### **Chinese Must Get** Face Saving Plan

They have only 24 hours to make one of the most significant decisions in the history of the world organization. The Security Council meets in emergency session Wednesday morning to consider the charges.

There was the fear that World War III might crupt if they label the Chinese Reds aggressors and authorize UN military action to combat them. Such a war seemed inevitable if Russia supported her ally — the Communist government in Peiping. 





DEAD GEESE MYSTERY-These dead geese were found near a waterhole 35 miles south of Vic toria, Texas. Forty-seven birds were found, and the water was tested in an attempt to find the cause of the deaths. Howard Dodgen, executive secretary of the State Game, Fish and Oyster Commission, blamed the deaths of hundreds of geese in South Texas on aspergillosis, a form of fungus or mold. Dodgen said the disease was harmless to hunters if infected birds were cooked properly. However, Dr. Roy Lander of Victoria warned hunters to avoid handling the birds. Further studies of the disease are being made in a government laboratory in Denver, Colo. (AP

Maybe it's because nobody told him about the "limitations" of heredity and environment and the "conditioning" of the human will






