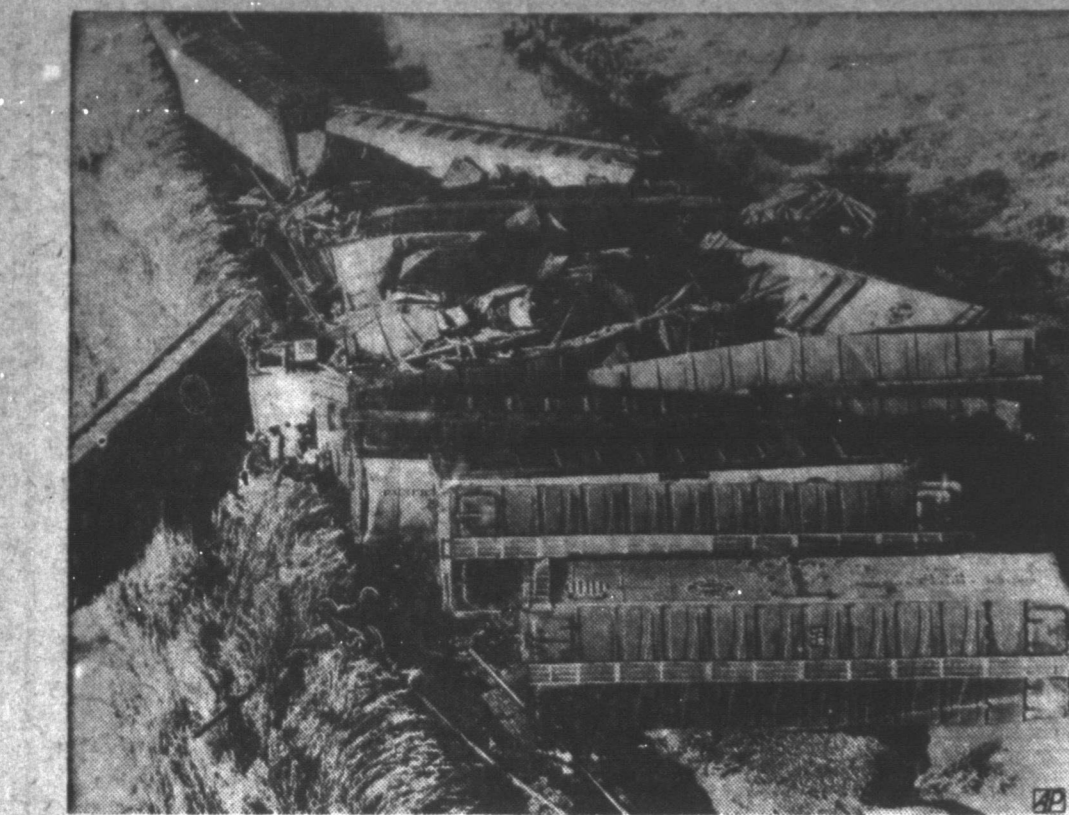


# Judith Coplon Is Expected on Stand Next in Espionage Trial

## Texas Gets Equipment For Polio

March of Dimes equipment to combat one of Texas' worst epidemics of infantile paralysis was flown to San Angelo today by Army plane from North Carolina.

The action came as State Health Department records yesterday showed an increase of polio cases. Ninety-four new cases were reported for the week ending June 11, compared with 37 the week before.

A representative of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis said 22 cribs, five hot pack machines and quantities of hospital linens were being obtained from a Monroe, N. C., polio treatment center. It was established during last year's epidemic there.

This is the second time in the last few days that supplies from there have been flown to San Angelo.

Hardest hit was Tom Green County (San Angelo). Its report last week to the department showed 27 new cases. The number in hospitals at San Angelo dropped to 15 Wednesday.

Unofficial figures showed four new cases admitted yesterday to San Angelo hospitals and six dismissed.

City Manager Sam O'Lawhon said the entire city had received its second DDT spraying since the epidemic started.

For the year the count had reached 464 in the state compared (See TEXAS, Page 7)

## HEADLINE HUNTING IS PANNED

As the government's big "spy" trials continued to make headlines, President Truman repeated today his belief that all the furor over espionage is mostly headline hunting. (See story Column 8.)

Meanwhile, his Justice Department proceeded with the prosecution of two major cases involving alleged espionage and aid to a foreign power by former government employees.

In Washington, Judith Coplon's appearance on the witness stand in her espionage trial appeared likely to be delayed a day.

The attorney for the former Justice Department employee continued his detailed examination of Prosecutor Raymond P. Wheatert, whom he called an "important" defense witness. He indicated Miss Coplon will follow to the stand tomorrow.

