Haynes to file civil suit in Grandstaff shooting

A civil case involving "wrongful death" will be filed by Houston attorney Richard "Racehorse" Haynes unless evidence turns up that points to criminal negligence in the shooting death of 6666 Ranch foreman James Grandstaff on Aug. 11, in Carson County

Borger police officers apparently thought Grandstaff was the Oklahoma fugitive who fired at them while leading them on a high speed chase through Hutchinson County and Carson County

The shooting death investigation was taken to the Carson County Grand Jury. and no indictments were returned during the two - day session. The grand jury did request additional information about the shooting and will reconvene when the information is available.

City scraps utility rate increase

City Manager Mack Wofford Tuesday said a 10 percent increase in city utilities had been scrapped from budget proposals, and the estimated revenue from city sales tax was increased from five to 13 percent in Tuesday's budget study session.

A Pampa citizen's questions about recent tax notices, increasing property values and taxes by at least 100 percent, were skirted with noncommittal answers by Pampa city commissioners Tuesday afternoon during a study session of the proposed \$6.2 million operating budget for the 1981 fiscal

Nina Spoonemore of Pampa asked commissioners at the conclusion of the 90 - minute study session what actual increase in revenues the city would

need to meet the 1981 - 1982 budget. City officials said an increase of 16

Mayor H. R. Thompson said the city did not have the tax figures yet. "We have to get them from the school

Mrs. Spoonemore commented. "I realize my tax notice is misleading, but the way it looks, my taxes will be 150 percent higher this year. If we could expect a 15 percent or even 20 percent increase in taxes, we could sleep better at night. Now how much do you think our taxes will be?

City Manager Mack Wofford answered, "We don't have the figures. It would be difficult to say. We don't know what the taxes will be individually.

Mrs. Spoonemore said, "Most people feel the taxes are going to be prohibitive, especially those older people who are on a fixed income.

As the dozen persons attending the study meeting were leaving the commission room Tuesday after adjournment, Commissioner O. M. Prigmore asked, "When are we going to bring up that tax rate?"

No one answered Prigmore's question, but Thompson said the city manager's estimate included in the

budget did not include the \$5,000 homestead exemption given by the school district.

Wofford added the city proposed to use the identical exemption for persons over 65 years old as the school does.

Thompson commented, "I wished I'd have thought to have mentioned that. That lady would have felt better if I

Prigmore said if the commission did agree on the tax exemption. "that increase will be less on the elderly.

During the study session, Wofford announced that the 10 percent increase of city utility minimum rates which would have cost about \$1.60 per month per household in Pampa had been cut from the budget proposal.

"From the first two meetings. it appeared the commissioners didn't want that." Wofford commented.

The city manager that without the 10 percent increase the budget would still remain at the \$6.29 million figure. He warned the commissioners that due to rising costs. "No doubt the time is coming when we eventually will have to adjust the (city utilities) rate.

To balance the budget. Wofford said the city sales tax revenue estimate was revised from a 5 percent increase from the 1980 figures, to a 13 percent

Wofford outlined for commissioners the three areas of increase in the budget which he said would equal about the 16 percent total increase of the

These included the purchase of a 1.000 gallon pumper for the Pampa Fire Department to replace the 7 - year - old model the department now has: a hydrostatic waterline cleaning machine; two side - loading garbage trucks and 96 three - year containers to convert the commercial waste collection system

In addition to the capital items. Wofford said the budget proposes a 12 percent increase in salaries and benefits for city employees and a \$200,000 street improvement program

commented. "Most of the comments I receive is from people who want the streets improved and then kept up.

Thompson added, "I don't think that (the \$200,000 allotted in the budget) will be enough to get the streets back in shape

Prigmore said, "I'd like to see that a couple of capital items are cut and put into the street program.

Following some discussion about the streets, the commissioners instructed Wofford to file the budget with a provision that if after the public hearing it was decided to cut two of the capital expenditures, the \$250,000 specified to the items would be placed in the street improvement funds.

Prigmore suggested that hydraulic sewer cleaning machine and the sanitary waste disposal trucks and containers be stricken from the coming year's budget

He pointed out that although Wofford said the sewer cleaning machine would save the city \$20,000 per year and pay for itself in four years, the city paid only \$6,500 in contract services for sewer cleaning in 1979 and \$15,000 in

Wofford said the contract estimates he had received show prices have gone up 10 cents per linear foot.

Regarding the buying of two side loading garbage trucks and the three yard containers. Prigmore commented. "You say you have mailed us something that shows you have save the \$107,000 per year you said you would be converting to this system. I have problems with that when I look at the costs of that (sanitation) department."

He added. "It says here (indicating the preliminary budget figures) that you spent \$160,000 in 1979 before the conversion: \$195.000 in 1980; and projected \$200,000 for this year. Where is the saving coming in?

Wofford said. "Well. we went from 30

Prigmore said. "I don't care if you

actual dollars I care about.

