



Extra Feeding as Harvest Nears Gives Super Yield

When garden plants begin to flower, set fruit, or reach harvest size, a "side dressing" of plant food will usually bring an increased yield, of higher quality. Flowers will grow larger, and colors more brilliant. Fruits will increase in size, and more will set. Leaf and root crops will speed up growth and improve in tenderness and flavor.

Plant food should be applied without distarbing the roots of the plants, since this might do more harm than the feeding would do good. One way is to spread the plant food on the surface between the rows after cultivating, and rake it into the soil, then wash it in. Another way, which has shown impressive results in New Jersey experiments, is to stir the plant food in water, and pour the water on the ground near the plants. During hot, dry weather, dry plant food may be inert in the soll, until water is supplied to dissolve it. By using liquid plant feed the



(Continued From Page One) tee's hearings are one part of a Congressional inquiry into how well the Atomic Energy Commission is guarding its secrets. Technically, the subcommittee is holding hearings on the commission's request for over a billion dollars of funds to finance its activities in the fiscal year be-

ginning July 1. The Senate-House committee on atomic matters is also making an inquiry. At the moment, it is particularly concerned with the disappearance of some uranium from a Chicago atomic laboratory and is seeking an "outside ex-pert" to check on testimony it has received.

Senator Ferguson (R-Mich), brought up the matter of the isotope exports while the Appropriations Committee was prepar-ing to question Dr. Isidore Edelman, holder of a \$3,750 commission fellowship at Harvard. The senators want to form their own

opinion of his loyalty.

At the outset of the hearing, Chairman O'Mahoney (D - Wyo) read a letter from Comptroller General Lindsay Warren saying that present law does not require a loyalty oath from students getting atomic fellowships.

There has been some dispute about the law. O'Mahoney has declared Congress will change the law to require such oaths.