In New York, John W. Davis, the Democratic nominee for president in 1924, testified he regarded the character of former State Department official Alger Hiss as "good." Hiss is on trial for perjury in connection with Whittaker Chambers' charges Hiss was a Soviet spy.

Davis is a trustee of the Carnegie Endowment for International Peace, which Hiss formerly served as president.

Miss Coplon was expected to be her own star witness in the two-month-long espionage trial.

## Wheat Harvest Heading for Full Operations in Plains, Panhandle

The wheat harvest buzzed toward full swing today in the Texas South Plains and Panhandle.

Some fields still were muddy from excessive rains of the past few weeks but clearing skies indicated it wouldn't be long before the combines and trucks can move full scale.

## Elevator Gets First Load of Gray Wheat

Despite the recent heavy rains, the first load of harvested wheat was delivered at 4:45 p. m. yesterday to the Fisher Panhandle Grain Company.

The first load, brought in by Lewis Meers and H. B. Ruscoe, surprised the elevator men for they weren't expecting the first load for several days yet.

The wheat, Early Triumph, was grown three miles south of Pampa. It yielded 34 bushels to the acre and tested 60 pounds, with a moisture content of 14 percent.

Ruscoe and Meers brought in 50 bushels in their first load. The second load of Gray County wheat was delivered to the elevator, Wilkins elevator at 7 p. m. yesterday.

Carson County's first load was delivered to the Panhandle elevator, DeLoach elevator at 7 p. m. Monday. It was harvested by O. R. Meaker and son, Lee Roy, on their farm four miles southeast of Pampa.

Like Gray County's first loads, the Carson County wheat had a moisture content slightly more than 14 percent. Meaker's wheat tested 57 pounds with a yield of eight bushels to the acre.

## Judge Makes Examinations

LA GRANGE, Okla. — Over defense protests, Judge James R. Fuchs today began examining prospective jurors for the insanity trial of Dr. Lloyd I. Ross.

The judge hopes the procedure will speed selection of a jury which will determine whether the condemned slayer is to die in the electric chair or be committed to a mental institution.

Judge Fuchs said it is the first time in history for the procedure to be used in Texas courts.

"It has never been done before," he said, "but it is under the law."

Attorneys are not permitted to ask questions but may suggest subjects to be included by the judge.

In explaining this action, Judge Fuchs told the attorneys: "I think I'm doing both sides a favor and doing a distinct service while carrying out responsibility. You have been antagonizing the jurors with your questions."

Word was received here this morning of the death of two long-time residents of Skellytown and their daughter and son-in-law, all of whom were killed in an auto wreck near Shattuck, Okla., late yesterday afternoon.

The dead are Mr. and Mrs. Lonnie F. Feigenpan, residents of Skellytown the past 23 years, and Mr. and Mrs. Alton F. Atteberry, Oklahoma City.

David Atteberry, four years old, was not injured. Further details of the fatal accident were not available.

Feigenpan, an employee of the Shell Oil Co., was a member of the White Deer Masonic Lodge and a patron of the Eastern Star. Mrs. Feigenpan was a member of the Order of the Eastern Star and of the Rebekahs.

Mrs. Atteberry attended Skellytown and White Deer schools. Following her graduation from Texas Technological College at Lubbock, she was employed in the Portales, N. M., school system, where she met her husband.

Atteberry served in the Coast Guard during the war and was a medical student in Oklahoma City at the time of his death.

Mr. and Mrs. Feigenpan are survived by one son, Dennis E., of College Station, and by two grandchildren, David Atteberry, and Dian Feigenpan.

## HST CALLS PROBES HYSTERIA

WASHINGTON, (AP) — President Truman today described the current uproar over spies as part of a postwar hysteria which will die out as it has after other wars.

Some members of his own administration are infected by it, Mr. Truman said, he will clean them out.

But he would not comment at his news conference on an editorial proposal that a commission be named to investigate the methods and procedures of the FBI and its Director J. Edgar Hoover.

He stated flatly, however, that Hoover has not submitted his resignation. This was in reply to questions about a published report of a quarrel between the FBI boss and Attorney General Tom Clark.

When asked whether Hoover has his confidence, Mr. Truman replied that Mr. Hoover has done a good job.

And when asked whether he thought Hoover could be included in those denounced by Mr. Truman last week for headline hunting, the President invited reporters to make their own estimate of the situation.

Neither would he comment on whether it would be a good idea to clear federal files of what a reporter called "unsubstantiated" reports.

The question obviously referred to reports of anonymous informants to the FBI which have been read in the Judith Coplon espionage trial. These reports, still unevaluated by the FBI, named many prominent persons as Communists.