Wofford said the budget would be filed, "with the alternative in it providing that if we can't justify the purchase of two pieces of equipment, the money will revert to the street program.

Prigmore asked if the two new employees proposed in the preliminary budget would be included in the "cost of living increase kitty

Wofford said the two employees would equal two percent of the 12 percent increase.

'That's not a realistic way to present it because you're not giving that money to the employees." Prigmore commented. "I didn't know that also included two people. I think we should know that," he added

Wofford said. "I'd prefer not to talk about that right now. If I say employees will get a 10 percent salary increase and someone only gets eight percent, then I'll be in trouble

Commissioners Tuesday also gave the city manager the go - ahead to implement a three percent city motel hotel tax to be placed on the overnight room charges of hotels and motels within the city limits.

Wofford said the tax would bring in from \$20,000 to \$25,000 per year. He suggested the money be used in the upkeep of M. K. Brown Auditorium

Prigmore commented. "I thought we agreed six months ago that it (the hotel motel tax) would be a good thing and that we would go through with it Wofford replied that at the time hotel

motel owners objected to it as giving an advantage to motels that were out of the city limits The city manager said at the

conclusion of the meeting that the budget would be filed with the city secretary by Thursday or Friday

Agencies may be eliminated in budget cuts

Reagan, struggling to control the federal deficit in the face of persistent high interest rates, is ordering a new wave of budget cuts which may wipe out whole government agencies.

The new cuts for the 1982 fiscal year. which starts next month, would be over and above \$35.2 billion in reductions already approved by Congress. \$14 billion still being sought by the administration and \$75 billion planned for 1983 and 1984 in the drive to balance the federal budget And that still may not be enough to

hold the 1982 deficit to the \$42.5 billion promised by Reagan, administration officials say

Ed Dale, an Office of Management and Budget spokesman, refused to say how much more would be cut from the budget but said every agency would be vulnerable

"The president is going to take a sharp knife on these 1982 budgets in order to hold the line," Speakes said. "We realize it's going to be a difficult

He said Reagan would be looking for further savings in already hard-hit social programs and probably would make cuts "across the board" in every department and agency.

Earlier. White House chief of staff James A. Baker III said Reagan had agreed to trim \$20 billion to \$30 billion from his record military spending plans for 1983 and 1984. Another \$45 billion would be cut in those years from already-pared social programs.

Speakes said Reagan will hold a Cabinet meeting in Washington on Sept. 10 to consider the budget cuts.

The flaw in Reagan's budget plans. Speakes said, is the persistence of higher-than-expected interest rates.

Wife and ex-husband arrested in murder of former Pampan

BORGER — A former Pampan, Carroll Lee Hudson, 38, was found dead of multiple gunshot wounds, sitting in his vehicle parked on a rural road north of Borger Tuesday morning. Hudson's wife and her ex - husband have been charged with murder in connection with the shooting. Borger police said

Janet Marilyn Hudson, 32, and Michael Lynn Bridges Sr., 35, of Borger were arrested at 12:30 a.m. Tuesday by Borger city police. Bond was set at \$50,000 each by City Magistrate Jim

Hudson has been transferred to Spearman Jail, while Bridges was taken to Hutchison County Jail in Stinnett in lieu of the bail, Hutchison today. He said Hudson was taken to Spearman because the Stinnett facility

arrested a traffic violator in Borger who told them of a situation involving the Hudson family. At this time, Hudson and Bridges drove up and were

A Hutchison County deputy sheriff later found Hudson's body in his car on a country road on the north edge of Borger, one mile south of the old county dump, police said. Hudson had been shot "multiple" times, police said. A 22 caliber handgun was taken as

evidence, police said Justice of the Peace Nadin Spinks pronounced Hudson dead at the scene and ordered an autopsy by the Borger pathologist at North Plains Hospital.

Officials said the autopsy report has not been returned. The Hudsons lived northeast of

Labor Day AUSTIN - Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) officials predict 48 fatalities in accidents on the state's streets and highways during the

coming Labor Day weekend. Texas DPS director Colonel Jim Adams warns that unless drivers are especially cautious, the 78 - hour weekend beginning at 6 p.m. Friday could be a replay of the tragic July 4

"Traffic accidents during the last July 4th weekend took a total of 60 lives. 16 more than had been estimated." he

Drunk driving and excessive speed were the major contributing factors in the fatal accidents recovered over the holiday, according to date supplied by the DPS Statistical Services Division.

None of the drivers or passengers killed during the Independence Day holiday were wearing seatbelts. In addition. 35 percent of these fatalities resulted from the person being thrown from the vehicle

"Last year in Texas, about 1200 lives would have been saved if all occupants of passenger vehicles had used safety belts," Adams says.

DPS Regional Commanders have been instructed to use additional highway patrol troopers during the three - day Labor Day holiday.

