

Europe's Workers Visit U.S. For Object Lessons in ECA

NEW YORK (INEA) — A Danish worker brought over here to learn how Americans work, asked particularly if he might visit Ford's River Rouge plant. It was not on his planned schedule, because the Danes had come to study steel production, in a packing, shipbuilding and machinery-making, not automobile manufacture.

"Why do you want to go there?" asked the Economic Cooperation Administration officials who had the Danes in charge.

"I'll tell you after I've been there," he promised. So the Rouge plant was added to his itinerary.

When he got back he said, "Now I'll tell you why I was so anxious to go there."

"Back home we have been told day after day, in Communist lectures, that a man with a blacksnake whip stands behind every 20 workers in the Rouge plant, to make them work faster. I promised my friends that I would go and see if that was true. Now I can tell them there wasn't even one man with a blacksnake whip in the plant. I even asked the workers there, to make sure."

The ECA is just getting into swing with a broad program to bring representatives of western European industry, from all countries entitled to Marshall Plan help, over here so they can

ORDINANCE NO. 288
AN ORDINANCE AMENDING ORDINANCE 267 PASSED AND APPROVED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF PAMPA, TEXAS ON THE 17TH DAY OF APRIL, 1948, HEREBY AMENDED AND REPLACED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF PAMPA, TEXAS, AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY THEREOF.

Section No. 1
The last paragraph of Section No. 2 of ordinance No. 267, passed and approved by the city commission of the City of Pampa, on the 17th day of April, 1948, be hereby amended and substituted therefor so that hereafter the last paragraph of this section will read as follows, to-wit:

Section No. 2
When parking meter spaces are indicated by painted lines upon the surface of the streets in said parking meter zones, as herein provided, and when parking meters are installed and placed in or adjacent to said spaces within the zone or upon any of the portions of the streets described in section 2 of this ordinance for a longer continuous period than hereinafter provided, no vehicle shall remain parked within any of said spaces within the zone or upon any of the portions of the streets described in section 2 of this ordinance, for a longer continuous period than hereinafter provided, except on any day except Sundays and holidays, officially designated by the City Commission of the City of Pampa, Texas.

Section No. 3
Section No. 10 of ordinance No. 267, passed and approved by the city commission of the City of Pampa, on the 17th day of April, 1948, be hereby amended and substituted therefor so that hereafter this section will read as follows, to-wit:

SECTION NO. XV

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The Dollar Has Become Very Important Question

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The dollar has become a very important question in Congress now and for us at home and our friends abroad. In spite of all that's been said and written about them so far this year, Congress still hasn't finished with three big items: The Marshall Plan, the Atlantic Pact, and our own defense program.

The big question with all three is: how much can we spend on them without getting into money trouble? The cost of the three, the way President Truman wants them taken care of, would be about \$22,000,000,000.

When you add that to about \$20,000,000,000 for running the government at home, our total bill for another year would be around \$42 billion.

So Congress' problem is: can all that money be spent without raising taxes or putting the country in the red? Both House and Senate have "authorized" continuing the Marshall Plan for helping Europe economically another year.

So how much will it cost? Not so fast. In "authorizing" continuing the plan, both Houses have said that no more than about \$5 1/2 billion can be spent on it. Will that much be spent?

No one knows. There's a difference between "authorizing" and "appropriating." In "authorizing" Congress doesn't actually vote to spend any money. "Appropriating" is hardly more than saying something is a good idea. But before money can be spent, Congress has to vote again. This is called "appropriating" money.

And it's when Congress gets around to voting appropriations that the money to be spent on it may be cut down.

So there'll be quite a to-do about the Marshall Plan all over again, when voting appropriations comes around.

More time will be spent in debating the Atlantic Pact, plenty of time in the Senate. Voting for the pact itself doesn't involve spending any money. Nevertheless, there'll be a lot of debate on the pact. But then comes something else, later.

That's when Congress has to decide on how much money, if any, it will vote to carry out one of the main ideas of the pact; that we'll help our allies with arms.

Around-World Flight Planned In Light Plane

TYLER, Tex. (AP) — A Texas aircraft manufacturer and an Oklahoma City pilot are teamed for an attempted around-the-world flight in a light plane.

Jack Brazil, former fighter pilot, signed a contract yesterday with the Johnson Aircraft Corporation of Tyler to make the flight.

He intends to fly a Johnson airplane powered by a 180-horsepower engine.

He plans to depart from Will Rogers Field in Oklahoma City shortly after Aug. 15.

