West Now Faces Political Battle for All Germany

Cold War in Atmosphere of Armed Truce

In an atmosphere of armed truce, the East and West grid today for the next round of the cold war — after the blockades at Berlin are lifted next Thursday.

The West considered it had won a victory by bringing the Russians to agreement. But Russian-controlled organs were putting the best front they could on the developments.

At best, the battle of Berlin was only part of a broad picture strewn with storm clouds. And a cold wind still was blowing off Russia, toward the foreign ministers council which will meet in Paris May 23 to consider the German question as a whole.

Under the big four agreement made public today, the Russians will lift the total blockade which has kept more than 10 months. The Western Allies will end the counter-blockade which severely pinched the economy of the Eastern Zone of divided Germany from July 26, 1948, on.

The United States will keep its airlift machine ready until they are sure Russia has no plans to set up another roadblock.

A burst of harmony brought about the truce after two months of negotiations in United Nations headquarters and in New York. Trygve Lie, secretary-general of the U.N., said the agreement "opens the way to new efforts for a settlement of the German problem, one of the main causes of the great power differences which have so far hampered the work of the United Nations."

Today Moscow's press and radio told its people of the agreement without editorial comment. But the Russian views were reflected in their press elsewhere. In Germany, for instance, the Soviet-licensed press said the Allies had "backed down" in agreeing to the four-power talks.

In London, the Communist Daily Worker called the agreement "a retreat for the United States."

New Labor Battle Plans Are Charted

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Labor legislation strategists in both branches of Congress charted new battle plans today even as the smoke of the hectic House scrap still swirled. Public predictions of final victory came from both camps—that is, from (1) those who want to get rid of the Taft-Hartley Law, and (2) those who want to keep most of it.

This is the situation: In the House, the Wood Bill to keep much of the T-H law on the books is back in the Labor Committee — fired there yesterday by a narrow-speak vote of 212 to 209. The House sent the measure back to the committee for further study and hence reversed its acceptance of the bill on Tuesday, 217 to 203.

That means there is no labor bill before the House. It also means the Truman administration can launch another drive, starting in the labor committee, for House approval of its Taft-Hartley repeal bill which got no place in this week's debate. However, the indications are Democratic leaders will concentrate instead on a compromise measure which could keep some of the T-H provisions.

That compromise bill also was defeated in the first round House battle. In the Senate, the opening of labor debate still appears to be about a month off. But Republican foes of the administration's Taft-Hartley repealer laid the groundwork yesterday for their counter-attack.

Prospects for a good wheat crop in Gray County this year are good, Charlie Robinson, manager of the Fisher Grain Elevator told Rotarians yesterday at noon in the Palm Room, City Hall.

Robinson told the club there are three grades of wheat — "desirable, less desirable and undesirable" as classified by the large milling companies. Among the "undesirable" wheats are the Chief, Red Chief and Early Black Hull which is grown by quite a few Gray County farmers. He cited one carload of wheat from the Pampa area stood for 30 days in Wichita last year without any bite. The wheat was finally sold to feeders. Robinson said wheat grown in this immediate area in 1947 showed Gray County farmers had raised 75 percent desirable wheat, five percent less desirable and 20 percent undesirable. He listed the desirable wheats as Westar, Comanche and Wichita.

Due to the absence of President Douglas Carver, Ray Evans presided at the meeting. Tom Ross, Jr., announced that only eight members had made specific reservations for the Plainview convention being held today and tomorrow.

Giles Given Life Term In Slaying

BEAUMONT — (AP) — Henry Robert Giles, Jr., stocky, 30-year-old member of a prominent family, today was convicted of murdering Elbert Langston of Houston. A jury set the sentence as life imprisonment.

Langston, former Florence, S.C., seaman, was shot to death in a rice field near Nome, Tex., last March 25. The jury returned its verdict at 9:35 a.m. It received the case at 8:25 last night.

Giles was pale, nervous, and twitching as the foreman rose to deliver the verdict. The defendant, resident of Houston and first son of the late H. R. Giles, physician, hotel owner and former mayor of Corpus Christi, avoided looking at the jury.

When the verdict was read, Giles showed no sign of relief but seemed more shaken than before. He did not rise to hear the verdict.

A wild youth and an erratic man, Giles moved to Houston, married seven times, ran through his inheritances, once shot a Houston friend in the stomach. The friend did not die.

The state had asked the death penalty — describing Giles as "a cold blooded murderer." Even as the Giles case was closed, the trial of William Earle Pelham of Houston, also indicted for murder in the slaying, was opening. A jury was being selected.

Giles' attorneys were not in the courtroom when the verdict was announced. No notice of appeal was given immediately.

John C. Brunson, no-billed by the grand jury in connection with the case, was a states witness. He said he and Langston, Giles and Pelham took a wild auto mobile ride from Houston. Pelham held a knife at his throat in the front seat of the car as Langston (See GILES, Page 2)

Chinese Reds Join in Pact Against U.S.

SEANGHAI — (AP) — Chinese Communists have joined in a Russian-blessed alliance with North Korean and Burmese Reds, the official Chinese Central News Agency said today.

The Communist action was announced as part of "the joint struggle against American and British imperialism," the Nationalist agency said.

If true, the "mutual defense pact" would stretch a 3,500-mile Red arc from the sea of Japan to the Indian Ocean — an arc encompassing hundreds of millions of people. There was no confirmation of the pact from other sources, however.

Chinese Red armies meanwhile slashed the South China Sea, China, with these developments reported: 1. As government forces prepared to yield Hankow, shaky Central China fortress-city, will range from coming to terms. The Red drive was near Nanchang, midway between Shanghai and Canton, and seemed aimed at Changsha, as well. Changsha, 175 miles farther inland, is on the rail line 200 miles south from Hankow.

2. Formosa sources reported the return of Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek from Red-encircled Shanghai to that big island haven. By coincidence, one Formosa newspaper only a day ago called many government officials flocking to that island "political" (See CHINESE, Page 3)

Why Does She Have to Bawl?

COLUMBUS, O. — (AP) — Dairy husbandry men of Ohio State University and the Ohio Agricultural Experiment Station had a problem today. It revolved about a cow but it wasn't one of those simple problems such as getting the animal out of a silo or a hay loft. This was a mental affair.

She doesn't have a thing to bawl about that I can see."

