Building Permits Show Slight Increase Over Same Period Last Year

AUSTIN — (AP) — Texas building permits increased four percent from September and 31 percent from October of last year, the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reported.

The bureau's index of permits, after adjustment for seasonal variation, was 98 percent of the 1935-39 base period, 15 percent below September.

September to October increases ranged from a fractional gain in Pampa to a 111 percent jump in Corsicana. Significant gains also were reported by Lubbock, Big Spring, Beaumont, Houston, Temple, Galveston and El Paso.

Decreases from September varied from two percent in Bryan to 79 percent in Texas City. Other sharp declines were noted in Tyler, Kerrville, Marshall, Jacksonville and Brownsville.

The dollar value of permits more than doubled during the

12-month period in Childress, Lockhart, Longview, Lubbock, Plainview, Snyder, Sweetwater, and Temple. Other notable gains were recorded by Lamesa, San Angelo, Austin, Beaumont, Waco, Wichita Falls, San Antonio.

Permits for residential construction totaled \$19,426,000 in October compared with \$16,785,000 for nonresidential construction and \$4,702,000 for additions, alterations and repairs.

By city-size groups, cities over 100,000 population granted permits amounting to \$21,162,000 in comparison to \$9,967,000 for cities in the 50,000-100,000 population group and \$8,339,000 for cities below 25,000.

October permits amounted to \$10,867,000 in Houston, \$4,649,864 in Dallas, \$3,734,631 in San Antonio, and \$2,511,428 in El Paso.

Color That Sings For Your Supper

NEW YORK — Dining rooms today feature a simplicity of furnishing and a richness of color that make them fairly sing — for supper... and every other mealtime!

This quality is outstanding in a lovely Chinese modern room where the walls and woodwork are painted in a luscious pomgranate color which accents the beauty of fine furniture, finished in an almond tone. The chairs are upholstered in celadon green leather which matches the draperies. Painted and flower prints, hand-painted on old rice paper and mounted on black spatter-dash mats, hang at each side of the fireplace. The hand-tufted rug is very light in tone.

Such beauty of color in the dining room provides a perfect foil for holiday decorations and for the table linens, china and glass now in vogue. They are so colorful, in themselves, that only a simple centerpiece is needed to impart a gala air.

For variety, match the tablecloth color with the wall color and use napkins or china in a different hue. Candles which repeat the color of the cloth, place mats, or napkins, are a harmonious touch.

If your "party" tablecloth is a clear, bright yellow, a grayed lavender would be effective for the walls. With gray, pale blue, rose or lavender table linen, try jonquil, butter yellow or soft citron. If you want a wall tone that will look attractive with practically any color — including white or ivory damask and delicately decorated china — choose off-white, French gray, or any of the light gray shades.

One ultra-fashionable effect for a small dining room includes walls in a medium bluish gray called gunmetal. This sets off a table cheerfully covered with a lacquer red linen cloth, accented by green napkins and plates with pink and green borders. With such dark walls, there should be at least one strong, definite hue in the table setting. Light colors other than white, such as pale yellow, glowing mahogany and brass candlesticks completed the centerpiece arrangement.

In a modern-style dining room, the blond wood table with pale rose mats was set off by two side walls painted a soft green. A window wall in rose harmonized with the table mats. The leaves of the flower centerpiece repeated the green of the walls. A porcelain figurine in green glaze was used at times as a substitute for the flowers.

Fire in Church Of Holy Sepulchre Is Extinguished

JERUSALEM — (AP) — A fire in the Christian-venerated Church of the Holy Sepulchre in Jerusalem's old city died down Friday after causing little damage.

The reassuring report was brought by foreign diplomats who visited the fire scene. They said on their return through Arab lines that the blaze only partly damaged the leaden main dome and cupola, and a layer of felt and tar underneath the dome.

The flames, they added, did not damage the reinforced concrete inner layer of the dome or heavy scaffolding inside the church supporting the rotunda itself.

Many Christians believe the church covers the spot where the sepulchre was located. The body of Christ was taken to the sepulchre after the crucifixion. Some authorities, however, question the authenticity of the site.

The fire broke out Wednesday night. Handicapped by lack of modern fire-fighting equipment, Arabs, Moslems and Christians joined in battling the flames. Monks of five denominations moved all the treasures of the shrine to safety. They included sacred images and rich fixtures.

Help Your Furnace to Be Honest

A terrible feeling "to have fuel burning merrily in your furnace while you shiver upstairs. In fact, it's foolish as well as expensive when you can do something about it.

One afternoon spent tuning up your furnace may cut your fuel bill as much as 20 percent. Insulation, weatherstripping, caulking, and storm windows can save another 20 to 40 percent.

