Mrs. Erwin C. Thompson, 1313 Terrace, as group secretary, is the official "foster mother" of the little boy, who was or-phaned during the war years.

The local class sends \$15 per onth to the care of the small boy, and must send at least one tter. Mrs. Thompson told The News the group is planning to send boxes of clothing as well. The tragic history of "Nikos,"

as he is called, is that his father, a shoemaker who cared well for his family, was killed by a mortar shell in 1944; and one day shortly afterward his mother disappeared. It is believed she was executed by the Germans, according to information received from Foster Parents' Plan. There is one brother, John, who is in an orphanage.

Nikos lives with relatives, making six in a one-room "house." The man of the house cannot work because he has tuberculosis; and his wife makes the equiva-lent of \$25 per month — de-


