
is not a party to a minority or maority. He asks no protection from the government if he decides he doesn't want to pay for police protection or fire protection or any government service. If the government is honest, intending to protect men's lives and property, it will not molest him. It will leave him alone. It will leave it up to him to defend his own life and property. And a government of that kind

means lack of government. We would still have government for those who believed in equal liberty; and it would be a very strong government; and it would be a very inexpensive government. Personally, I know of no single individual who would not be willing to pay to support a government to stop individuals or groups from initiating force, in proportion to the amount of property he had protected. He be willing to pay even if he wasteful, because if it only tried to protect men's lives and property and didn't operate itself into stealing, it would be a very inexpensive government and cost so much less than it would cost an individual to

There is no substitute and no alternative to a definite limited government other than a government that enslaves part of its people, and that form of government is the exact opposite from the ideologies on which this government was formed. thing that works a hardship on any individual. It means that we only want people to support the government, and therefore help run it, who believe in the moral principle that all people are equally free, and that all people are owners and that no individual has a right

Number 1" report back in the early days of the New Deal, a report back in the early days of the New Deal, a report that was fallacious even then but a report which received widespread publicity. The Committee of the South,

under the able chairmanship of Colonel E. W. Palmer, President of the Kingsport Press, Kingsport, Tennessee, has made a very thorough survey of the enormous industrial development in the South in recent years, both of those industries that have moved to the South from other locations and those new industries that decided to locate in the South. The committee found there were

three main factors that determined this Southern industrial expansion. The one ranked as most important was the fact that a Southern location would place a plant near a great Southern market that had heretofore been almost totally supplied with manufactured goods from a distance. The second factor in importance was that a Southern location would place the industrial plant nearer to its source of raw materials, a recognition of the fact that the South furnishes a large percentage of these materials for the nation.

The factor ranked third in im-

portance was the labor supply. And what may prove startling to those who think otherwise or who would like to have us think otherwise is that industrial plants locating in the South were not after cheap labor, they were seeking good labor. One of the great complaints of the proponents of federal




