Tony Zale, 'Man of Steel,' Announces Ring Retirement

CHICAGO (AP) — Tony Zale, former world's middleweight champion, yesterday announced his retirement from the ring — thus stepping aside as the No. 1 contender for the crown now held by Marcel Cerdan.

Cerdan, scheduled to face Zale in a return match at New York June 21, now probably will meet Steve Brillante, formidable 160-pound New Yorker. The date will be either June or September, depending upon arrangements by the Tournament of Champions.

Zale, the always popular, but slightly rusted "man of steel" from Gary, Ind., will be 36 years old next month.

In surrendering his claim to a rematch with Cerdan, Zale passed up a \$50,000 guarantee.

"It was to satisfy my pride that I wanted to meet Cerdan again," Zale explained. "But now I'm satisfied to rest on my past."

Punching professionally since 1934, Zale held the middleweight crown from 1940 to 1946, except for a brief time in 1947 when he lost to Rocky Graziano in the second of their vicious three engagements.

At a news conference, Zale declared:

"After deliberation and arguments with myself and my managers, too, I decided to call it quits. It was not an easy thing to do."

Sam Pian, one of his co-managers, cut in with the explanation that Zale had "pride and determination to regain the title for the second time, but he had overlooked the two most important things in life — his health and his family." Zale is the father of two daughters, aged six and three.

When Zale flattened Graziano in the third round of their last tangle June 10, 1946, at Newark, N. J., he became the only other dethroned middleweight champion ever to regain his title. The other was Stan Ketchell, who lost it to and regained it from Billy Papke.

Zale lost his title the second and last time to Cerdan on a technical knockout in the 12th round of a battle fought in Jersey City last Sept. 21. It was a distinct upset by the fancy-boxing French invader.

Sports Fans Enjoy Run-Around When Tony Hulman Gives It

NEW YORK (AP) — One a year Tony Hulman gives some 200,000 people the run-around, and they love it.

Tony Hulman is a tall, dark and handsome gentleman from Terre Haute, Ind., and among numerous other holdings he owns the Indianapolis Speedway, where every Memorial Day daredevil is in souped-up iron horses go around and around the big track, trying to cover 500 miles in the shortest possible time.

The Speedway people gave a nice party for the press here last Sunday, and we attended hoping to get some pertinent information on the big race. What we did get was some pertinent information of Tony Hulman, a subject quite as interesting.

Hulman purchased the Speedway from Eddie Rickenbacker in 1945, but his association with sports goes much farther back than that. Back to pre-World War 1 days.

In prep school, at Lawrenceville and at Worcester, Mass. Academy, he gained quite a reputation as a track and field man. "I was in it when the war came along," he says. "I couldn't wait to get in, so ran away from school and joined the Ambulance Corps."

After the war he went to Yale, where in 1921, 1922 and 1923 he played end on the fine football teams the bulldogs turned out then.

His active participation in sport today is a deep sea fisherman and a low-70 golfer. He is one of the top men when it comes to tuna fishing.

Rickey Doesn't Sell at Bargain Prices; Does Mahatma Hear One Hundred Grand?

NEW YORK (NEA) — Already yet the Dodgers snipe up as the club to beat.

Not only on the field, but indoors, over the conference tables, where so much of the early baseball must be played.

The other clubs are sweating out the Brooklyn surplus, with every front office wading anxiously through budgets, option files and waiver lists in search of the wedge that would force Branch Rickey to set up a bargain counter.

Meantime Rickey poises his gavel, holds up a glittering, like-new infielder for all to admire, and patiently repeats:

"Do I hear \$100,000?"

The question is which will fall first, Rickey's prices or the shoppers' resistance, and this has to be decided by the showings of the clubs.

The Giants may be cracking already. Leo Durocher can't like what he has seen. His second baseman hurt him in two straight games, and in defeat No. 2 by the Dodgers, Leo weakened on his shortstop to the extent of a seventh-inning pinch-hitter.

Durocher got to musing about those Brooklyn price tags. He sneered at them, to be sure, but at the same time sounded like a man who is straining to do business.

This is what Rickey is asking for his livestock:

Eddie Miksis, \$100,000.
Bob Ramazotti, \$85,000.
Tommy Brown, \$75,000.
Dick Whitman, \$50,000.
Willard Ramsdell, \$40,000.

