He is not an intellectual coward or an intellectual sneak. His door is always open to seekers after truth. He never says he can see no useful purpose for answering questions. He always treats questioners as brothers and not as inferiors unworthy to treated as honest seekers after The real Christian is not so much

interested in an audience and power as he is in himself coming as nearly as possible to living in harmony with the precepts taught by Jesus. He never sets himself up in contradiction to the teachings of Jesus. He never wants to be a divider, as E. Stanley Jones does, over men. He never wants to take the property of another person without his consent, as does E. Stanley Jones by way of legislation. 