As for the subject of spies, he invited reports to men. The history of the alien and sedition laws of the 1790s, following the Revolutionary War. You'll be surprised at the parallel, he said.

Noble agreed, Parker said, that the situation west of Pampa should be corrected and added he would send the engineers to Pampa at the convenience of City Manager Pepin to study the terrain and make surveys to determine the best way to drain the waters that flood southwestern Pampa every time a heavy rain falls.

## Greek Born Movie Theater Magnate Is Highest Paid Corporation Employee

WASHINGTON —(AP)— Charles P. Skouras, an \$810,000 a year Greek-born movie theater magnate, was listed by the Treasury as America's highest paid corporation employee in 1947.

Betty Grable, with \$208,000, was the best paid of her sex in a list of over 1,000 persons who drew more than \$75,000 in pay from corporations in 1947 or in business fiscal year ending in 1948.

It was the third consecutive year at the top for Skouras, although his compensation as president of National Theatres Amusement Co., Inc., and of Fox West Coast Agency Corp., was \$175,500 less than they paid him the year before.

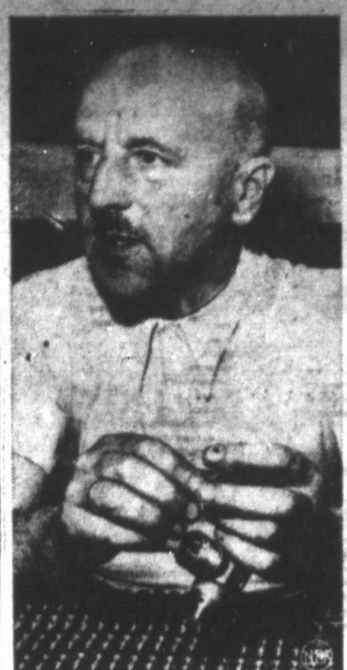
All the sums which the Treasury listed were before taxes. On single persons, the 1947 federal income tax alone ran about \$75,000 on a net income of \$800,000, about \$408,000 on income of \$500,000, about \$225,000 on \$300,000 and about \$149,000 on \$200,000. In some states, state income taxes took an additional bite.

Both Skouras and Miss Grable could be overtaken later as supplementary lists of corporate salaries in the 1947-48 period are issued by the Treasury.

Miss Grable and actress Olivia de Havilland were the only women among the 47 persons credited in the new list as earning more than \$200,000 during 1947.

No movie stars made the top ten money earners, which featured business men to an extent unusual in recent years. In the top ten behind Skouras were:

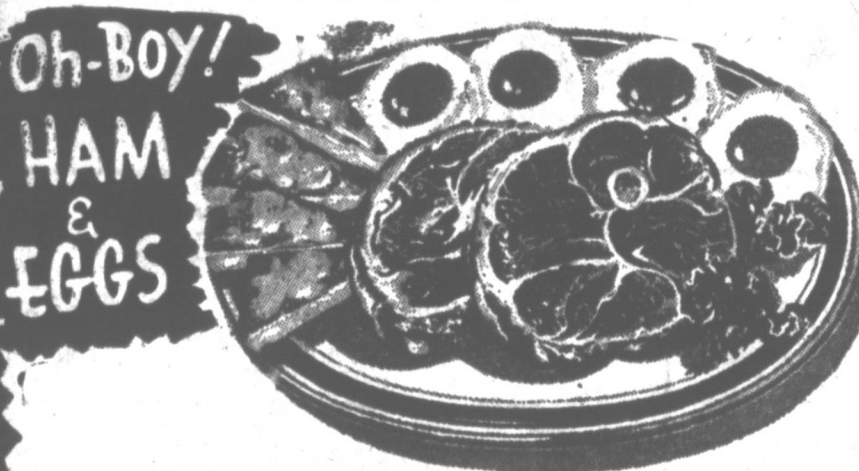

- 1/2 cup seedless raisins
- 2 tablespoons rum
- 4 teaspoon lemon juice
- Grated rind of 1 lemon
- 1/2 cup rice
- 2 cups milk
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 2 tablespoons butter
- 2 eggs, separated
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1/4 teaspoon nutmeg

Let raisins, rum, lemon juice and lemon rind mellow together for 2 hours or better still let stand overnight. Put rice, milk and salt in top of double boiler and cook for 1 hour stirring frequently but gently with a fork.

When rice is done take off stove and stir in butter. Beat egg yolks slightly and pour a little of the hot mixture onto them, stirring constantly (this way you have a smooth pudding). Mix the two mixtures and add sugar and nutmeg. Cool before you fold or gently stir in stiffly beaten egg whites. Pour into greased casserole. Set casserole in pan of hot water and bake 30 minutes in slow oven, 325°F. Makes 4 people want Father's Day every day.

