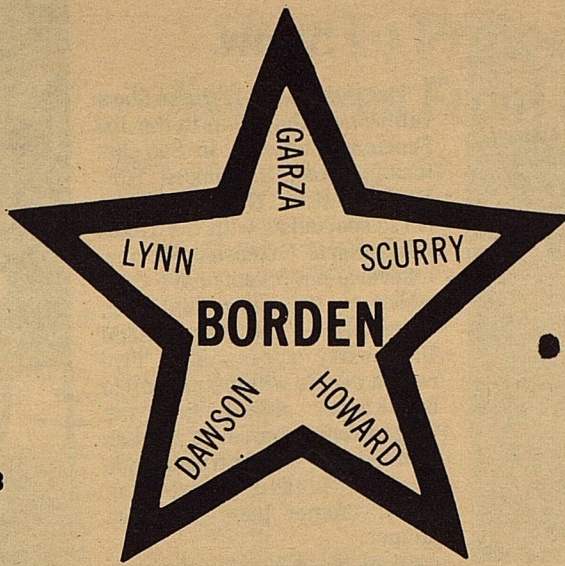

Screwworm : Epidemic Proportions

— Pointing out with alarm that the screwworm problem in Texas has now reached epidemic proportions, Dr. M. E. "Cotton" Meadows Jr., in charge of the Screwworm Eradication Program in the U. S., said the 454 cases reported Friday makes a total of 9,702 cases for the year — surpassing the yearly total of 9,268 cases for 1968, the worst year on record up to this date.

The weekly total of new screwworm cases reported total 2,988 cases, 12 cases less than occurred last year.

New counties reporting screwworm cases this week include Wharton in South Texas, Glasscock in West Texas and Hale, Wise, Lynn, Gaines, and Donley counties in the Texas Panhandle, the farthest north cases have been reported to date, and also in Dallas County.

Dr. Meadows said numerous cases of screwworms have been reported in West Texas, the Big Bend Country and Trans-Pecos areas during the last few weeks. Friday's total includes cases from Brewster, Crockett, Val Verde and Terrell.

Uvalde and Medina counties have been "hard hit," with the former reporting from 14-20 cases daily for the last week, Medina reporting 26 cases Thursday and Maverick County from 2-5 cases daily, he said.

Other West Texas counties hit by the recent upsurge in screwworm cases includes Concho, Lampasas, Nolan, Howard, Runnels, Brown, Coke San Saba and Reeves.

Menard County has recorded six such cases so far.

At Junction in Kimble County, 17 new cases have been reported in the last week.

In Crockett County, Ozona area ranchers have reported eight confirmed cases according to county agent Pete Jacoby and a number of other ranchers have sent in sample bottles for testing that will probably be confirmed cases.

Dr. James E. Novy, veterinarian in charge of field operations, said Thursday at Mission the epidemic is "unprecedented," with as many as 1,000 samples received in the laboratory here in one day. He warned producers that because of the paper work and other necessary work at the laboratory, reports of samples sent in the past two weeks have not been made.

Beef Cattle Grading Short Course

Mr. Sid Long, Vocational Agriculture teacher at Borden County High School, will attend a Beef Cattle Grading Short Course to be held at Abilene, Texas June 13 and 14. Purpose of the short course is to improve teacher's ability in grading and determining yield grade of beef cattle. The short course will be conducted by Mr. Frank Litterest, Beef Cattle Specialist, from Texas A&M University. Vocational Agriculture teachers from Areas II and IV, have been invited to attend the course.

