Fair Forces Cancellation Of Concert

On Thursday, around noon, the Muleshoe Chamber of Agriculture Commerce and office was notified that the George Strait concert, booked for Muleshoe on Friday, June 21 had been cancelled.

Toni Eagle, manager of the CofC, was informed that the Panhandle South Plains Fair Roard, who had booked the George Strait Show for the fair in late September, exercised an option in the contract and refused to allow Strait to honor his appearance in Muleshoe.

According to the Fair Board, anyone they book to appear at the fair cannot appear anywhere on the South Plains prior to the fair. Mrs. Eagle has made trips to Lubbock, as well as made many telephone calls trying to get a waiver on the fair board's decision, but to no avail.

Mrs. Eagle said Strait was told that if he did go ahead and appear in Mulestoe, his contract at the fair would be pulled. The CofC manager expressed regret for any inconvenience to persons who had already mailed checks for tickets to the show in Muleshoe, and said checks are on in process of being related at this time.

Regretfully, the fair board has chosen to ignore the hundreds of thousands of dollars spent each year by most Muleshoe residents, and businesses who shop regularly in Lubbock, as well as the many local residents who use their extensive medical facilities, dropping more dollars on Lubbock's economy.

Although Strait promised to appear in Muleshoe at some future date, he or his manager, could not venture to name any date within the next year or

Raid Nets Marijuana, Vehicles

Law enforcement officers from six agencies conducted a raid at a residence in the Bula community at 10:20 Thursday night. Bailey County Deputy Sheriff Hal Bynum said the raid was the result of several weeks of ongoing investigation.

He said five males and one female were arrested and charged with the possession of drugs, drug paraphernalia and for investigation of stolen items, including guns and vehicles.

Officers confiscated pounds of marijuana; materials used to sort, weigh and package marijuana for resale; eight weapons suspected of being stolen; and impounded two vehicles suspected used to deliver marijuana and a pickup believed to be stolen.

Deputy Bynum said the marijuana confiscated by officers had a street resale value of approximately \$32,000.

Officers assisting the Bailey County Sheriff's Office were the Bailey County Constable's Office; the Texas Department of Public Safety; The Hockley County Sheriff's Office; The Lamb County Sheriff's Office and the Portales (N.M.) Police Department K-9 unit.

Investigation is continuing into the case at this time, according to Deputy Bynum.

To Carry Penalty According to information received from the local ASCS office, there are clear rules for haying and grazing ACR acreage. Danny Noble, Bailey County ASCS executive director, said, Bailey County has been approved for haying and grazing of ACR acreage on an individual basis. He said the AOR acreage may be grazed by the producer's own livestock or another producer's livestock with permision of

ACR Violations

Noble said the ACR acreage may be mechanically harvested for hay, green chop, or ensilage for feeding the producer's own livestock or to another producer's livestock.

However, he added that producers cannot charge for grazing ACR or charge for the value of vegetative growth mechanically

harvested, when used by another producer. He says if you are going to hay or graze your ACR, you must come into the ASCS office, certify your ACR acreage, pay the

\$10 inspection fee, and sign the register. If the ACR is wheat, rye, barley, or oats, this must be done by May 15, 1985. The ASCS office has also been notified that corn will be

counted as a grain on the farm program. ASCS office personnel said spot checks will be made on ACR acreage and for violation of the contract, the acreage becomes

Also, for serious violations, the producer could be 'thrown out of the program' and declared not eligible for any farm programs, warned the ASCS personnel.



CHINISTER STATE OF THE CONTROL OF TH By Spencer Tanksley

Spring planting is at hand, and farmers should have their tractors in good running order to keep operating costs down, says Spencer Tanksley, county agent for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

Attention to a few details can help farmers reduce fuel con-sumption in farm machinery, whether gasoline or diesel powered, Tanksley says.

Perhaps the most neglected item on any engine is the air cleaner. A dirty air cleaner can cut down the amount of free air flow and change the fuel-air mixture. A tractor operating at full load needs about 1,200 cubic feet of air to burn one gallon of fuel. Anything less cuts down on power and

increases fuel consumption. Tractor engines also should operate at the proper temperature, usually 180 to 190 degrees F. Engines operating at lower temperatures, because of faulty thermostats use more fuel, exert

less power and wear out faster, explains Tanksley.

Farmers can save as much as 400 gallons of fuel a year, based on 800 hours of tractor operation, by cutting down the time an engine idles. Studies show that tractors idle as much as 12 percent of the time and use half a gallon of fuel an hour at idle speed. A fast idle will use 40 percent as much fuel as the tractor engine needs at full

So, pay careful attention to idle time when operating a tractor, make sure the engine thermostat is operating properly, and service the air cleaner regularly. These practices can reduce operating costs, and that's critical for 1985, says Tanksley.

It's almost summer, for some that means the best time of year. The word "summer" in Webster's dictionary means the warmest season of the year and summer in West Texas can get pretty down-right hot. Summer can be great fun with lots of outdoor activities, but it can also be very dangerous if you allow yourself to become overheated. A few symptoms to watch for include muscle cramps, weakness, cool moist. skin, profuse sweating and pale skin. These signs are an indication of heat cramps. For this type of heat disorder move the victim to a cool place. (In an air-conditioned house or under a shade tree). Give him sips of salted water (1 tablespoon of salt to 1 quart of water).