**Perryton Markets First Wheat**

**PERRYTON** (Special) — The first load of wheat marketed in Perryton from this year's harvest was delivered late Tuesday afternoon by Carl Carter of Boyd, Okla.

The wheat was cut on Carter's farm just over the Oklahoma line, where the harvest has started this year earlier than it has in Ochiltree County. The wheat tested 60, with a moisture content of 14.66 percent, and it sold for \$1.72 per bushel.

The general outlook in Ochiltree County is that there will be a shortage of combines because so many machines are still on the South Plains and may not be able to complete their contracts in that area in time to meet their commitments with Perryton farmers.

Observers said yesterday that there is not a spare combine in town now, compared with the 20 or more idle machines that were waiting in the rain last week.

The general harvest in Ochiltree County is expected to open about tomorrow noon.

E. L. McElhannon of the Texas Employment Commission has his office set up at the harvest headquarters provided by the county commissioners on the rodeo grounds one-half mile west of town. Those interested in harvest information should contact him at phone 8, Perryton.

**Water Lines Nearly Complete**

**PERRYTON** (Special)—Laying of new water lines to new housing developments in the southwest and northwest parts of town is nearly complete, city officials announced.

The H. H. Heiskell Drilling Co. of Pampa is expected to begin work in a few days on a new water well to be drilled in the City Park in the 1000 block of S. Main.

An eight-inch water line was laid to connect with the old city line to give pressure from both wells. E. S. Lanier of Haskell, Tex., has the contract for the water lines.

New sewer lines will be laid in the east part of town and in the northwest and southwest parts to connect with both the new housing units. The Sherman Machine & Iron Works, Oklahoma City, has the contract for the pipe work, and the Southern Cons. Co., also of Oklahoma City, will do the concrete work.

Concrete laying crews arrived in town Tuesday and work will begin as soon as materials arrive. J. A. Clark, superintendent of construction, said.

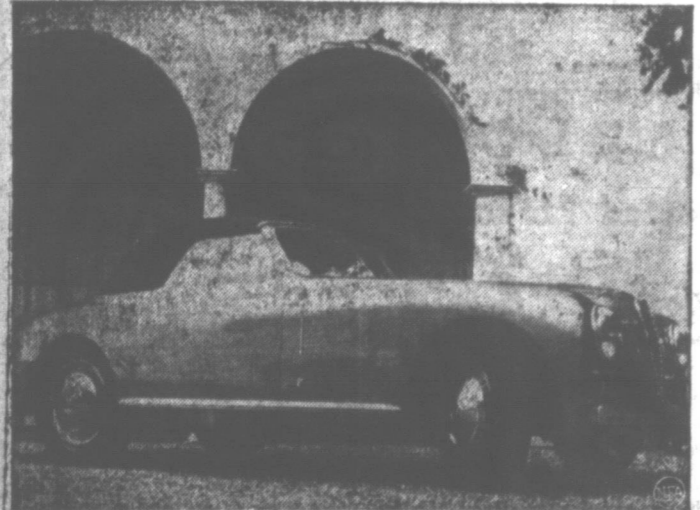

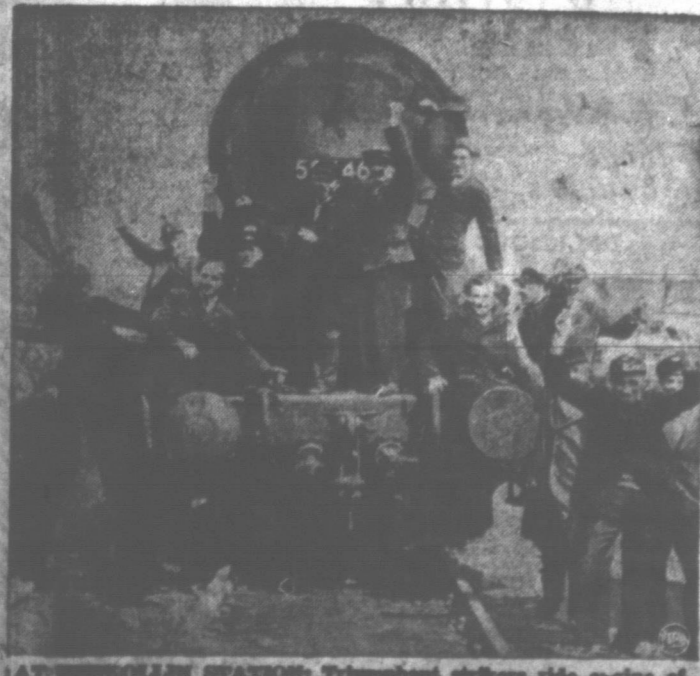

### Good Signs Expressed in Polio Report

NEW YORK — (AP) — Two good signs in the attack on infantile paralysis were stressed in the 11th annual report of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis.