To clean the furnace, first remove the smoke pipe between the furnace and chimney and clean thoroughly with a stiff wire brush. If the pipe is weak or perforated, replace it. Before setting it back, seal all leaks at the flue opening in the chimney with furnace putty. After the smoke pipe is put in place, carefully seal all connecting joints.

Open the chimney cleanout door at the base of the chimney and clean in there. Next, open the furnace cleanout doors and with a wire brush and scraper, clean out all soot from the heating surfaces, gas passages and fire box walls. Then tightly seal the cleanout doors and all cracks around the doors. You can locate leaks by passing a lighted candle around. If there's a leak, the flame will be sucked in.

Tips for Fixing Up Guest Room



To make a delightful dressing table for a guest room or a bedroom, try this:

Take a large, deep old-fashioned or Victorian picture frame and form the top. Mount this on a shallow box, so that you have shadow-box display case under glass. A small chest of drawers old table legs or even a packing case can be used for the base of the dressing-table. Drape it with a pinch-pleated or gathered skirt.

In the shadow-box, display small pieces of handmade American glassware, such as colorful old paperweights, old inkwells, small bottles, cup plates and so on.

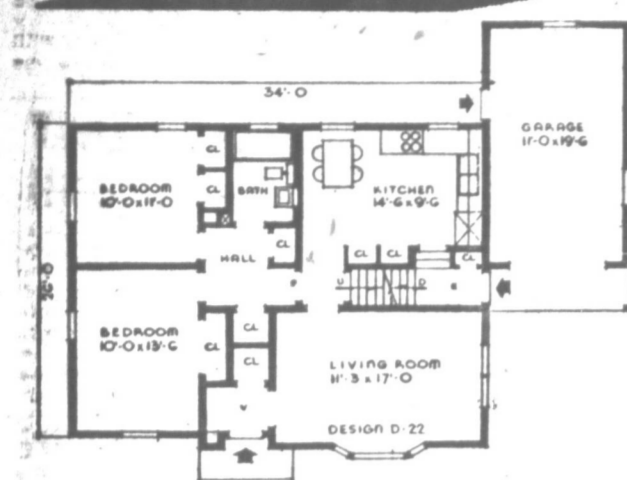

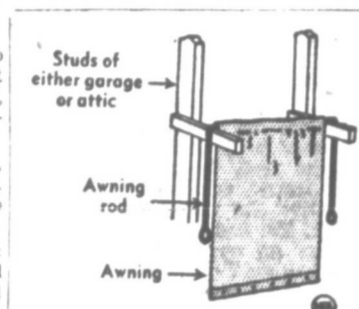
How to Help Awnings Hibernate

Your awnings did a good job during the summer. But they got a lot of wear and tear doing it, and a little extra care will prolong their life.

When you take awnings down, carefully inspect and clean them. Wash the fabric with a mild soap and rinse thoroughly.

Repair all breaks in the fabric or at the seams. Awning thread or a good quality carpet thread will do. It should be run through paraffin or bees wax before stitching to make it more impervious to moisture. Reinforce all patches snugly.

Awnings will mellow and rot unless given a protective coating of awning paint. This paint is available in cans, or you can use a solution of paraffin dissolved in turpentine or kerosene. Use one pound of paraffin to one gallon of liquid. Shave the paraffin so that it will dissolve easily. Be sure the canvas is dry and taut.



Storing awnings for winter

Apply the solution with an ordinary paint brush.

Never fold awnings when storing; instead place them on wooden racks, similar to those shown in the sketch, and hang them as free from folds as possible.

The metal or wood slat awnings, which generally are permanently attached to the house, require little maintenance other than periodic painting.

Few Large Pieces of Furniture Seems Best

A few large pieces of furniture in a small room are better than a collection of many small pieces because the latter seem to be always under foot cluttering the room.

Avoid particularly the use of more than one table. To lighten the effect of the massive sofa and chairs, choose plain upholstery in a medium color, such as blue-gray, and floor the room with cream or light buff asphalt tile.

Inset inch-wide black strips of the flooring material three feet apart diagonally across the narrow dimension of the room. Diagonal installation in a light single asphalt tile comes not only in squares but in half-tile cut diagonally at the factory to eliminate on-the-job cutting. To remove the plainness of the room hang a light-colored figured draperies at the windows.

