Under two and one-half this week, the Follett Times re-Is Extinguished JERUSALEM -(P) A fire in feet, they pay half-fare; over four and a quarter feet, they pay full the Holy Sepulchre in Jerusalem's fare. old city died down Friday after causing little damage. The reassuring report was brought by foreign diplomats who visited the fire scene. 

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


Thornton Tip Peters Out