One is a likelihood that present cases will be a simple, quick for this disease. One of the handicaps is the delay before the doctor can be sure. This is important because early treatment is essential.

Other good sign is development of two steps toward progress of an infantile paralysis vaccine. First step is to discover how

many different strains or kinds of infantile paralysis there are since a vaccine made for only one kind is not good for another.

The second step is discovery of a method to grow the virus, the microbe that causes infantile paralysis, outside of living nervous tissues. This makes it easier to study the virus.

To combat last year's infantile paralysis outbreak—27,888 cases, second largest in the nation's history—the foundation spent \$4,250,000 more than it received in the March of Dimes. This was done by dipping into reserves which had been accumulated for such an emergency. Remaining now is a reserve of \$1,629,000.

In that epidemic 45 states exhausted their own share of March of Dimes money and the national foundation supplied deficits.

### Lourdes Today: 90 Years After Bernadette's Vision, Pilgrims Overflow Grotto Shrine

contain the ever-growing crowds. Services are often held out-of-doors.

A pilgrimage in Lourdes is a moving sight, even for non-Catholics. At every moment of the day, people may be seen kneeling in prayer and repentance on the Calvary Hill, in the churches, the baths and the grotto, the latter alight with thousands of candles, offered by the faithful, which glitter throughout the day and night.

In the bright afternoon sunshine, on the broad Esplanade leading to the basilica, thousands of people walk in procession between rows of sick, often dying people, whose pleas punctuate the litanies of the clergy.

The atmosphere, however, is joyous rather than grim. Church bells ring and voices sing hymns. Processions are apt to start spontaneously all over the town. People kneel, pray, unthinkingly, cry their faith everywhere.

When a pilgrimage train arrives, volunteer stretcher bearers and nurses, representing every class of society, handle their charges with care and devotion.

One of the marvels of Lourdes is the strong faith and patience of the sick and dying, hoping for recovery which has been pronounced impossible. But for every "miraculous" cure, there are uncounted thousands who return to their homes resigned to their fate.

In 1882, 24 years after the apparitions, a medical Bureau of Investigation was established by the Catholic authorities to check on "miraculous" cures. This was set up near the famous bath where the sick are immersed in the waters of the "miraculous" spring.

From then on every cure has been catalogued and investigated by doctors who come there from all over the world. Over 16,000 medical men have signed the Golden Book at the Bureau of Investigation.

Scientific and exhaustive inquiries are made on reported cures, which, according to the large basilica, which was church, "are a direct challenge to subsequently built, cannot now the negations, doubts and sar-

casms of contemporary incredulity."

Before a cure is definitely accepted, there are three conclusions to be arrived at:

1. The patient must have been seriously ill, suffering from an organic disease and not merely a nervous or functional ailment.
2. The cure has to be complete and instantaneous and no extraordinary medication administered.
3. No explanation for the cure can be found in the ordinary course of natural laws.

The obscure little shepherdess, whose life story was told to the world in the film "The Story of Bernadette," was canonized by Rome on December 8, 1933, 75 years after her death, before 76,000 people.

Twenty-nine years after she died, when her body was transferred to a reliquary, it was found to have remained intact. It remains so to this day, visible to the pilgrims who go to Nevers to pray at the shrine of St. Bernadette.

Borger Man Found Guilty Of Assault

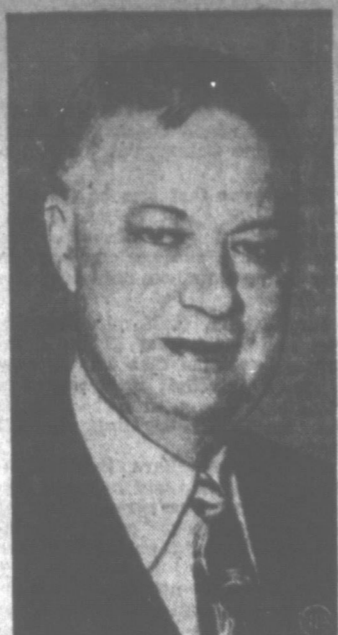
BORGER — An 84th District Court jury in nearby Stinnett yesterday found Vernon H. Robertson guilty of aggravated assault in the June 27, 1948, slaying of Carl H. White, Borger postal employee, sentenced him to six months and fined him \$500. Robertson was indicted by the Hutchinson County Grand Jury for murder in the first degree in the killing of White in front of Robertson's night club. Robertson admitted on the stand during the trial, that he hit White over the head with a shotgun when White lunged at him and "kept reaching in his pocket." He told the jury he feared for his life and was "scared" of a possible robbery. Testimony brought out that White came to Robertson's night club after the place was closed and wanted to buy beer, was refused and then threatened to take Robertson outside and take over if a waitress, Dessie Reed, didn't come out. White's companions departed. Dessie was supposed to have a date with White the night of the killing. Robertson denied he intended to kill White and was quoted as telling the waitress "I had to hit that fellow or maybe hit him too hard. If the law comes out you tell the truth." The jury got the case at 5:30 p. m. after the state and defense attorneys made their final arguments. The defense, H. M. Hood and K. H. Dally, stressing self defense. At 8:35 the jury asked if a suspended sentence could be given. Judge Jack Allen said that none had been asked for. District Clerk Mrs. Wallace Kelly read the verdict at 9:25 p. m.