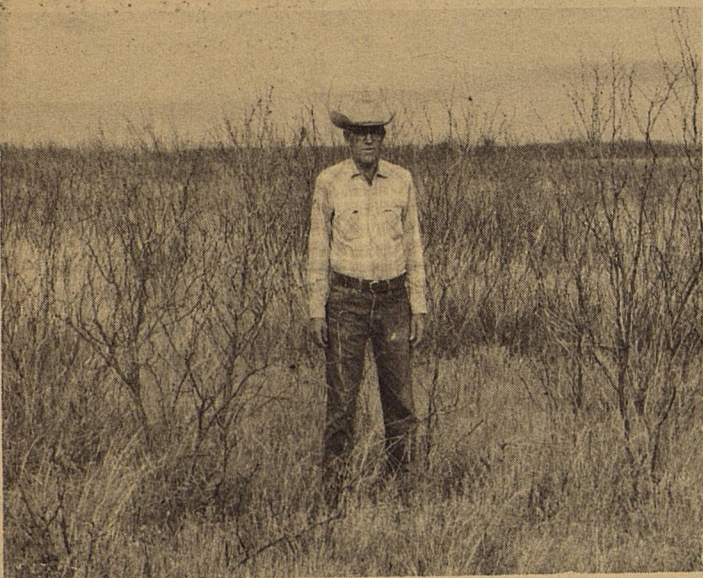

4-H Horse Show

The 1972 State 4-H Horse Show will be held July 19-22 in the Joe Freeman Coliseum in San Antonio, Texas, announces B.F. Yeates and Dr. Gary D. Potter, horse specialists with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Several new events have been added to the show this year, according to the Texas A&M University specialists. Two roping events will feature timed breakaway roping and the judged roping horse. In English competition, events will include English pleasure, working hunter, hunter hack and open jumper.

All of these events, plus cutting horse and drill team competition are open invitational note the specialists. Competition in the halter, showmanship, western pleasure, reining, pole bending and barrel racing events will be limited to those qualifying at the various district horse shows.

The Informed Consumer

Planning a vacation? Up, up and away - make sure it's you and not your money! Many travelers have fallen victim to phony travel promotions.

The most common scheme is promoted through extensive advertising or direct solicitation of groups, such as teachers or government employes, and especially students. The offer may include round-trip fare, accommodations, and additional services at bargain rates.

The fraudulent promoter requires a deposit or even the total price in advance. He accepts only cash and rarely gives you a receipt. Once he has collected from a sufficient number of victims, he'll disappear without a trace. And you're stuck - no vacation and no money!

Be careful when taking charter flights! While many are true savings for group tours, some turn out to be nothing but gyms. One travel agent booked flights resulting in the stranding of 1,100 passengers and a loss of nearly \$500,000! Check with several travel agencies before making final arrangements.

Vacations offered in connection with property selling are also popular schemes. An all-expense paid weekend in Florida is hard to pass up. The promoters assure there's no obligation to buy. They just want you to "take a look" at some newly developed land, which they'll sell at extremely low prices. Be careful! Your tour guides are really expert high pressure salesmen and may talk you into buying property you never wanted.

Another trick is gimmick advertising, which proves to be more misleading than actually fraudulent. Even legitimate agencies carry such pamphlets and brochures. For instance, to Greece!" It sounds pretty good, but as you read on, you discover this price carries many stipulations: it includes only one-way fare, the flight leaves from Chicago, the offer is good only if you're 26 or younger, etc.

Guest Editorial

If you watch much television (and I know that most students will not admit it, even if they do) you have probably noticed certain trends in advertising. I am not speaking of the general decline towards lunacy, but of the symbols used by advertisers. For instance, 1968 on Madison Avenue was the year of the Tiger. Tires were not tires, but tiger paws. We all drove around with tigers in our tanks. Remember?

When future ad men recall 1971, they may well remember it as the year of the lemon.

It all started innocently enough. There were lemon scented polishes and liquid cleaners. That was fine. Though lemon is not one of my favorite scents, I can take an occasional sniff without any ill effects. Then came lemon toilet bowl cleaners. Okay, I said to myself, I can take it. Then in the true advertising tradition of riding a good horse to death, a gasoline additive was dubbed "lemon aid." Things were getting out of hand (and mind).

Then came the ultimate blow. Lemons invaded the cosmetics industry. The cosmetics people never were known for their good taste in advertising. Any women's lib advocate will tell you that they visualize the average American woman as a brainless sex object, completely dominated for her obsession for male attention. Now it was time for them to grab the gold (or lemon yellow) ring.

Again things started innocently, with lemon shampoo. It was supposed to lighten the hair. At least it had a purpose. That is more than could be said for the lemon face creams, lipsticks, and feminine hygiene sprays that followed it. The crusher, however, was lemon perfume. I remember one commercial with some guy saying, "Let me tell you about my girl. Her skin is soft and pink and she smells just like fresh cut lemons."

I am no psychologist, but I know that any guy who finds the idea of making love to a lemon appealing, has one bad hang up.

