# Registration To Start School Year

## Insurance Coverage Available For Student

The 1970-71 school registration will leave students an opportunity to have just less than two weeks of leisure time before school begins on Monday, August 31. Registration for Muleshoe High School will be in the high school cafeteria. Seniors will register on Tuesday, August 18 from 8:30 a.m. to 12 and juniors will register from 1 p.m. to 4:30 p.m. the same day. Sophomores will register on Wednesday, August 19 from 8:30 a.m. to 12 and freshmen from 1-4:30 the same afternoon.

Eighth grade students will register at Muleshoe Junior High School from 8:30-12 on Tuesday, August 18 and seventh grade students will register that afternoon from 1-4:30 p.m. Sixth grade students will register on Wednesday, August 19 from 8:30-12 noon. Junior High School registration will be held in the entrance foyer of the school.

Superintendent Neal Dillman asked that all students who will be new to the Muleshoe School System have their records mailed to the respective school they plan to attend.

Elementary students for both Mary DeShazo and Richland Hills will register from 8:30-11:30 a.m. on Thursday, August 27. All grades, kindergarten through fifth grade are asked to report to their respective school for registration.

At the time of registration, the annual school insurance will again be offered to those interested parents and students who desire the double protection.

If parents are interested in the insurance, they may send a check with their child at the time of registration. The check should be made payable to the Muleshoe Independent School District. There will be tables set up at both high school and junior high to take care of students wishing to take part in the insurance program. Elementary school students may purchase insurance at the beginning of school.

of the May 16 Bailey County Hospital District and Bond Election which was held in the county.

At approximately mid-afternoon on July 29, following an abrupt withdrawal by the lawyers contesting the election of more than 100 subpoenaed witnesses, Judge Boone ruled in favor of the Bailey County Hospital District Board and declared the election legal in every respect.

If the district judge's decision is to be appealed, it reportedly must be within ten days from the date the judgment was filed.

Amended Dress Policy In Effect This Year

On June 15, 1970, the Board of Trustees of the Muleshoe Independent School District amended the existing dress policy for the Muleshoe School System.

The amended policy reads: "Girls' skirts and dresses may be worn no shorter than four inches above the top of the knee cap when measured from the standing position. Longer skirts are more desirable." The new dress length replaces the former two inch above the knee policy which had been in effect.

For boys, the haircut policy

is: "(a) At least one-half inch above the eye in front; (b) trimmed in back so that hair does not lay on shirt collars; (c) trimmed on sides so that hair does not touch or overlap the ears and (d) sideburns, trimmed no lower than in line with bottom of ear." The sideburn change replaces for former middle of the ear line for sideburns.

"In the interest of an educational atmosphere, dignity of the individual, decency and pride in our schools and community," said Superintendent Neal Dillman, the following dress policy for students will be as follows, in addition to the two amendments to the policy.

No shorts or cut-offs of any kind are to be worn either by

**Dear Editor:**

Dear Sir:

Again I would remind our readers not to "blow your cool." Our lawyer tells us that it will probably be May 1, 1971 before the final decision concerning the Hospital district will be reached. Things are going as expected and we feel confident that our side will prevail.

Now then, when was the decision made to build a district Hospital? At the meeting at Needmore in early May of 1970 we were told by Mr. Neil Dillman that the Hospital board had been studying the problem for two years and had just decided that the district Hospital was the only way to provide a Hospital for Muleshoe. I would like to quote from a copy of a letter dated May 18, 1970 from Mr. Joe W. Smith of Texas

Municipal Bonding Co. and addressed to the Bailey County Hospital District Directors.

Gentlemen: As you recall, we have worked with your group since May, 1968, both as Directors of the Bailey County Hospital Authority and as Provisional Directors of the Bailey County Hospital District. ---end quote. Mr. Smith goes on to say that the enabling act was passed by the 61st Legislature Regular session, 1969. This would indicate that the decision was made quite sometime ago rather than just preceding the election.

Who made this decision? I have it from good authority that the major decisions were made by three members and were passed on to the rest of the board to be approved. I was present at the board meeting when they retained their lawyers. This was definitely the case there. The lawyers along with Mr. Joe Smith of the Bonding Company and three board members met in a separate room for about thirty minutes while the rest of the board waited. Then the lawyers were introduced and the rest of the board were told how it should be done.

