However, a spokesman for Yablonski said the dissident candidate was not conceding defeat and added "legal action is contemplated" on the alleged use of union money and personnel in the Boyle campaign.

Boyle pulled to an early lead and never lost it during the long night of counting paper ballots at the local level. The reports were telephoned to each of the 25 district headquarters, which then relayed returns to Boyle's office. Most observers felt Boyle would win, although betting was close. The final vote will be certified to the membership Jan. 1.

NEW YORK (UPI)—With a more accommodating monetary policy developing in 1970 and at least measured progress made in Vietnam, "the outlook beyond the immediate foreground favors the development of a solid upthrust in the stock market as 1970 proceeds," Standard & Poor's says. Though the near-term business outlook calls for a restrained investment approach for the time being, launching of a more aggressive policy should not be held up until better earnings prove a certainty, the firms says.

Ever since October, 1968, critics of growth and speculative stocks have been coming forward at each fresh sign of correctional activity and insisting that it is time to get out of overpriced growth stocks in order to buy blue-chip bargains. Highlights Of Nixon's News Conference

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Highlights of President Nixon's news conference:

Vietnam—Another U.S. troop withdrawal will be announced in two or three weeks. The number withdrawn depends on events in the meantime. So far, his "Vietnamization" plan is proceeding "with more progress than we had anticipated," and he does not anticipate any reversal of the withdrawal process. Infiltration is somewhat higher than a month ago but still lower than a year ago. There has been "no significant change" in the military situation since his Nov. 3 address to the nation, and he does "not anticipate any progress on the negotiating front (at Paris) at this time." But he sees an end to the war on the long-range horizon.

My Lai—While the guilt of particular individuals is still to be determined by trial, there definitely was a "massacre" of civilians and "under no circumstances was it justified." Investigation to date indicates that it was "an isolated incident." Overwhelming majority of U.S. troops have behaved with "generosity and decency" toward Vietnamese civilians and their honorable record must not be "smeared" because of atrocities committed by a few. He will not appoint a civilian commission—as proposed by Democrats—"at this time."

Taxes—He will veto the tax reform bill if it emerges from Congress containing such senate-approved features as an increase in personal exemptions from \$600 to \$800 a year and a 15 per cent Social Security increase. "If I signed this kind of bill the Senate is about to pass I would be reducing taxes for some Americans and raising prices for all, and that I will not do."

News Coverage—He believes Vice President Spiro T. Agnew "rendered a public service in talking in a very dignified and courageous way" about the fairness of television news coverage. Agnew "did not advocate censorship." For himself, Nixon welcomes expressions of opinion by the news media—provided they are plainly labeled and kept separate from straight news reports. "I don't want intellectual eunuchs writing or talking about the news." He feels the news media have been "generally fair" to him and he has "no complaint."

Arms Talks—Progress in the S.Soviet talks on limitation of strategic arms has been "encouraging...better than I anticipated." Both sides are making serious proposals, not trying to score propaganda points, and that is a good sign.
