I don't fully agree with the Declaration of Independence that "all men are created equal because there certainly are differences in intelligence and ability, as well as in social and economic status, but I do think that every person ought to have at least s similar opportunity to achieve the good things in life and that that opportunity can best be offered by giving him equal educational idvantages.

To my way of thinking-tax-supported education best guarantee the rights of true liberty and the pussuit of happiness to many who would not otherwise have a chance to improve a poor station in our society. I imagine you'll still insist that to tax the well-to-do or childless to pay for the education of the poor or those with children is an infringement of liberty. than the tax-supported variety can be an instrument of propaganda also, In my own experience I got the most thorough instruction in the "Stateism" you abhor so, not in any tax-supported educational institution but at Stanford Univerquarters of my freshman year, (1932-3), in which a planned economy was enuthiastically lauded, a "laizzes-faire" economy severely

I believe that tax-supported education is here to stay and that there is no point in attacking it and our boards of education in general. I was much more impressed by your paper's printing ex-cerpts from text-books playing up Stalinism and at the same time debasing our own country's history and leaders. The publicity given such teachings is constructive criticism quite likely to secure action from schools boards backed up by angry parents and taxpayers. Give us more such facts, and we'll do our best to see that pupils get a more fair appraisal of governmental practices.



Self-preservation and self-interest make it imperative that people try to educate each other. The preachers and the newspapers and the workingmen and the business men and the professional men all should try to ucate themselves and doing so they help educate others. The writer of this letter is using a method of educating the public as well as the writer. It is a good check on the writer's thinking. It helps educate her. Any person with aptitude can get a good education without ever going to school or college by read-ing a few good books and then

putting into practice what he has learned in them. The Declaration of Independence didn't mean literally that all men are created equal, but that all men are equal before the law and with equal rights. The Declaration of Independence also said: "Governments are formed deriving their just power: from the consent of the governed". And that sentence cannot be harmonized with forcing a man to pay for a school system that he does not want and believes is negative instead of positive. That certainly is more than a 'technical infringement of liberty.' It is a primary, or, absolute infringement. Public schools make it more difficult for each person to achieve the good things of life. Wealth is no help in getting an education. In fact, more people become educated who have to work and pay tuition than become educated whose parents pay all the cost or the state pays all the cost. Teachers like lawyers and doctors and preachers and newspapers and peach growers should render a ser-

ice so desirable that people will intarily buy their ravice. But public school teachers need only please 51 percent and then they can coerce the other 40 percent to pay. That makes the school teacher careless, vain, despotic, sly, cunning, and a typical bureaucrat. He is seldom interested in educating He is interested in holding his job He is usually lazy physically and mentally. 

Wild Horses of the Plains!

MUSTANGS! WILD HORSES! Magic words to men of imagination! Hence, it is that stories of the mustangs-that lost breed of historystill intrigue all men who love good horses. Back of the story of mustangs, however, is one of the wildest odys-

Thus this marvelous bundle of muscle and nerve, and of sense and stamina, returned in wild and prolific vigor to reclaim the land of his origin, and to revolutionize life in the western half of the New World. For some three hundred years he reigned free and supreme. Meanwhile, Indians mounted on mustangs that they had caught and gentled, battled with fairfaced warriors who rode hard to meet them, while men actually grown to the shape of saddles moved their longhorned cattle upon the lands the Indians lost. Eventually, other men with horses killed off the buffc herds, and for one brief moreint, as time is measured, the great and grass-grown Plains were little more than a wild horse range.

These horses, usually in bands of from twenty to forty head, jealously and dangerously ruled by a single stallion, swept out from their waterings in circuits of several miles to graze their favorite range. They congregated in great herds and pawed their feed from the snow in the breaks of winter, and by hard fighting among themselves, the stallions again cut their mares and struck out in individual bunches as grass rose in the spring.

For some time, both red men and white levied on this vast reservoir of horse flesh without touching the supply. But in the late 1870's, as men

moved farther west and demanded more grass for their cattle, other men mounted on grain-fed horses began catching mustangs in droves and trailing them off to the settlements to market. They became the mustangers, and their work developed into a sort of a science, or at times an art, that was known as mustang-

They either "walked down" the wild horses by keeping after them for days, or trapped them in bunches by hazing or stampeding them into the wide, converging wings of hidden corrals. After trapping, they fore-footed them and attached a clog to a fore-leg of each, which tripped the horse whenever he broke to run, and then trailed them off in bunches for trade or sale.

Yet the mustangers made little impression upon this immense herd that still covered the open face of the Great Plains. Only the invention of barbed wire, and its cutting of the range to pieces, brought an end to the wild horse.

But wherever his recumbent mores peacefully slept on the clean turf be-neath his watchful eye, wherever his colts pitched about and cut their capers in sheer joy of living, and wherever he tossed his noble head as he scented danger and snorted his challenge through resonant nostrils from afar, there he will never be forgotten. For in a way the mustang made the Western World, and grate ful men never forget their horses.