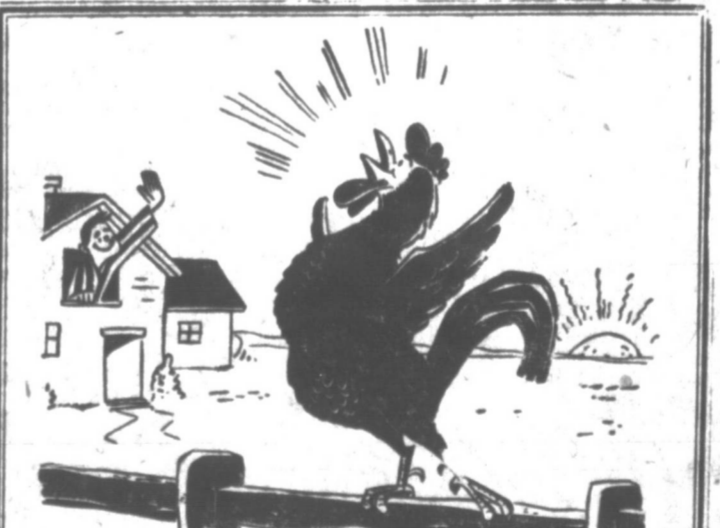

day's hand, which came up at the national tournament in Chicago. Mrs. Flasher was the declarer (North) and her partner was Dr. Louis Mark of Columbus.

Confirming a thought I have often expressed, Mrs. Flasher pointed out the importance of the play of the first trick. The careless play would be to win the first trick with the ace of diamonds in dummy. But if you stop to think and count your tricks, you can see that if declarer plays the ten of diamonds on the first trick, and it loses, she still can make four diamond tricks. The ace of clubs will make five, four trump tricks are mine, and the ace of spades ten. Now all she has to do is to ruff two spades to make the contract.

When the ten of diamonds holds the first trick, declarer should then lead the three of spades, win it with the ace, trump the deuce of spades in dummy with the deuce of hearts, lead the seven of hearts, pick up the trumps, take the diamond finesse, and discard three losers on the three good diamonds.

If declarer wins the first trick with the ace of diamonds, the timing on the hand is lost. Even though a second diamond finesse is taken, the contract will not be made.

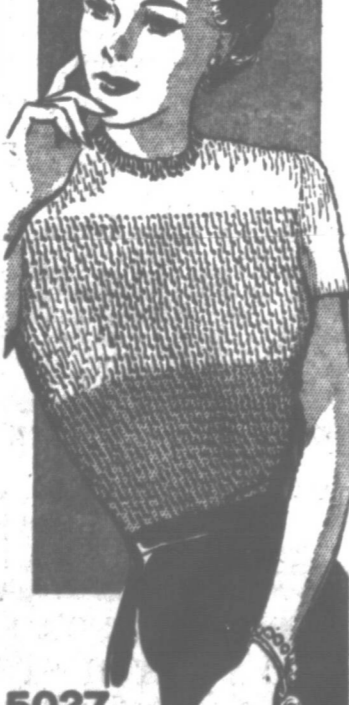
But all too often they are afraid to antagonize their children, or to make their children "different" from others in the group.

The mature woman should destroy the false mental image of her looks that she carries with her. Leaving through recent candid photos and comparing these with early album photographs will help her to plan her new approach. Peering objectively in a full-length mirror will tell her what needs to be done.

From her analysis, the older woman should start fresh and build her new wardrobe around tones and colors that flatter her mature figure, select hats that will crown her "new" hair and apply make-up to highlight her mature loveliness.

Billy Hooper, Rowles, ran 67 yards the only time he carried the ball across the line of scrimmage and passed 44 yards for another touchdown as he engineered the Mustangs' 50-0 victory over Big Spring.

Bulldog Tilt Shows Weak Spots in Play

The Pampa Harvesters will be back popping leather again this afternoon after a three-day rest during which they rested up their aches and bruises left from the narrow victory over the Borger Bulldogs. And it will be hard work for a few days for the Green and Gold, you can be sure, because the Bulldogs didn't stop the charging Bulldog backs.

The blocking was so poor that the Pampa attack, which has been mainly on the ground all season, had to take to the air. The ground game was held to 112 yards net, the smallest amount the Harvesters have been able to gain all season long. The Borger line was big, but the Green and Gold has run up against just as big a line this season before.

The tackling will definitely have to be shooting stuff this weekend against the Coyotes. The entire Wichita Falls backfield runs terrifically hard. A shoulder or necktie tackle won't stop them. Many fans who have seen both the Coyotes and the Lubbock Westerners are of the opinion that the Coyote backfield runs harder, though maybe not as fast. Tommy Fields, Bill Waggoner, James Self and Billy Bookout form a quartette that any coach in the state would be happy to have.

The last time the two met the Harvesters fought them a fine battle, losing 14-6. Then a safety and a questionable touchdown entered into the final score. They were able to hold the Coyote backs in check pretty well that night. It was sheer fight and determination that did the job, as the Coyotes outweigh and out-expertise the Harvesters at every position. And if they could do it before, with that type of fight, they might be able to turn the trick at home.