Electrical Storm, Strong Winds Hit

The High Plains country got a wetting down last night, and some wheat farmers were beginning to cry "enough." While most of the area last night was treated to an electrical storm, strong winds and plenty of rainfall, there was some talk from the weather bureau today that more unsettled weather was in prospect for this afternoon and tonight.

A cool front due to move into Northwest Texas late today was expected to churn up new storms. The U. S. Weather Bureau said a "squall line" would precede the front as it moves slowly southeastward across the state. There was no indication that it would reach the Panhandle, but conditions here were unsettled at midday.

PAMPA received 1.74 inches of rainfall over a 6-hour period last night, and there was some hail. There were no reports of damage to wheat, which could still use the moisture without being damaged. There was some wind, but no reported damage. The precipitation is recorded at the radio station here, official observers for the U. S. Weather Bureau.

MIAMI had 1.79 inches of rain, according to the Miami Chief. Although the rain was not needed, it did not damage, it was said. There were no destructive winds, and no hail.

CANADIAN had an electrical storm, according to the Canadian Record. The rain measured 1.80 inches. This added to .11 inch of the night before still was not sufficient to satisfy the wheat farmers' needs. More moisture would be needed before harvest, the county agent said, because the rate of wheat growth is very rapid at this time. The electrical storm did no damage that was reported.

PERRYTON had about one-half inch (.50) of rain, and farmers considered it a pretty good rain, according to the Ochiltree County Herald. The Herald said farmers had hoped for an inch, however. There was a little hail, and quite a bit of wind, but no damage from either.

MCLEAN registered .39 of an inch, there was no hail. Lester Campbell of The McLean News (See RAIN, Page 2)

Frank White, Dallas, described as one of the Southwest's top grain experts, according to the Associated Press, said at a grain and feed dealer convention at Amarillo yesterday that farmers in the area have had enough rain. He said much more rain will be detrimental to the wheat prospects. (For more details on wheat prospects, see separate story on this page.)

At mid-morning rain was still falling in parts of the Panhandle. Clarendon and Childress reported rain at that time, as did Big Spring, according to The Associated Press.

Farmers Have New Worry—Too Much Rain

Panhandle wheat farmers generally had an unusual worry today—too much rain. This was the consensus as it was reported there is a chance of a bumper crop of 70 to 75 million bushels. Conditions are right, provided there is a little more rain before the harvest.

The bumper crop was forecast at the Panhandle Grain and Feed Dealers Association 33rd annual convention brought to a close at Amarillo yesterday.

Frank White, Dallas expert on wheat, estimated the total Texas wheat yield this year at 50 to 55 million bushels. The 1948 yield was 56 million and the '47 yield, a bumper crop, was 124 million.

The Gray County Farm Agent Office here said today there were no reports of hail damage to wheat in last night's downpour. There are no green bugs to speak of in the county, according to reports to the office.

There was a possibility that last year's average per acre yield of about 11 bushels might be exceeded this time.

Early wheat in Gray County has had enough rain, it was reported, but the late crop still will need more moisture.

The grain and feed men at the Amarillo convention were briefed on a "blood, sweat and tears struggle" — movement of stored wheat out to make room for the new crop. Principal speaker was Latham White, regional Production and Marketing Administration director of Dallas.

He said "I think we can get the job done if there are no breakdowns along the line. Loading capacity at Galveston now is approximately 100 boats or 30,000,000 bushels a month, I think."

It was said most of the stored grain is destined for export. The Santa Fe Railroad has wanted it must be moved quickly — and efficiently to avoid a glut and (See FARMERS, Page 2)

CRONISTER CASE WILL BE TRIED AT DALHART

PERRYTON — (Special) — The murder trial of Ochiltree County Rancher D. A. Cronister was ordered to Dalhart yesterday after 143 special veniremen were examined here without even one juror being selected.

Cronister is charged with the double-slaying last May of C. W. Barker and his son, W. H. Barker, in Southeast Ochiltree County in a dispute over property sold by Cronister to W. H. Barker.

The case was ordered to Dallam County's 6th District Court, to be tried before Judge Harry Schultz, who said that it would be during this term of court which began last week. The court runs for six months.

A tentative date of June 6 has been set. However, there was some talk that it might not be held until after the wheat harvest which would be the latter part of July or early August.

Vernon Hobbs Seriously Ill

City Commissioner Vernon Hobbs was stricken this morning with a heart attack and confined to his home.

Attending physicians described his condition as "fair" but said that the commissioner would have to undergo a period of rest lasting from at least six to eight weeks. All of his outside activities will have to be suspended during that time. Physicians also said no visitors except members of the immediate family would be allowed to see him.

He was described as "resting comfortably" at press time today.

Realtors to Make Survey

A meeting of Pampa rental property owners has been called for 2 p. m. Monday at the County Courthouse, it was announced today by John Bradley.

Bradley, who is president of the Pampa Real Estate Board, said the meeting has been called to work out plans for making a survey on the number of houses vacant in the city limits.

The survey is the outcropping of a petition placed before the City Commission this week requesting the removal of rent control on rental property here in Pampa. An option clause in the new rent control law makes it possible for local communities to lift controls on property provided the governor or of the particular state approves.

Bradley said the meeting will be devoted mainly to getting a few persons to conduct the survey on local housing.

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Next Big Problem Is Unified Government for All Germany

Russia has agreed to lift the Berlin blockade, shifting the struggle for control of Germany from the field of force back to the field of negotiation.

The action is expected May 12, with a meeting of the four-power foreign ministers to follow on May 23 in a renewed effort to unify Germany.

Factors which have long been dormant will be revived, and new ones injected. Major among the latter will be an embryonic allied-sponsored government in the Western zones and a Russian-sponsored one in the East.

The battle presumably will center around efforts to compromise between these set-ups and merge them.

It will be conducted in a suspicious atmosphere, the Allies particularly have in mind the past agreements with Russia which have been ignored or violated.

The United States has made its attitude and its policy perfectly clear within the past few days.

The United States has considered all of its moves in Western Germany looking toward economic and political revival of temporary measures pending re-union of the country and the making of a peace treaty.

But there is no evidence that communism is giving up its fight for control of Germany.

There will be no surprise in the State Department, an Assistant Secretary "John Feair" put it, if current Russian moves prove to be without real interest in furthering world peace.