DPS patrol officers will be enforcing the laws and assisting motorists by watching for drivers who exceed the speed limit and those impaired by alcohol or drugs," Adams says. They will also be looking for vehicle defects. he adds

Adams says Operation Motorcide will be in effect from 6 p.m. Friday until midnight Sept. 7.

During the July 4 holiday, 73 percent of the fatal accidents occurred between 8 p.m. and 4 a.m.

Khadafy threatens attack of Mediterranean nuclear depots

TRIPOLI, Libya (AP) — Libyan leader Moammar Khadafy threatened to attack American nuclear arms depots around the Mediterranean if the U.S. Navy again challenges his control of the disputed Gulf of Sidra.

'We are warning the peoples of Sicily, Crete, Turkey and all the states of the Mediterranean that if America again attacks the Gulf of Sidra, then we will intentionally attack the nuclear depots in their countries and cause an international catastrophe," Khadafy declared in a speech Tuesday on the 12th anniversary of his overthrow of King Idris.

We are willing to die for the Gulf of Sidra." he declared. "We will make the Gulf of Sidra into a new Red Sea with our blood.'

Nazi slave-labor boss dies at age 76 on visit to London

LONDON (AP) - Albert Speer, the Nazi slave-labor boss who spurred German war production despite massive Allied air raids, died during a visit to London, the city blitzed by the bombs and rockets of the war machine he ran. He was 76.

Speer, whose post-war memoirs provided the most detailed account of the inner working of the Third Reich and made him a rich man, died Tuesday of an apparent stroke.

The man who once said he was "mesmerized" by Adolf Hitler and served him as chief architect and production chief, was in Britain for a television interview with the British Broadcasting Corp.

After recording the first segment of the interview Tuesday morning, Speer returned to London's Park Court Hotel, where he collapsed in the afternoon. He was taken unconscious to St. Marv's Hospital and died there at 8:30 p.m., 2:30 p.m. EDT, the hospital said.

The BBC said Speer was being interviewed for a documentary about Hitler's proposed cultural center in the dictator's hometown of Linz, Austria. Speer, the project's chief architect, was questioned by Cambridge University historian Norman Stone, who said the ex-Nazi "showed no sign of strain. Speer, who engineered Hitler's rise to

power and later put his organizational skills to work running the Third Reich's enormous industrial complex, was convicted by the Nuremberg War Crimes tribunal in 1946 of crimes against humanity Described at Nuremberg as one of

Hitler's "closest personal confidents. Speer was convicted for his expansion of the slave labor system, using civilians from occupied countries to power the Nazi war machine. The only senior Nazi to admit responsibility for his crimes, Speer served a 20 year sentence at Spandau Prison in West Speer was born March 19, 1905, the

son of a prominent architect in Mannheim. As a young architech in 1931, two years before Hitler rose to power, Speer joined the Nazi Party and rose quickly through the ranks on the basis of his expertise in organizing the giant rallies that marked Hitler's ascension ~ While still in his 20s. Speer was given

the task of designing a new Berlin, complete with a quarter-mile-long marbled chancellery, that was to reflect Hitler's view of Nazi grandure. Like most of the dictator's other projects, the Berlin development was stalled when Germany invaded Poland on Sept. 1, 1939, starting World War II.

Three years into the war, Speer became Hitler's minister for armanents. Under his leadership, German aircraft production rose from 12,400 planes in 1941 to 45,000 in 1944 despite round-the-clock Allied bombing of German manufacturing centers. Some experts say Speer's production expertise extended the war by two

In his memoirs, part of which were smuggled out of prison, Speer claimed that toward the end of the war he turned against Hitler's policies, and entertained ideas of pumping gas in the Fuehrer's bunker. However, he said Hitler's power over him persisted.

Speer's death leaves former Deputy Fuehrer Rudolf Hess as the only senior member of the Nazi hierarchy still

South Africa captures Soviet officer, two killed in invasion

CAPE TOWN, South Africa (AP) -South Africa captured a Soviet sergeant major and killed two Soviet lieuterant colonels during its Angolan invasion, a Defense Ministry spokesman said

In a telephone interview from Pretoria, the spokesman said Sgt. Maj. Nikolai Fyodorovich Pestretsov, who was earlier identifed as a warrant officer, was captured during a skirmish in Angola about 30 miles north of the South-West African border

The spokesman, who asked not to be identified, did not provide names of the slain Soviet officers or details of their

He said more than half of the South African forces in Angola had been withdrawn and the rest would be pulled out "according to schedule." He could not say when the troops would return to South-West Africa because they were 'still having problems with land

An informed source estimated that the force totaled 4,000 when the invasion began Aug. 24.

South Africa's defense minister said Tuesday that the Soviet casualties in Angola prove the Namibian guerrillas are controlled and supported by the Soviet Union.

There can be no doubt that the terrorist organization SWAPO is controlled by and given ideological and material support by the Soviet Union,"

said Defense Minister Magnus Malan in

"Earlier, it was generally believed and acclaimed that Soviet Russia was only indirectly involved, but now the opposite has been proved, namely the direct involvement of military personnel on the lower levels of terrorist movements.