His first stop will be to Goose Bay, Labrador. Successive landings are to include come, Italy; Ankara, Turkey; Teheran, Iran; Karachi, India; Shanghai, China; Tokyo, Japan, and Oklahoma City.

Modification work on the plane, called the "Bullet," is to begin immediately.

Nine Flyers to Be Buried at Nashville

Although none of the airmen was a Tennessean, families chose Nashville from a list of "logical" burial places submitted by the adjutant general's Grave Registration Division.

The war victims included S-Sgt Richard Ray, Jr., Talacios, Texas, and S-Sgt Curtis A. Reynolds, Houston.

Missile Mystery

AMERICAN authorities in Germany are baffled over the origin of four mysterious projectiles, which have landed in the same area, just east of Schweinfurt, since October, 1946.

The last of the rocket- or jet-propelled missiles landed last Jan. 21, 1949, and eye-witnesses said it came from the northeast and had a 200-foot-long flaming trail.

Experts have so far been unable to reconstruct the projectiles from the small bits recovered from the craters.

He reported three persons had been arrested for starting fires in an area embracing the counties of Fulton, Sharp, Izard, Randolph and Lawrence, where thousands of acres of timber have been destroyed in the last five days.

It sometimes happens that in trying to give information to your partner, you also give your opponent the information he needs to make his contract.

In today's hand, for example, South opened the bidding with one spade and West doubled. When North bid two spades and

East passed, South knew that all the adverse strength was in the West hand. He then bid four spades and all passed.

On the opening lead of the king of diamonds, East dropped the nine-spot. West cashed the ace and then the queen of diamonds, East showing out on the third round and discarding a small heart. The fourth diamond was led by West. East ruffed with the three of spades and declarer overruffed with the five.

Now, without the informative double, declarer probably would have picked up the outstanding trumps and played for a 3-3 break in clubs. But with the information indicated by the double, South played all of his trumps, forcing West to make two discards. He could not let go of a club, so he discarded two hearts, leaving the blank king of hearts in his hand.

Declarer now played the ace, king and queen of clubs, and on the third club East showed out. South now had an exact count on the West hand. He knew that West had originally held three hearts, and he should have had the king to make the informative double. As he had already discarded two hearts, he must now be down to the blank king, ace of hearts, picked up the king, and the queen was good.

Rehearse Your Tyke for Parties

Party time can be fun time for mother as well as junior, if he has been conditioned beforehand, says the National Kindergarten Association.

Mothers usually dread parties. The association with other children, the games, toys and goodies consumed, the singing, shouting and dancing all make for heaps of fun and excitement, but leave children unmanageable afterwards, they say. The children are left tired and fretful.

Why not have parties - quiet little parties about once a month for them at home, for extra occasions that would please, but not excite them, the Association suggests. Then when an outside party does come, the children take it much more quietly because they are conditioned, they say.

Hunt for occasions to give them a party once a month. There are the well-known Valentine's Day and April Fool's Day as starters. Also Washington's and Lincoln's birthdays; Flag Day, Arbor Day, Columbus Day, and birthdays of persons of note who are not nationally honored, are others. Then there are such days as when your state was admitted to the Union. Every state has a motto and a flower - this helps.

One child can make place cards of maps of the states. Another can color them and cut them out. The results may not be professional-looking. But what of it? It gives the children a chance to find that things they have learned in school can be put to practical use.

There is another benefit from these parties, too, says the association. The children are the guests. Encourage them to talk, but in turn. That is, they learn not to interrupt but to listen carefully to what the other person is saying.

Mother and Dad can tell them some interesting facts about the occasion being celebrated, and then be prepared to answer any questions the children may ask.

Later, the whole family can sing songs or read a poem or story connected with some incident pertinent to the event.

"I've resigned from the child study club, and packed away my books on child psychology," I recently heard a conscientious mother say.

The reason? She just made up her mind that she was doing too much worrying about how she was bringing up Junior.

"From now on," she said, "I'm going to use common sense, as much patience as I have, and try to enjoy having a child around, instead of scaring myself silly fearing I'll make some grave mistake that will ruin my child."

There are a lot of overly-conscientious mothers who would probably get along better with their children if they did the same thing.