I would not even try to draw any conclusions about lemons or advertising or the kind of society that would be susceptible to this kind of thing. I leave that to the analysts. It does seem rather appropriate though, that in 1968, when things were booming, we were all tigers but in 1971, when the war and the economy both went sour, our thoughts turned to lemons.

Melba Rinehart and Jimmy Hodge made the honor list at W.T.C. for the spring semester. To be on the honor list you must be a full time student carrying 12 or more hours, with a grade point average between 3.0 and 3.5.

When working with liquid ammonia fertilizers, wear the proper eye protection equipment.

"We get many reports of farmers totally or partially blinded by ammonia and other agricultural chemicals," says Dr. Wilfred D. David, executive director of the National Society for the Prevention of Blindness.

"Wear safety goggles with hooded vents and a rim that fits snugly around your face to protect your eyes when you handle these materials."

If liquid nitrogen or ammonia comes in contact with your skin, flush with water for at least 15 minutes. If there is a pond nearby, jump right in and immerse yourself completely. For extra safety attach a 5-gallon water container to the nurse tank and the applicator; keep it filled with fresh water. Then clean water will always be handy if needed.

Remove contaminated clothing as soon as an accident occurs. After flushing the affected skin area, get medical attention immediately. Until an injured person can get to the doctor, don't use any treatment except flushing or washing ammonia burns with plain water. Salves or ointments should never be applied, because they "seal in" the ammonia.

Ammonia is very soluble in water. That's one reason why flushing with water is the best treatment for ammonia burns. But this high-water solubility makes ammonia damage tissue rapidly.

"Eye tissue contains much fluid, so the eye is especially vulnerable to ammonia injury," Dr. David points out. "Thirty seconds after someone gets ammonia in his eye, the damage can begin."

How To Protect Your Eyes From Chemicals

Farm organizations join with the National Society for the Prevention of Blindness in urging you to use these precautions:

1. Wear tight-fitting goggles

and rubber gloves. For the most complete protection wear a full-face gas mask.

2. Don't place your head or your body in the direct line of

valves or hose couplings.

3. Always stand upwind during transfer operations.

4. Keep an ample water supply on hand at all times.

- ¼ cup chopped onion
- ¼ cup chopped green pepper
- 2 Tbsp margarine
- 2-½ cups canned tomatoes
- 2 cups water
- 1 cup uncooked regular rice salt and pepper

New Chemical For Mesquite Control

Cattle and stockman are hailing the new chemical, Tordon 225, as a major breakthrough in controlling mesquite on some 88 million acres of Texas rangeland.

"No question about it, this is the best brush killer we've ever had," said C.E. Fisher of Lubbock, head of Texas A&M's field research program in brush control.

The new chemical has been under test since 1963 but will become available for range use for the first time this season.

Fisher said Tordon 225 consistently has killed approximately two times more brush than previous herbicides in tests on range sites throughout the state. This mixture of Tordon and 2, 4, 5, -T also killed 47 percent of the Lotebush (blue thorn), 54 percent of the prickly pear and 95 percent of the annual broomweed.

Soil temperature at the 18 inch depth plays an important part in the chemical control of mesquite. No kill was gotten on mesquite where the soil temperature at an 18 inch depth was below 70 degrees. A good kill was gotten when the soil temperature was between 80 and 85 degrees at an 18 inch depth. Heavy, clay bottomland soils, and clay upland soils are much cooler soils than sandyloam type soils. These clay soils are usually 7 to 8 degrees cooler than sandyloam type soils.

Chemical control of mesquite has greatly increased forage production. On one experiment forage production per acre ranged from 1353 pounds on the brush pasture to 1985 pounds per acre on the pasture sprayed 14 months previous. This increase of 46 percent in total production on the sprayed pasture was a result of improved forage growth in both open areas and

Recipe

At your next patio party serve this Creamy Blue Cheese Dip with fresh-from-your-garden vegetable stick relishes. In a small mixing bowl beat together 1 cup (4 oz.) of crumbled Blue cheese and 1 package (3 oz.) of cream cheese until smooth. 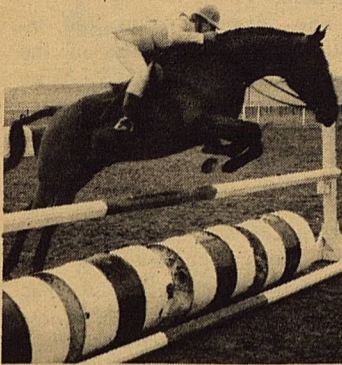

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Rural Routes Retained By Air Force

High-speed, low level routes for intensive training of tactical air reconnaissance aircraft remain the same as those established last fall over Texas, parts of Oklahoma, Arkansas and Louisiana, according to an announcement from Bergstrom AFB.