The first three names are the important ones, because infielders are in short supply around the league and the bidding for them is high. Not quite that high, as yet, especially since Rickey insists on throw-ins, a farm club player or two, in addition to the cash. Miksis is invariably the first player the other clubs name.

Oddly enough, the Rickey outfit has higher regard for Ramazotti as an all-around player. But Miksis commands a bigger price. His youth, speed and reputation as a double-play marvel apparently make him more desirable.

Brown, listed now as an outfielder, is being sought for infield protection. Brownie is the best shortstop the semi-professional Brooklyn Bushwicks ever had. Also the best batting practice hitter in either league.

That is what the customers object to about Rickey's wonder boys. The prices really are fantastic for players who have yet to prove themselves.

Miksis, Ramazotti and Brown had shots at third base, where the Dodgers were in desperate need the last few years. All failed. For the third straight year Whitman finds himself unable to win a job in an outfield that has been pleading for left-hand strength. Ramsdell never impressed Durocher in Brooklyn and Burt Shotton doesn't seem any more pleased with him.

That's why Leo scoffs at the fancy figures. He goes further, needing Rickey with cracks like: "Brooklyn has some players I wouldn't have even at the water price."

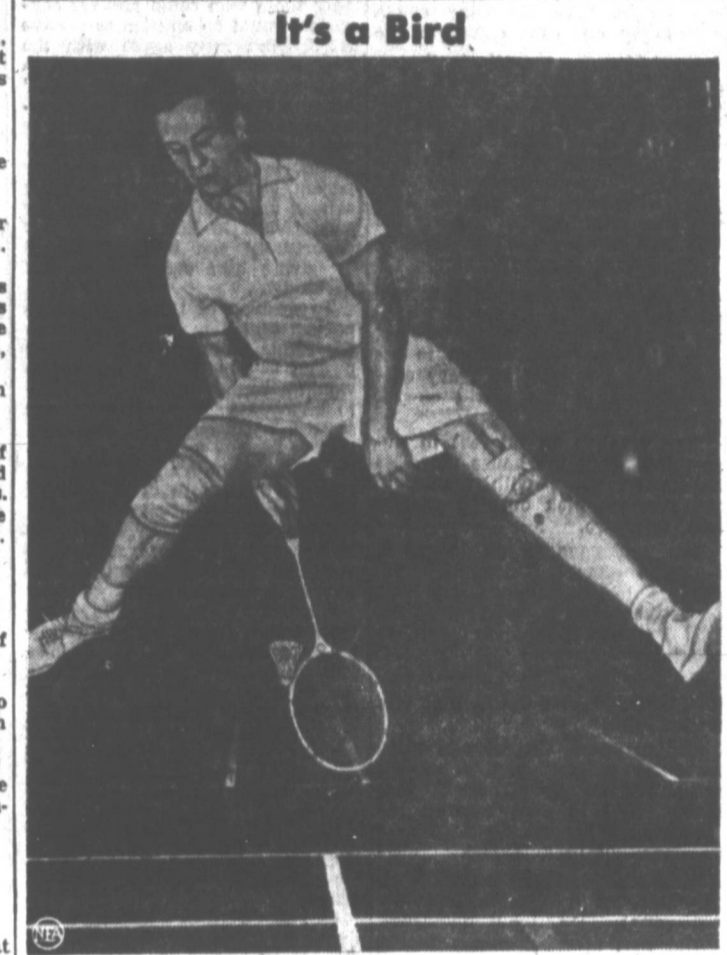
But the more games the Giants lose the greener Rickey's grass will look, and the cheaper his prices, too, and other have-nots. And Branch can wait.