SWAPO is the South-West Africa Peoples Organization, which has been fighting a bush war for 15 years to try to end South Africa's control of South-West Africa, or Namibia, as the big territory between South Africa and Angola is called by black Africa and the United Nations. South African forces make periodic

raids into Angola to attack SWAPO bases there. This time, informed sources reported, the chief targets were radar and anti-aircraft missile batteries installed by the Soviet Union and its East European allies in southern Angola to aid SWAPO and the Angolan army.

The South Africans advanced more than 60 miles into Angola, then announced last weekend that they were withdrawing. A field commander of the invasion force told visiting reporters that the radar installations and missile batteries were destroyed and an estimated 450 Angolan troops and SWAPO guerrillas were killed.

South Africa said Tuesday that its forces had not completed their withdrawal because land mines were delaying them

In Washington, a senior Reagan administration official said the Soviet Union and East Germany have had 1,000 advisers in Angola for some time, assisting Angola's Marxist government and the Namibian guerrillas. He said the Soviet Union is a major supplier of arms to the Angolans, and some of these are being used by SWAPO.

Meanwhile, the Soviet Union accused the U.S. government of displaying a "high-handed disregard" of world opinion by vetoing a U.N. Security Council resolution condemning the South African invasion of Angola.

"Even the United States' closest NATO allies have not dared to challenge the world public so blatantly," said the official Soviet news agency Tass.

The United States said it vetoed the resolution Monday night because it did not mention the estimated 20,000 Cuban troops in Angola and the Soviet military advisers there as contributors to the situation in the area.

The other two members of the North Atlantic Alliance on the Security Council are Britain and France. Britain abstained on the vote while France voted for the resolution along with the other 12 members of the council.

Cleanup begins as flooding moves south

By The Associated Press

The rain-swollen Lavaca and Guadalupe rivers chased South Texans to higher ground for a second day as they churned over their banks downstream from where floodwaters claimed the lives of at least five people.

In Cuero, the steadily rising Guadelupe River Tuesday flooded parts of the city about 80 miles southeast of San Antonio

The National Weather Service said the Guadalupe River had fallen to 41.5 feet at Cuero early today. The river is at or near crest and should remain at or near 41.5 feet today.

At Victoria, the Guadalupe reached 30 feet early today and was expected to crest at 30.5 feet

sometime Thursday. Most of the heavy rainfall had ended before dawn today, but forecasters said the flooding would

continue for some time "Several river additions are completely under water." said Dewitt County Sheriff Bob McMahan. And some livestock have been lost down the

Hundreds of evacuated residents in Gonzales and Lavaca counties returned home Tuesday to start

massive cleanup operations and survey the damage from the muddy torrents.

Lavaca County Sheriff Hilmer Woytek said evacuated residents of a nursing home and county jail inmates remained in temporary shelters Tuesday in Hallettsville.

"We had 6 feet of water in the jail. It's the worst we've ever had," he said.

Cuero officials opened a center for evacuees early Tuesday afternoon, although most schools were able hold classes, said McMahan.

He said county jail inmates accompanied sheriff's officials to help families move valuables

Most residents in Lavaca County, where flooding was most severe, had no flood insurance, officials

and furniture.

"Fifty or 60 homes were flooded here," said Shiner city secretary Ila Stratman. "That water's a bad thing. Flood insurance is so terribly high anad hardly any company will write it (for areas near rivers).

Three Shiner youths drowned Monday when fast-rising waters swept away a home where they had taken refuge, officials said

Gregory Hights, 16, said his three brothers were carried away by swirling waters that demolished their mobile home.

Hights said he and his brothers, Glenn, 17, Johnnie, 15, and Bradford, 12, had gone to a nearby frame house after their mobile home was flooded out early Monday morning.

Hights and his 15-year-old brother crawled onto the roof before the murky water carried the house downstream, tearing it apart, he said.

"I was with Johnnie on the roof when he fell off," Hights said. "He was calling my name. He said, 'Greg, Greg,' - I couldn't do anything.

The 16-year-old survivor was found clinging to a tree by rescuers who had tried in vain to reach all four youths before the house was swept away.

Authorities said the bodies of Samuel Goode, 27, of Hallettsville, and Herman Rayne of Yoakum were discovered Tuesday morning near flooded

Lavaca County Sheriff's officials said the two men were in separate vehicles and were swept away while trying to cross the rain-swollen creek on U.S. Highway 77.

Forecasts called for mostly cloudy skies over the state today with scattered showers and thunderstorms expected over Southwest Texas. South Central Texas and East Texas.

Highs were to be mostly in the 80s and 90s except in the Big Bend area where highs were to be near

Most of the heavy rainfall in southern and southeastern sections of the state ended before dawn today, but a few showers lingered in Southwest Texas near San Angelo and heavy thunderstorms developed in North Texas, north of the Dallas-Fort Worth area. Dense fog wasreported in Northeast Texas.