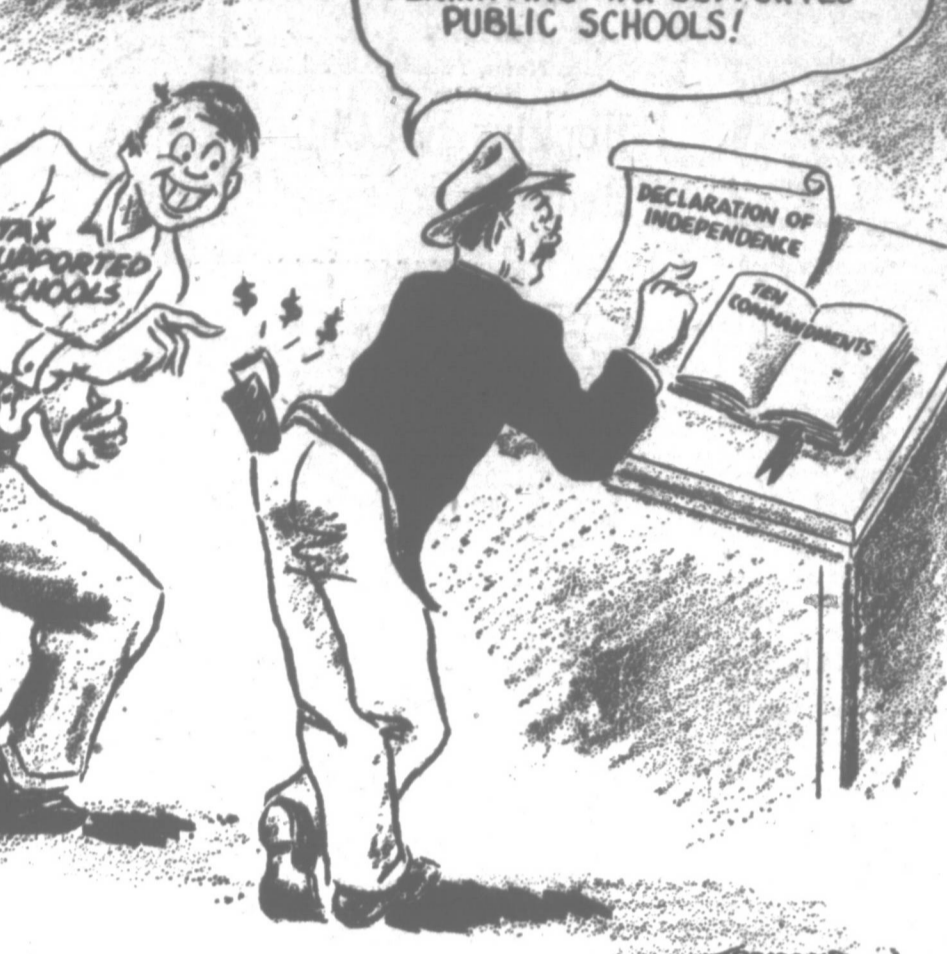

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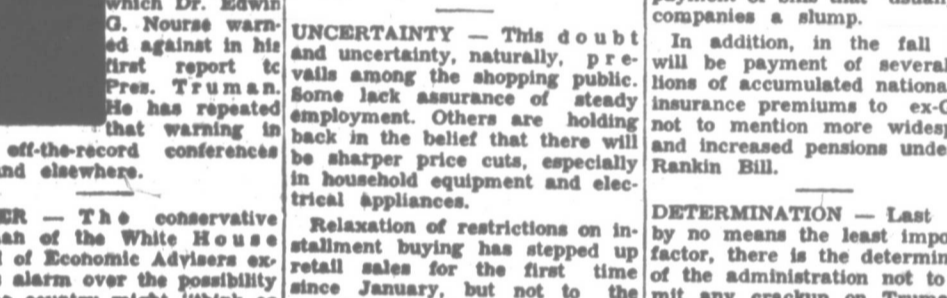

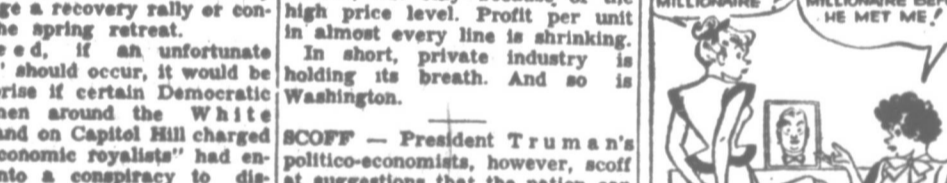

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Major Leagues Spring Into Full Schedule Today

Phillies Top Braves, Senators Defeat A's in Early Openers

The major league baseball season opens with a full schedule today following surprising early victories by the Philadelphia Phillies and Washington Senators.