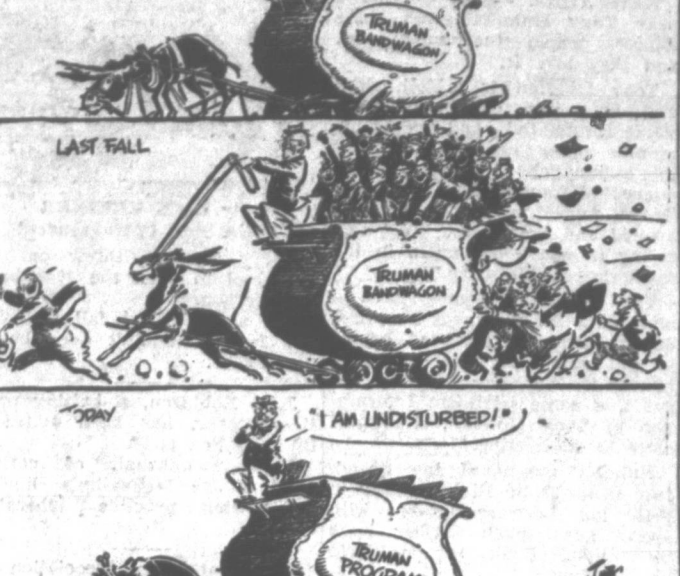

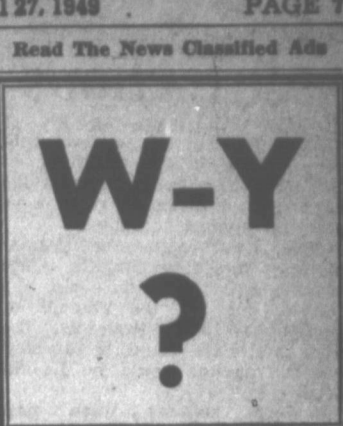

Can India Become Republic And Stay in Commonwealth?

The conference of British commonwealth prime ministers in London, to try to figure out how India can become a republic and still remain within the commonwealth, is fascinating in its potentialities.

An entirely new situation has been created by the refusal of mighty India — like the independent republic of Ireland — to continue recognition of the King as her sovereign. Such recognition has been a requisite of membership in the commonwealth. Unless some substitute can be devised, India will walk out of the commonwealth when she becomes a republic.

That's the problem which the London conference is trying and confidently expects — to solve.

The solution must be flexible enough to include more nations than India, for others may adopt the republican form of government. Among them might be Pakistan and Ceylon, and there even is speculation that the Dominion of South Africa might take this step.

The evolution of the commonwealth is an interesting chapter of history. Canada gave it a big fillip back at the time of the formation of the League of Nations after the first world war. She fought a great battle for separate Canadian representation in the league — and won her point. Finally in 1931 the Statute of Westminster was born. This provided that "dominions are autonomous communities within the British empire, equal in status, in no way subordinate to one another in their domestic or external affairs though united by a common allegiance to the crown, and freely associated as members of the British commonwealth of nations."

Now the time has come to revise that statute. The relationship ultimately will be divided into three categories: (1) the imperial relations with the colonies; (2) the commonwealth association with the autonomous dominions which still acknowledge allegiance to the crown; and (3) the special association and Asiatic dominions which do not acknowledge allegiance to the King.

Thompson Heads School Board

A legislative report on the status of the Gilmer-Aikin proposals was given the Pampa Independent School District Board Monday during regular session by Superintendent Knox Kinard.

H. R. Thompson, elected president of the board on April 11 to succeed Ray Wilson, whose term expired, presided over his first full-length meeting.

Other officers of the school board are: Herman Whitley, vice president; and A. C. Troop, secretary.

Routine business concerning maintenance of school equipment was discussed. There were no motions entered on the minutes.

Texaco Announces Quarterly Earnings

Net earnings of the Texas Company and its subsidiaries for the first quarter of 1949 are estimated at \$28,870,111, of \$2.08 per share on 13,797,824 shares outstanding, the company announced through its local offices this morning.

The first quarter figures were announced today by W. S. S. Rogers, Texaco chairman, at the annual stockholders' meeting in New York.

The estimated earnings are after deducting all charges, including provision for federal income taxes. They compare with \$27,974,829, or \$2.08 per share on 13,461,598 shares outstanding at the end of the first quarter of 1948.

Jester Plans Mexico Visit

MATAMOROS, MEXICO — (AP)

— Texas Governor Beauford Jester plans to visit every state in Mexico in an effort to erase differences — particularly those concerning Mexican labor in Texas — between Mexico and Texas.

The Governor promised Mexican President Miguel Aleman he would make the tour. Jester and Aleman held an impromptu conference here Sunday.

Jester expressed "personal regret" for "several unfortunate incidents of discrimination against Latin Americans" in Texas.

In return Aleman said he had "great hopes" Texas soon will be removed from the black list which forbids importing Mexican farm labor into the state.

Jester told Aleman that one of the things he hopes to do before completing his term as governor is obtain Pan-American educational foundation at the University of Texas in Austin.

Jester said he hopes to have the foundation set up by Nelson Rockefeller, former assistant secretary of state.