Here are the major planks of the platform upon which America will stand:

1. European security can be obtained only through a Germany which upholds basic human freedoms through democratic procedures—i. e., a non-Communist, non-Fascist Germany which would eventually join forces with the free peoples of Europe.

2. International control of the Ruhr must be maintained until that other objective has been attained.

3. The military occupation of Germany must also continue until that first objective is attained.

4. The Allies intend to go ahead with unification of their occupation zones. Eastern Germany can come in if Russia wishes and will abide by the rules.

5. Germany's direct participation in the Marshall Plan through an ECA agreement with the United States is important.

Reparations, dismantlement of German industries, currency and many other problems also are involved in any approach to a settlement.

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Board Discusses State Tidelands
AUSTIN — (AP) — No compromise on the tidelands question should be agreed to, the School Land Board said Wednesday.

Taking note of press reports that a compromise between the federal and state governments is being considered, Gov. Beauford H. Jester, Attorney General Price Daniel, and Land Commissioner Bascom Giles said in a joint statement benefits from efficient state management of Texas school lands have far exceeded those for comparable areas under federal control.

Texas has averaged \$20 per acre for its leases compared with 28 cents per acre for similar federal leases, the three officials observed.

The board later sent a telegram to Rep. John Lyles of Corpus Christi (D-Tex.) in Washington urging that he withdraw a proposed compromise bill which he reportedly plans to introduce.

Sanity Tests Are Ordered for Hetenyi
ROCHESTER, N. Y. — (AP) — County Judge Daniel J. O. Mara has ordered the Rev. George F. Hetenyi sent to Rochester State Hospital for sanity tests.

Hetenyi formerly was pastor at El Paso and Texas, Tex.

The order directed that two qualified psychiatrists be named to determine whether Hetenyi, who is charged with first degree murder in the slaying of his wife, Jean, is "incapable of understanding the charge against him, the proceedings or of making his defense."

Postal Receipts Show Increase
April's postoffice receipts show an increase of \$1,670,688 over April of last year, W. B. Weathered, postmaster, said this morning.

The total receipts for last month were \$12,335.71 as compared with \$10,665.03 for the same period last year.

The largest April receipts in the history of the Pampa Postoffice were reported in 1945. This April's total was less than \$100 less than the all-time high for April.

Pampa Postoffice receipts have shown approximately \$4,000 gain for the first quarter this year. Each month this year has shown a receipt gain over 1948.

Ask Senator Lodge a Republican of Massachusetts. He barely escaped the Connally treatment Friday. Afterwards he mopped his brow and exclaimed: "I'm glad that the smoke cleared. I'm glad we got that point cleared up."

Connally charged into the Senate chamber, stood by his desk and turned a stern eye on Lodge.

"I understand you in my absence made a speech denouncing my state," he said.

"Well, no," exclaimed Lodge. "Whoever told you that told you an untruth."

"Well, you were using my state as a horrible example, weren't you?" Connally persisted, accusingly.

"Oh, no, no," Lodge protested.

NEW YORK — (AP) — Sh-h-h-h-hhh!
Quiet, please. Quiet!
Prithree, let no bird call. Don't make a sound. This is national noise abatement week.

Anybody who makes an unnecessary sound in the next seven days is certainly no 100 percent American.

The signal for anti-noise week was given by a strong, silent man in Albany — Gov. Tom E. Dewey. He didn't make a speech about it. That wouldn't have been right.

No. The Governor issued a muffled statement instead. He said excessive noises were "one of the hidden drawbacks of our civilization."

Anti-noise week started off with a bang. Both Congress and the United Nations were in session, thinking out loud as usual.

In the sports world perhaps the outstanding observer of noise abatement week has been Leo Durocher of the New York Giants, known in exuberant moments as "The Lip." For days he has rivaled the clam. But what he hasn't been saying must be a mouthful. Maybe a choked mouthful.

Noise basically can be defined as a sound made by someone else that annoys you. The trouble is that if you try to shut the other fellow up you are likely to get into an argument. Then you both make strange sounds that become noise to a third party.

One of the difficulties of noise abatement week this year is that it is running into some stiff competition. This also happens to be national boys and girls week, university week, national baby week, and national baby week.

Yes, and your favorite cafeteria feels free to serve any old noisy soup it wants because it is national restaurant week.

It is even impossible to have quiet around the house. Sure 'nough, it's spring cleaning week, too.

You can't even beat your dog for howling at night. This is be kind to animals week.

If you're disillusioned about anti-noise week, there is small comfort ahead. You might just as well put on your earmuffs, stuff your mouth with raisins, and crawl into the refrigerator.

For it's national hearing week, and national raisin week — and they merge into national frozen food week.

Oh, yes, it's national golf week. And, yes again, it is also national packaging week.

Do you ever feel like you're in a package?

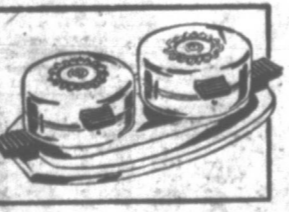

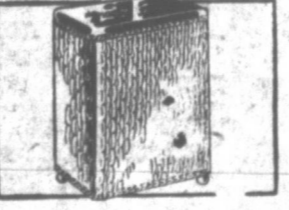

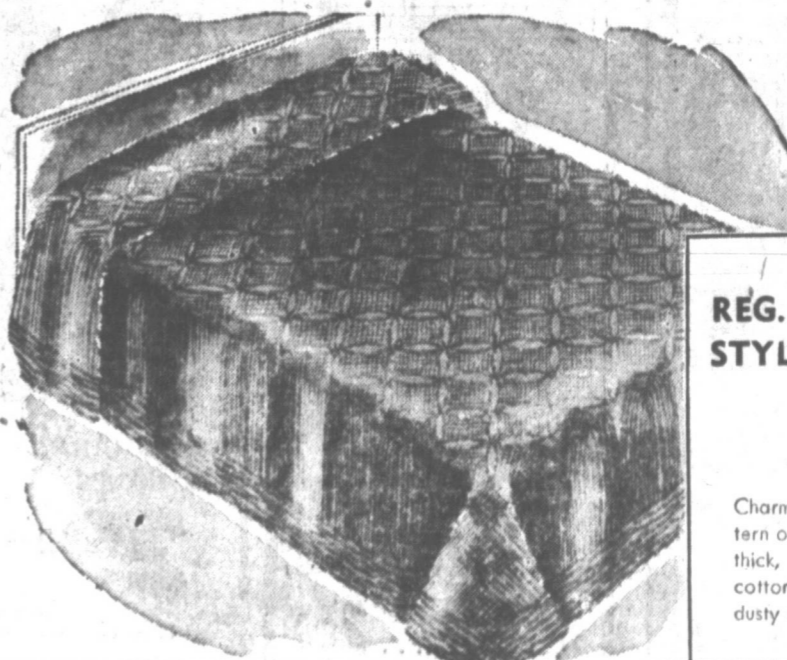

Unemployment in U. S. Dropped During April

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Unemployment dropped 151,000 while employment rose 172,000 in April, the Census Bureau reported Wednesday.