The Borger game produced a new scoring leader for the Harvesters. Co-captain Pete Cooper scored both touchdowns to go ahead of Jimmy Hayes, who had led all season, 64 points to 48. Hugh Gracy maintained his 5 rushing average of 4 for 5 tries. Hayes' average dropped to 6.9 as he was held to 40 yards on 13 tries. Elmer Wilson slipped to 5.8 as he gained 15 yards in 4 tries. Dale Richerson is fourth with a 5.0 average. Carl Kennedy has a 3.9 mark and Pete Cooper is right behind him with a 3.8.

Four Bowls Filled; Good Teams Few

NEW YORK — (AP) — The four richest bowls were chock full of football teams today, but not promising a game resembling a national championship.

Two of the nation's four leading touchdown machines, California and Oklahoma, are represented in the post-season lineup, but on different fronts. The other two Notre Dame and Army, are not interested.

That leaves the big part of the bowl wrangling up to a group of eleven with lack-luster records.

California and Oklahoma were among five major teams finishing with unsplashed records. The others were Notre Dame, Army and College of the Pacific.

The remaining six teams in the major bowls carry an embarrassing total of 11 defeats and three ties among them.

The lineup for the Jan. 9 games:

Rose Bowl — California (10-0) vs Ohio State (7-1-2).

Sugar Bowl — Oklahoma (10-0) vs Louisiana State (8-2).

Cotton Bowl — Rice (9-1) vs North Carolina (7-3).

Orange Bowl — Santa Clara (7-2-1) vs Kentucky (9-2).

The Sugar Bowl was the last to complete its program, waiting until late yesterday to name Louisiana State as the foe for Bud Wilkins' split-T specialists from the Southwest.

LSU landed in the vast neighboring New Orleans stadium the hard way after dropping early season games to Kentucky and Georgia.

The Southeastern Conference has a rule that a team must have at least a .750 record in the league to be eligible for post-season play. LSU battled .667.

But after the Bengals smashed Tulane's bowl hopes Saturday, 21-0, the circuit voted to waive the regulation.

Oklahoma, which trounced North Carolina in the same saucer a year ago, was an automatic selection to return after stumbling Oklahoma A&M, 41-0, for its 20th straight victory.

Rice, beaten only by LSU, won the host role in the Cotton Bowl at Dallas by overwhelming Baylor, 21-7, in the game that also decided the Southwest Conference championship.

For an opponent the Cotton Bowl officials reached all the way across Dixie and grabbed three-beaten North Carolina, the color of the erratic team that is spearheaded by Charlie (Choo Choo) Justice.

They made up their minds in advance that the winner of the Tar Heel-Virginia game would get the nod. With Justice starting, North Carolina edged the Cavaliers, 14-7.

Kentucky, one of the great defensive outfits in an era of offensive attack, won the favor of the Orange Bowl Committee with 21-0 triumph over the University of Miami Friday night. The Wildcats lost only to Southern Methodist and Tennessee.

Snubs Natural In Bowl Deals Say Cottonmen

DALLAS — (AP) — Snubs come naturally in this bowl business, the Cotton Bowl reasons in explaining why it took North Carolina despite an alleged "rumor" last year.

The Dallas News, obviously speaking for Cotton Bowl officials, said today "the bowl game muddle is that way each year. What team does not jockey for the best position? Sure, they held the Cotton Bowl on the hook while trying to decide between the Sugar and Cotton bowls. The same goes for every bowl."

North Carolina was chosen Saturday to meet Rice, champion of the Southwest Conference, in the Cotton Bowl Jan. 2. It occasioned considerable surprise not only in view of North Carolina's record (it lost three games, two by big margins) but because Dan Rogers, chairman of the Cotton Bowl board, said after last January's Cotton Bowl game and between Southern Methodist and Oregon that North Carolina intimated it would come to the Cotton Bowl and later changed its mind and went to the Sugar Bowl. It left the Cotton Bowl on a limb.

The News said Army and Oklahoma were sought for the Cotton Bowl but could not be obtained and that Kentucky was not considered because it had lost a game to Southern Methodist. College of the Pacific because it didn't play a major league schedule and Tulane because Louisiana State because they seemed the logical Sugar Bowl choice. Also, it added, Louisiana State beat Rice in early season.

Clay Named on All-American Defensive Unit

NEA Picks Both Defense, Offense Teams

NEW YORK (NEA)—The old-fashioned All-America is as outmoded as the 60-minute man. With the entire concept of football changed, why not alter the All-America procedure? With the two-platoon system in vogue, there is no basis for comparison, no way of judging the combatants. How, for example, are you going to weigh the worth of a defensive guard against a running guard, or a tackling back against a running back?

