Retail pork prices are unchanged for the past three weeks. Look for best pork values on smoked hams, picnics, shoulder roasts and steaks, end cut lion roasts and chops and liver.

Fryers are still excellent buys in most retail meat departments, and frozen turkeys are available in some stores at low prices.

Check prices on large and medium size eggs for lowest costs, comparing eggs of the same grade. If the cost difference of the two sizes is less than seven cents, the larger size is usually the best buy, Mrs. Clyatt says.

Fresh fruit and vegetable items in good supply at the most economical prices include oranges, bananas, lemons, strawberries, pineapples, corn, potatoes, head lettuce, celery, cabbage, carrots, broccoli, yellow onions, radishes and green onions.