Appreciation for the cooperation between Mexico and the United States in fighting hoof and mouth disease was expressed by Jester.

The meeting resulted after state Sen. Rogers of Edinburg suggested Jester, who was at Ramonville Saturday, should meet Aleman. The Mexican President had been touring Northern Mexico.

Among those in the international party were Jester, Kelley; John Van Cronkhite of Harlingen; and Bascom Cox, Robin Pate, Oscar Longnecker and Ygnacio Garza, all of Brownsville.

McLean Clean-Up Week Set May 2-7

McLEAN — (Special) — The McLean Lions Club is sponsoring a spring clean-up week from May 2 through 7 and is asking for a general overhauling of individual premises, streets, and alleys.

have chosen this means of coming from retirement to lead China in her battle against communism. He called on his people to fight as hard against communism as they did against the Japanese in eight years of war. At the same time he admitted some of the shortcomings of his own 22-year rule of the vast country. The Generalissimo said the Reds by crossing the Yangtze had blundered into the same military errors that mired the Japanese in their conquest of China. The river crossing, he said, represents the "peak of Communist military development." It will bring the Reds "face to face with the tangling mass of military, political and economic problems which will eventually result in their downfall."

"I am certain," he said, "that so long as we carry on the struggle the Communists can neither enslave nor destroy our country. Within three years the final victory will be ours."

Chiang said his government realized that communism was a problem of international complication that China alone could not settle. If that problem in China could have been settled through peaceful and political means, Chiang went on, he felt that China would become the tinderbox battleground of a terrifying third world war in which every nation of the world would be tragically involved.

An error, originating in the city manager's office, gave the rezoning public hearing date as yesterday while a legal notice stipulated May 3 as the hearing date. The hearing will be held next Tuesday, May 3. The commission began exploratory talks on the widening of W. Kingsmill between Cuyler and Russell. While nothing definite was decided, the commission agreed the street would have to be widened in order to continue angle parking there. The problem of laying a storm sewer along Kingsmill delayed any final action. In addition City Manager Dick Pepin told the commission he had not seen all of the property owners along Kingsmill yet.

A resume of the city's insurance protection was presented the commission by Farris Oden. The report was accepted and placed on the calendar for further consideration.

CCC to Provide Ample Storage Space for Grain
WASHINGTON—(P)—The Commodity Credit Corporation will take all possible steps to provide ample storage space for grain crops this year, Rep. Poage (D-Tex.) says. He made the statement yesterday after conferring with CCC President Ralph Trigg. Proper storage for grain is necessary for farmers to obtain government loans on their crops. Poage said he received complaints last year that some grain dealers deliberately held the previous year's crop at inland elevators so farmers could not find approved storage space available. Growers therefore were forced to sell at prices lower than the loan figure, he added. The Texas said Trigg also agreed to do everything possible to see that grain stored at inland elevators this year is moved to port and terminal warehouses, thus making room for the coming harvest.

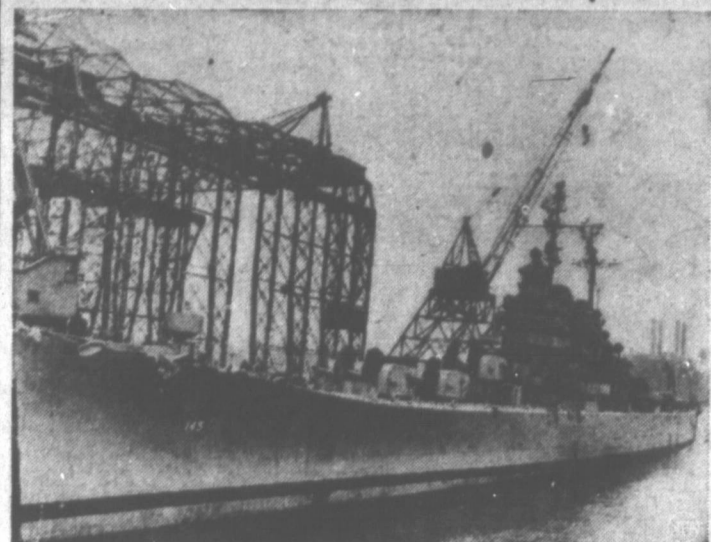
Natural Gas Fight Brews
AUSTIN—(P)—A Senate floor fight over exporting Texas' natural gas was brewing today. Senators Wardlow of Center and George Moffett of Chilton told the Senate Committee on Oil and Gas last night that they would fight a House-passed resolution opposing any further development of pipelines out of the state. The committee approved the resolution and sent it to the Senate floor for the showdown. By Rep. W. B. Chambers of May, the resolution calls on the Railroad Commission to oppose future pipeline permits before the Federal Power Commission. Chambers told the committee that Texas must conserve its gas to attract new industry to Texas. He said there was only 2 1/2 years supply remaining. Lane contended that the state might as well block cotton shipments out of the state and tell manufacturers to move to Texas if they wanted it.

