Resolution Canvassing Returns And Declaring Result Of Election

THE STATE OF TESAS COUNTIES OF BORDEN AND HOWARD

WHEREAS, this Board of SCHOOL DISTRICT: Trustees resolved and ordered that an election be held within this District on the 14th day of August, 1976, for the purpose of submitting certain propositions to establish a maintenance tax and issue bonds under the provisions of Chapter 20 of the Texas Education Code to the resident qualified electors of the

District; and
WPEREAS, it is hereby found
and determined that said election was held in accordance with the authorizing proceedings, that notice of the election was duly given in the form, manner and time required by law, and that said election was in all respects legally held and conducted in accordance with the laws of the State of Texas applica-

ble thereto; and
WHEREAS, the returns of said
election have been made to this Board of Trustees and said returns, duly and legally made, show the following votes were cast on the propositions submitted at said election, to wit;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF BORDEN INDEPENDENT (District Seal) COUNTY

SECTION 1: That all of the recitals contained in the preamble of this resolution are found to be true and are adopted as findings of fact by this Board and as part of its judge-

SECTION 2; That it is further found and determined that the results of the election as canvassed and tabulated in the preamble hereof properly represents the desires of those persons voting at said election.

SECTION 3: That a majority of the resident qualified electors voting at said election having voted in favor of the propositions numbered 1 and 2, the Board of Trustees of said District is authorized and empowered to establish a maintenance tax and issue the bonds on behalf of said District in the amount and for the purpose mentioned in the propositions, as set forth in the proceedings calling the election.

Be it resolved as of August 16. 1976, the Fluvanna School District shall be annexed to the Borden County and Snyder Independent School districts. All of the former Fluvanna District properties lying in Borden County will be annexed to the Borden County School District. All former Fluvanna School District properties lying in Scurry County will be annexed to the Snyder School District.

The indebtedness and cash District will be divided proportionally to the taxable evaluations as of this date as determined by these joint boards-10.3, Borden County and 89.7, Snyder.

Fluvanna School physical properties and school records shall become the property of the Snyder School District, excluding 6 teacherages. Snyder will have first choice on teacherages, the custodians home, Borden County will have second choice, Snyder, third choice, and Borden County, the remain-der. Individual school records will be made available to the Borden County Schools as need-

ed.
Teacher contracts(Mrs. Mills and Mrs. Rundell) become the responsibilities of the Snyder School District and Mr. Ridenour's shall become the property of Borden County Schools. Pupils shall attend the school in the district where they reside after annexation. Transfer procedures shall be followed in accord with the policies of Texas Education Agency which has extended the deadline accomodate circumstances relating to this annexation. Students wishing to transfer from either district should contact the Superintendent of the re-

ceiving district to receive further information.

The resolution was signed by Jim Burkett, County Judge of Borden County and Marvin Hanson, President of Scurry County

School Board.
Permission was given by The Board to apply for membership to an organization called Texas for Equitable Taxation in support of favorable tax legislation for West Texas.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned.

AUSTIN-The 1975 Texas Field Crops Statistics book has been published, Agriculture Commissioner John C. White has announced.


The free 89-page booklet includes statistics on all field crops except small grains and cotton.

CINNAMON SURPRISE BUNS

1 pkg. dry yeast ¼ cup warm water 1 cup milk, scalded 1/4 cup sugar 1/4 cup butter 1 tsp. salt 3-4 cups all-purpose flour 2 eggs, beaten ½ tsp. vanilla 24 large marshmallows 1/2 cup chopped pecans ¼ cup melted butter 1/2 cup sugar 1-1/2 tsp. cinnamon

Dissolve yeast in warm water. Add milk, 1/4 cup sugar, butter, salt, eggs, vanilla and 1-1/2 cups flour. Mix well. Add enough of remaining flour to make a soft dough. Turn out onto floured surface and knead about five minutes. Place dough in giled bowl: cover and let rise until double in bulk, about one hour. Punch down dough; place on floured surface and roll out 1/2-inch thick. Cut into 4-inch circles. Combine 1/2 cup sugar, cinnamon and pecans. Dip marshmallows into 1/4 cup melted butter, then into sugar mixture. Place marshmallow in center of each circle of dough. Wrap dough around marshmallow, pinching together securely at bottom. Dip top of roll into butter and then into sugar mixture. Place in greased muffin tins, cover and let rise until doubled. Bake at 350 degrees for 20 minutes or until lightly browned. The marshmallow will melt, leaving the center of the bun hollow and coated with syrup. Yield: approximately 24 buns.

Kiker's Kolumn

Screwworms have mounted a siege on the Lone Star State this spring and summer, and the coming months hold little promise for relief.

Virtually all of Texas is now subject to the menacing flesheating livestock pest, points out Earnest Kiker, county agent for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Recent cases in Montague county in North Texas and in Baylor, Cottle, Kent and Motley counties in the Rolling Plains mean that screwworms are now within striking distance of all livestock in the state. Therefore, it's vital that producers check their livestock regularly, spray for flies, treatany wounds, and send any worms found in wounds to the Mission Lab for identification emphasizes Kiker.

If the worms are identified as larvae of the screwworm fly, then action will immediately be taken to bombard the area where the case was reported with sterile flies reared at the Mission Lab. Sterile flies will breed with wild screwworm flies, rendering any eggs that they may lay as sterile. Thus the eggs won't hatch. Of course, the screwworm fly dies after mating, so the mating process with the sterile flies breaks the reproductive cycle of the screwworm.

Texas screwworm cases in June totaled 2,306 and were double those recorded in June of 1975, points out Kiker. That makes this June the third worst on record since the screwworm eradication program got under way in 1962. Through July 28 a total of 6,398 screwworm cases have been confirmed in Texas this year.

With the recent wet weather in South Texas, a letup in the screwworm siege is not likely. And, traditionally, screwworm cases have been high during the fall months. So, the outlook isn't good, surmises Kiker.

However, a new effort that may eventually keep the screwworm out of Texas will be kicked off in late August when the first screwworm eradication program begins in Mexico. That's when the first consignment of flies from the new insectary at Tuxtla Gutierrez is scheduled for delivery to Baja, California.

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

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
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
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
