WTSU Discusses Drug Problems

problems afflicting many American college campuses today--drugs, racial and radical elements -- made few inroads at West Texas State University

during the past school year. This was the highlight of the annual report to Dr. James P. Cornette, university president, by Dr. T. Paige Carruth, vice president for stu-

dent life. "The misuse of drugs was a little more in evidence this year than it has been in the past, but generally, our campus is fairly free of illicit drug

traffic," Carruth said. The Amarillo Police Department, in a letter to Carruth, said its undercover agents reported few incidents of

narcotic use on the campus. He said there were some regular users of marijuana and larger percentage of students who experimented with

"A substantial majority of our students continue to frown upon the misuse of drugs,"

he added. Carruth said there was an element of the Students for a Democratic Society (SDS) leadership on campus but "no attempt was made to organize an SDS operation in the true spirit of SDS.

The House Committee on Un-American Activities has listed the SDS as a Communist-front organization.

Racial problems also were minimized, he said, because the university sought to involve black students in the affairs of the campus, "making them feel

Carruth said officers of the Security Department, headed by Bobby Hudson, drove 54,409 miles on patrol during the ninemonth period, or an average of 6,045 miles a month. This was an increase of 7,789 miles driven over the previous year.

"Major crimes and problems continued the downward trend." he said, adding that 271 incidents were filed as compared to 349 a year ago.

"Sharp reductions were noted in thefts from automobiles, liquor violations and thefts of state property from buildings," Carruth said.

He attributed the decrease to a larger staff of officers and better coverage of buildings and parking areas.

Liquor violations, the leading offense with 65 cases in the 1968-69 school year, dropped to seventh place in the 11 crime categories with 16 cases in the past year.

Miscellaneous theft was the leading crime with 63 cases. an increase of 20 over the previous year. Theft-from-room also was up from 36 cases to 55, making it the second leading offense on campus.

Traffic accidents and improper conduct showed slight rises, but incidents of burglary dropped to four cases.

In three of the nine months no liquor violations were recorded and only one case was reported in each of two other

The number of traffic citations increased slightly to 7. 683 with 4,169 of the offenses being for failure to display a parking permit.

The Security Department recorded 15,294 visitors to the campus during the nine months as compared to 11,835 in the previous period.

The report showed the five women's residence halls, with accommodations for 933 students, had 94 per cent occupancy during the school year. The yearly average of residents was

This compared with an average of 906 residents the previous year.

In the five men's dormitories. housing 1,005, the average number of residents was 856, or 84 per cent of capacity. A year ago the figures were 930 and 92 per cent.

'Occupancy rates remained at an acceptable level but could be higher if more pressure was brought to force students to live on campus during the spring

semester," Carruth said. come more of a problem in the 1971-72 school year when two high-rise dormitories, now under construction, are completed, when meal tickets become mandatory for campus residents and if more off-campus

apartments are built in Canyon. In the area of women's affairs on campus, Dean of Women Jean Moore said two new resident hall directors have been appointed.