Thanks to Ken Heintzelman, a 35-year-old greybeard, and newcomer Clyde Vollmer, the Phillies and Senators stole a cap on the field yesterday in the only two games played.

Heintzelman shut out the favored Boston Braves, 4-0, spoiling the 1948 National League Champions' pennant-raising ceremonies. Vollmer came through with a ninth-inning single that beat the Philadelphia Athletics, 3-2.

Both games on the first of the double opening programs were played under poor weather conditions. As a result the crowd suffered. Only 9,195 paid to watch Billy Southworth's Braves hoist their 48 flag. Some 26,000 joined President Truman at Griffith Stadium.

Chill, damp weather threatens to sully today's crowds. Cincinnati, sold out, since Christmas as usual for its date with St. Louis Cardinals, won't be hurt. But the others may be.

Brooklyn hopes to crack its home opening record of 31,648 with the New York Giants as an attraction. The weather man is not optimistic.

Chicago may turn out 39,000 to see if Rip Sewell, winner of nine opening games, can pitch Pittsburgh to a victory over the Cubs. Sewell, better than ever at 40, is opposed by a not in the field, 38-year-old Leonard.

The Philadelphia Athletics, who beat the gun yesterday, may top their opening day mark in a Patriots' Day doubleheader.

Detroit expects to draw 50,000 to see Hal Newhouser try to tame the feisty Chicago White Sox. The New York Yankees expect about 40,000 for their Yankee Stadium opener against Washington.

The World Champion Cleveland Indians are due to play in the comparative solitude of Sportsman's Park against the St. Louis Browns with 15,000 or less in the stands. Connie Mack counts on 25,000 at Shibe Park for the A's first home start against the powerful Boston Red Sox.

It's a sad opening day for Joe DiMaggio, Whitey Kurowski and Edell Blackwell, the three "big ifs" of the spring training season. DiMaggio, missing his eighth of 11 openers, will be on the bench in street clothes while the Yankee tangle with the Senators—league-leading Senators, if you please.

Kurowski stays home in St. Louis for an examination by Dr. Robert Hyland while the Cards face Cincinnati. Blackwell, who hasn't pitched an inning after a kidney operation, won't see action for some time.

The Eastern clay court tennis championships will be staged on the Travers Island courts of the New York Athletic Club, July 2-10.

Well, it looks like the New Mexico calf ropers put it on the boys from Oklahoma and Texas in the 3-state roping contest held Saturday in Amarillo. From the time turned in by the ropers in this contest, I believe that the Pampa Roping Club could give them a pretty good race. The New Mexico ropers led the contest all the way and wound up with an average of 102.4 seconds per man. Oklahoma came in second with an average of 127.9 per roper, and Texas finished last with an average of 137.5 seconds per man. The only consolation Texas can get from this match is that a Texas roper, Toots Mansfield, from Big Spring, turned in the best average of any roper for his five head of stock. Toots' time for five head was 93.4 seconds, an average of 18.7 per calf. Members of the winning team were Troy Fort, Jack Skipworth, James L. Ney and Cotton Lee. From a cash standpoint the contest wasn't too good. There were only about 700 roping fans on hand to witness the match.

The college boys over a bout Canyon are going Western next Saturday. The WP Aggie Club is sponsoring the rodeo and the contest is open only to boys who are enrolled in West Texas State. The directors of the show have a new ruling that might help some of the other ropers held in the Panhandle. The rule is that any contestant must enter at least two events. Tom Harlan, McLean, will furnish the stock for the rodeo. Don't forget those dates Friday night and Saturday afternoon, April 22 and 23, in Buffalo Stadium.

Toots Mansfield and Red Whaley didn't get enough roping done over at Amarillo Saturday. Toots thinks that he can beat a Toots, so he challenged him to a ten-calf match. The match was held Sunday, April 17, at Red's home town, Crosbyton. I haven't received any results from this match yet. If Toots wins, it's a real trouble at all he could have of beat. Red has been pretty hot this season. I think he has won two matches already from two good ropers.

While we are down at Crosbyton we might as well tell you about the rodeo they are going to have on May 12, 13 and 14. The Crosbyton Rodeo Assn. is sponsoring their annual rodeo on those dates. The Assn. has one of the finest arenas that stands to be found in this part of Texas. The grandstand will seat 4,000 people, and the grounds are really pretty. Goat Mayo, Petrolia, Texas, will furnish the stock and Hobart Normand, El Paso, will do the announcing. The purses for the show have been raised \$500 for this year. All of you know Goat Mayo's stock. Goat is furnishing the Top of Texas Rodeo stock again this year.

