 percent.