The routes, one of which includes an area of the South Plains, are purposely designed to avoid populated areas and are confined to rural locations at operating altitudes between 500 and 1,500 feet.

One of the routes set in east of Canyon, skirts Canyon to the south and veers southwest to a point northwest of Plainview, skirts that town widely and goes between it and Lubbock, ending southwest of Childress.

Another of the routes comes in from the east and widely skirts San Angelo while circling it, passing near Brady. Still another one skirts Junction and goes North around Ozona and returns south of that town, between it and Fredericksburg.

The only other route over West Texas goes between Pecos and Kent, skirts, Marfa, widely and ends south of Fort Stockton.

The routes are used primarily by photo reconnaissance pilots of the 67th Tactical Reconnaissance Wing at Bergstrom located 8 miles southeast of Austin.

Width of the routes is five nautical miles either side of a center line. Airports within a 20 miles radius of any side of the routes have been notified to post notices of the location of the route for the benefit of local pilots.

Wing spokesmen said no weapons of any kind are aboard the Phantom Jets of the flights, and flying safety is paramount in the planning of each flight.

The Southern Research Institute in Birmingham, Ala., reports that the temperature of water not the kind of cleaning agent used, is the key factor in killing disease-carrying germs on clothing. Very little detectable virus remained on the test fabrics after hot-water washing in the laboratory.

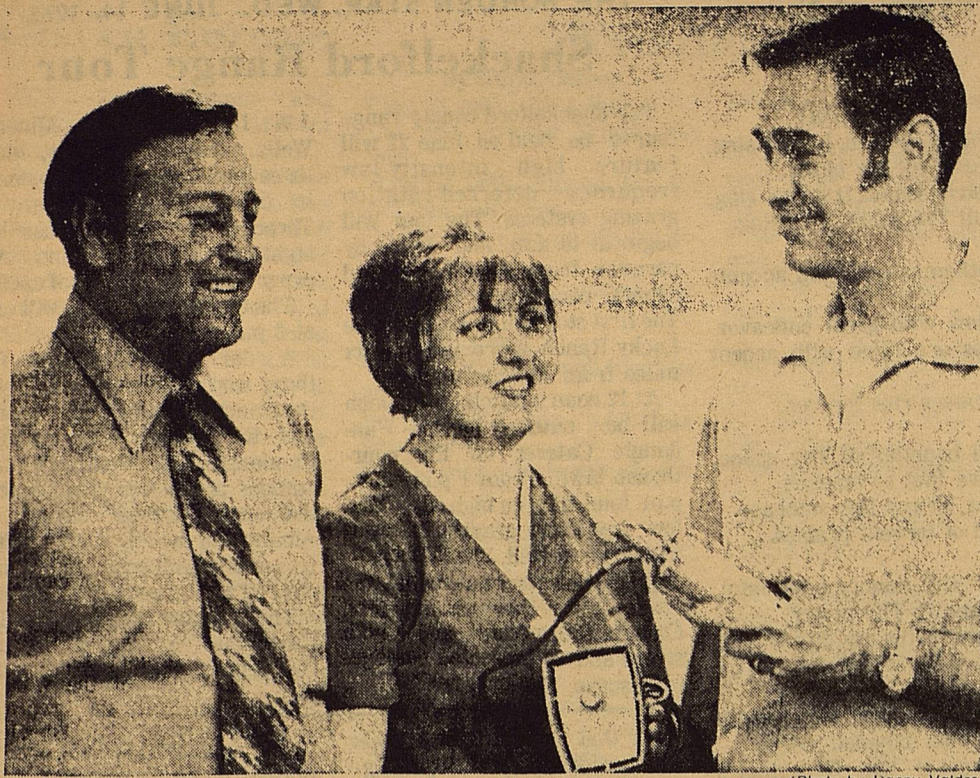

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Trailer Brake Law

Texas House Speaker Rayford Price has appointed a committee to study needed changes in the trailer brake law passed by the 1971 Legislature.