So NEA Service's far-flung selectors, comprising coaches, scouts, opposing players, football writers and other competent observers, give you the very first edition of two-platoon All-America Teams, an offensive and defensive side.

The quarterback is omitted from the defensive unit, replaced by an added linebacker. Any one of the guards can drop back or fill in in the line, as the ever-changing defensive patterns warrant. The defending halfbacks and safety man are, of course, swift offensive backs adept in plenty of fancy stepping with intercepted passes and kicks.

Offensive ends are Notre Dame's Leon Hart and Army's Dan Foldsberg. The six-foot four, 245-pound Hart towers over one of the greatest ND lines. He plays both ends, turns the entire side of a line with his blocks, in a fine target and pass receiver, carries on end-around plays. Foldsberg is a 245-pound, 245-pound junior, is West Point's top end.

Offensive tackles are Oklahoma's Wade Walker and Michigan's Allen Wahl. Walker is the finest blocking tackle in modern football history, really can turn 'em with vital strong-side blocks from the Split T. Wahl, six feet two and 215, is another of four juniors with the offensive six group. Fast and agile, he is rated ahead of more publicized tackles.

Offensive guards are Kentucky's Bob Gain and Minnesota's Leo Neallin. Gain, six feet three, 225 pounds, and a junior, is perhaps the principal link in the Wildcats' progression back to big-time football.

Normal six feet two and 225 pounds, was the anchor of the vaunted Minnesota line. Running like a halfback, he has played end, tackle and guard, was the middle man of the Gophers' celebrated defensive five-man line. Gain is also a tackle, but the selection board wanted the offensive platoon big and fast.

Rice's six-foot two-inch, 225-pound Joe Watson is the offensive center, considered the most formidable in the memory of the Southwest Conference's oldest inhabitant.

College of the Pacific's five-foot eight-inch, 165-pound Eddie LeBaron is the offensive quarterback. A top professional prospect despite his lack of size, his extraordinary ball-handling even fooled experienced officials.

Offensive halfbacks are Southern Methodist's Doak Walker and Notre Dame's Eddie Sitko. Golden Boy Walker does things from the old double wing that originator Pop Warner never dreamed of. Six-Yard Sitko probably is the most vicious straight-away runner in college football.

Virginia's John Papp is the offensive fullback. The six-foot 190-pounder is rated superior to Bill Dudley, the present Detroit Lion who was an All-America with the Cavaliers.

NEA's board brings you a defensive alignment of proven ability, athletes who have also exhibited their offensive skill. Most of them are 60-minute men when necessary, and all are seniors.

Defensive ends are six-foot two-inch, 193-pound Kenney Powell of North Carolina and Stanford's six-foot three-inch, 205-pound Ken Rose. Powell shifts to left end on defense to catch the opposition's strong stuff. Notre Dame's superior blockers couldn't cut him down. Rose, labeled by Archie Schwartz as the best blocking end he has seen, doubled as a stickout punter.

Defensive tackles are Notre Dame's Jim Martin and Michigan State's Ed Bagdon. Martin, six feet two and 204, moved in from end, and his experience there gives him added mobility to cope with unusual situations. Normally a guard and the fastest lineman in major college football, the five-foot nine-inch, 207-pound Bagdon lends more striking power to the defense.

Some Facts to Be Thinking About

IT DOESN'T seem to be a question any longer whether or not the country is headed toward all-out socialism, but rather by what means it will arrive there. There is one road by which we seem to be traveling there; and if there are those who doubt that the country is going in that direction, they might consider the following facts.

THERE ARE 183,000 persons in New York state who work for the federal government, according to a report Oct. 1, by the Bureau of Labor Statistics. The Dunn Survey of Greenwich, Conn., after years of fact-finding, has established that every federal employee controls, for the party in power, on the average of four votes.

IN NEW YORK state that means 732,000 votes were committed to the New Deal candidate. In the election this month that meant Herbert Lehman, running for the U. S. Senate with the personal blessing of President Truman.

ACCORDING TO Ralph W. Gwinn, himself a member of Congress, the figures released a few days ago, New York state contained only about 59,000 federal employees 17 years ago—in 1932, or the year that Herbert Hoover went out of office. That against 183,000 now employed by the federal government and living in New York state. That means more than twice as many persons are employed in New York state by the U. S. government. That happened in 17 years.

IF THE FEDERAL government adds employees proportionately over the years just ended, New York should not have any trouble keeping itself in power.

BUT WE want to know, though, what will happen when 59 million people are working for the government, and the federal mills are trying to keep real commerce going.