It was the second straight month of improvement in the labor situation. But the bureau said that even so, the rise in employment was "somewhat below seasonal expectations."

Significantly, the entire April increase in employment was due to the customary seasonal expansion in farm work. Non-farm employment went down 235,000 while farm employment increased 427,000.

The number of unemployed — those out of jobs and looking for work totaled 3,910,000. This compared with 3,167,000 in March and 2,193,000 in April a year ago.

Civilian employment amounted to 57,819,000 against 57,647,000 in March and 58,330,000 in April, 1948.

The bureau counts as employed persons working as little as one hour a week. Also counted are persons laid off for no more than 30 days as well as those ill, on vacation, or on strike.

A breakdown on the bureau's figures showed April employment in agriculture was 7,820,000 against 7,385,000 in March and 7,448,000 in April, 1948.

The number on non-farm jobs totaled 49,999,000 against 50,254,000 in March and 50,883,000 in April, 1948.

DETROIT — (AP) — The sharp drop in re-sale values is chasing many would-be car buyers out of the market.

There are some instances where dealers are offering high trade-in allowances to make sales. But this happens only when the dealer has more cars than he wants. It doesn't happen often among dealers in the more popular low price makes.

Three years of car scarcity led thousands of persons to believe they could go on indefinitely selling year-old cars at more than

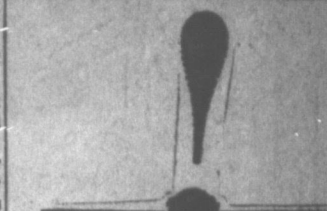
The house is half of a huge balloon 38 feet high and 53 feet in diameter, fastened to a concrete base. It's made of fibre glass and rubber, and is only as

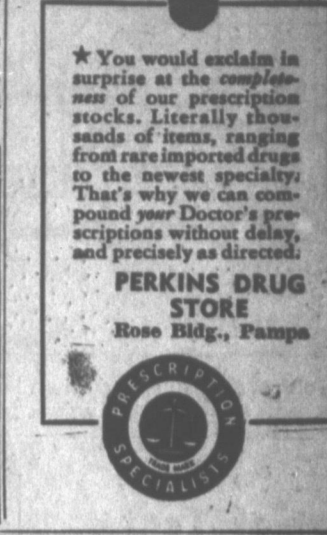

New Process Gasoline to Be Made at Brownsville Plant

OLEAN, N. Y. — (AP) — A plant being built at Brownsville, Texas, to make gasoline from natural gas will use a new process which may add 25 percent to America's motor fuel supply.

A centrifugal compressor is the heart of the Hydrocol process plant. Made by the Clark Bros. Co., Inc., a subsidiary of Dresser Industries, Inc., it can produce gasoline from coal, shale or gas.

A public demonstration of the compressor was given here Tuesday.

Then, at a luncheon, Ernest O. Thompson, Texas Railroad Commission member, told newsmen "the Hydrocol Process can easily mean an added 25 percent to the motor fuel supply of America."

"These compressors and more like them soon will be turning billions of cubic feet of waste gas daily into gasoline, if the opportunity is fully understood and grasped and utilized," said Thompson.

In the Brownsville Hydrocol plant, oxygen and preheated natural gas will be reacted at 250 pounds of pressure in a generator to produce the carbon monoxide and hydrogen mixture known as hydrocol gas. A similar process can make use of low grade coal or shale.

This method of producing hydrocarbons has been known since 1902, but a commercial unit was not built until 1933 when the German government subsidized one at Oberhausen-Holten. The Germans there had an octane rating that was too low to permit its use as a motor fuel without additional treatment. Refinements tested at an experimental station here yielded 82 octane gasoline and led to the commercial plant in Brownsville. The Brownsville plant will have a daily capacity of 6,000 barrels of high octane motor fuel and 1,000 barrels of by-products.

The cost of the gasoline will be about 5.25 cents a gallon, the same as that produced by other methods.

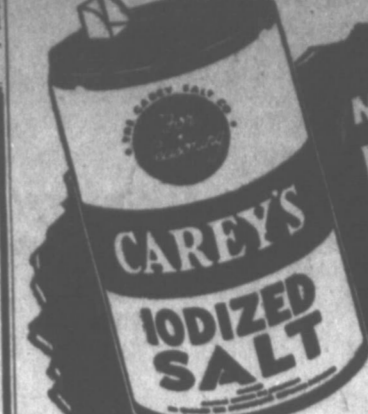

More People Afflicted with Rheumatic Disease Than Any Other Says Med Consultant

SAN ANTONIO—(AP)—Arthritis and rheumatism play important roles in statistical records on the nation's health.

Dr. W. Paul Holbrook, senior medical consultant for the Tucson, Ariz., Medical Center, says 7,500,000 people in the United States are afflicted with rheumatic disease.

This figure, he says, represents twice as many people having heart disease, seven times as many as have cancer and tumors, ten times as many as have tuberculosis, and approximately forty times as many as have infantile paralysis.

Holbrook has presented two technical papers on rheumatic disease research before the eighty-second annual convention of the State Medical Association of Texas now in session here.

Speaking before the association's section on medicine yesterday Holbrook said rheumatoid arthritis is perhaps the greatest crippler among the rheumatic diseases.

This type of arthritis involves an inflammation of the joints, with stiffness and deformity.

"There is no known single cause or no single specific cure for the disease," Holbrook told the Texas physicians.

