In a tiny, two-room house at 313 S. Russell, in a bed room where a gas heater was burning high, one man died about 10 a.m today and his friend is ill in a local

hospital. Mrs. Opal Hardy, who is ex-pecting her third child, returned home from the hospital this home from the hospital this morning to find her husband dead.

Both men were lying in the front room of the house; Eugene Hardy, 22, was on a studio couch and Jimmy Rhodes, his friend

on a divan. Both local funeral homes sent ambulances. Rhodes was taken to Pampa Hospital, where his mother is a nurse's aide, by Duenkel-Carmichael and Hardy was taken to the Blackburn-Shaw Sims Funeral Home after he was unced dead.

Sheriff G. H. Kyle has asked for an autopsy to determine the actual cause of death. There were no wounds or marks of violence on either man to indicate foul play, but the gas heater in the where the men were lying room was turned on full and it is possible Hardy died of asphyxiation.

Rhodes, who is believed to have been working in Canadian, returned to Pampa yesterday. He and Hardy visited Mrs. Hardy a local hospital, where she had been receiving treatment the past few days, until late last night.

Rhodes then returned to Hardy's home, where he planned to board with his friend's family. Mrs. Hardy's father, a Mr Smith who lives at the Russell Street Apartments, 323 S. Russell, was due to pay his daugh ter's hospital bill and bring her home this morning. He went next door, where the Hardys lived to waken his son-in-law. saw Rhodes on the divan and tried to shake him awake,

but missed noticing Hardy on couch across the room. He met his daughter at the hospital and told her that "Jim-my is at home dead-drunk." But when Mrs. Hardy entered the house she found her husband dead and Rhodes violently ill. this morning. 
Carlino has been indicted in the death of Vallone, restaurant owner and pardoned former convict. Marino has been charged in the July 15 slaying but not indicted.



Rites Set for Emil Jannings, Silent Film Star

VIENNA, Austria -(AP)- Emil Jannings, who won Hollywood's first Academy Award "Oscar" for his 1928 performance in "The Way of All Flesh," will be buried Friday.

Jannings, 62, died peacefully in his sleep Monday night at his home in Zinkenbach. Suffering om cancer of the liver, the star of the silent screen had been given sedatives to ease his pain. He had been acutely ill for several weeks.

The actor's family said his body would be carried aboard a barge across Lake Wolfgang Friday, from his home to burial place at St. Wolfgang, in the American Zone.

Jannings went to Hollywood in 1926 after winning fame in German movies. His screen successes in America included, in addition to the award winner, such pictures as "The Street of Sin" and "Sins of the Fathers." Because of his imperfect Eng-