Thumbs-up feeling

It's far too soon, of course, to conclude that President Reagan's policies have rescued the nation's economy from the twin curses of inflation and stagnation. The proof. if and when it comes, won't be available for a year or more.

Even so, there's a decidedly refreshing opitmism in the air that contrasts sharply with the pervasive gloom and doom of a year ago.

A 1980 New York Times - CBS poll found that two - thirds of Americans were markedly pessimistic about the future well - being of both themselves and their country. That same question drew dramatically different answers in June. By a 2 to 1 margin. those polled reflected a new thumbs up feeling that things were. in fact. getting better.

It can't be entirely conincidental that some significant economic indicators are showing heartening improvement as well. Inflation declined to an annual rate of 7.4 percent for the second quarter of this year. If the new mortgage loan rates that affect relatively few consumers are subtracted from the Consumer Price Index, the inflation rate for most families fell to 6.5 percent during April. May and June. And more encouraging, the inflation rate for July dropped to 5.5 percent.

Gold and silver prices - indirect inverse barometers of the strength of the American economy - plummeted during the last 12 months. A conclusive measure of international confidence in the world's largest economy is the strength of the dollar in foreign money markets. And for most of this summer, the dollar has been ringing up successive highs against the German mark and the Japanese ven.

Unemployment, the traditional price paid for fighting inflation. is declining. The July figure of 7 percent is the lowest in 15 months.

In one sense, these heartening indicators tell us little about what Reagan's supply side economics will mean for the economy. The tax and budget cuts the president won from Congress won't begin to affect the economy until later this year.

But the psychological boost provided by Reagan's leadership. and the new discipline he has prompted in Congress, is indeed making itself felt.

And the results constitute the kind of good news for which we've been waiting a long, long time.

Time to repeal a costly law

It is a law that has so much fat built into it that it is costing the taxpayers of this country upwards of \$2 billion a year

The law requires that "prevailing wages be paid to workers on federally financed construction projects. "They want it for the coal and other energy holdings." he said.

The purchases were made by the London-based Hanson Trust and a Canadian investment combine composed of the Belzberg Interests of Vancouver, British Columbia, and HCI Holdings Ltd. of Toronto. Hanson Trust bought 5 percent of Gulf

purchased over 6 percent, Harrison said.

The purchases were made prior to Aug. 25 when Gulf announced it planned to close Bunker Hill because the northern Idaho operation lost \$8 million in the first half of this

Resources stock and the Canadian combine

year and was costing the corporate parent \$3 million a month.

Harrison said the billionaire Hunt family of Dallas still holds about 9 percent of Gulf's stock through Placid Oil Co., which was

turned back in a bid to buy all outstanding

Gulf stock for a reported price of \$400 million.

The SEC report indicated that the Canadian combine did not expect to acquire more than 10 percent of Gulf's stock. The Wall Street Journal Tuesday reported that Hanson Trust's disclosure statement indicated that company might reduce or increase its stock in Gulf Resources at any

The Wall Street Journal also reported that Hanson Trust representatives and Gulf Resource officials met briefly on Aug. 20, but a Gulf spokesman later said no understandings or agreements came out of the session

Some Spokane market analysts believe closure of the Bunker Hill complex could lure investors to Gulf. In addition to profitable coal operations, the company has substantial and growing oil and natural gas interests.

When Gulf executives announced plans to close the lead, zinc and silver mine in Kellogg, they said it was part of a new, long-range strategy to withdraw from the metals mining and refining business and expand its coal, oil and gas operations, which have been generating significant profits.

Stock price reaction to Gulf's decisions has been almost negligible on the Spokane Stock Exchange, Harrison said.

He said those in the know had anticipated the closure, so the market discounted the move. Now, investors are waiting to see what develops, he said.

Gulf stock closed at \$26 a share on Aug. 25, the day the shutdown was announced. It closed at \$25.25 Tuesday.

Washington Water Power Co. stock, which some thought might be affected by the closure, was also holding its own Tuesday at \$16.50.

Bunker Hill is the utility's largest electricity and natural gas customer.

WWP Executive Vice President Paul A.
Redmond said the utility anticipates "no impact on our stock prices or our ability to raise money.

"We also do not anticipate any layoffs or change in employment."

Mother who lost custody of sons critical after overdose

HOUSTON (AP) — A woman found unconscious just hours after a judge ordered her sons returned to their father in New York was listed in critical condition at a Houston hospital early today from an apparent drug overdose, hospital officials said.

Family Court Judge Bruce Wettman ordered Harriet Berne to surrender custody of her two sons Tuesday in a case that may have been the first test of a new federal law controlling the interstate flight of estranged parents with their children.

Houston fire department paramedic Walton Segree said he found the woman lying unconscious on her living room floor with three empty pill bottles nearby. Fire department dispatchers said they received a call from a man who reported an overdose.