Despite these handicaps, he added, research has proven that victims of the disease can be

Attention of Different Kind Given 'Expert'

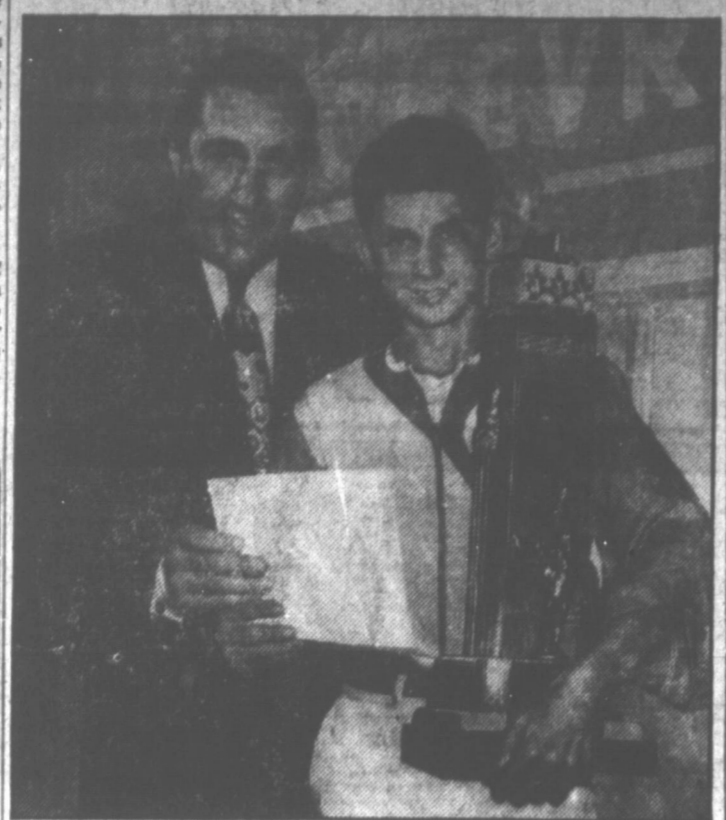
indicted him on charges of using the U.S. mails to defraud.

Contest officials, noting the postmark, thought Lengyel's letters were delayed in transit. So they paid him the prize.

DERBY RULES SET TO ENCOURAGE MORE BOYS

Each year a few new rules are added to the official All-American Soap Box Derby rule book, and others are changed, so it is important for boys who are entering the Derby competition to study the rule book carefully.

The book, circulated through Chevrolet dealers, contains the official rules and illustrations which help Derby contestants to interpret the rules and to follow the text. Every applicant receives a rule book when he signs up to enter the Derby.

The National Rules Committee of the Derby is made up of representatives of certain sponsoring newspapers and of the group that is in charge of the operation of the national final race. Every year this committee goes over the rules in an all-day meeting and makes changes that are thought to be necessary.

"Most of the changes are to make it easier for all boys to compete in the race on an equal basis," said Charles J. French, executive director of the Derby and advertising manager of the Chevrolet Motor Division, national co-sponsor of the race. "The changes of the past two years have stressed this point particularly, and also are aimed at making the race even safer than it has been in the past."

Changes for the 1948 race eliminated transparent wind-shields. Some boys had been taking advantage of this feature, and making their cars look like "submarines on wheels" by using transparent material all along the entire cowl. Hand brakes were eliminated because it had been discovered that foot-operated brakes were the only safe type.

This year, the committee decided to eliminate the use of power tools in Derby racing car construction and finishing.

"We feel that this rule will tend even more to give all boys an equal chance in the race," said French. "It means that

boys who do not have access to power tools will be on the same basis as those who used to have the advantage of power tools.

"Most cars in the past were made with hand tools, and the boys did splendid work on these cars. We expect that the 1948 cars, all made exclusively with hand tools, will be just as fine."

There is one basic rule which boys must never forget: every car must be built only by the boy who enters the race. This means no help from parents, friends or any adults. You can have advice from your father, or from a previous Derby contestant, but you have to build the car yourself.

Some other rule changes which you should study in your rule book are:

The weight allowance has been changed, with the only restriction being 250 pounds on the car and boy together. The 150-pound limit on the car itself has been dropped. So, if you are a light boy and want the car to be heavy, build that added weight right into the car. Don't try to add it afterward as extra weight, because that is against the rules.

The steering wheel may extend above the 25-inch height of the car. Another rule provides that the steering wheel must be no less than eight inches in diameter, and that there must be a two-inch clearance between the rim of the wheel and any part of the car or driver's body.

The prohibition against transparent material of any kind is continued, and a new rule provides for a cockpit opening on each side of the car. The lowest part of this opening must be no more than 10 inches from the floor of the car.

The cost limit remains the same, at \$8 plus the cost of wheels and commercially-made steering devices.

At the Akron Finals, it is provided in the rules that the National Contest Board may, at its own option, remove the wheels from all competing cars in the championship race Aug. 14, and furnish all contestants with new wheels, free of charge. Such wheels would have been broken in equally, and would be used to give all the competing champions an equal chance at the national championship.

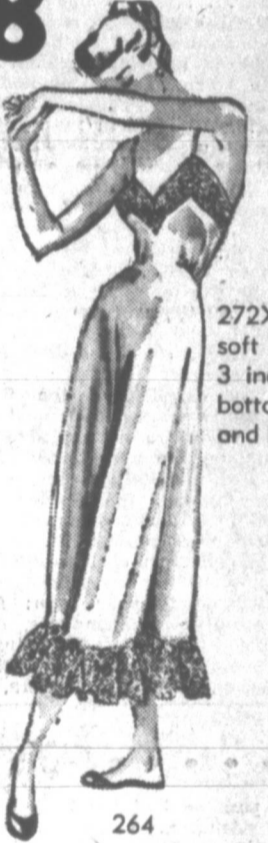

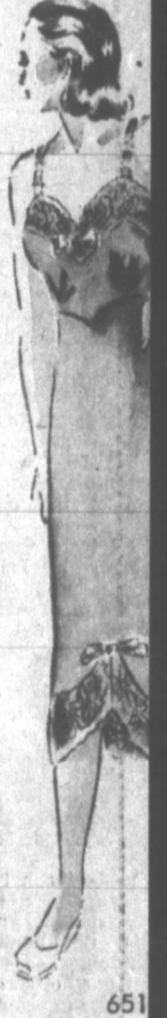

Fair Enough - Pegler

I present two methods of raising money for foreign relief and some comment on the powers of unions over American citizens.