In Sunday's Lubbock paper there was an interesting story concerning District Hospitals that you might have missed. You have read, I am sure, of the man who was arrested in McCamey for practicing medicine without a license several days ago. He was lodged in the McCamey jail. He later developed a kidney problem and was transferred to a hospital in Odessa. The doctors there are asking for a dialysis machine to save

his life. He had only lived in McCamey for a couple of weeks but McCamey has a hospital district and as such cannot refuse to treat any inhabitant. And also a District must guarantee the bills of referrals. The president of the McCamey Hospital District was trying to find out from some state or federal office last Saturday if the McCamey District really had to purchase this machine for this man. I called my friendly drug-gist but he wouldn't even guess at the cost. I think about \$8,000 but my wife says \$30,000 (disagreeing agreeably). Aside from the geography, this story best illustrates our reasons for opposing the district. The cost of the taxpayers could be unlimited.

Next week I am going to check on the trout population in a little lake on top of a mountain in Southern Colorado, so I will give you folks a vacation also.

boys or girls. No mini-skirts are to be worn. Boys will wear belts on trousers tailored with belt loops. Blouses and shirt tails designed to be worn inside of skirts or trousers must be worn in that manner. Blouses and shirt tails designed to be worn on outside of skirt or trousers must cover the 'midriff' and backs, in the standing, sitting or bending position. No conspicuous or ridiculous costumes can be worn that will distract other students attention and detract from a learning environment.

Dillman continued, "This policy is not designed in an effort to make everyone dress or look alike. It is written in the belief that young people should be encouraged to take pride in their personal appearance, for it has been demonstrated many times that their personal appearance, for demonstrated many times that there is a direct relationship between dress and behavior. "If young men and women take pride in their personal appearance, they will also take pride in their personal behavior, habits and achievement. "The factors that should be considered in selecting clothing and determining all over good grooming that will contribute to a good learning atmosphere," concluded the superintendent, "include neatness, cleanliness, comfortableness, trimness, modesty, discreetness, and non-embarrassment to the wearer or others."

four new teachers with the school system. Rev. Doug Dubose of the Muleshoe First Baptist Church was guest speaker at the luncheon and his talk ranged from humorous teacher and preacher events to quite serious evaluations of the modern teacher. He stressed Americanism and said that high on the list of teacher qualifications should be patriotism, Dubose added, "Be proud to be an American and stand for something -- stand for Americanism. "A personal regard for personal appearance should also be demonstrated," said the minister. "Show the student that you care for your personal appearance, demonstrate that through a personal pride in appearance, you can elevate your position in the world."

The minister also encouraged discipline, a teacher being totally familiar with the subject they are teaching; and the belief that a dedicated teacher has a true calling to teach. He expressed the belief that through inspiration and encouragement, a student may, from a small community, become a great leader of the nation. shoe Independent School System have again secured the insurance service through the Southwestern General Insurance Agency of Dallas. This is the same company utilized by the school for the past several years.

the creation of the Bailey County Hospital District and the issuance of \$950,000.00 in Bonds, and came the parties, in person and/or through their attorneys of record, and all parties announced ready for trial.

At the conclusion of Contestants' testimony and case and after Contestants announced that they rested their case, the Contestees moved the Court to render judgment in favor of Contestees and that the Court enter its Order, Judgement and Decree that Contestants wholly failed to produce evidence of the allegations of their petition, or otherwise, to raise a fact issue with respect to the validity of the election in issue and that as a matter of law Contestees were entitled to an Order, Decree and Judgment that the election was fairly, honestly and legally held, that the results shown in the order canvassing the returns expressed the true will of the ma-

majority of the persons duly and lawfully qualified to vote in such election who voted in such election; that the Bailey County Hospital District was validly and legally created and the District has all powers granted by the Act providing for the creation of the District, and that the election approving the issuance of \$950,000.00 in Bonds by the District is in all respects valid.

The Court, upon due consideration of the pleadings, evidence and the law, is of the opinion that Contestee's Motion should be granted and Judgment rendered in behalf of Contestee upholding in all respects the election of May 16, 1970, for the creation of the Bailey County Hospital District and the issuance of \$950,000.00 in Bonds.

IT IS, ACCORDINGLY, ORDERED, ADJUDGED AND DECREED that House Bill 97, passed by the 61st Legislature, Regular Session 1969, page 253, Chapter 100, 44944, V.A.C.S., providing for the creation of the Bailey County Hospital District, was enacted pursuant to the authority of Article IX, Section 9, of the Texas Con-

stitution, and is not a local or special law in violation of Article III, Section 56, of the Texas Constitution; that the Contestants have not proven any facts, plead or otherwise, sufficient to raise a fact issue of the validity of the election of May 16, 1970, creating the Bailey County Hospital District and authorizing the issuance of \$950,000.00 in Bonds; that all grounds plead by Contestants for challenging the legality of the election are without merit; that it is possible to ascertain the true result of the election from the returns of the election and the returns considered in connection with the other evidence; that there is no evidence that any legal voters were, by the officers or managers of the election, denied the privilege of voting, and there is no evidence that such a number of legal voters were, by the officers or managers of the election, denied the privilege of voting as, had they been allowed to vote, would have materially changed the result of the election; that the election was ordered and held and the returns thereof made in all respects as required by