Mrs. Berne had left Rochester, N.Y., with her sons two years ago despite a ruling by a New York court that gave custody of the children to her ex-husband, Dale Berne, 43.

Mrs. Berne, 37, was free on \$5,000 bond pending an extradition hearing Thursday. She faces a state charge of custodial interference in New York and a federal charge of unlawful flight.

She was arrested last week in Houston, where she has lived and taught school since

1979 using the name Judy King, when police acted on a tip from a babysitter who recognized the boys' pictures in a magazine article about children kidnapped by their parents.

Berne said the arrest ended his two-year search for the couple's two sons.

Wettman said Tuesday he felt he had no choice but to return the children to their father.

"I felt like my hands were pretty well tied in what direction I had to take," he said.

Scott Berne, 11, tried to reassure his 7-year-old brother, Mark, who asked, "Can I say bye to my mother:"
Scott asked the judge, "Are we going to see

"Obviously the boys were upset," Wettman said. "It was probably the hardest job of the whole mess to see those kids. It will take time, but I feel they understand what happened, even though they are not real

happy with it."

The judge asked Berne to "afford the mother the opportunity to properly part with

Berne said he planned to return to Rochester Tuesday night.

Grocery prices show decrease in August

Shoppers are finding lower prices at the supermarket particularly for pork chops. according to an Associated Press marketbasket survey which shows grocery bills dropped by six-tenths of a percent during August.

More than one-fifth of the items checked by the AP declined in price last month and many of the decreases were substantial. In part, the price trends at the supermarket reflect what's happening on the nation's farms: The U.S. Department of Agriculture says farmers are getting paid less for many key crops than they were a year ago.

The AP drew up a random list of 14 commonly purchased food and non-food items and checked the price at one supermarket in each of 13 cities on March 1, 1973. Prices have been rechecked on or about the start of each succeeding month.

The latest survey showed that the marketbasket bill increased at the checklist store in four cities last month and decreased in eight cities. It was unchanged in the 13th Overall, the marketbasket bills decreased an average of six-tenths of a

The marketbasket bill measured by the AP has declined in five of the first eight months of 1981. dropping in February. March, April and May, as well as in August. It increased in January, June

Looking at prices for the past year, the AP found that the marketbasket went up at the checklist store in five cities over the last 12 months and decreased in eight cities. Overall, it was an average of 1.6 percent lower at the start of September than it was a year earlier.

Associated Press Writer BRENHAM, Texas (AP) -Bidding to lease 12,700 acres of West Texas land dedicated to Washington County schools has stirred up a controversy involving a number of local officials, including County Judge Gus Mutscher, the former Texas House speaker.

District Attorney Charles Sebesta said Tuesday he figures a grand jury investigation into the leasing should conclude by the end of September. Mutscher calls the

investigation, sought by a potential opponent in next year's elections, politically motivated.

"The main thing I am concerned with is to see everyone involved gets a fair shake." Sebesta said in a telephone interview.

The controversy arose when the county commissioners court voted in July to lease the county's school land in Tom Green County to somebody other than the high bidder.

"The mechanics of the way the thing was handled are the greatest problem. Whether it was intentional or criminal. I don't know. That's what the grand jury is for," Sebesta







Alarmed about burglaries? Check your home

By LOUISE COOK **Associated Press Writer**

How safe is your home? The FBI estimates that there are over two million residential burglaries every year, and Americans spend millions of dollars trying to thwart the thieves.

Neil Solomon, vice president of the technical services division of Guardsmark, Inc. of Memphis, Tenn., said sales of residential security devices totaled \$610 million in 1978. By 1990, Solomon said, the market will more than quadruple to \$2.5 billion, according to estimates by Predicasts Inc., a Cleveland forecasting firm.

The best alarm cannot guard against things like unlocked windows or doors. "Carelessness by the occupant is a big

cause of successful home burglary," said Solomon.

There is no such thing as a burglar-proof home, Solomon said. "All you can say is burglar resistant ... What you're doing is raising the stakes to a level where it's not worth the burglar's effort

Dead-bolt locks on doors and key locks on windows help raise the stakes and can provide a first and relatively inexpensive line of defense. Light also deters burglars. "If you can deny darkness, a shadowed hiding place, your chances for not being broken into are a lot better," said Solomon, who advises corporations and individuals on security measures, but does not sell alarm systems themselves.

An alarm system ups the stakes still further. The simplest

- and cheapest - alarms are the ones which give off a loud noise to frighten an intruder away. Noise may not be enough determined thief, however.

More con icated systems send an alarm to a central reporting station which notifies the police. Prices for this kind of system range from \$1.500 to \$3,500 and up. Monthly service fees are extra.

Before you buy any alarm system, find out what kind of sensor is used to detect the presence of an intruder, what sort of protection there is against false alarms and what kind of service you will get from the company you are dealing with.

