





WANTED: A NATIONAL POLICY It is obvious that the public at large is showing no increasing pulse rate about widespread lack of economy in government spending. Apparently no large number of eyebrows were raised by former-President Hoover's testimony that money is being poured down the rat-hole by the military branches at the rate of \$1% billion annually. It's hard to imagine that

You do hear Senator Byra speak up, now and again. He is a great apostle of economy, but unfor-tunately his "economy bloc" seldom is able to block appropriation bills that ought to be blocked. His voice, and the voices of a mere wilderness where millions, even billions, are appropriated and spe with ease. There are hardly a halfdozen men in each party who have given more than lip service to the mportant battle for economy in national aftairs. NOT EASY TO PRUNE

Congress naturally finds it hard to deny money to projects that af-fect the people back home. There are a lot of people back home, and that explains the failure to prune down appropriations. In the face of the deficit that keeps piling up, President Truman has called for \$4 billion in increased taxes. (He has suggested no cuts in expenditures.) Actually, a federal deficit of \$11 billion is likely by 1951 or increased taxes will have to provide that much, unless important economies are made.

If any sort of headway is made against wasteful government spending, the American people are going to have to get interested. The President has not only asked for a tax increase of \$4 billion this year. He has outlined for the future more than 40 new spending projects that touch nearly every citizen. He has not said much about the cost, either in this generation or the next one. Before America gets on the skids, somebody had better think of the right way to keep prosperity: by spending less.

It is assumed by the President that his voting public gave him a "mandate" to put through his spending program. Yet, I am convinced that the American voting public has never understood the real meaning of spending huge sums of public money. 