the general election laws of the State; that at said election the majority of those qualified to vote and who voted in such election voted in favor of the creation of the Bailey County Hospital District and the authority of such District to issue \$950,000.00 in Bonds; that the election approving the creation of the Bailey County Hospital District was in all respects valid and is upheld and that the Bailey County Hospital District was validly and legally created, and the District has all the powers granted by the Act providing for the creation of said District; that the election approving the issuance of \$950,000.00 in Bonds by the District was in all respects valid and is upheld, and that the Bonds authorized at said election may be validly issued.

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED, ADJUDGED AND DECREED by the Court that all costs of court herein are hereby taxed against the Contestants, for which execution may issue. SIGNED AND ENTERED this the 12th day of August, 1970. (s) Pat Boone Jr., JUDGE PRESIDING.

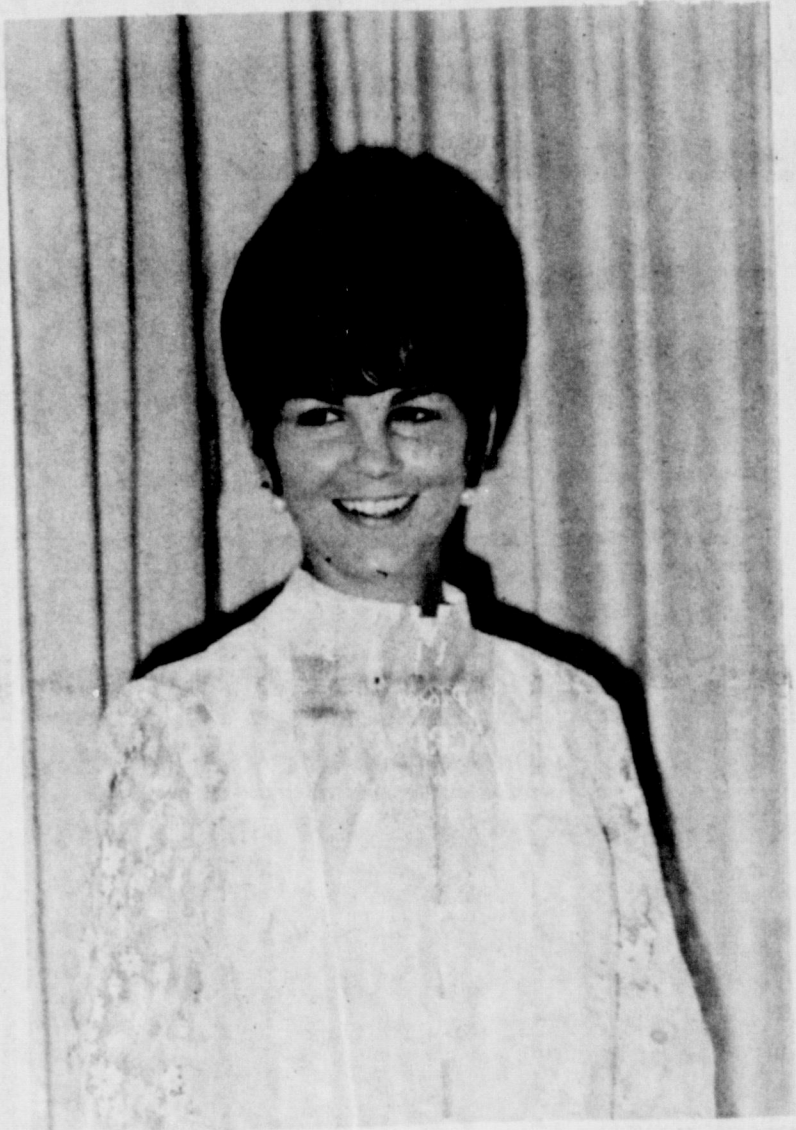

Passing out rice bags at the reception were Robin Longwell, sister of the bride, Carolyn Richards, Julie Flanagan and Laurel Flanagan.