The Catholic Bishops' Fund for Victims of War, of New York, appeals for \$500,000 toward a national total of \$5,000,000 to provide food, clothing and medicine for the sick, the aged and the children in certain war-ravaged countries. A further objective is the "resettlement" of displaced persons.

This is an appeal, not a demand. There is no slightest threat, coercion or compulsion. There is no penalty for failure to contribute and the total goal is only \$5,000,000 for the entire country.

Now I refer to a demand, somewhat agitated, which has been received by members of the International Ladies Garment Workers Union, whose president, Davina Dubinsky, is an old protegee of the Roosevelt administration. He operates a little nuisance party of his own in New York called the Liberal Party. Dubinsky is a social democrat.

The social democratic splinter of the United States Communist Party is an alien political element in the United States. Dubinsky's union has so much money that he cannot find legitimate use for it here and thus is forced to spend much of it on European projects. The idea of reducing the collections would be regarded as a labor-baiting device. During the war the I.L.G.W.U. conducted secret, irresponsible espionage in Europe at the expense of American workers who were not informed of these activities. The expenditures remain secret on the ground, or pretext, that to disclose them in detail would be to jeopardize persons who took part in the "underground" work. Thus this model among the paternalistic socialist unions cannot account for these expenses nor even submit a report of its secret activities overseas.

On March 18, workers belonging to Locals 10, 22, 60 and 89 embraced in the joint board of the Dress and Hat Makers' Union received a printed letter from their union bosses which was an appeal for money but a demand and a threat. It calls on the "members in your shop to do your share in a great and noble cause... to carry out this noble responsibility that our members have taken upon itself to ever before... Thousands of displaced persons are at last on their way from D. P. camps in Germany... and looking with hope toward establishing a new, free and secure life in their newly acquired homeland-Israel. Many others are finding new homes in democratic countries of the world. All of them need not only means of transportation, food, clothing and care but also means of earning a living. When they have established themselves and begin life anew—be it in Israel, the United States or anywhere else... The people of Italy are erecting a better life... All these brave peoples cannot be left down by us. Their help... cannot remain unanswered.

"By decision of the General Executive Board and approval of our union we have pledged contributions to the United Jewish Appeal, the Italian American Labor Council, the Jewish Labor Committee, Histadrut and many other organizations... to facilitate collection of these funds we ask you to immediately begin collection in your shop: from operators, samplers, cutters and pressers, \$7; finishers, \$5; from cleaners, pink-

ers and pressers, \$2.50... We sincerely hope you will give this prompt attention because registration for vacation benefits will commence immediately after April 1. This collection is to be completed by that date so that all members may be in good standing." In plainer words, American citizens are required to accept a "noble responsibility" imposed on them by a small group of powerful union politicians, failing which they will cease to be in "good standing" and thus will become ineligible for vacation funds already earned by them and paid to their individual accounts in the union treasury by their employers. The union contracts forbid the employers to pay the vacation money straight to the individuals. It must go through the union and the individual as much as the employer has paid in his name.

These workers get small pay and every dollar counts. Dubinsky has been president of the I. L. G. W. U. unopposed since 1932 and is as strong in his union as Lewis is in the Mine Workers. He publishes semi-weekly a paper called "Justice" at the expense of the members with his name on the masthead and his picture liberally scattered through the pages always in the most favorable poses and situations. It is actually a personal organ of propaganda and praise rather than a members' paper. Israel, the chief beneficiary of the fund to which these American citizens were forced to give money under threat of reprisals, is a sovereign foreign nation with an army, ambassadors, a treasury, and other services. It would be equally outrageous to force American citizens to give money to the Peron government of Argentina, the Soviet government or the British government. Citizens of Israel are in no greater need of homes and "a secure life" than millions of Americans. In Tucson, Ariz., thousands of American citizens live in trailers for lack of money to rent or buy homes. Millions of our own also need "transportation, food, clothing and care." Few Americans have "a secure life."

The March 1 issue of Dubinsky's "Justice" carried five photographs of Dubinsky. In the March 15 issue he led the paper with the announcement, accompanied by a picture, that "Dubinsky turned over \$250,000 on behalf of the I.L.G.W.U. to Henry Morgenthau." It said that last year the union gave \$150,000 to the fund. On Page Four there was a small picture showing a presentation of \$7,000 to Luigi Antonini, a vice president and patron of the Italian-American element of the union, "for Italian relief." We are not told whether this is the total allotted for Italian relief.

The organization called "Histadrut," mentioned in the letter of the joint board as a beneficiary, was identified flatly in this issue of "Justice" as the Israel federation of labor. It is a member of the Communist-controlled World Federation of Trade Unions. American citizens in this labor union, the I. L. G. W. U., have been compelled to contribute \$400,000 in two years to the cause of a sovereign foreign nation. The Royal Egyptian Embassy in Washington reports that 800,000 Palestine Arabs are now refugees from their own homeland. There seems to be much concern for them in this union. Without regard for the merits of the rival claims to this "homeland" it is obviously wrong to use the power of boss unionism to compel American citizens to give of their scanty earnings for the benefits of a sovereign foreign nation or its citizens.

It is possible that the United States of America could go into a century of revolution, confiscation, violence and impoverishment unless its people take an interest in what professional officials are letting us do for? But what shall we do, now, about China? Is it beginning to be a typical American reaction — or only an official American reaction — that when confronted by gigantic failure of theory or the sad reality of a political situation we want to vote a billion dollars to the lost cause? That's no good in the case of China now! Congress might as well save American taxpayers' money and the U. S. Treasury's credit on this one. We stopp... Let's recognize that we — our government — made this situation. We — our State Department and some of our military — gave prestige to the Communist heads by demanding that Chiang Kai-shek take Chinese Broeders and Powers and Eislers into his government. We stopp... Chiang's supplies when he wouldn't give the Communists all because they wouldn't take half. We invited the Russian armies to occupy the Japanese arsenals which were on the verge of surrendering to us, making it possible for Stalin to equip the Chinese Communists with effective arms — even to the big guns which have been shooting British cruisers out of the Yangtze River. As the result of our government's policy, the Chinese Communists are now so well entrenched that we shall have to let them knock themselves out. There is no one left in China who can use our money and arms to knock them out for us. After winning most of China, the Communists have won a second round. We must recognize that, too. Having overrun China, their real test would be policing

Common Ground

The Proposed Atlantic Treaty A Denial of Declaration of Independence

Very few people realize the far-reaching effects that the proposed Atlantic Treaty would have in causing them to lose more and more of their economic and political freedom. It is a denial of the ideologies on which this government was formed. The Declaration of Independence, the first official document of this country, reiterates the various oppressions the king of England was imposing upon the people living in the United States. Then in the last paragraph it sums up a course of action that should be followed.