**Most Deaths Caused by Heart Diseases**

AUSTIN — (AP) — Better slow down, mister. Take it easy. Quit worrying. Quit racing to the cemetery. That was the advice of State Health Officer George W. Cox, who has just added up last year's death causes in Texas. There were 64,034 deaths from all causes. Heart disease was the cause of 16,838 of them. Cancer came second with 6,913. Apoplexy and accidents were third and fourth, in that order, with 5,406 and 5,164 deaths, respectively. Much of the heart disease, Dr. Cox said, brings death from doing too much, going too fast, worrying and fretting.

**Administration Will Not Press Congress for Stand-By War Powers**

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The Administration is sharply revising its peacetime planning for possible future war and has decided against pressing Congress for early enactment of stand-by war powers.

These decisions were reported by responsible officials. They coincide with what one top official called a "quiet, de-militarization" of the National Security Resources Board, under orders from the White House.

The blunting of NSRB's teeth was accompanied by the departure of perhaps 100 officials from the 400-man agency, one high government source reported privately.

NSRB is charged with planning the industrial and civilian mobilization of the country for any future war emergency. It is made up of seven cabinet-rank officials plus a chairman — temporarily.

The committee was picked at random about 100 schools, big and small, and asked for a list of their textbooks in general use.

What caused this? The main spring was a petition from the Sons of the American Revolution. A number of top educators already have protested the move taken by the committee.

For a couple of years the committee has been receiving complaints that some of this country's school books are slanted in favor of Russia.

So, Rep. Wood says, when the petition came from the Sons of the American Revolution, the committee decided to act and sent out its letter asking for the names of the textbooks used.

**Retail Meat Prices Are Pushing Higher**

Retail meat prices pushed to the higher last week on top of the sharp increase a week ago. However, growing price resistance by shoppers and wholesalers, plus arrival of larger shipments, were beginning to exert a levelling-off influence. Poultry was unchanged. Top grade eggs advanced a penny or two a dozen in many markets, but in heavy supply, eased slightly in scattered areas. And the vegetable situation was dominated by lower prices for cabbage, snap beans, asparagus, lettuce and tomatoes. A survey of key cities showed the popular cuts of beef, such as sirloin steak, up four to six cents a pound in many highly competitive chain stores.

**Delinquent Rules Altered**

AUSTIN —(AP)— Boys will be boys, the House decided and shouldn't be doomed for sneaking out for a drag on a forbidden cigarette. It passed a bill eliminating "use of tobacco in any form" as one cause for declaring a child delinquent.

The concession to youthful curiosity was made in a bill making it illegal to contribute to the delinquency of a child. The bill was one of 46 passed on a local and uncontested calendar.

Others included: Raising the expense money for regents of state teachers colleges from the present \$5 a day to \$10 a day.

Changing the name of North Texas Agricultural College at Arlington to Arlington State College. Under the Senate bill by Senator Keith Kelly of Tarrant County the name was changed to Arlington Junior College, and the bill must go back to the Senate.

Authorizing the Governor to work with the federal government for use of the Rio Grande River bed and banks to be used in construction of dams provided in a United States-Mexican Treaty. The bill goes back to the Senate for consideration of a minor amendment.

**36th Division Slates Reunion**

NORTH CAMP HOOD —(AP)— T-patchers have set Sept. 9-11 in Waco as a date for their reunion.

Then wearers of the patch who fought together in World War I; who hit Salerno beachhead in World War II; and who served in the 36th Infantry Division between wars, will gather.

Lt. Col. Charles M. Beachman of Corpus Christi, president of the 36th Infantry Division Association and a battalion commander in the Texas National Guard division, announced the dates and place of the meeting.

"We hope to have a great many of our buddies from outside the state at the meeting," he said. "There are now 80,000 former members of the division living in other states, two of our buddies from outside the state at the meeting," he said.