We had a few visitors here in Pampa yesterday afternoon. They were the boosters from the Spearman Rodeo Assn. Those fellows really believe in putting things on over there. They will be just as friendly to you in Spearman as they were here in Pampa. Let's try to send a good bunch of spectators over for their show April 22 and 23. I know that there will be a bunch from the Pampa Roping Club over there as contestants. The local boys want to get ready for Pampa rodeo.

If some of you Roping Club members are getting anxious for the calves to get here, maybe this will help you out a little. The committee set up to buy our calves has really been working hard this week and here's what they have found out. We have a chance at a good bunch of calves that will be here April 25, or Homer Taylor may go out to Clovis to look at 100 or 125 there. The calves will be in the barns within the next ten days. I think they will be ready to rope in time for all of us to be in top shape for the Roping Club Rodeo June 10, 11 and 12. If any of you have not paid your 1949 dues yet, try to get them in this week so we can pay for these calves.

If any of you "weaders" are interested in a good steer hunting, and who isn't, you might be interested in driving out to Clovis April 23 and 24. The Clovis Mounted Patrol is sponsoring a big match on those days. There will be ten of the biggest names in steer roping entered in the match. Purse will be for the entry fee of \$1000 per man. They will rope six steers each, three on Saturday and three on Sunday afternoon.

Well, the typewriter has got to where it don't spell so good; so I will let it rest for a few days. Let's rodeo this weekend somewhere.

The bill against the poll tax measure was broken only by one 25-minute rest. It was the same type of filibustering tactics but of longer duration. That is, the Senate's business creeping at snail-pace for nearly three weeks. But this time the Senate was prepared to sit it out.

A complete barbecue supper was spread in an adjoining committee room and senators filtered back and forth between supper and Senate while Lane talked.

Two items down the Senate's calendar was the controversial bill to permit cooperative development of oil fields.

The bill's author, Senator George Moffett of Chillicothe, claimed enough votes to pass the bill and directed Senator resistance to Lane's talking battle which was delaying consideration of his measure. It was Lane who helped filibuster the oil bill at the last session of September instead of the last Saturday of August this year.

Kelley told the Senate that the measure is essential in the face of pending federal legislation. "If we do not remove the poll tax requirement," he argued, "we'll have to hold two sets of elections in 1950. One for state, county and local officials where a poll tax would be required. The second for other officials where a poll tax would not be required."

He said the poll tax is on its way out, "whether we in Texas like it or not."

Final Senate passage was 25-2. It now goes to the House where it must get a two-thirds approving vote before it can be substituted.

The two men are Recruit Phillip J. Conner and Recruit Carroll Cook. They told Ragdale that a planned Guard unit in Perryton had failed to materialize. They would transfer back to their home town if a unit were ever organized there, they said.