"We, therefore, the representatives of the United States of America, in general congress assembled, appealing to the Supreme Judge of the world for the rectitude of our intentions, do, in the name, and by authority of the good people of these colonies, solemnly publish and declare, that these United Colonies are, and of right ought to be free and independent States; that they are absolved from all allegiance to the British Crown, and that all political connection between them and the State of Great Britain, is and ought to be totally dissolved; and that as free and independent States, they have full power to levy war, conclude peace, contract alliances, establish commerce, and to do all other acts and things which independent States may do in right. And for the support of this declaration, with a firm reliance on the protection of divine providence, we mutually pledge to each other our lives, our fortunes and our sacred honor."

Now, we propose to enter into a treaty that obligates us to go into war if any one of the signatory states are involved in war. We do not even require the European states to abandon tariffs before we are to be bound by the treaty. It is a denial of the Declaration of Independence, the first official document of this country, reiterates the various oppressions the king of England was imposing upon the people living in the United States. Stalin has concentrated in the last few years on construction of latest-model submarines and powerful, long-range aircraft, including both bombers and jet fighters, according to confidential information submitted to several Congressional committees. It is understood that he has at least 200 U-boats built on the German schnorkel-boat design. His objective is 500. He is building no carriers or capital ships.

At the same time he is building an air force expected to have twice the strength of a combined Anglo-American unit. Although he had almost no bombers for use in the last conflict, he is turning out great numbers based on American types which fell in Red territory, or which we loaned to him.

WALL — In short, Russia is preparing for a wholly defensive conflict designed to prevent a seizure of her territory, including land which she may occupy in Western Europe and China before the North Atlantic Pact nations can even mobilize. Taking advantage of mistakes made by Hitler, who was unable to prevent an allied landing on Festung Europa, the Red dictator aims to erect an impregnable, submarine-airplane wall around the European and Asiatic continents.

Although our military attaches abroad admit that Moscow conceals detailed data on postwar rearmament, they are certain of his plans and preparations with respect to submarines and air planes. BOMB — It was this extremely secret report on Russia's overall strategy for a possible World War III which, together with other factors, led to the sensational scrapping of the supercarrier after her keel had been laid.

If the Soviet had the strength in under-surface and air forecast in these communiques, it would be almost impossible for her supercarrier to approach foreign shores near enough to survive the opening engagement. If a Schorkel did not penetrate the ring of protective subs and destroyers to sink her, a single, well-aimed bomb from a high-flying plane might do the trick.

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Success Secrets

Studies made among high school and college students show that about 80% of them have no definite plan for their lives other than to "get a job" or "go in business."

He sold his company. "The way to sell soap is not to sell to the store and overload their shelves—but to sell through the store to the customer so the stores will want to buy. That sort of organized thinking led him, at the age of 35, to the president's job of Lever Brothers' 100 million dollar business.

Although he's still selling soap for a living, Luckman is still an architect when it comes to thinking and planning. It means having a blueprint of what you wish to accomplish, rather than a hit or miss system of doing whatever turns up. Architectural thinking does not mean inflexibility. Circumstances may cause it to alter your plans—add a room here or there. But planning each move in advance is the secret of the architect.

SOME MORE MARSHALL PLAN RAZZLE-DAZZLE (Chicago Daily Tribune)

With the appropriation for the Marshall plan for the second year still to be acted upon by congress, the British last week made a cute little political gesture. They announced in Washington the elimination of the bill for aid to Britain, articles to be paid for with ECA money, in addition to the same total as before. The American taxpayer is welcome to whatever satisfaction he can draw from having his money spent, for eggs, tobacco, and metal products shipped to Britain instead of wheat.

The wheat going to Britain under the Marshall plan was Canadian wheat. The American money point was used in subsidizing the British diet has been spent largely on the other side of the border. The new items replacing wheat on Britain's ECA list are to be purchased as before in Canada, so that there will be no diminution of the flow of dollars to Canada. Mounting evidence of the glut in the American wheat market is responsible for Britain's rick-a-dink with the shopping list. The farm organizations have been sounding off about the agreement Britain signed in January with Canada covering 140 million bushels of wheat to be shipped from Montreal in the year beginning next Aug. 1. The price of \$2 set in the agreement was intended to reimburse Canada in part for grain supplied to Britain at \$1.50 to \$2 under the market a couple of years ago. Canada wanted \$2.50 a bushel, but the money point was the oversupply of grain in the United States which might make a \$2 price look ridiculous. The point was also made that padding Uncle Sam's bill too much for past favors by Canada to Britain, the new crop started coming to market at midyear. On top of that, the department of agriculture estimates that this year's crop will be the second biggest of record, and probably 500 million bushels will be carried over at mid-year. The price of wheat is now \$1.50 a bushel, and exports continue at last year's rate.

To be honest with the American people, ECA Administrator Paul Hoffman ought to reduce the British allocation of funds by 280 million dollars, or 140 million bushels at \$2 a bushel. Mr. Hoffman has said repeatedly that "he has presented the program again and again to make sure that it includes only those goods and services essential to recovery." Now Britain, of its own accord, is screening wheat out completely and writing in some new commodities, including wool, without objection from the ECA.

If Mr. Hoffman does not reduce the British allocation by the value of the wheat, then he ought to stop pretending that the shopping list carefully made up is completely indispensable for recovery. The real character of the Marshall plan now becomes clear. What we are supplying to Britain is not tools for permanent recovery but dollar exchange to buy consumable goods for immediate use. There is no essential difference between the ECA help and lend-lease.

Britain has been living off the United States for nine years without interruption. The form and name given to the relationship has changed, but it has remained what it was nine years ago, a gift camouflaged for acceptance in the United States. Lend-lease as originally revealed to the American people contemplated repayment. All thought of repayment has long since disappeared. When lend-lease ended, aid in the amount of \$3/4 billion dollars was given, labeled as a loan. No thoughtful person now expects that to be repaid. When the \$3/4 billion was about shot, the Marshall plan was brought forward.