Wharton, known to his friends here as "Squirt," died Tuesday morning at the Canadian Hospital after a long illness. Born August 10, 1884, in Paris, Tenn., he came to Amarillo in 1906 where he was employed as a brakeman on the Fort Worth and Denver Railroad. He moved to Canadian in 1933. Survivors include two sisters, Mrs. Jim Hutcheson, Canadian; and Mrs. T. R. Herbert, Amarillo, and a brother, Wiley Wharton, of Jacksonville, Fla., and a number of nephews and nieces.

rebuttal witnesses this afternoon. Mrs. Stull took the stand at 9:21 this morning under direct questioning by Defense Counsel Burton S. Burks, Lubbock. Mrs. Stull gave a verbal chronicle of her life from the time her son, Richard, was born. She told the court that she married Richard Wooten McGee, Sr., in Hanesville, La., in 1922 and divorced him in 1930 following a three-year separation. At the time of separation, Richard was only three, she said on the stand. "Richard's father was always a heavy drinker. I never heard from him after the separation, but heard a rumor that he had died in 1938."

Mrs. Stull also told the court of her subsequent marriage to A. E. Avery, Borger furniture dealer and real estate operator in 1932; of his death from a heart attack in 1938; and her marriage to H. H. Stull, her present husband, a Pampa feed dealer. Mrs. Stull told the court and jury that a brother of her first husband, Gerdis McGee, once visited them in their Hanesville home where, "he took a .22 rifle and shot a teakettle off the stove. Gerdis was taken to an insane asylum at Little Rock, Ark., in 1928. I learned that he died in this asylum in 1942."

In answer to a question propounded by Burks, Mrs. Stull testified: "I told Betty Jane Allison that Richard was a mental patient and would have to have lots of sleep, otherwise he might become difficult. I also told Jane that Richard was drawing 100 percent disability."

In giving the defendant's early life, Mrs. Stull said she first noticed he was unusual when only nine years of age. Doctors, she added, didn't seem to know what his trouble was, she said. Then Mrs. Stull said: "He had alternating spells of elation and stupor. I had to whip Richard on several occasions. When Richard was a small child

he came to me and said, 'mother, I am all mixed up. What is the matter with me?'" She also testified that her son once attacked her with a butcher knife and on another occasion went for her with a straight razor. Referring to her son's drinking, she told the court that he never drank a drop of liquor to her knowledge. Mrs. Stull told the court she did not know in what order McGee had entered various schools from which he either left or had been dismissed. She became very dramatic when she recounted her experience in Waco at the VA Hospital where she had been called by Dr. Samuel H. Ross. She said: "Dr. Ross told me to 'take this damn boy out of here' and when I remonstrated with him and told the doctor I was afraid he might do someone some harm, Dr. Ross said, 'you are the first damn mother who has refused to take the responsibility of taking care of her son.'"

Yesterday afternoon, shortly after the jury was taken from the room, McGee had to be carried bodily from the court room after a mild scuffle with three officers. He was subdued in a matter of seconds and carried to his jail cell. This was the second scene of violence on the part of the defendant since the trial started. The first, happened last Friday when his wild outburst recessed court for the day. He has been handcuffed since then.

'Little Things Make for Big Things' Is Topic Discussed by Local Pastor

Like the mighty land and the mighty oceans, government is not one body, but is made up of many individuals, the Rev. Clyde Smith, pastor of the First Methodist Church and guest speaker at yesterday's Junior Chamber of Commerce luncheon meeting, said.

The theme of the pastor's talk was that little things make for big things. "Little drops of water, little grains of sand, make the mighty ocean and the mighty land." From this idea, he said, it is only a step to realizing that government, huge as it is, is really made up of small units.

In the fields of economics, community building, and even character building, he said, if one pays careful attention to the lit-

tle things, the big things will take care of themselves.