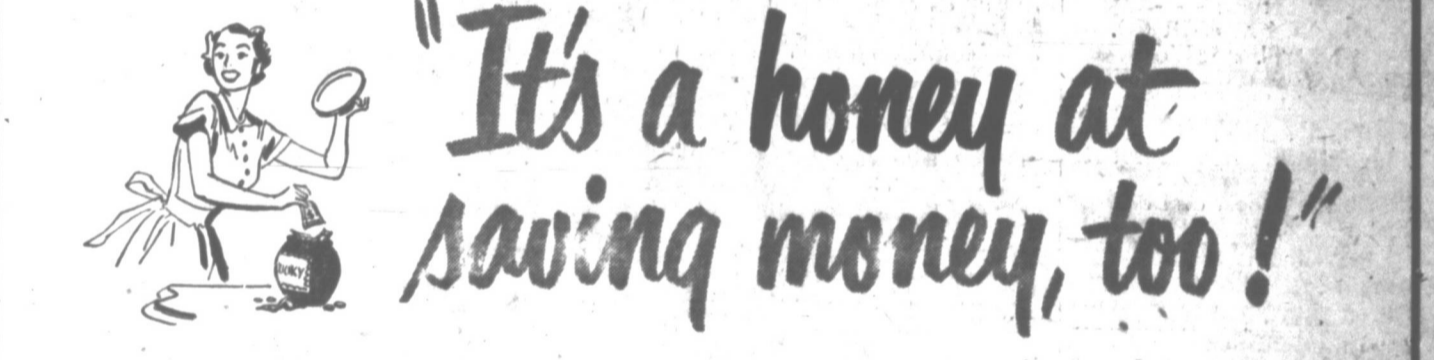

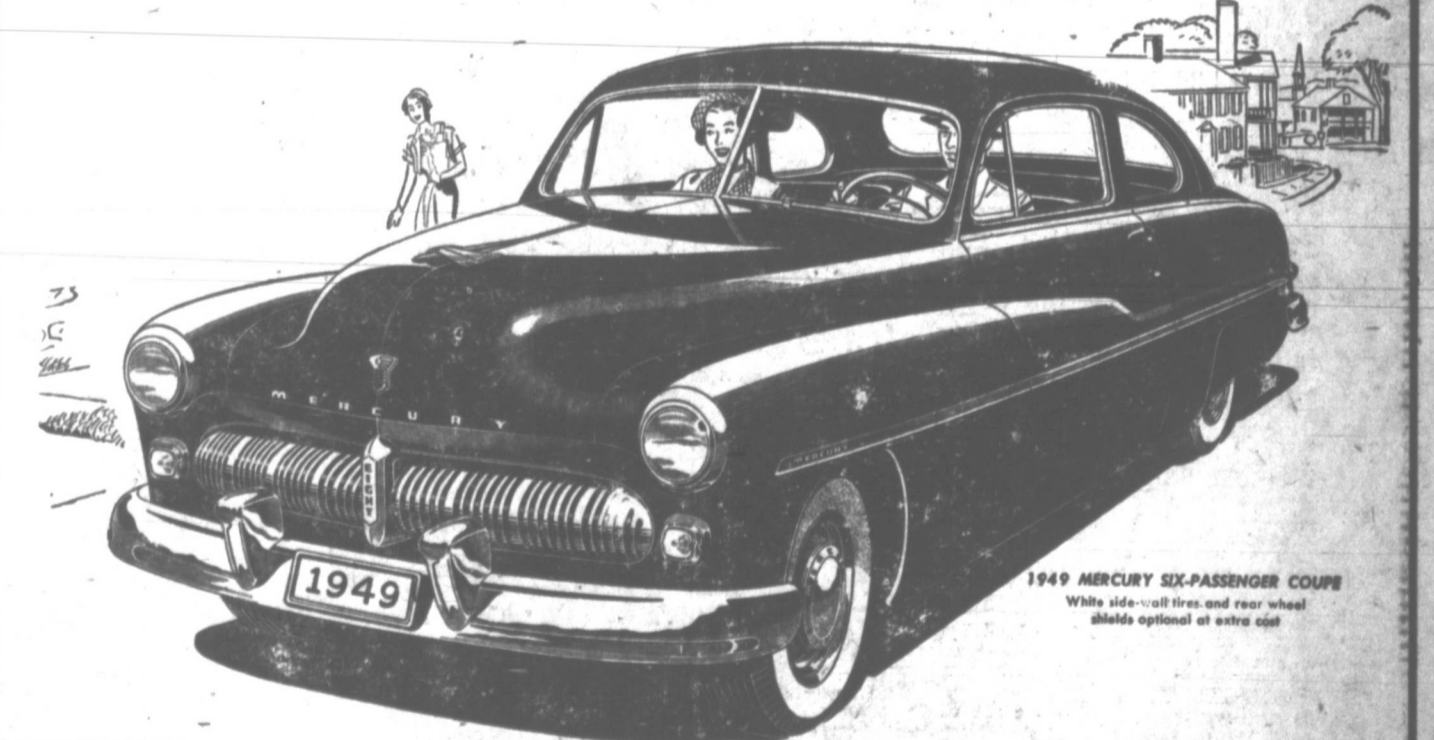

The peace agreement calls for outright capitulation. Their privately expressed feeling was that the terms are unacceptable. However, the specific nature of the Communist terms still was a secret.

Three Kuomintang (government) Party leaders who sound-ed out retired President Chiang Kai-shek on the peace proposal, reported to the acting president and his cabinet today, Chiang, who may come out of retirement now that war is at hand again, was believed to have opposed surrender.

Right wing elements led by Chiang are said to favor a final Nationalist resistance movement in the South.

The Legislative Yuan today asked the government to submit for examination whatever final decision is made. The legislators last month gave the cabinet full power to negotiate a peace settlement with the Reds.