When the Marshall gap plays out, there will be another label and another rationalization. The Marshall plan was conceived as a fraud upon the American people and is being executed steadily in accordance with that conception.

Family, Health and Welfare Problems Discussed by Group

Family health and welfare problems were discussed Tuesday at the second meeting of the Social Welfare Agencies Organization, Mrs. Mildred Hill, president, said this morning.

The organization was formed during the first part of March and will hold monthly meetings to discuss the various ways Pampa can help solve the problems of the respective agencies.

"The community needs to be awakened to the vast problems our agencies are being confronted with in many cases," Mrs. Hill said. "The financial phase of the problems is not of major importance as much as is the serious family problems where the welfare of a family and of the children must be considered."

By working together, the Department of Public Welfare, the County Welfare Court, the Salvation Army and the Red Cross, with the guidance of the Ministerial Alliance, the school principals, the county doctor and both the city and county law enforcement officers, the agencies carry on their work to the best advantage of all people and the various agencies.

"We want the public to know we make an investigation of each case and are aware of the problems involved in each," she said. "We hope the town will cooperate with us in checking with the agencies before they help families that already may be getting help from one of the agencies."

Each case is based on the need involved and the coordination of the agencies helps each agency to understand the other agencies' problems.

John Hessey, Department of Public Welfare, gave an overall picture of how his agency carries out his department's policy. A question and answer period followed his talk, whereby the other representatives present were better able to understand the public welfare problems.

Attending the meeting were: Dr. M. McDaniel, representing Dr. Julian M. Key, county doctor; Louise Allen, chief of police; Dr. Douglas Nelson, Ministerial Alliance; Mrs. Willie Bain and Hessey, Department Public Health; Bruce Parker, county judge; Mrs. Ethel Anderson, county welfare court; Major Bernice Lyons, Salvation Army; H. 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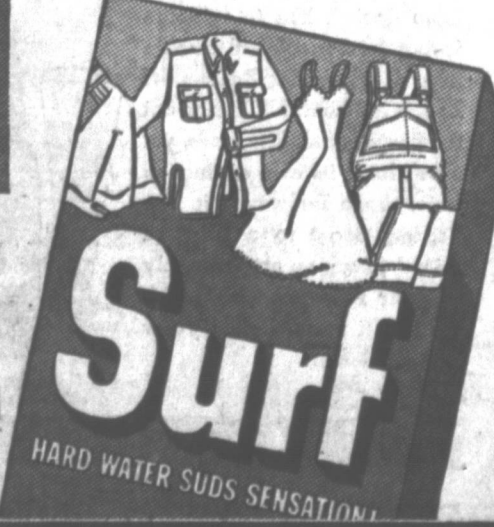

DALLAS — (AP) — Ben Hogan, golf's little giant, said today that he was unable to return to the game as a competitor.

They are: a fractured ankle, a cracked collar bone and a case of nerves. He isn't sure which is the biggest obstacle but said he was mighty hopeful he could lick all three.

The 1948 National Open and National PGA champion is attending his first golf meet since a bus-auto crash three months ago almost took his life. He is a spectator at the Texas PGA.

Ben's doing all the walking he can. That's what the doctors told him he needed. He has gained 25 pounds in the past five weeks.

America's number one golfer made his first tournament appearance since the accident here yesterday, as a spectator. He watched his golfing pal, Byron Nelson, and the top Texas pros play in the pro-amateur at the Texas PGA Gold Tournament.

Hogan received a great ovation at the Dallas Athletic Club Country Club. Players and fans crowded around him for a chance to shake his hand.

"They didn't ask him if he would play again. It was 'Hey, Ben, when are you going to play again?' or, 'are you going to play tomorrow, Ben?'"

Hogan was a bit weak and wan, but dapper in his sports coat and slacks.

"I can walk about three holes now," Ben said. "The doctors don't know how long it will be before I can play again. Personally, I think it will be a long time."

Hogan's legs were taped as he walked around the clubhouse today. He explained how his injury has prevented him from playing golf.

"My left ankle is too weak to support my full weight in a golf swing right now," he declared, "and the particular type of injury to my left shoulder has slowed the healing process."

Then, Hogan added, "the operation on the blood clot in my leg cut off the circulation and has caused my legs to swell."

He's still a sick man, but he has made tremendous progress since he stepped out of his wheel chair a few days ago. Nelson, who knows Hogan the golfer better than anyone, thinks Ben will play again. 



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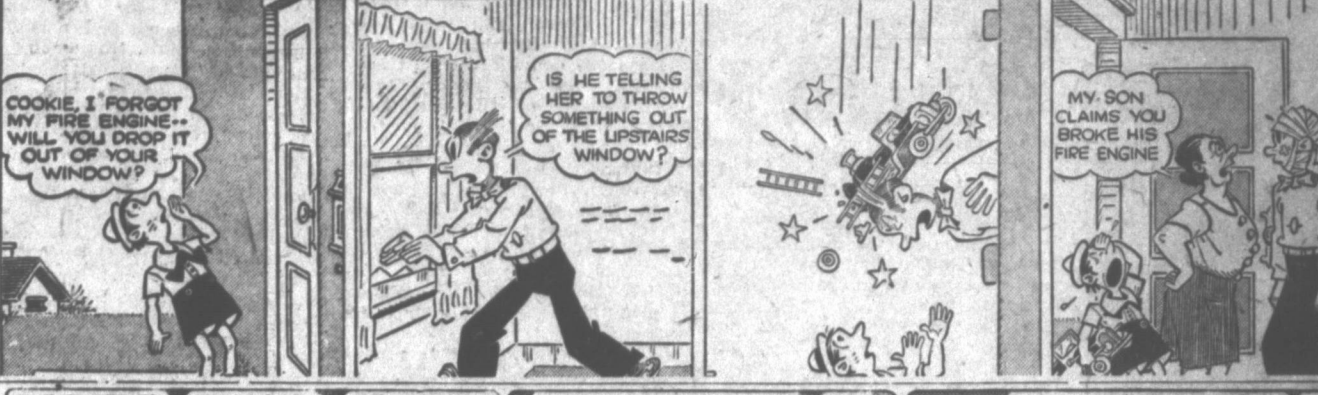
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