Governor Preston Smith has hinted strongly that the measure will be submitted to the mid-June special session as the Legislature for action.

While announcing appointments to the committee, Price said he has a number of changes he personally favors. Among them are provisions which would exempt trailers having a gross weight of 10,000 pounds or less from the requirement that all trailers be equipped with brakes, specifically authorize "surge brakes" for the same class of trailers and as a "grandfather" clause to exempt trailers manufactured prior to September 1, 1971, the effective date of the Texas Rules of the Road Law.

Actually Attorney General Crawford Martin has already held that surge brakes are included in the present statute, even though they are not specifically mentioned.

At presently written, the trailer brake section of the Rules of the Road Law requires all wheels of trailers weighing more than 3,000 pounds to have brakes. It exempts farm trailers under 10,000 pounds when the gross weight of the trailer does not exceed 40 per cent of the gross weight of the towing vehicle.

The 10 man committee includes three members of the House Representative; Mike Moncrief of Fort Worth, Chairman Bill Clayton of Springlak, vice chairman; and Steve Burgess of Nacogdoches.

Citizen members of the committee are Clark Jarnigan of Euless, representing the Texas Home Council; Don King of Fort Worth, Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Assoc; Tony Price, Dallas, Texas Cotton Ginners Assoc., Cecil Reid, Dallas, Sportsmen's Clubs of Texas; Bruno Schroeder, Austin, Texas Agricultural Council; Bill Sims, San Angelo, Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Assoc; and J.T. (Red) Woodson, Gober, Texas Farm Bureau.

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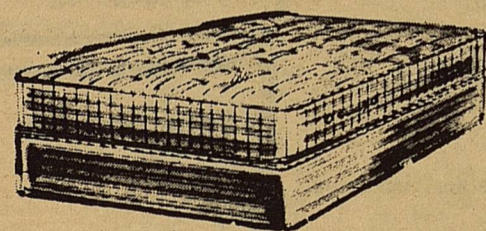
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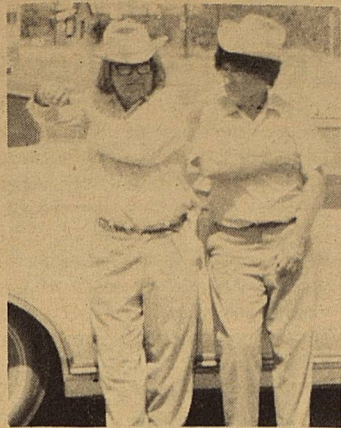
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ARIZONA EXPERT TESTS METHOD TO INCREASE FAT IN RATIONS

Solutions Help As Plant Starters

There are solutions to help your plants get started. They are mixtures of water and soluble fertilizers, which provide transplants with nitrogen, phosphorous and potassium. You can buy them at garden centers, and they come in various plant nutrient ratios.

Spread the wetted area with soil after applying the starter solution. And if you use peat pots when transplanting, be sure the peat pot is covered with soil to avoid excess moisture loss.

Clean Drip Pan On Range Often

Remove the drip pan from the cooking range periodically and wash it. Between washings, keep it clean by wiping with well-lathered cloth or sponge.

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—A University of Arizona animal scientist, William H. "Bill" Hale, is playing games in the rumens of feeder cattle and he thinks he's on the track of faster growing, cheaper beef for the nation's dinner tables.

What's more, the new product will be lower in saturated fats, the kind your doctor says play into the hand of cholesterol buildup and heart disease.

Surprisingly, Hale makes feeder cattle grow and fatten faster by feeding fat.

Not just any old fat. Nor, does he simply throw it into the feed bunk and say to the fattening animals: "Go ahead—eat."

His is encapsulated fat.

This means it is fat that is encircled with a protein substance which is insoluble in the animal's rumen. This is the dark, mysterious place where feed lodges first after a bovine animal eats it and where initial fermentation and digestion takes place.

It's a well known fact among feeders that a ration can contain up to 4 percent fat. "If you go higher than 4 percent, you can get into problems with rumen fermentation—it creates a belly-ache, that can throw the animal off feed," Hale said.