WASHINGTON — (NEA) — The path will soon be cleared for an avalanche of claims for World War Two damages sustained by American citizens overseas. They may total over \$250,000,000.

They may cover all kinds of cases. Big oil companies whose plants were seized or destroyed by the Japs. American traders and agents whose small businesses in the Orient were wiped out by the Japanese invasion. Foreign missionary organizations whose churches, schools or hospitals may have been damaged. Missionaries who gave aid to war refugees, for which they have never been paid. Employees of American business firms caught overseas by the outbreak of the war. Survivors or dependents of prisoners of war.

Congress has passed laws to pay war damages to only the prisoners of war and interned civilians. But Congress has recognized that others may have valid claims against the government for war damages. So it has set up a War Claims Commission which only now, four years after the end of the war — is in business to receive and process all these claims.

Fair Enough - Pegler

NEW YORK — There seems to be considerable indignation over the platoon system in football and it is my intention to defend or denounce it with great vehemence as soon as I can make up my mind what is right or wrong with same. Meanwhile, I mark that this is a device of the coaches, a hapless, ill-used lot

of wretches whose frowns are a terror to their own players, on graduation, they prolong their adolescence with, as it were, post-graduate juvenility and, at the age of 35 or 40, find themselves outaged, unemployed and busied. The ex-coaches, about 30 in the entire U. S. A. in any given season, only prove the rule and even these presently go drifting into odd jobs selling athletic tackle, insurance or burial plots with petty shadings such as jury duty with all-America boards, spotting for broadcasters and officiating for the pros.

The distortion, indeed the profanation of football, has been altogether the doing of the very men who profess to hold it dear and, in their fashion, do. They have altered the shape of the football from the buxom balloon that the likes of Eckersall and Heston used to kick and carry to the small and slender cherub of now.

They have, periodically, done away with such accoutrements, such as the paper-mache helmets and the concrete cestus with which, for a time, it was the joyous practice to slug offensive linemen just beneath the skull, and either brought them back in some new guise or hatched new atrocities. The goal posts have retreated, advanced and fallen back again in a sort of dance and the mighty winds that blew in the horrible evils of men in motion as the coaches met in high consistency are howling now again for and against the new custom of taking out and putting in whole teams at once and at will.

The day is long past when eleven men played the entire game for a side and substitutes were called only to replace warring players by accident or the subtle arts of mayhem. The Army played Notre Dame without a substitution in 1929, the year Jack Elder plucked a pass from Red Grange and ran 95 yards to the touchdown that beat West Point contrary to the odds and expectations. But that was 20 years ago and even then the custom of replacing wounded men or dopes had been established, but the confusion and anger, he said, of the working press upstairs. It is exacting work, at the easiest, to cover football by the play and my contention, when I get into it, is that I would like to see the day when I awarded all doubtful gains off tackle to Johnny Garvey, of Scranton. I probably was more right in my wrong, for this was the only successful buck Yale had, but my point is that Knute Rockne made our hard lot worse by sending in whole gangs of ruffians and even more so by jumbling the line numbers so that they might have the center catching a forward from a guard.

Like Yost and Zuppke and Warner before, Rockne was an original. He raised his standards were always raising cries for new rules to make him quit what he was doing. But his lavish use of men probably was due to other motives than the actual need of the moment. Rockne had dozens of players who would have been first string anywhere so he may have jiggled his lineups just to keep the stars humble and hearten those who were not quite recognized as yet.

It was unthinkable in the years of his glory and to the day he was killed in a plane crash, that Rockne ever could lose his charm, prestige and pull. I think I observe that all the other great coaches of that time have waned and vanished. It is a fierce business, coaching, and the heartless need of institutions of learning in casting off family members when they begin to lose is a mournful fact of our cultural life. The coaches themselves develop a dogged corps spirit and put their heads together against a common enemy, the world. They are the authority who dictate the changes in the rules, always in their own interests as a protection against the alumni and the brittle, sapless double-domes who hold forth as presidents and blink notorious lies and false pretenses as to the amateurism of their Hebraians.

By R. C. BOILER The Nature and History of the Growth of State Power

I have been commenting and quoting from "On Power, Its Nature and the History of its Growth" by Bertrand de Jouvenel. Under the chapters "Power and Politics" the author makes some very interesting statements showing how the beliefs of individuals tend to determine the nature of the power of government. Here are some of the things he says:

"What the inquiring mind first sees in any human formation are the emergent authorities which supersede its groupings and direct its activities. But soon it realizes that the rules and constraints of these visible authorities could not of themselves achieve harmony and cooperation among men. Invisible Director

"The behavior of individuals is much less influenced by the external forces pressing upon them than by an invisible director who determines their actions from within. Each man with a certain position in a given society strays only in the most exceptional cases from a typical behavior. This regularity is produced by a code of beliefs and moralities which is deeply embedded in the nature of man himself."

