Redistricting goes back to drawing board

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) - It's back to the maps and
computers today as five top state officials try to computers today as five top state officials try to
come up with boundary lines for the 150 House and 1 Senate districts.
The Legislature The Legislature thought it took care of the
politically bloody redistricting task during this
year's regular session. Those maps went year's regular session. Those maps went out the
window thanks to a Gov. Bill Clements' veto of the Senate plan and a court rejection of the House plan. That leaves it up to the all-Democratic
Legislative Redistricting Board. which was

couple of years after that, the female Loggerhead needs a little land to reproduce.