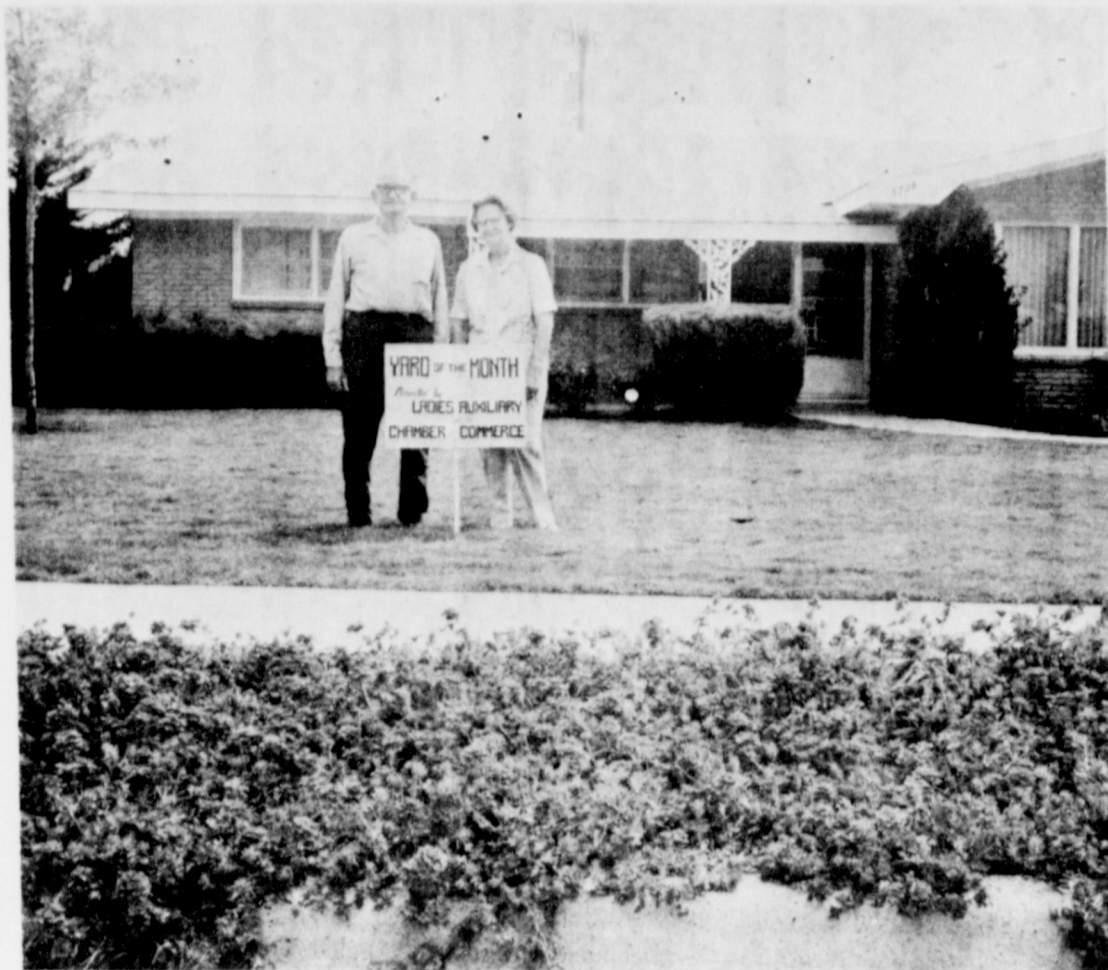

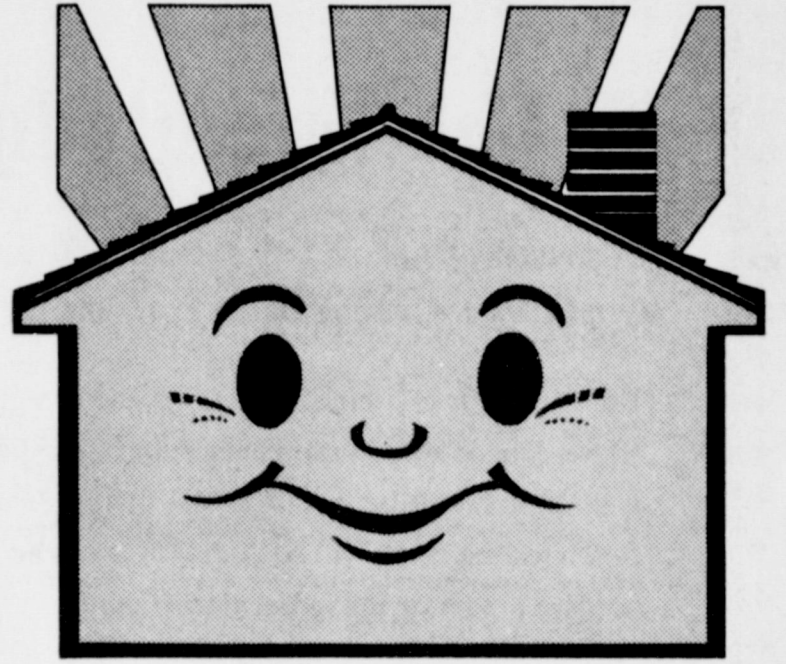