"The ancients showed, by the importance which they attached to folkways, wars, good government, and the like, that they were aware that it was almost impossible.

"So long as persons of every degree behave according to fixed rules which everybody knows, their actions under all circumstances can be predicted with a certain confidence and confidence reigns in human relationships. Conversely, a non-conformist behavior upsets all calculations and every precaution necessary, stirs up a whirl of reprisal for its own wrongful acts of aggression, and, if the evil grows, unleashes in the end hatred, distrust, and violence."

In other words if people are governed by eternal natural, rational laws then a good government can be had. If they are governed by emotions and whims and beliefs that there are no laws superior to the will of the majority, then we cannot predict with any certainty what the next act of the government will be.

Denying Divine Lawgiving "A Power which regulates human behavior according to its own notions of social utility is absolute in a quiet different way from one whose subjects have their own notions prescribed for them by God. And here we glimpse the fact that the denial of a divine lawgiving and the establishment of a human lawgiving are the two sides of the same coin which society can take towards a truly absolute Power. So long as a supernatural origin was ascribed to law, this step remained unmade."

"If God is the author of law, who else is there worthy to amend it? There must be a new law from Him. And so we find Christians who, in the name of the law of God, the New Law, and the Moral Law, in so far as it dealt with points on which Jesus did not touch, the Old Law. St. Thomas so refers to them."

The ancients recognized that laws were eternal. As the author says: "Cicero expounds the nature of law as clearly as anyone could wish: "Our greatest philosophers have unanimously concluded that laws are eternal and unchangeable, not anything at all resembling the rules of day-to-day life; rather it is something eternal which governs the universe by the will of God, which its deers and prohibitions are conceived. According to these same authorities this primitive law is nothing other than the supreme law, the law of God himself, whose sovereign reason is the source of every precept, whether to do or not to do. From this law comes the nobility of that which is called the law of nature, which is in fact the reason and wisdom embodied in the man who has learnt to command what is good and prohibit what is bad."

The situations which arise make necessary the law of man, which Cicero makes distasteful allusion: "Rules of day-to-day life" he calls them. But what a difference there is between the divine law and these human laws! As the seat of the supreme law is in the divine spirit who conceived it, it resides no less in the spirit of the man who is wise or perfect. Such are the words of the ancients who speak with different voices on the same subject and last but for a time, they bear the name of law rather than popular sequence, that is, of custom."

The Nation's Press

FLEDGES AND PEACE (The Wall Street Journal) Some time ago Soviet Foreign Minister Vishinsky proposed to the United Nations that the Big Five join in a non-aggression pact. The other day the United States and Britain got around to rejecting this idea.

Now these are pretty little doubt that it might as well be rejected. Facts, as we all know, are made to be broken, and few nations can rival the pact-breaking record of the Soviet Union. This particular proposal laid the onus of war-mongering on America and Britain, which greatly enhanced its chances of rejection by these countries.

But what did the United States and Britain offer in place of the pact? A resolution calling on all the members of the United Nations to refrain from threatening or using force, to carry out in good faith all international agreements, to agree to international control of atomic energy, to settle international disputes by peaceful means and in a number of other ways to behave pliantly in accordance with the spirit of the U. N. charter.

WASHINGTON — A new, political dynasty is rising at the Capital to profit from the golden days of the Roosevelt era. A New Deal heaven to the Tommie Corcorans, Dean Achesons, Paul Porters, Thurman Arnolds and other erstwhile officials under Franklin D. Roosevelt.

In law, as in its closely related field of politics, it pays the everyday, bread-and-butter practitioners to stand in with today's reigning family, not yesterday's. And the men in position to hand out favors to the bar-risters these days are Harry S. Truman and Alben W. Barkley, although the President is not a lawyer and the vice president has never practiced law himself in practice or otherwise.

But "Yea's" son-in-law, Max O'Rell Truitt of Millsburg, Mo., whose rise in the government and the law has been sensational, is now understood to be making more or at least as much money as a supernatural origin was ascribed to law, this step remained unmade.