Ask the salesman for a list of current subscribers and contact them to find out whether they are satisfied

could be gaining ground. The office of the county attorney handles all hot checks from \$5 to \$199.99 as misdemeanor offenses.

Hot checks written for \$200 and up are sent to the District Attorney's office and are. treated as felony offenses.

This office handles 250 hot checks per month from local merchants." County Attorney Robert McPherson said.

We were able to collect restitution from 72 check writers last month. McPherson said. "We also sent out letters to 300 delinquent check writers in

The office of the County Attorney has added an extra clerical assistant just to work on contacting the writers of hot checks

August was bad month for business

NEW YORK (AP) - The economic forecast index dropped just one-tenth of 1 percent in July - not a bad performance in view of the widespread feeling it will take a while to get the economy moving again.

But that was in July, a

month or so ago. Something worse than that probably occurred in August. There aren't many numbers to document the feeling, and whatever figures exist are subject to revisions. But the feeling is strong: August wasn't good.

Feelings can't be ignored. because they come from the same source as the numbers. Feelings are measures of economic activity. And while they can distort, they can reflect accurate observations

These are some of the observations: Car sales are dismally poor, well below industry expectations. Housing is sinking into an abandoned cellar hole. Small business unable to absorb costs and often unable to raise prices is in a bad way. Companies of all sizes are closing plants and laying off workers, often in wholesale

This is hardly the mood that was expected to follow a massive realignment of federal priorities, expressed in budget and tax cuts and designed to spur confidence. inspire investors, and encourage savers, risk-takers and business to commit themselves to the economic

future Wall Street, not as reresentative of random opinions as it used to be but still an indicator of attitudes. has had a fainting spell, produced in part by the shocking realization that it had been listening to its own and Washington's advertisements rather than

to the marketplace. The most serious intrusion into this reverie was the realization that the Federal Reserve Board means to take a stand - a stand so strong that hopes of a sharp decline in interest rates have been abandoned

The typical comment from analysts a week or so ago went something like this:

"This is a new beginning The tax and budget bills weren't the very best, but they'll accomplish a lot. The country finally is pointed in the right direction again, and that's good news for

investors Today, the mood is decidely more reserved, and the once-confident voice of your broker may have a quiver in it as he observes

"Things will get better, that's for sure, but first we're going to have to get by the Fed. which is hell-bent on having its way. Soon as those interest rates come down we'll be okay When? I don't



They have seven days to make restitution after they receive the registered letter. If they do not respond to that, we go to the county attorney's or district "attorney's office." Chambers said.

Our policy is to see a driver's license for every check. We always ask for positive identification, just in case someone has taken a person's checks, the positive identification helps. Chambers said.

The rash of hot checks has slowed down a little in the past two years. In 1977 we had a big hot check problem here. The office of the justice of the peace was trying to take care of the hot checks but there was just no policy," he said.



Israeli apple trees thrive in South Texas HONDO, Texas (AP) — A successful experiment

with a dozen dwarf apple trees from Israel's Negev Desert has prompted optimism that the low chill plants could thrive throughout warm South Texas.

"They've done so well that I decided to put in another 400. Some of them will be ready to harvest next year," beams Medina County cattle and chicken rancher Tony Zerr, who recently finished

harvesting 12 trees heavy with the fruit.

*Zerr planted the first dozen dwarf trees three years ago on recommendation of County Extension Agent Eddie Holland and Dr. Loy Shreve, Texas Agricultural Extension Service horticulturist in

"I'm amazed at this apple crop," Zerr said. "I really didn't expect them to produce very well here, especially so soon, but I'll try anything once. I think this orchard will raise some eyebrows in the area

when it reaches productive potential." Zerr's miniature trees now measure just under six feet in height and have their branches tied to

stakes to hold up apple-laden limbs. He said the small size of the trees have two advantages - a person can stand flat-footed and pick the apples to hold harvest costs down, and more trees can be planted in a small area

"You put them on a trellis like a grape vine. I plan on letting people who want to buy them harvest them," Zerr said.

Zerr runs 200 head of cattle and has 20,000 laying hens. He uses chicken manure to fertilize the trees, which are watered mostly by drip irrigation although bountiful rains this year eliminated that

Shreve personally selected low chill apple trees that were developed in the Negev Desert of Israel and are adaptable to the mild South Texas climate.

The horticulturist said Hondo, located 40 miles southwest of San Antonio, was about the northernmost area the trees should be grown because they could be placed in jeopardy by late freezes that sometimes occur in the Texas Hill Country to the immediate north.

"Ordinary apples require 800 to 1,000 hours of chilling, which is the accumulated time when temperatures are 45 degrees Farenhait or less, Shreve said. "Yet, by comparison, these Israeli varieties require only about 300 hours of chill, and maintain a certain amount of disease-insect

The short Israeli trees can easily be covered to prevent freezing and are noted for early

production, often in the second or third year, Shreve said.