Rev. Smith went on to give a recipe for personality building that is simply "work, play, love, and worship." If a man lacks any one of these things, he said, he cannot be a well-rounded, responsible individual. But by careful attention to the little things — the smile instead of the frown, the kind word instead of the bark — the big job of character building will take care of itself.

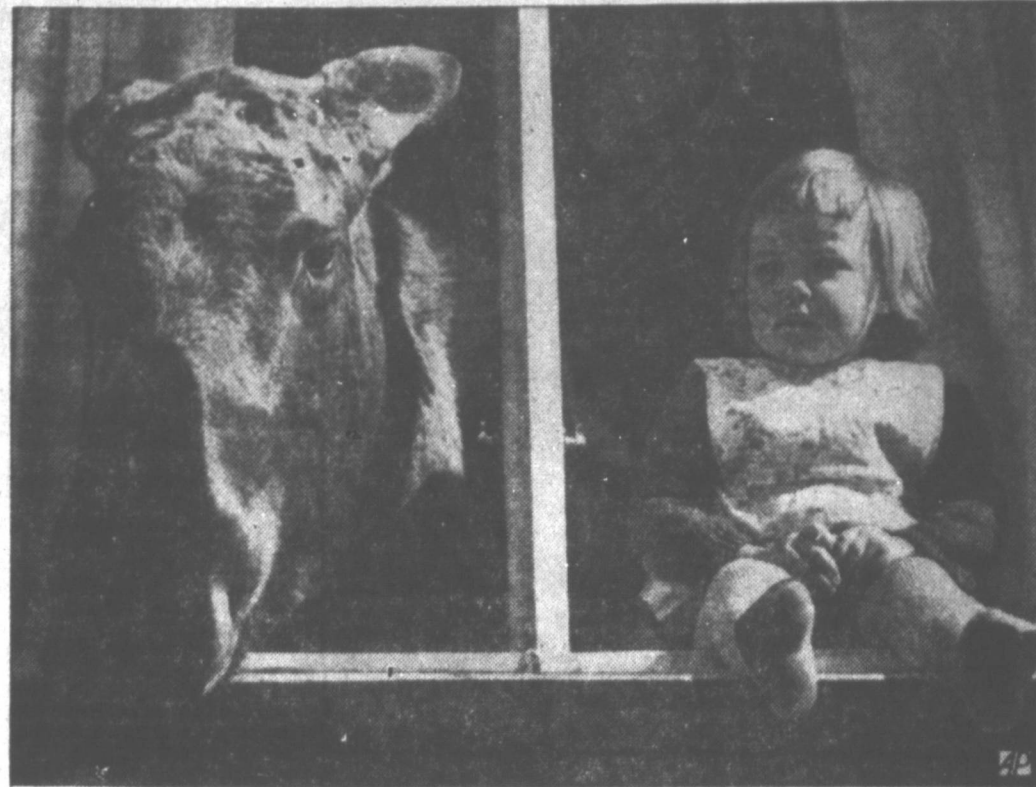

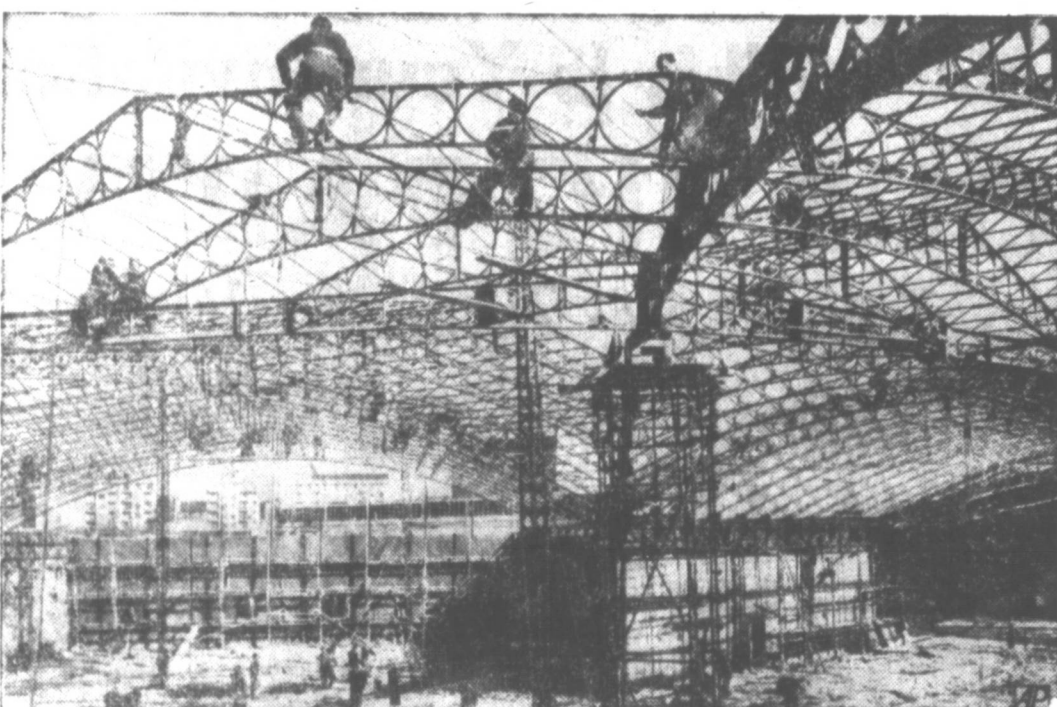

The Rev. B. M. Smith, pastor of the First Baptist Church, ended an eight-day meeting at the Lone Mound Baptist Church Sunday night.

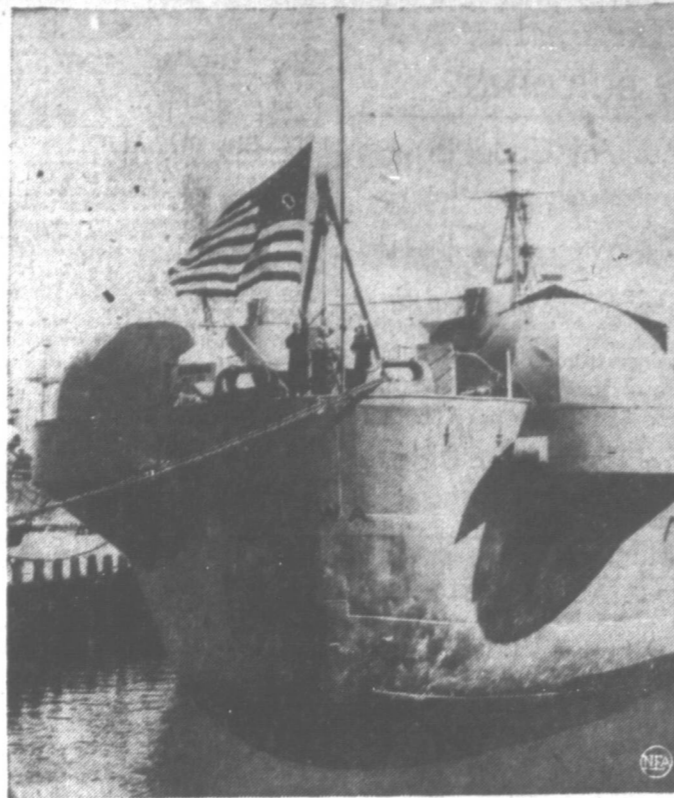
Attendance at the church, six miles south of Lela, was very good. Rev. Smith reported, and several were added to the congregation.

Girl Asks One Indictment Thrown Out

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Judith Coplon asked the U. S. District Court to throw out one of the two indictments against her which grew out of an alleged rendezvous with a Russian agent.

Her attorney, Archibald Palmer of New York, argued that an indictment voted by a Washington grand jury against the 27-year-old former Justice Department employe, should be dismissed because nine of the 17 grand jurors present were government employes.

Government attorneys replied that the question of eligibility of government employes to serve on juries here has been settled by a long line of court decisions.

The motion and argument came when Miss Coplon was called to trial.

The indictment here charges her with copying and removing secret documents from justice department files "with intent and reason to believe the information was to be used to the injury of the United States and to the advantage of a foreign nation."

In addition to the indictment here, Miss Coplon is under indictment in New York along with Valentine A. Gubitchev, 32, a Russian and former United Nations employe, on espionage conspiracy charges.

Miss Coplon, a tiny brunette,

listened attentively during the arguments before Judge Albert L. Reeves, a visiting judge from the western district of Missouri.

As part of the alleged spying conspiracy, the New York in-

dictment charges Miss Coplon with attempting to deliver government secrets to Gubitchev. The two of them were arrested together in New York last winter.