Another problem with high fat levels in the ration: "A high percentage of it passes through and out of the animal in its feces because it is not absorbed," the nutritionist told a Feeders Day audience.

Yet what intrigues Hale is the fact that fats furnish about 2 1/4 times more energy than comparable feedstuffs. Too, frequently the market price of fats are such that it would save money to go above the presumed 4 percent ceiling in a ration.

The scientist has fed as high as 6 percent fat successfully, and he reported that he believes it is possible to go "to the 10 or 15 percent level, if the fat is available to the animal in its intestinal tract rather than in its rumen."

The trick is to by-pass a feeder animal's rumen with the fat.

As a fat source, Hale uses safflower oil, a product high on the list of unsaturated, anti-cholesterol fats. To make it insoluble, he first mixes it with casein, a milk protein source. Then, the mixture is spray-dried. To insure that the coating around the safflower oil is efficient, it is then treated with formaldehyde, making the product insoluble—"protected" is the word the scientist uses—in a bovine's rumen.

Thus, it passes through the rumen of the feeder animal the same way it would in a monogastric animal—pigs, chicken, and man.

Then, due to a lowered acid-alkalinity level in the animal's intestinal tract, the protected safflower fat suddenly becomes available. Thus the protein coating breaks down and the fat is absorbed directly and without nutritive loss.

"By protecting fat from rumen fermentation, we should be able to grow and fatten a beef animal faster. This will ultimately result in a cheaper product," Hale said.

With safflower oil as the fat base, the scientist said the level of saturated stearic acid in animal fat is replaced in part with oleic acid, a fatty acid which is less saturated.

In a test which Hale reported, he said use of protected safflower oil in a cattle ration reduced feed requirements by 16 percent as compared to when unprotected safflower was fed at the 6 percent level.

Elsewhere in the country, the scientist concluded, USDA scientists have fed protected fats of unsaturated origin to dairy cows in an attempt to produce milk containing a higher percentage of unsaturated fats. "Very successful," is the way he indicated success to date.

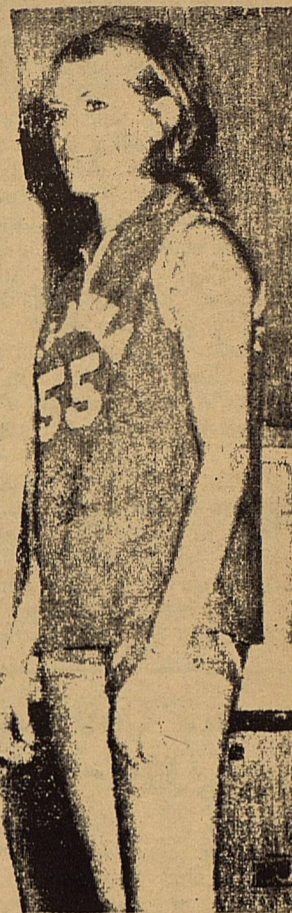

IF A COMPANY IS NOT SELLING its product, somewhere up around the offices of top management will be asked. 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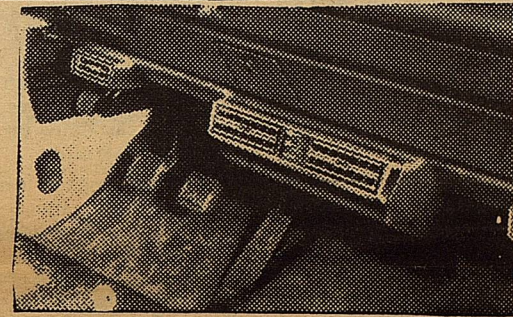
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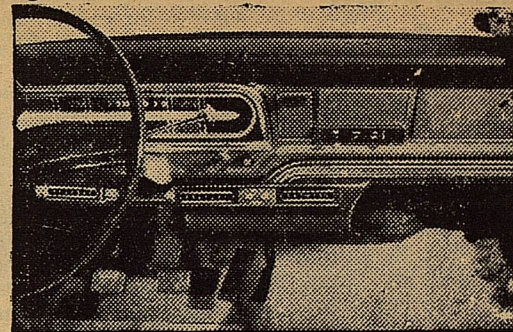
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
