It will be extended to Spain, Italy and to other parts of North Africa. The study is being made by J. Henry Burke, marketing specialist of the department's Ofice of Foreign Agricultural Re-

Preliminary studies were said to show that there is a potential demand in Europe for 25 to 30 ercent more citrus fruit and citrus products than before the war. But there was said to be little immediate prospect of im-proving the market for United States products because of a shortage of dollar exchange.

Most governments participating in the European Recovery Program prefer to use their recovery dollars for other things. Ship-ments of citrus presently are confined to Belgium and Switzer-

"The United Kingdom is pur-chasing from the United States large quantities of orange juice oncentrate for maintenance its child health program but plans to develop other sources of supply to conserve dollars," the department said.

Krug Urges Industry to **Build Plants**

"Does the United States have sufficient coal to contemplate the large requirements of a synthetic fuels industry? Fortunately, the answer is yes. This country has almost half the world's total known coal reserves."

The Bureau of Mines has found that gasoline can be made from coal for 12 to 15 cents a gallon, not counting the value of by-products. Counting the by-products, the figure is given as 8 to 12 cents a gallon. This allows 15 years for amortization of the plant but no return on the investment.

One plant here cost \$10 million and the other cost \$5 million. Krug said he hopes Congress will "promptly" pass some pend-ing bills which would provide government loans to help finance commercial plants.

To be economical, he said, such a plant should produce nearly 10,000 barrels a day. A plant of that size, he went on, would cost from 40 to 80 or even 90 million dollars, depending on the raw ma-

The process is not new. The Germans worked it out, starting in 1913, and used it extensively in World War II.



One player contended that three clubs is the only possi ble response. For my part I would bid only two clubs. I have made it a rule never to make a jump shift bid unless I have control of at least two suits. There is one exception, you may make a jump shift bid if you hold so many king-queen combinations that you your partner has to hold at least three aces. These hands are few and far between.

Most players today consider a bid of any new suit over an original bid as forcing. Therefore, do not paint a bad picture to your. partner which will lead him to believe you have two controls. Over two clubs South has a choice, he can bid three clubs or three diamonds. In either case North is now justified in jump-ing to five hearts, which tells his partner that he has a powerful hand, but did not have two controls. South will now bid only six hearts, which he will no trouble in making.





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