Varities he recommends for this climate include Anna and Ein Shemer from Israel, and Dorsett Gold, a variety originating in the Bahama Islands. Other newer Israeli varieties are Elah, Adia 17, Ben Dagen, Michael and Maayamand Slor, but they are not yet available, Shreve said.

However, the fruit specialist warned that more work must be done to ensure the trees will thrive

throughout the region. There's definitely a future for low chill-requiring apples in South Texas, but that means more experimental work is necessary," Shreve said: "Producers in the Hill Country may be flirting with trouble by growing these varities exclusively, because a late freeze, will wipe them out. Israeli varieties are adapted to South Texas which has a climate similar to Israel.'

Holland said Zerr has economics on his side for commercial production of applies from the dwarf

"One tree produces about a bushel of applies and the plot Tony has selected can accomodate about 800 trees," the extension agent said.

NEW YORK (AP) - The big tax cut favors big business over small, says the National Small Business Association, whose rolls includes 55,000 individuals and enterprises, none listed on a major stock exchange.

The NSBA wants to make its position clear, for at least two reasons:

First, it seeks to counter the position of some organizations that have little but praise for the cut. Second, it hopes in upcoming bills to correct some of what it sees as deficiencies hurting small

Its position contrasts sharply with that of the U.S. Chamber of Commerce, which claims that 'contrary to some published reports,' the new law "affords substantial tax relief for smaller

David Franasiak, chamber tax authority, says, "Business people are beginning to recognize the

numerous benefits to smaller firms in the bill that may have been overlooked during the heat of

Herbert Liebenson, NSBA president, agrees that some relief is afforded small business by the new law. Still, he says, it is skewed in favor of big business. What was overlooked, he says, was small business - in capital gains, for example, an area of great importance for small business operators considering the sale of their business.

Prior to passage of a tax cut, all parties agreed that capital gains taxes should be cut, but there were two different methods: raising the percentage of income that could be excluded from taxes, and reducing the overall tax rates.

The latter was chosen, to Liebenson's chagrin. "Increasing the exclusion would have treated every income level equally," he says. But "the method

chosen, relying on overall rate cuts, does not. At \$200,000 of income, he states, a taxpayer under the new law will benefit from an overall rate cut from 70 percent to 50 percent, and a reduction in capital gains from 28 percent to 20 percent. That means a total tax reduction of 28.5 percent in the first year, says Liebenson.

At \$50,000 of income, he continues, the reduction in the overall tax rate is to 38 percent from 49 percent over a four-year period, bringing with it a reduction in capital gains taxes to 15.2 percent from 19.6 percent, or a 22.5 percent drop.

The inequity doesn't end there, says Liebenson, explaining, "If the buyer is one of the 11,000 companies with nationally traded stock, then there would be no capital gains tax at all, because exchanges of the stock of one company for the stock

Small businesses want tax cut equity

WASHINGTON (AP) - There's an old joke that Washington veterans are reviving as President Reagan tries to cope with the growing political furor over high interest rates.

The outgoing president hands his successor three envelopes marked No. 1. No. 2 and No. 3, with instructions to open the appropriate one after each year in office if the economy is souring.

One bad year goes by, and the new president opens the first envelope. The contents say: "Blame the previous administration." After another poor year, he opens the second envelope and reads: 'Blame the Federal Reserve Board." After a third year of gloomy economic developments, he rips open the last envelope and finds the message: Prepare three new envelopes

With five months left in his first year, Reagan gives the impression that he peeked into the first envelope. Whenever he and his aides are asked why interest rates are persisting at record and near-record levels, they lay the blame at the feet of the Carter administration

"We're paying the piper for four years of stop-and-go economic policies," presidential spokesman Larry Speakes recently said.

And, Reagan already has started to put some distance between himself and the Federal Reserve. One gets the feeling that, if interest rates stay in the stratosphere, it's only a matter of time before he follows the advice of Envelope No. 2 and turns on the nation's central bank.

"The Fed is independent, and they're hurting us in what we're trying to do as much as they're hurting everyone else," the president told a group of California Republicans.

Spokesman Speakes quickly explained to reporters that the "they're" referred to high interest rates, not the Fed, and that the president has "complete confidence" in the bank. But the hint

of criticism came through. At this point, Reagan has no legitimate complaint with the Fed's tight-money policy, because that's exactly what he ordered to fight inflation.

For years, it was government policy to risk rising inflation to keep interest rates low and stable. Now, the government is risking high interest rates to bring inflation down. Both Reagan and Fed Chairman Paul Volcker say they see eye-to-eye on this policy call.

The Fed, which regulates the nation's supply of money, has been keeping a tight grasp on the growth of credit in the belief that too rapid an expansion is inflationary. However, the combination of a tight-money policy that restricts supply and large budget deficits that increase demand for credit produces persistently high interest rates.

The administration's plan called for the Fed to stick to a tight-money policy while the White House cut spending en route to a balanced budget by 1984. In February, Reagan aides were predicting that the high interest rates they inherited from Carter would plummet by summer but that has not