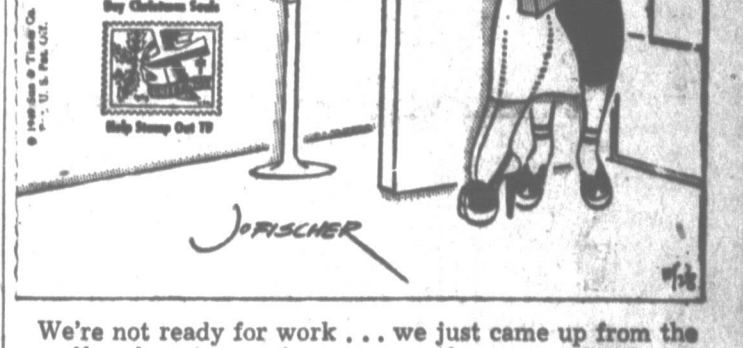
Solon Disputes Late Contention WASHINGTON (AP)—Senator Ives (R-NY) has disputed a contention that most lawmakers from Northern industrial areas will oppose a key part of the Truman civil rights program.

That assertion recently was made by Senator Sparkman (D-Ala.). He predicted that most Northerners from industrial sections will team up with Southern Democrats to block an administration bill to create a fair employment practices commission.

"That argument," Ives told a reporter, "is absolutely refuted by the fact that New York, Massachusetts, New Jersey and Connecticut already have laws which do what the bill in Congress proposes to do on a national scale."

Sparkman argued that the bill's impact would be much greater in Northern industrial areas than in the South. Dixie senators have made it clear they intend to filibuster against the bill.

Reed expatriated himself only to die a disillusioned man in Moscow. Larkin died in Ireland, similarly disillusioned. Gitlow broke with communism in 1934 and became a famous and authoritative historian of its innermost feuds.

The first national Conference of Communists was called for June, 1919. Before the meeting could be held, New York State Senator Clayton R. Lusk's committee, set up by the state legislature to investigate the Reds, ordered mass raids. Nearly 1000 left-wingers were jailed, including 80 who later stood trial. Among the 80 were Gitlow and Larkin.

Now began the struggle for power. Left and right-wing Socialists met separately in Chicago, in August and September, 1919. Two Communist parties were organized, with Socialists right reading the Socialist left out of its ranks. The left-wingers called themselves the Communist Labor Party, sending Reed to Moscow as Comintern representative.

By November, 1919, they got together again, and "The Communist" first party organ, announced a merger. You probably never heard of the headlines during this phase — names such as Dennis E. Batt, D. Elbaum, C. C. Johnson, John Kerachner, S. Koppnagle, J. S. Stilson and Ales Staklitsky. None strikes a very familiar chord today.

The official announcement of the merger meeting made clear that its membership knew how subversive it was, by placing the locale of the assembly as "somewhere between the Atlantic and the Pacific, and between the Gulf of Mexico and the Great Lakes." The U.S. Communist Party was underground — even at its birth.

Claiming representation from 32 foreign-born and 25 native-born organizations, the United Communist Party debated for seven days and came up with a constitution. All debating fathers signed the document with aliases, fearful of raids by the Lusk committee and by U.S. Atty. Gen. A. Mitchell Palmer.

This constitution flatly declared: "The Communist Party is an underground, illegal organization."

Where will it end? One fearful prospect is that it may lead to the third world war. Although the movement was made in Moscow and then imported into the new world, it is still managed by Moscow today.

Some say you can't kill an idea with a gun. Nevertheless, it must not be forgotten that the nazism, fascism and Japanese imperialism — merely names for totalitarian movements every bit as dangerous to American freedom — had to be beaten in a shooting war.

But U. S. Chief of Staff Gen. Omar Bradley and Defense Secretary Louis Johnson already have disposed of one burning politico-defense question — possible rearming of Germany.

On his arrival here Bradley told reporters: "Our government does not think of rearming Germany at this time."

Yesterday, in Frankfurt, Johnson said just as emphatically: "The United States has no intention of rearming Germany."

Not the military men, but the defense ministers, political statesmen responsible to their countries' people, are expected to have the final say on the German question.

At this meeting the defense ministers may settle another question vital to military planning but still a political decision: just what are the boundaries of the Atlantic area that the pact's members have agreed to defend.

There are three suggested geographic lines on which the Western allies might stand — the Elbe, deep in Germany; the Rhine on France's border; or the Pyrenees mountains, which would mean virtual abandonment of France to enemy occupation.

(Continued From Page 1) Lillenthal's farewell meeting with the press. His resignation, effective Dec. 31, was accepted with the "utmost regret" by President Truman last week.

Over the weekend, Senator Edwin C. Johnson (D-Colo.) charged Lillenthal with being the ringleader of a "nefarious plot" to hand Great Britain the secret of an American super atomic bomb.

And last Friday, Mr. Truman directed Attorney General McGrath to tighten up the safeguarding of atomic and other defense secrets. The President's action reportedly was prompted mainly by Johnson's Nov. 1 television discussion of atomic weapons.

Johnson, ironically, has long been an advocate of more — not less — atomic secrecy. Lillenthal, on the other hand, has indicated that he thinks freer discussion should be permitted.