HOLLYWOOD — (AP) — Charles Laughton lumbered into a room marked "Tumor Board" and faced a dozen veterans, at least one of whom has a few weeks to live.

"I guess I came to the right place with this tumor," he smiled, holding his massive belly.

The men and women laughed and he introduced himself to each of them. To one wheel-chaired woman named Jenny he recited the poem "Jenny Kissed Me" and then kissed her. This was the face that launched the Mutiny on the Bounty.

Laughton took a book from under his arm and read a scene from "Midsummer Night's Dream." "Did you know Shakespeare was less than 30 years old when he

wrote this?" he asked.

He did another scene from the play with one of the women patients. Then he had a six-foot ex-fier enact Lady Macbeth to his Macbeth.

For a finish, the actor recited two scenes from "Julius Caesar." For 25 minutes Sawtelle Hospital rang with the words of Brutus, Cassius, Marc Antony and other Roman citizens.

As one of the veterans filed out of the room, he commented to a buddy, "That's the first time Shakespeare made any sense to me."

Laughton has long made a practice of reading the bard and the Bible to veterans, but this was the first time he allowed a member of the press along. A naturally shy person, he sighed afterwards, "I suppose after doing this sort of thing for years, I'm not afraid of anybody."

As we drove away from the hospital, I asked him when he would do some Shakespeare for the public.

"Lawrence Langner of the Theater Guild asked me that in Washington a few weeks ago," he answered. "I told him I wouldn't put on any Shakespeare until I was sure it would be understood. 'All the Shakespeare I have seen has bored me stiff, because I haven't understood it. I doubt if even a university professor could.'"

"The drama and the language is all there; all that is needed is better acting."

# The Boys in Washington Long-Winded

WASHINGTON — (AP) — This is the talkiest, bill introducing Congress all the time.

It has been proved — by statistics — in testimony before the Take congressional conversation. House Appropriations Committee.

John J. Deviny, public printer, had come up to Capitol Hill to explain why it took so much money to run the government printing office.

One reason, he said, is because Congress talks so much. Normally, he said, during the first two months of a session of Congress, the "Congressional Record" will average 75 pages a day.

"The first 60 issues of the

61st Congress," said Deviny sadly, "have averaged 116.9 pages."

Take the Appropriations Committee. It talks so much about saving the taxpayers money that it costs the taxpayers money.

So far, Deviny said, testimony before the various appropriations subcommittees has filled 17,846 pages. (This does not include the 28 pages needed for Deviny's testimony on why the printing cost is so high).

So far Congress has had 10,868 bills introduced. That's more, Deviny said, than the last Congress introduced in six months. It has taken -48,203 pages just to print them.

# Moisture Aided Most Texas Crops

AUSTIN — (AP) — Rain, hail and floods hampered harvests last week but most crops prospered from the needed moisture, the United States Department of Agriculture reported.

Flooding rains in the high plains brought harvest of small grains to a standstill and washed out considerable cotton acreage. Wet fields caused serious delay to reseed operations. Some additional damage from hail was reported in several sections.

Rains interrupted the Rio Grande Valley into harvest but brightened prospects for the commercial vegetable areas. The corn crop improved. Watermelons and cantaloupes in the mid-season sections were also aided.

Rain and moisture grass continued to make excellent development in most northern and all northwestern counties. Scattered showers in eastern and trans-Pecos counties and heavy rains in the Plateau and southern counties were beneficial in checking deterioration.

Cattle and sheep continued to make fair to good gains, USDA said.

GAINESVILLE — (AP) — The city fire siren sounded during a heavy electrical and rain storm early Tuesday. But there was no fire.

Fire Marshal William C. Simpson said lightning struck near the siren on the roof of the central fire station, setting it off.

# Year-Round Sanitation Is Needed

AUSTIN — During the last several summers, considerable enthusiasm was shown by various

local organizations such as Chambers of Commerce, many civic organizations, and others in the arranging of a fly eradication program. Dr. Geo. W. Cox, state health officer, says that for taking interest in this work, the responsible parties are to be commended.

However, without year-round community sanitation the ultimate

result, which is so important, has not always been too successful; in some areas this has given rise to rumors that flies are DDT resistant.

The Texas State Department of Health heartily endorses a fly spraying program, provided it includes a general clean-up program carried out during the entire year," Dr. Cox said. "For example, why

only spray a garbage heap that not only invites but actually breeds flies when it should have been removed. Why spray the city dump when it really should be covered. I fear the unplanned spraying program is "similar to the application of perfume or toilet water to overcome BO or the application of powder to cover dirt."