Employers Must Bargain on Pension Plans

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The Supreme Court held in effect Monday that employers must bargain with unions on worker pension plans.

However, only companies subject to federal laws — that is, firms whose goods cross state lines — are affected. Likewise the unions involved must be eligible to use National Labor Relations Board machinery.

Such a decision already had been handed down by the United States Circuit Court in Chicago in a case affecting the Inland Steel Company. Inland appealed to the high tribunal, contending among other things that it already has a company-wide pension system which would be destroyed by the effects of the decision.

The Supreme Court refused to review the circuit court ruling, thus letting it stand unchanged.

The circuit court decision upheld a National Labor Board ruling that the company engaged in an unfair labor practice by refusing to negotiate with the CIO United Steel Workers concerning Inland's pension plan.

Along with the ruling on the

pension plan issue, the circuit court upheld an NLRB finding that officials of the union must file non-Communist oaths before the board will require the company to begin bargaining on pensions.

MUSTANGS Wild Horses of the Plains!

MUSTANGS! WILD HORSES! Magic words to men of imagination! Hence, it is that stories of the mustangs—that lost breed of history—still intrigue all men who love good horses. Back of the story of mustangs, however, is one of the wildest odysseys in history.

It is now generally held that the horse originated in America, that he spread throughout the world in prehistoric times, and that he then died out in the land of his origin. Scattered diminutive fossils remain throughout the southern Plains point to his beginnings here. Aeons later, and in historic times, hundreds of thousands of mustangs, sweeping across the Southwest in spirited and colorful bands, marked his return. The very sight of a good horse used to be—in fact still is—a challenge to bold adventure. Nothing is impossible to men who really believe in horses.

History seems to prove the point. The horse of the Moors came to the Indies of the New World with the explorers from ancient Spain in the 1490's. He reached the mainland and played a vital part in the fantastic conquest of Mexico by Cortez in 1521, crossed the Plains with Coronado in 1541, escaped from numerous later Spanish exploring expeditions, reverted to the wild state, and spread, with tossing mane and flowing tail, expanding girth and hardening hoofs, from the hot valleys of Mexico

and the rocky ranges of the Montezumas clear across the continent to the Arctic plains of Canada—all in less than a hundred and fifty years.

Thus this marvelous bundle of muscle and nerve, and of sense and stamina, returned in wild and prolific vigor to reclaim the land of his origin, and to revolutionize life in the western half of the New World. For some three hundred years he reigned free and supreme. Meanwhile, Indians mounted on mustangs that they had caught and gentled, battled with fabled warriors who rode hard to meet them, while men actually grown to the shape of saddles moved their longhorned cattle upon the lands the Indians lost. Eventually, other men with horses killed off the buffalo herds, and for one brief moment, as time is measured, the great and grass-grown Plains were little more than a wild horse range.

These horses, usually in bands of from twenty to forty head, jealously and dangerously ruled by a single stallion, swept out from their waterings in circuits of several miles to graze their favorite range. They congregated in great herds and pawed their feed from the snow in the breaks of winter, and by hard fighting among themselves, the stallions again cut their mares and struck out in individual bunches as grass rose in the spring.

For some time, both red men and white leaved on this vast reservoir of horse flesh without touching the supply. But in the late 1870's, as men moved farther west and demanded more grass for their cattle, other men mounted on grain-fed horses began catching mustangs in droves and trailing them off to the settlements to market. They became the mustangers, and their work developed into a sort of a science, or at times an art that was known as mustanging.

They either "walked down" the wild horses by keeping after them for days, or trapped them in bunches by hazing or stampeding them into the wide, converging wings of hidden corrals. After trapping, they forefooted them and attached a clog to a fore-leg of each, which tripped the horse whenever he broke to run, and then trailed them off in bunches for trade or sale.

Yet the mustangers made little impression upon this immense herd that still covered the open face of the Great Plains. Only the invention of barbed wire, and its cutting of the range to pieces, brought an end to the wild horse.

But wherever his recumbent mares peacefully slept on the clean turf beneath his watchful eye, wherever his colts pitched about and cut their capers in sheer joy of living, and wherever he tossed his noble head as he scented danger and snorted his challenge through resonant nostrils from afar, there he will never be forgotten. For in a way the mustang made the Western World, and grateful men never forget their horses.
