

## **Auto Industry** Hit New High In Year 1949

DETROIT - (P) - The nation's auto industry built - and - more motor .vehicles in 1949 than in any previous year. Barring an economic upset it may do nearly as well in 1950.

Final official figures probably will not become available until about mid-January, but they are certain to show 1949 output of more tahn 6,000,000 cars and trucks. They also should show that, excepting for the units that always have to be in transit from factory to distributor, most of these vehicles were sold.

The industry's previous produc-tion record was 5,358,420 vehicles, built in 1929. But that year, un-like 1949, saw the industry carry over more than a million unsold vehicles. It was followed, too, by a high total of repossessions.

Whether the steel strike late in the year materially cut down the auto industry's 1949 output is a question in the many quarters. Ten-day to two-week shutdowns of considerably more than half the industry's capacity that began with Thanksgiving Day generally were attributed to the shortage of steel.

But there were many among industry chroniclers who asserted that had there been no steel shortages prolonged shutdowns would have been ordered and attributed to new model changeover work. It is significant that most of the factories that halted assemblies for a time after Thanksgiving Day had just com-pleted their 1949 model produc?

It is significant, too, that they planned no heavy output volume until well into January.

Whatever else may be said about 1949 it must be recorded as the auto industry's most successful year. Aside from record production it brought for most companies the greatest net profit their history.

Examples were General Motors' \$502,414,029 net in the year's first nine months against \$327,-155,222 in the like period of 1948; Chrysler's net of \$97,651,453 against \$59,887,601, and Studebaker, leader of the independents,

\$17,242,245 against \$13,392,724. The family-owned Ford company makes no interim earnings reports.
Only two companies — both

newcomers - ran substantially against the general trend. Kaiser-Frazer which built 181,317 cars in 1948, turned out fewer than 60,000 in 1949. Crosley, which started with relatively low volume in 1939, got production up to nearly 30,000 units in 1948 and dropped to fewer than 10,000

Frequent closings for inventory adjustments marked the year for Kaiser-Frazer.
Aside from huge prodution,

sales, and earnings, 1949 brought more high compression engines and more automatic transmissions the car industry. Design changes, however, were relatively

One of the things that failed to materialize were major price cuts. Several companies, including Ford and General Motors, made minor reductions during the first half of 1949, but the sharp cuts predicted for July and later did not develop.



#### Business Termed 'Extremely Good' In Southwest

WASHINGTON — (P) — Business conditions in the Southwest have been termed "extremely good" and are expected to remain so in

Secretary of Commerce Sawyer made the report to the White House based on his personal inspection of the economic situation over the country.

The secretary reported:

"The Southwest has been experiencing a period of economic growth reminiscent of the opening of the Western frontier."

"The heart of this development is in Texas," he added:

"Striking testimony was provided in all of my meetings there of what it has meant in terms of

"Striking testimony was provided in all of my meetings there of what it has meant in terms of business conditions through the present year.

"The 1949 declines experienced

"The 1949 declines experienced in areas and business lines elsewhere appear to have been not nearly so noticeable in Texas, and recovery seems to have been achieved more rapidly.

achieved more rapidly.

"Indeed, numerous individual businessmen made reports to the effect that in many instances bank loans and debits, drugstore, restaurant, gasoline, automobile and general retail sales would run ahead of 1948 levels both in dollars and otherwise."

The only somber aspects of Sawyer's report on the Southwest concerned the petroleum and livestock industries.

Large imports of oil from the Far East have forced cutbacks in domestic production, hitting independent operators in particular, he said, and lower livestock prices adversely affected ranchers.

adversely affected ranchers.

He reported the effects were felt more severely in Oklahoma than in Texas.

"Comments made to me on business conditions in Oklahoma indicate that, while the same general pattern described above has also been felt there, business conditions have conformed more closely to national trends," his report to John R. Steelman, assistant to the President, said.





By R. C. HOILES Two Concepts of God and Government

In the last issue I was quoting from Bertrand de Jouvenel's book "On Power". He was showing the two different concepts of God and government. One was a concept of God that could be beseeched by prayer and cause the petitioner's request to be granted. The other concept was that God was eternal principle, law, order, sequence, commandments, impersonal rules that could not be changed by man. The author also centended that

there were two kinds of government patterned after the two kinds of concepts of God, or religion. It seems that quite often those people who believe most strongly in their ability to change the will of God by prayer are the kind of people who want a planned econ-

those people who believe that there is a God who can be changed by prayer and who believes planned economy are the kind of people who will never sit down answer questions without evasion. On the other hand, I have always found those people who believe that God is eternal law and believe that a government should be based on laws that no man made and no man can unmake and are eternal are the kind of people who will always attempt to answer any questions about what they are advocating or opposing. They know that laws that are eternal never contradict each other. They are sure that if they are obliged to contradict themselves about what they are advocating or opposing, they are in error and are seeking to put themselves above God's laws.

I want to quote further from this book:

"When Power (government) confines itself to enforcing respect for those laws, the individual moves over ground on which there are both barriers erected and roads marked, but on which, on condition that he respects those barriers and follows those roads, he is free. in the sense that no human will can, by a sudden and arbitrary intervention, disturb his plans and constrain his will. He is recognized as being the master of his fate and responsible for it. He has a consecrated dignity. "Human infirmity, no doubt, will

always stand between us and the complete realization of such a system as this. Our power of discerning the good is not flawless and, still more, our ability to anticipate the useful is unequal to taking into account all possible circumstances. Our laws, in consequence, can never be of an absolutely unalterwisdom must from time to time take a hand in revising the rules. Yet it is certain that this vigilance ventions multiplied unduly will diminish the liberty and dignity of the individual. The conclusion is, then, that government by the laws, undiluted, is in its perfection unrealizable, but remains ever the model and the touchstone, the myth and the inspiration. The cause of social order and human dignity is best served when this



For he can now no longer plan his course by reference to any given certainties, and the knowledge that any activity of his own will avail him much less than to stand well with Power (Government) disposes him towards ambition of a servile kind-to be of those who are in touch with the author of all "miracles", to be a beneficiary of arbitrariness."