In a well-planned fly control program, Dr. Cox declared, all places where flies gather, such as dumps, rubbish piles, garbage piles, decaying vegetation should be cleaned up by hauling away and burying. Proper garbage and rubbish containers with tight covers should be demanded from all. All buildings should be screened. Then, secure a sprayer out-

fit, preferably with one or more hoses each manned by a skilled operator to spray the areas where flies and other insects will light. It does little good to spray the center of the street, the ball diamond, or the sidewalks. Spray the surfaces where insects light or breed.

A residual spray remains active until the DDT washes off or is

covered with grease, dirt or soot. This usually lasts four to six weeks. After that, a second spray is recommended provided the item of clean-up is still being carried out.

The legislative committee made bill two ways it provided the referee and players don't throw things, bottles, stones, rocks or cets. either.

# Eddie Waitkus' Condition Listed as 'Much Improved'

CHICAGO (AP)—A teen-age girl was summoned into felony court today on a charge of assault with intent to murder in the shooting of Eddie Waitkus, the Philadelphia Phillies star first baseman.

Waitkus, shot near the heart with a .22 caliber rifle bullet by the girl who was secretly in love with him but whom he did not know, was reported in "fair to poor" condition.

Oxygen and blood plasma were administered to the 25-year-old ball player but physicians delayed operation to remove the bullet still lodged in his chest.

His physicians at Illinois Masonic Hospital said Waitkus rallied from several low spells yesterday. A lung specialist described his condition as "much improved but still guarded."

Ruth Steinlager, 19-year-old typist, in statements to police related how she shot Waitkus, her baseball hero, after she lured him to her hotel room Tuesday night.

The tall, dark-haired girl told and retold her story of the shooting in her 12th floor room at the fashionable Edgewater Beach Hotel.

Told by State's Attorney John S. Boyle that the shooting was a serious offense, she replied: "Oh, it's just a simple one." Asked if she was sorry, she said: "I'm not really sorry. I'm sorry Eddie had to suffer so. I'm sorry it had to be him. But I had to shoot somebody. Only in that way could I relieve the nervous tension I've been under the last two years. The shooting has relieved that tension."

Ruth's mother, Mrs. Edith Steinlager, and her girl friends said she had a secret crush on Waitkus, who is single, ever since she first saw him play ball with the Cubs in 1947. Waitkus was with the Cubs for three years.

Mrs. Steinlager said her daughter had visited two psychiatrists who told her "nothing was wrong with her except she should forget about Waitkus."

Waitkus went to Miss Steinlager's room late Tuesday night in response to a note she sent him that she had something "important" to tell him. Some of her girl friends said she had written Waitkus many letters and telephoned him whenever he was in Chicago. But her letters and telephone calls went unanswered until Tuesday night.

**Leaves From a Correspondent's Life Notebook**

By HAL BOYLE

SHANNON, Ireland — (P) — Oh it was high up in the air we were, 8,000-feet above the great Irish Sea.

Inside the cabin of the American Overseas Airlines flagship, were some 30 correspondents returning from a tour of the European battlefields and outside was a thick cloud making a mystery of the land below and the sky above.

We had run into clouds after taking off from London. Some of the passengers dozed in their seats, quietly digesting one of Merrie England's postwar austerity meals and wondering if God ever made anything more courageous than the Irish.

But some of us were looking out impatiently waiting for the clouds to clear. We were semi-professional Irishmen in the crowd, seeking to know with our eyes the things our mouths had gabbled about all our lives.

Just then a starboard engine gave a tug at a cloud and swallowed it whole and through the mist there gleamed a river beneath us. And faraway, sure it was a fair river—as if the Lord had taken the Milky Way and poured it star by star between the green banks and all the stars had melted and ran together in a silver flood.

Looking down at the map of Ireland they saw it through the hearts of forebearers who had left this beautiful land for something better but carried the memory of it wherever they settled.

There was among us, Cornelius Ryan, who had been born here and was seeing his homeland again for the first time in eight

ty meals and wondering if God ever made anything more courageous than the Irish.

"There is Ireland's tallest mountain—Carrigeen," said Ryan. "Now over there, the Irish Central Plateau," said Ryan. "See how few roads there are and notice how small the farms are."

Around each farm is a stone wall. They were built in the days when the Irish used to say "we may not have any ammunition to fight the British, but we have plenty of rocks to throw at them."

Our plane landed at Shannon Airport and we picked up a souvenir of Irish earth at the edge of the runway. Then we went into the lounge. We had only an hour before our plane left and we spent it learning about Ireland.

It seems there are two rival dairies here. One is run by a fellow named Bushmill. The other is operated by a guy named John Jamason. They both bottle beautiful brown milk.

What else can you learn in an hour about Ireland, mayvournee? It was too dark to look for sham-
